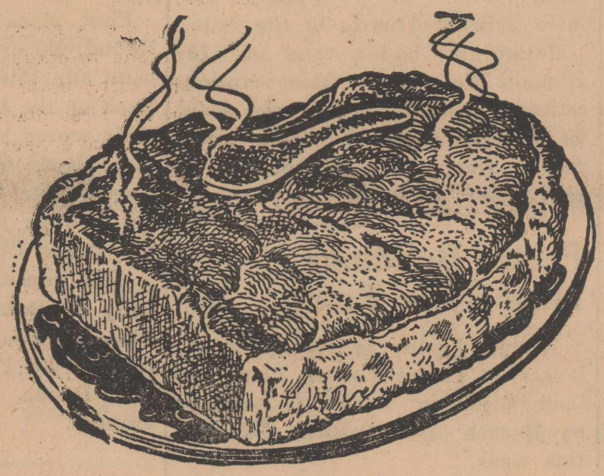

Vets Loan Provisions

Veterans holding permanent type Government insurance should be advised to consider the advantages of borrowing on the cash value of their policy rather than cashing in their policy when confronted with financial emergencies. This is one of the desirable features of having a permanent type policy and the insured may call upon this reserve at any time after the policy is at least one year old.

Policyholders should realize that they can borrow almost as much on their permanent policy as they would get by surrendering the policy for cash and thereby keep their policy in force. They can borrow up to 94 percent of the cash value of their policy.

The amount of cash value of each policy depends upon the amount of the policy and the length of time it has been in force. The policyholder will be granted a loan on his permanent plan policy for any amount up to 94 percent of the cash value of the policy at the time he makes application for such loan.

Such policy loans can be repaid in multiples of \$5 and interest is computed on the unpaid balance and is due annually on the anniversary date of the loan. Should the veteran die before repaying the loan in full, the unpaid balance is deducted from the policy proceeds before the beneficiaries are paid.

The important thing to remember is that once a Government insurance policy is surrendered for the full cash value, all protection ceases forever because the law prohibits a veteran taking out any new GI insurance, with few exceptions.

The six types of permanent insurance carry the policy loan provisions. The term insurance contracts do not provide for any loan benefits.

Interesting Statistics

The VA recently released some statistical information that should be of interest to Texans. They show that as June 30, 1962, there were approximately 1,100,000 veterans living in Texas. Of this number, 774,000 are veterans of World War II; 217,000 from the Korean conflict; 111,000 from World War I; and 7,000 others (which includes the Spanish-American War; Peacetime; and the Indian Wars. The average age of the various groups of veterans is as follows: World War II-43; World War I-68; Korean conflict-30; and others, including Peacetime-36.

About Your HEALTH

Thousands of years ago, the cave dwellers had a simple solution to the sanitation problem -- when conditions became unbearable they simply moved to another cave. But, this presented problems. There were only so many caves to go around. As urban complexes developed, the citizens realized that dumping trash in the streets and hoping that it would rain and wash away soon

turned the city into a huge dump. Today the problem is still with us. Cities pay out a major of their annual budgets to pick up trash and dispose of it in a sanitary manner. To better cope with this problem the Texas State Department of Health conducts a series of demonstration short-courses on the proper disposal of refuse.

This year nine such one-day demonstrations are being conducted--one within easy traveling distance of every community in Texas. Sponsored with the cooperation of

refuse equipment manufacturers and the host cities, engineers from the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Division organize and conduct the demonstrations as well as notify everyone in the area who should be interested in refuse disposal procedure.

The list includes nearly everyone associated with municipal sanitation--mayors, city commissioners, city managers, health officers, sanitarians, sanitation superintendents, public works directors, city engineers, county officials, members of civic organizations and citizens interested in community sanitation and public health.

Highlight of the meetings is a demonstration of collection trucks and sanitary landfill equipment and the correct method for using the equipment.

Sanitary landfill as opposed to other refuse disposal methods in Texas is one method which has considerable potentials in making sanitary refuse - disposal practice economically feasible for many communities.

Basically the method employs three steps -- the refuse is dumped in an excavated trench, it is compacted by heavy tractor equipment, and finally covered with compacted earth.

Garbage, rubbish, and ashes are disposed without nuisance, fire or public health hazards.

Sites of this fall's courses are: Plainview, Sweetwater, Weatherford, Mount Pleasant, Lufkin, Rosenberg, Temple, Kerrville, and Harlingen.

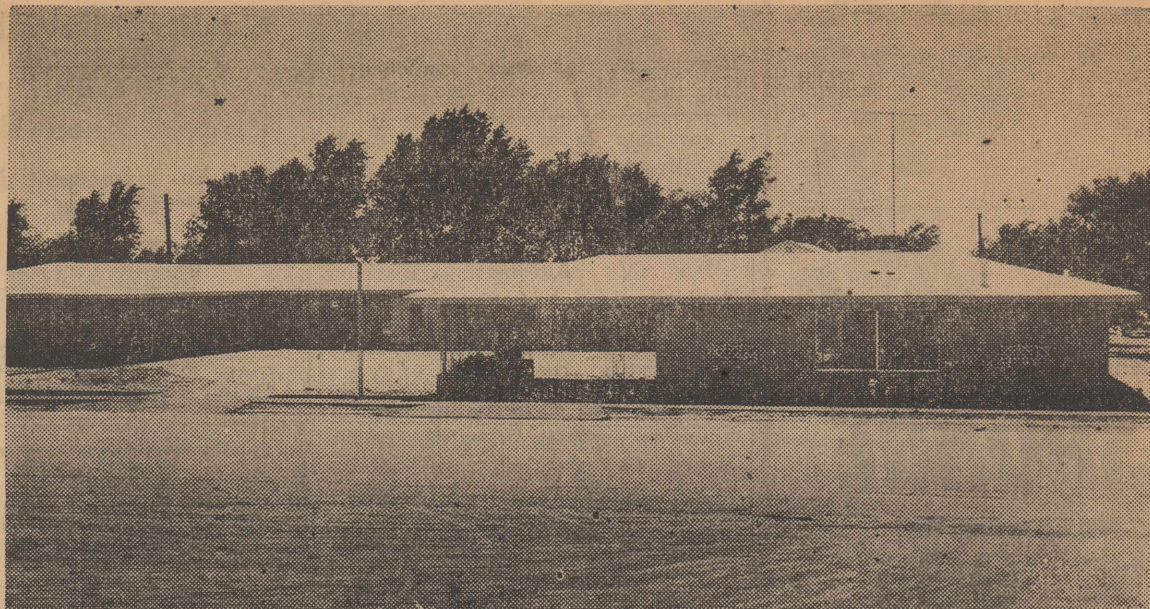

Cotton Classing Work Increasing With Harvest

According to B. B. Manley, Jr., Officer-In-Charge of the USDA's cotton classing office in Abilene, receipts from District 2, totaled approximately 15,850 samples last week. Although this is approximately twice the number of samples received the preceding week, receipts are still below the season normal. The primary reason for this of course is the harvesting in the area continued to be slow because of adverse weather of the preceding week. However, fields were drying and once again getting in good shape for both hand pulling and machine stripping. The Grades improved slightly over the previous week with a small percentage gain of Light Spot Grades, accompanied by a small percentage decrease of Spotted Grades. Two percent of the cotton classed as White, 58 percent was Light Spot, 39 percent was Spotted, 1 percent was below Grade. Middling Light Spot was the predominant grade making up 33 percent of the total.

Staple continued to run about the same as the previous week. Break-down by staple shows the following: 29-32, 12 percent; 15-16, 79 percent; 31-32, 7 percent 1 inch and longer, 2 percent.

Marketing activities continued to increase last week. Some average prices were: Middling Light Spot 15-16, 30.39; Middling Light Spot 29-32, 29.93; Strict Low Middling Light Spot 15-16, 29.36; Strict Low Middling Light Spot 29-32, 28.90; and Middling Spot 15-16, 28.85.

The most common problems for which cotton is reduced in grade when classified are grass and bark. As more cotton is being machine gathered, these problems are becoming more serious.

Mechanical harvesters have a tendency to harvest grass, as well as bark, along with the cotton. Mal-adjusted machinery, or stripping too soon after the plant is killed, causes most barky bales. If the stalk is dry, and machinery adjusted properly, barkies are rare.

Grass and bark are very difficult to separate from the cotton, and their removal results in the loss of cotton which clings, probably a lower grade of finished product.

Since grass and bark lower the value of the lint after it is ginned, producers should improve their cultivating and harvesting practices in a manner which will do away with these costly foreign objects so common to the cotton industry.

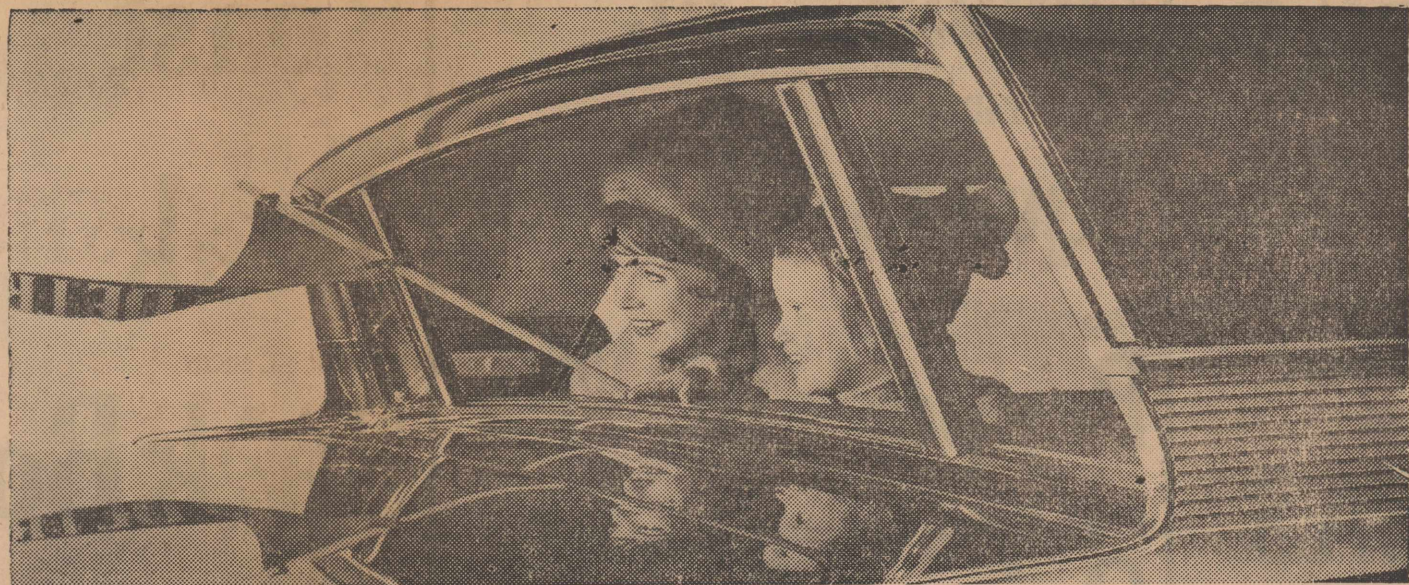

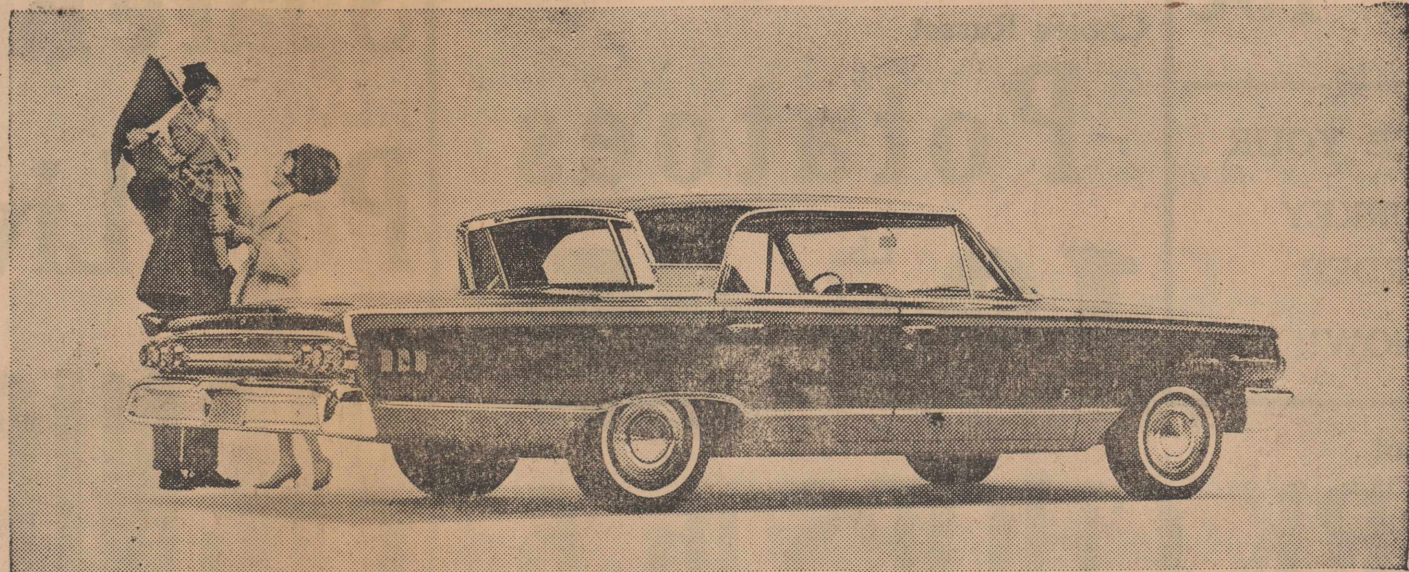

Christmas Seals To Be In Mail Soon

When Mrs. John F. Kennedy, National Honorary Chairman of the Christmas Seal Campaign opens the annual drive early in November, the event will have a personal as well as official significance.

"Christmas Seals are a tradition in our family," she said last year when she accepted the first sheets of Seals from Charles O. Finley, who was the 1961 National Chairman. "I can't think of a year when we haven't used them."

The world quickly fell in love with the new First Lady. Her charm, grace and wit were more evident than when she launched the 1961 Christmas Seal Drive.

The National Chairman, Charles O. Finley, a recovered tuberculosis patient who owns the Kansas City baseball club and Dr. H. Stuart Willis, then president of the National Tuberculosis Association, presented the first sheets of Christmas Seals to her.

As Dr. Willis describes the scene, "When she came into the Oval Room, my heart thumped like a schoolboy's. She's more than beautiful. She has a radiance and warmth that reaches out to you."

She had fun with the news photographers. As she fanned out the sheets of Seals, one man called out, "Hold them higher." Remembering her own days behind a camera, when she worked as an Inquiring Photographer on the Washington Times-Herald in Nineteen fifty-one, Jackie's eyes danced. She raised the Seals squarely in front of her face. Everyone laughed. The stiffness of a White House Presentation was broken.

She was serious, however, when she said, "Again, I'm using Christmas Seals on all of my own correspondence."

Now, as honorary national chairman Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy will present the first 1962 Christmas Seals early in November. The Seal shows a small girl and boy trimming a Christmas tree. She hopes it will bring in enough contributions to surpass the 1961 total.

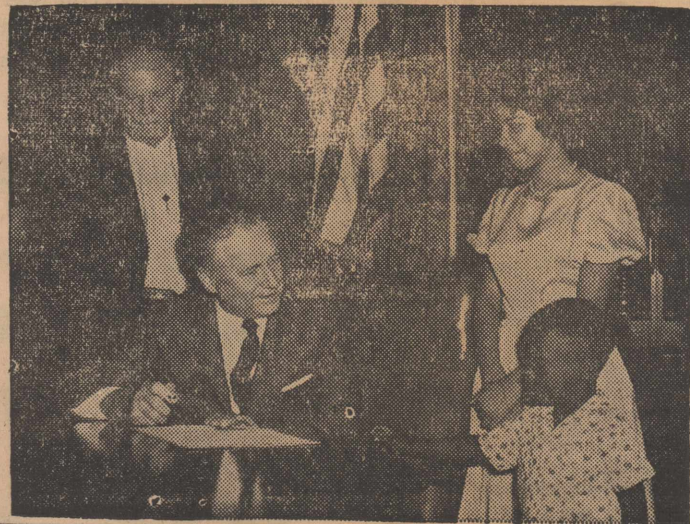

NEWS County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

Texas county agricultural agents and home demonstration agents "headed home" Friday, from Texas A&M College after completing a five-day Texas Agricultural Extension Service conference.

Agents studied the latest on science and technology and how to work with people during the conference which was developed around professional improvement.

Prominent speakers from education, work affairs, research, administration, business and youth rehabilitation work addressed the agents. Among the out-of-state speakers were Dr. Elmer Ellis, president, University of Missouri; Dr. E. T. York, Jr. of Washington, D. C., Administrator, Federal Extension Service; and George B. Strother, professor of commerce, University of Wisconsin. Other speakers were Felix Mc Knight, vice president and executive editor, Dallas Times Herald; George J. Beto, Huntsville, representing the Texas Department of Corrections, Marvin Hurley, executive vice president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce; and Dr. Bernice Moore of the Hogg Foundation and a consultant with the Texas Education Agency, Austin.

Director John E. Hutchison of the Extension Service said the conference theme of "Pursuing Excellence" was in keeping with the goals of the Century Council study and "our own professional improvement efforts."

Besides hearing the addresses, the agents also participated in special workshops. Approximately 800 agents and visitors attended conference sessions.

Funds are still coming in to the South West Health Research Foundation, from livestock producers and sportsmen over the state.

Here is how some areas are collecting funds to help with the control of the screwworm. Officials of the Union Stock Yards in San Antonio were extremely pleased with the results of the stocker-feeder sale conducted there October 25, at which time 4,871 head of cattle were sold. Fifty cents for each head or \$2,435.50 was turned over to the Foundation to be used in the screwworm eradication program. The stock yards association and commission companies each contributed half of the total. The check was presented to C. G. Scruggs, SWAHRF president, by John Henry Kothman, who represented the San Antonio Livestock Market Institute which sponsored the sale. Also aiding the cause was a 22-year-old Longhorn steer donated for sale by Rocky Reagan, Sr. of Live Oak county which brought \$82.18.

Word has also been received that the Uvalde Livestock Sales Company will conduct a sale on November 1 and will donate 25 cents for each cow, calf and horse, 10 cents for each hog and 5 cents for each sheep and goat sold. Ranchers may also donate livestock to be sold with the entire proceeds going to the Foundations. Credit for the amount of the donation will go to the county where the seller lives. This was also done at San Antonio.

Fisher County still needs \$975.00 to reach its quota. Anyone interested in helping with the screwworm control program may deposit their money at either of the banks in the Fisher County Screwworm Eradication Program fund.

The mishandling of game after the kill often makes impossible a tasty preparation job in the kitchen, explains Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. He recommends field dressing immediately after the kill, especially if the weather is relatively warm. Keep the game clean and cold storage aging is recommended. Hunters may pick up a copy of B-987, "Game and Cooking" from local county extension office.
