**Its Seagraves At Snyder Today**

Most of Rotan will move over on Snyder today for the bi-district game of Yellowhammers vs. Seagraves Eagles. Game time is 2:30 and Rotan stands will be filled with cheering fans.

The day will open with a big pep rally at 10:30 at high school gym, at which the public is urged to attend and participate. The team will leave shortly after 12 noon from the field house with a rousing send-off.

The Hammers won their place in bi-district last Friday night with Merkel. They have a 9-1 record, and go into the bi-district rated no. 2 in state sportswriters poll.

Both teams in today's game are rated stronger than last year when they met.

Last year, the two clubs got together in the first round of the Class A playoffs and Rotan won the game on first downs after the score ended in a 22-22 tie and Seagraves near the Rotan goal line.

A block of 800 reserved seat tickets was allotted to Rotan and 725 had been sold at 4 o'clock Wednesday. A few tickets are expected to be available this morning and some will be available at the gate before game time.

**Hammers Win Over Merkel 27-0**

Rotan's Yellowhammers won district 6-A championship last Friday with the Merkel game giving them a berth in bi-district play with Seagraves.

This damped the large crowd of Badger fans who had gathered for Merkel's Homecoming, to see their favorites downed 27-0. The Badgers made a hard fight and held the Hammers 6-0 at halftime.

Quarterback Steve Herron had a big evening along with his teammates. He tossed his 15 and 16th touchdown passes and bossed his scoring total to 206 points.

With 1:40 remaining before the half, Herron hit end Joe Frank Garcia for a 40 yard pass-run gain that set the ball down at the Merkel 21. An offside penalty moved the ball back to the 23 after a running play picked up three.

From there, Herron poked a floating pass to his other end, Bill Ashton, who was standing by himself in the end zone.

Ashton's attempted kick was blocked by Tittle and the Yellowhammers took a 6-0 lead into the dressing room.

Merkel kept the statistics close in the first half with Rotan leading in first downs 6-4, and rushing 36-24, but the second half was a different story.

Parmelly fumbled the second half kickoff and guard A. C. Snapp recovered for Rotan at the Badger 39. From there it took Herron five plays, including a five-yard penalty against the Yellowhammers, to push his team in for the score.

The 163-pound Herron tossed the final 32 yards to Garcia, who simply took the ball away from Merkel safety man Charlie Russell at the five, and raced in for the TD. Herron sneaked for the points and Rotan led 14-0.

Rotan put together a 75-yard march early in the fourth period for still another touchdown. Herron sneaked the final yard with 6:20 showing on the clock and a running play for the extra points was stopped.

The Yellowhammers' final score came three minutes later. This time it was halfback Lennis Polnac who skipped 11 yards for the touchdown. Polnac aided the 60-

While Herron was outstanding, Polnac took his share of the offensive honors. The 155-pound halfback carried the brunt of Rotan's running game, while Merkel was swarming Herron, and emerged with 109 yards in 19 carries. Parmelly was the Badgers' chief threat with 52 yards on 13 carries.

Herron ended the game with 43 yards on 21 carries, but penalties erased longer runs. At one point, Herron raced for 145 yards on two consecutive plays, and didn't get either of the touchdowns in the record books.

The long-distance action came in the third period. First Herron intercepted a Russell pass at the Rotan 28 and raced 72 yards through half of the Merkel team to score. That run was brought back by a clipping penalty, and moved the ball back to the Rotan 27.

On the very next play, Herron rolled to his left, cleared the line, and set sail for still another score. This time, it was a personal foul that erased the touchdown.

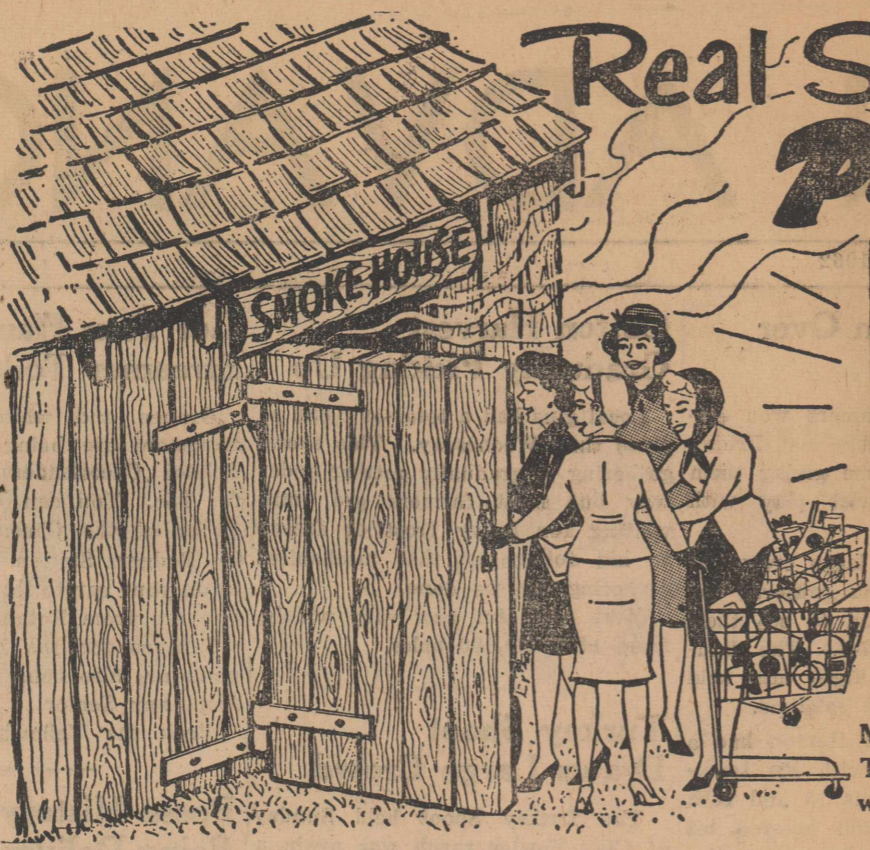

## Common Errors On Questionnaires

The income questionnaires sent out by the Veterans Administration at the end of each year shall come out one month earlier this year according to Veterans Administration. These questionnaires come to each person, veteran, widows, dependent or guardians of deceased veterans children that is drawing pension from Veterans Administration each year.

Here are some common errors made by the individuals that fill them in:

1. Many mutilate, trim or fold card, making it impossible to process.
2. Many having filled out the card, fail to sign it.
3. Many delay beyond the deadline date of January 31. Although the Veterans Administration is mailing out the questionnaires a month earlier this year, the deadline January 31, remains the same.
4. Many neglect to fill all pertinent blanks. If a question does not apply, "one" might be written in to show no oversight.
5. Income information should be provided for both 1962 and 1963.
6. Pensioner should use the card received.
7. Other topics should not be combined with this report. If other questions arise, they should be the subject of separate correspondence.

8. Custodians or guardians answering questions for a child should be sure to supply information applying to that child and not to other members of the family.

I shall be more than glad to assist all people in filling these income questionnaires out. Maybe if we both fill them in that we won't make any mistakes. Don't forget now according to Veterans Administration the income questionnaires will be out one month earlier than before, I suppose they mean that they shall be in the November checks rather than the December checks. Everyone that possibly can and wants me to help them please come over during the month of December and we shall get them all fixed up.

I shall not be in the City Hall in Rotan each Friday anymore. Hereafter I will be there on each third Friday of the month. In other words my next trip to the City Hall in Rotan will be December 21.

Please don't forget the importance of getting your income questionnaire filled in and mailed back to Veterans Administration before January 31, 1963. Please bring all pertinent information along as you come to see me with these questionnaires.

**Deer Hides Needed By State Institutions**

Austin, November 20, -- Deer hunters were reminded today an audience of 26,000 persons in state operated hospitals and schools for mentally retarded wish them luck with their buck.

Nor is it a strictly unselfish wish, since the patients and students stand to gain hours of enjoyable employment -- if the hunters send the deer hides to the annual buckskin collection.

Haskell Fine of Kerrville, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council which sponsor the collection has sent out thousands of shipping tags giving specific directions for donating the hides. They are available from most Chambers of Commerce in the hunting country and other spots where hunters gather.

If the sportsman skins out his own kill, he is asked to throw a handful of table salt on the raw side of the hide, allow it to drain, roll and tie or package it and affix a tag addressed to

If the tag is marked "charity", most motor freight lines will haul without charge, Fine said. If the deer is left at a processing station, the hunter is asked to direct that the hide be sent in.

The Volunteer Council arranges tanning and delivery of the finished leather to all hospitals and special schools where it is used in occupational therapy, he explained.

"So little effort on the part of the hunter can mean so much to so many," the chairman said, "we feel sure we will again be able to show these patients that people do care about them, even in the excitement of a deer blind with antlers square in the telescopic sight."

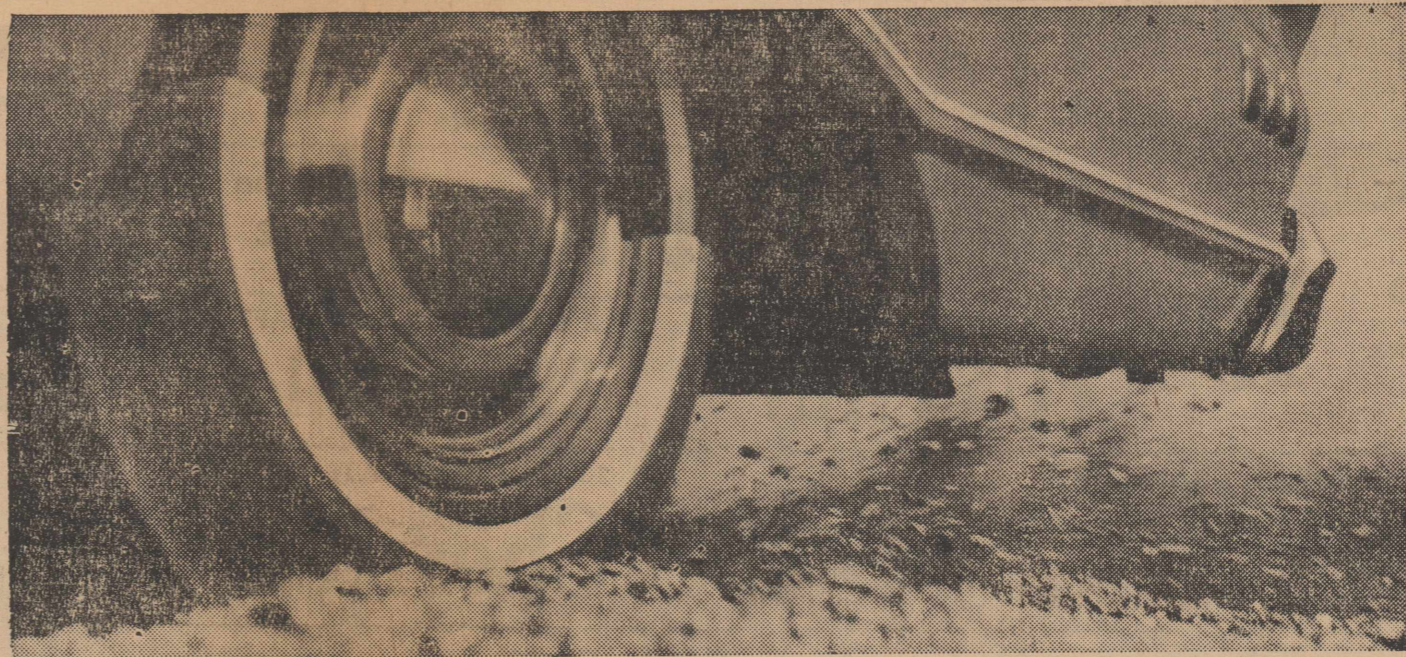

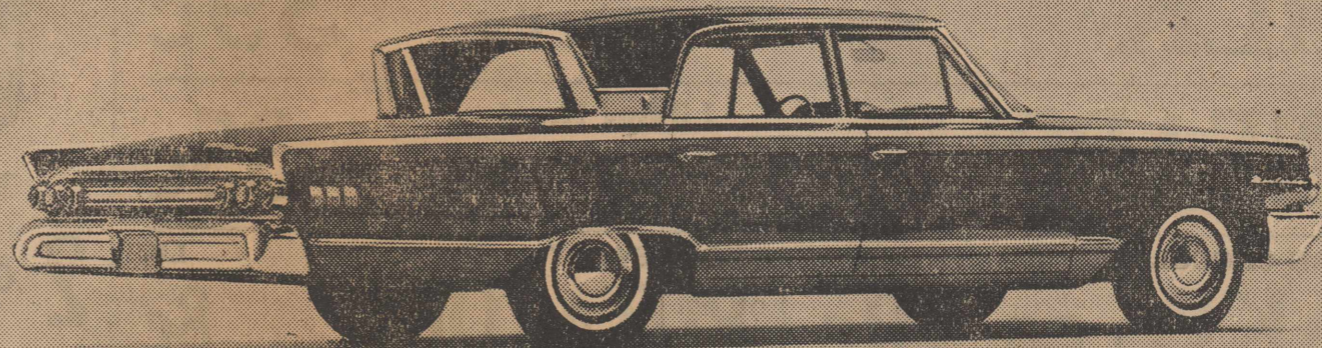

## 'Wasty' Cotton Term Is Explained

Many questions have been brought up lately concerning "Wasty" cotton and the USDA's new Micronaire Service. B. B. Manley, Jr., Officer in charge of the Abilene Cotton Classing office will attempt to answer some of these questions with a series of articles on the subject. This week's article is concerned with wasty cotton. The one on the Micronaire Service will follow soon.

Wasty cotton is weak fibered, immature cotton. Because of this it is less desirable on the market and generally brings about two to five cents per pound less than the same grade that is not wasty. It is wasty, or not mature for several reasons. Some of these are explained in the following paragraphs.

Defoliation before maturity may cause wasty cotton. If cotton is defoliated before maturity, the bolls will usually go ahead and open. The cotton fibers have not reached their

maximum growth in diameter and when the cotton plant is defoliated the growth stops. When harvested the fiber is weak and immature. Therefore farmers should be sure the cotton is mature and ready to harvest before defoliating their crop.

Weather conditions, such as an early freeze, which stops growth, results in weak or wasty cotton if it is not mature at the time of the freeze. A freeze will not affect those bolls that are already open. But, those that are immature will open sooner than the normally would without maturing further. A drought may also cause wasty. If a cotton crop doesn't get sufficient moisture during crucial fruiting periods, the growth cycle of the cotton fiber is upset, and results in a weak fiber.

Plant diseases can cause wasty cotton. Nematodes, or "Root Rot", causes dead spots in fields. If these plants die after fruiting, which they most often do, they may go ahead and open. Often this cotton is immature, or wasty.

A culling process sometimes takes place at harvest. After the second or third hand pulling, only

green, unopened bolls, or partially opened, immature boll have been left. These may gin out wasty cotton.

These are some of the reasons for wasty cotton. Some, such as an early freeze, or drought, are natural factors and a farmer can do nothing about them. Others, such as defoliation and harvesting are in the hands of the producer.

According to Mr. Manly cotton sample receipts in the Abilene Classing Office remaining fairly steady. Last week we classed 23,995 samples as compared to 26,673 for the preceding week. This brings the season total to 129,429 samples classed as compared to 214,888 at this time last year.

The Grades and Staples in District 2, which is composed of the Counties surrounded by Dickens, Sterling, Brown, and Jones counties, show quite an improvement over the previous week. The Grades classed are as follows: Middling, 2 percent; Strict Low Middling, 2 percent; Low Middling, 1 percent; Strict Middling Light Spot, 2 percent; Middling Light Spot, 43 percent; Strict Low Middling Light Spot, 22 percent; Low Middling Light Spot, 3 percent; Middling Spot, 14 percent; Strict Low Middling Spot, 10 percent; and Low Middling Spot, 1 percent.

Following is the percentage breakdown of staples classed: 29-32, 9; 15-16, 79; 31-32, 10; 1-inch and longer, 2.

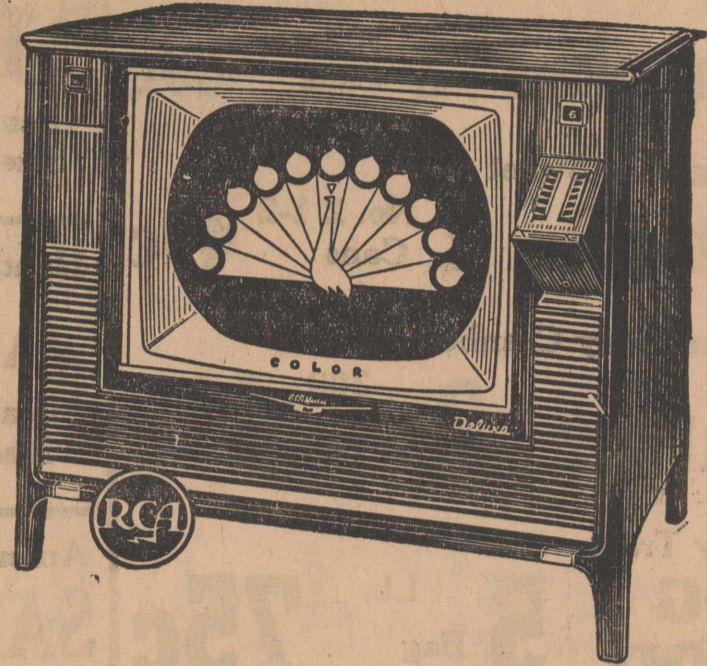
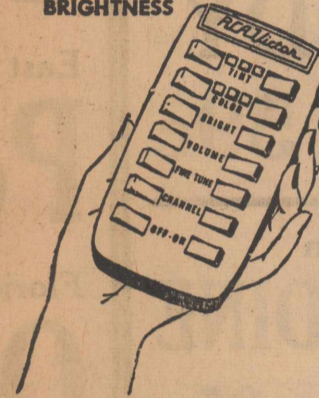

**TB Can Be Controlled  
Proper Treatment**

**WE KNOW ABOUT TB**

People know about tuberculosis long before they knew it was caused by a germ. Today we know that TB is catching and spreads from person to person. We know that TB can be cured.

We know how TB germs can hurt the body. Most of the time they get into the lungs, although they sometimes get into other parts of the body. When the germs get in, they start a fight with the body they have entered. If the body wins, it walls up the germs by growing a hard covering around them.

Today we know how to help the body fight and conquer TB--how to cure TB.

**HOW LONG TO CURE TB**

If the person who has early tuberculosis is treated by a doctor right away, he can be cured. Treatment takes many months, sometimes years. But only the early months will be in a hospital. The rest of the time will mean taking drugs at home. It is not quick and easy, but the prayer of many centuries has been answered: tuberculosis can be cured.

How fast will TB get worse if it isn't treated properly? You can't tell ahead of time. If TB is going to kill, it usually happens only after months of years of sickness. Very often it does not kill but just hangs on. When this happens, the person may not ever know he is sick--even though others may be getting sick and dying from the germs he is spreading.

How much better to find TB early to be treated properly -- to get well as fast as possible.

**HOW MANY HAVE TB**

Today TB can be beaten--fewer die from it every year. Yet 250,000 Americans have active TB, with over 50,000 new cases yearly. And TB kills more Americans than all other infectious diseases combined. Almost all these people could live--by finding their TB early and having it treated correctly. Consult your family doctor for a checkup, and send a check to the Fisher County Tuberculosis Association during their Christmas Seal Campaign.

Sergeant Butler reminded that more strict compliance with our traffic laws would further reduce this tremendous loss that kills and cripples so many of our citizens each month.

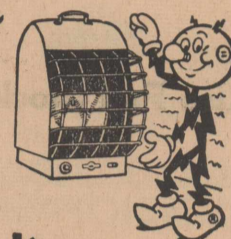
