Hammer Help Make Homecoming Successful

A large Homecoming crowd saw Rotan's Yellowhammers play a jam-up game Friday night and sweep Jim Ned Indians with a 73-32 score.

Scoring at least two touchdowns in every period, Rotan ran its season record to 3-1 and its district mark to 4-0. Rotan played its second-stringers half the game but couldn't be contained.

Homecoming fans saw Steve Herron, Rotan's potent offensive weapon, gain 250 yards in 18 carries, pass for four touchdowns, score four touchdowns himself plus two extra points. Sophomore Bill (Choo-Choo) Burns gained 40 yards on 11 carries.

In addition to Herron's scoring carries, Joe Garcia caught two scoring passes from Herron, Eddie Lang one, and Bill Ashton one. In addition, Ashton kicked two extra points and Lang ran for a TD.

Other Yellowhammer scores were made by Burns (six points), and Pete Garcia, with four. Leading the Rotan line, providing their usual fine blocking and defense, were Joe Garcia, Earl Hammit, Jerry Stewart, A. C. Snapp, Ashton, Gary Floyd, and Howard Van Loon. Van Loon also kicked a 66-yard punt.

Jim Ned's Ronald McMillon was the Indian big gun, making 141 yards on 21 carries, and scoring four touchdowns and running for two extra points to tie Herron for the night's scoring lead with 26. Other Indian extra points were made by Gary Allredge (four) and Gregg McAdams, with two.

Plans Shaping Up For Community Program

Much planning work is going into the new community project of a community building, proposed rodeo arena and feeding lots for 4-H and FFA students and other phases of such system.

J. B. and Lance Davis have deeded a 15 acre tract on the west side of their farm, just across the road east of Aaron Park, to the Posse for such project.

Present plans call for a Community Building to be constructed as soon as funds are available. The Posse plans to move their arena, now located north of town to the new location after their annual Jr. Rodeo next summer. Feedlots etc., to be constructed as soon as practical.

A group of citizens met with Commissioners Court Monday morning and asked for financial help on the project. Reports indicate that the Court agreed the project was needed and they were in favor of this. They agreed to study the program in regard to county funds going into the plant.

The land was contracted for \$6,000 and payment of this is expected to come from sale of bonds issued for the purpose. Most civic and social clubs of Rotan are expected to come from sale of bonds in the program.

The Advance will carry a plat showing proposed buildings etc., as soon as available.

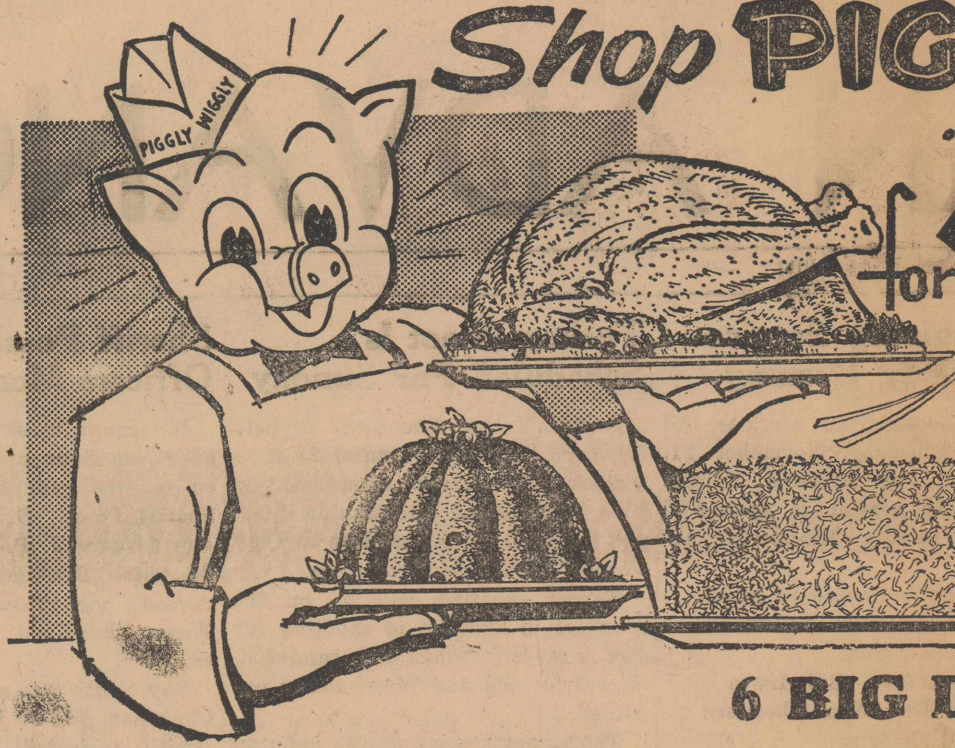

Leaf and stem rusts are showing up in Fisher County wheat fields. The rusts, says Dr. Maurice Futrell, USDA plant pathologist, are causing more damage than is casually seen by growers. The rusts cause the leaves of the infected wheat plants to die, and hence, a loss in forage production.

Three years of research on rust resistant small grain varieties by Texas A&M College shows that resistant varieties will produce from 2,000 to 4,000 pounds of high forage per acre, as contrasted with a forage yield of 1,000 to 1,500 pounds an acre for susceptible varieties.

The plant pathologists points out that leaf rust spores on wheat will live through the winter in most areas of Texas. However, in the northern part of the state rusts will be drastically reduced by cold weather. The quantity of rust which overwinters in South Texas is one of the factors that determine how much rust will develop in the wheat crop the following year. Rust spores produced in this area during the spring months is blown northward into the main wheat belt, explains Futrell. However, rust epidemics develop only when weather conditions become favorable for disease development.

Leaf and stem rusts weaken the wheat plants and cause heavy forage losses as well as causing the plant to lose water. Thus, the plant makes poor use of soil moisture. Root growth of the diseased plants is reduced and this, combined with the water losses, makes the plants more susceptible to winterkilling and cold weather.

Livestock grazing rusted wheat will suffer no ill effects since the forage is good feed. But asks the pathologist, why let rusts out the grazing value of small grains by a third when the problem can largely be eliminated through the growing of rust resistant varieties? Recommended varieties for this area that are also rust resistant are: Westar and Ponca and QuanaH is acceptable.

Screwworm cases and samples reported for the week took a drastic downswing. Program officials attribute this to the cold weather that has been continually penetrating deeper into the Southwest. They predict that screwworm infestations will continue to decrease in the coming weeks, particularly in the region outside of the overwintering area. The overwintering area should also experience considerable relief.

During the week, 1,470 samples were submitted for identification compared to 2,419 for the previous week. Texas submitted 1,429 samples; New Mexico, 39 and Mexico, 2. Annual total is 47,203 samples. Screwworm cases went from 6,219 to 3,659 last week -- 3,572 in Texas and 87 in New Mexico. Total for the year is 145,519 reported infestations. The officials emphasize, however, that this is no time to relax defense against screwworms. Now is the time to maintain a first-rate ground control program to wipe out all infestations and flies.

Sterile fly production for release came to 72,391,850 during the week of October 28 - November 3. For the year, 1,220,758,410 sterile flies have been produced and released.

For most counties, the drive to raise \$1.2 million has been completed, and results are expected to be made public shortly. Other counties will continue their activities through the later part of this month. Fisher County lacks about \$800, reaching the county quota of \$5,973.00, according to Roger Smith, County Chairman. Livestock interested in contributing to the eradication program may leave their money with James Cave, treasurer of the local committee, Smith, or deposit it at either of the county banks.

This should be of interest to all of you dairymen: The 1962 Dairyman's Short Course will be held November 29-30 at Texas A&M College. According to A. M. When Buying Shoes, Consider This . . .

Four out of five people in the United States complain of aching feet --- and 80 percent of adults suffer from some form of foot disability during their lifetime.

A basic step to foot health is recognizing and selecting a good pair of shoes, reminds Mary Routh, Extension Service clothing specialist.

Two important factors to consider when buying shoes are construction and fit.

Construction begins with the material used in a shoe, and leather is ideal for both shoe uppers and soles. Leather "breathes" because of a natural porous structure and thus allows fresh air into the shoe and perspiration out.

The construction of a good shoe involves the shaping and sewing together of many parts. Each size and shape is made over a wooden last. The upper is all of the shoe above the treading surface. The upper has three main parts; quarters, which form the front; vamp, the part over the instep and counters, that go around the heel.

Inside the shoe are the lining and insole. Both are made of leather in better shoes. Examine the inside for smoothness without ridges or protruding stitches or tacks.

The shank of a shoe is set inside the middle of the outsole running under the arch to the front of the heel. This should be a piece of a steel or stiffened leather. A good shank helps the shoe to retain its shape.

The leather welt is the backbone of a good shoe because it holds the

upper and sole firmly together. The counter is important in keeping the shoe from gaping and twisting. Heel heights and shapes vary with styles and types of shoes. Selection should be based on the specific use of the shoe:

To insure good fit for shoes, have your feet measured each time you buy. Both feet should be measured while you are standing. The larger foot is the one you must fit. Since the foot lengthens a bit during the day, the best time to buy shoes is late afternoon or evening, the specialist says.

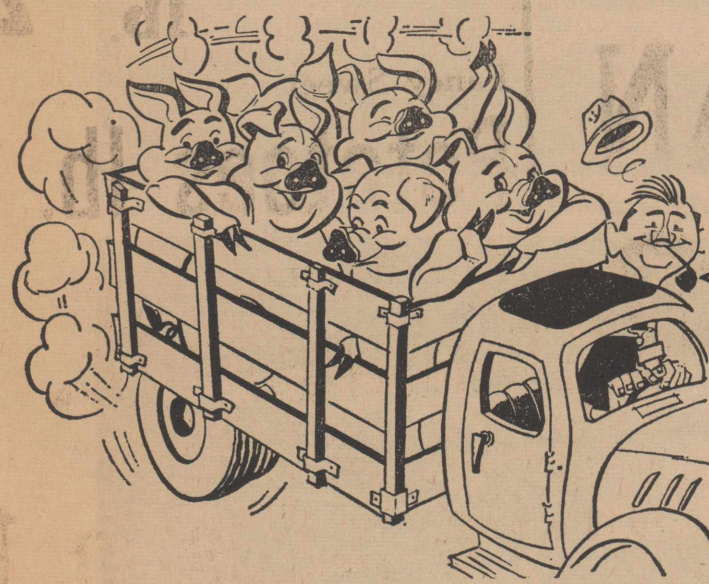

**Francis To Close 42
Year WTU Career**

K. K. Francis who has served as WTU's District Manager in Stamford for the past 25 years, will round out more more than four decades of Service with his retirement in December.

His long career in the utilities industry began in 1917 when he was employed as a cashier and meter reader for the Grand River Gas Company in Vian, Oklahoma. This company later became a part of the Commonwealth Public Service Company, and he served as a material clerk for the Company's line construction program in Oklahoma and Arkansas. His career was interrup-

ed by World War I when he volunteered for service with the U. S. Army Engineers.

He returned to work for Commonwealth following the close of the war and was sent to DeQueen, Arkansas as a material clerk on the construction of an ice plant.

In December, 1920, Francis resigned his job with Commonwealth to accept a job with West Texas Utilities Company in Abilene. He served as an assistant to the Chief Clerk, and six months later, joined a transmission crew as a material clerk on the construction of a line from Abilene to Cisco.

From 1921 until 1924, Francis served as a WTU Local Manager in Baird, Hamlin and Stamford. In 1924, he returned to Abilene where he served as Assistant District Superintendent until he assumed his duties as District Manager in Stamford in 1937.

This veteran WTUer was born in Morrilton, Arkansas in 1897, and spent his early life in Vian, Oklahoma where his father, the late G. L. Francis, Sr., worked as an accountant. He attended the public schools and was graduated from Vian High School in 1915. While still a youth, he worked part-time in drug stores and grocery stores, and during the summers of 1915 and 1916, worked in the wheat fields in Oklahoma and Kansas. He attended the University of Oklahoma one year.

Mr. Francis is one of Stamford's most active citizens; is an elder in the Presbyterian Church and has been a Mason since 1919. He is a past director of the Rotary Club and the Stamford Chamber of Commerce, serves on the Zoning Board, the Boy Scouts and has served as a director of the Stamford Cowboy Reunion for many years.

Mrs. Francis is the former Geneva Allen of DeQueen, Arkansas. They were married in 1920 and are the parents of a son, K. K. Jr., and a daughter, Jeanmine.

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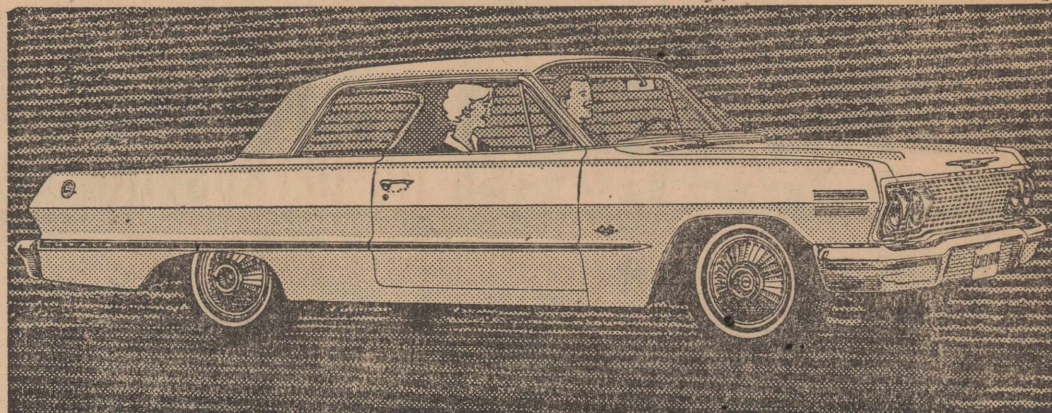
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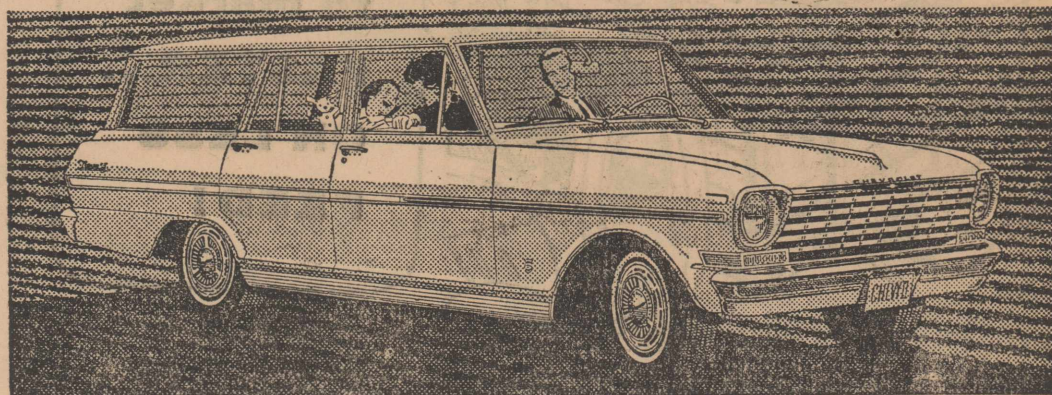
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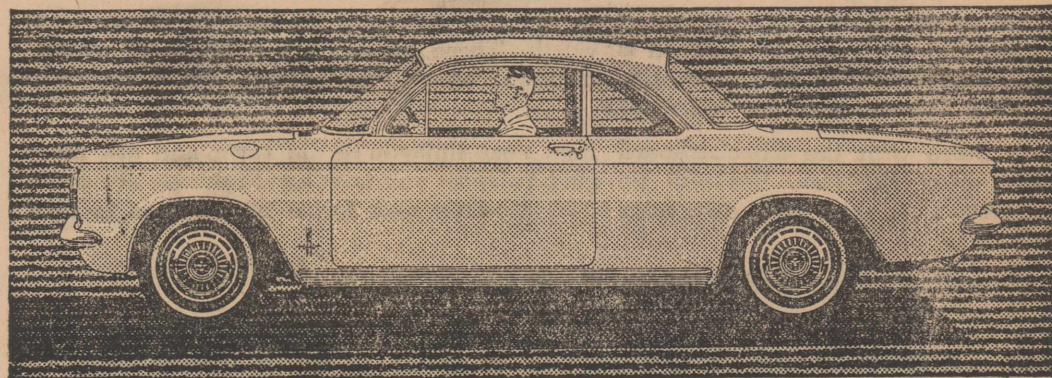
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
