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Dental Care Urged By Groups

This is the second in a series of questions and answers on dental health published by the Rotan Advance in cooperation with the Seventeenth District Dental Society, Texas Dental Association, in observance of National Children's Health Week, February 3 through 9.

What is the relationship between nutrition and dental health?

In general, if you eat the kind of diet recommended for general health, you'll be getting the essentials for dental health.

During the years the teeth are being formed (from about 5 months before birth to the age of 8 year), an adequate supply of calcium and phosphorus is needed for hardening of the tooth structure. Once the teeth are fully formed and calcified, the enamel does not need any more calcium and cannot absorb any. The gums and the bones of the jaws must have the same nourishment throughout life as the other tissues of the body.

While a good diet does play a part in the development of sound, healthy teeth, only fluorides have been proved to help develop decay-resistant teeth.

Various studies that have been made indicate that bacteria always present in the mouth act on fermentable carbohydrates, especially sugar, to form acid attacks result in decay.

No way has yet found of removing bacteria permanently from the mouth, although brushing temporarily decreases the number of bacteria. But sugar can be eliminated -- or at least the amount that is eaten can be reduced. The teeth of those who eat sweet snacks frequently during the day are subjected to almost continuous acid attacks.

Brushing immediately after eating does help to remove some of the sugar before it is converted to acid. When brushing is not possible, the mouth should at least be rinsed with clear water.

How should I brush my teeth?
Your dentist can tell you the best method of toothbrushing for you. Three good general rules are:

1. Brush immediately after eating.
2. Brush each area at least ten times -- the surfaces next to the cheeks and next to the tongue and the upper and lower chewing surfaces.
3. Brush the upper teeth down toward the biting edge and the lower teeth up toward the biting edge.

Early Check For TB Is Urged

Doctors tell us to have a tuberculin skin test or a chest X-ray every year because early TB usually gives no warning . . . you don't feel sick. A tuberculin test can tell if the germs have entered your body; an X-ray discovers if they have done damage. Both help find tuberculosis of the lungs early, when it can be cured most quickly.

After a person has had TB for some time, he may begin to feel sick and to notice signs or symptoms. He may feel tired all the time, have a fever, or sweat at night. He may lose weight. He may catch colds easily, cough a lot, or spit up blood. A person with any of these symptoms should see his doctor right away. He may not have TB, but he should make sure. Whatever he has, he can start treatment right away. Probably you'll never catch TB . . . but if you remember only one thing to do about the disease, remember this: Get a physical checkup including TB tests once a year, not because of TB alone but for your health in general. The doctor often can prevent sickness or find it before it gets a head start. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred the doctor will tell you that you're in fine shape . . . the hundredth time he may save your life.

How do you catch TB? You don't inherit tuberculosis . . . you aren't born with it. You catch TB . . . from someone who has it . . . in one of three ways.

- (1) By kissing someone who has active TB.
- (2) By breathing air with TB germs in it. The person with TB may spread the germs by coughing, sneezing, or spitting.
- (3) By putting in your mouth things that were not sterilized after being used by someone who has active TB.

Who catches TB? Anybody can catch tuberculosis. Among the persons living today who have had TB are Congressmen, professional ath-

letes, Hollywood stars, and college presidents. Both rich and poor catch TB, but people with little money fight it off less easily. If you're poor, you're more likely to live in a crowded neighborhood and you may not get the right foods.

People of any age can catch TB. For some reason, however, children over 4 or 5 and under 14 who catch TB seldom break down at that age

. . . that's one reason why regular X-rays are usually recommended only for older people, who are more likely to have active disease. Children and young adults should have tuberculin tests first, then chest X-rays if necessary.

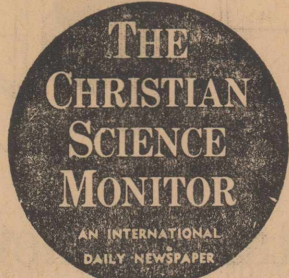

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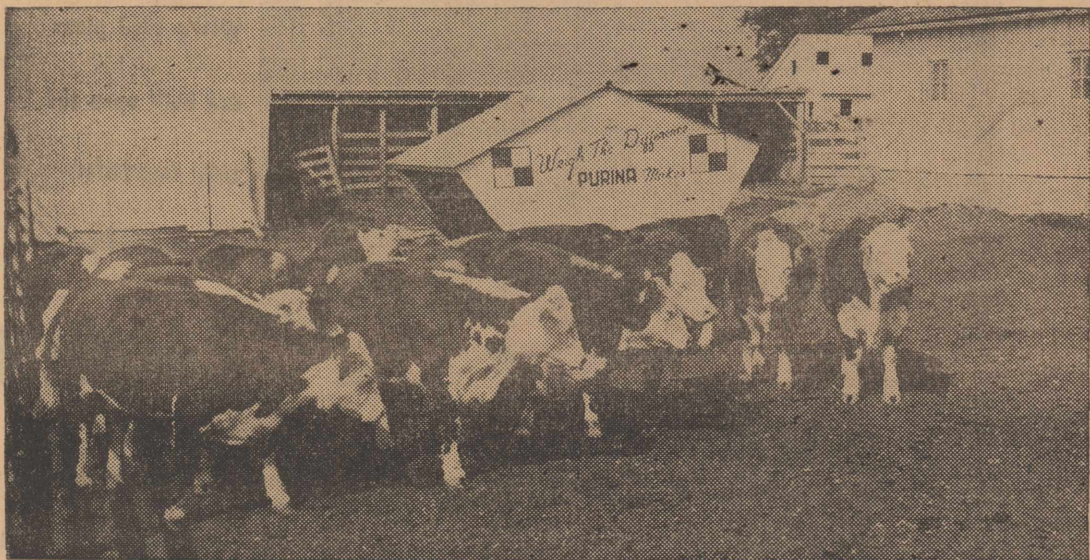

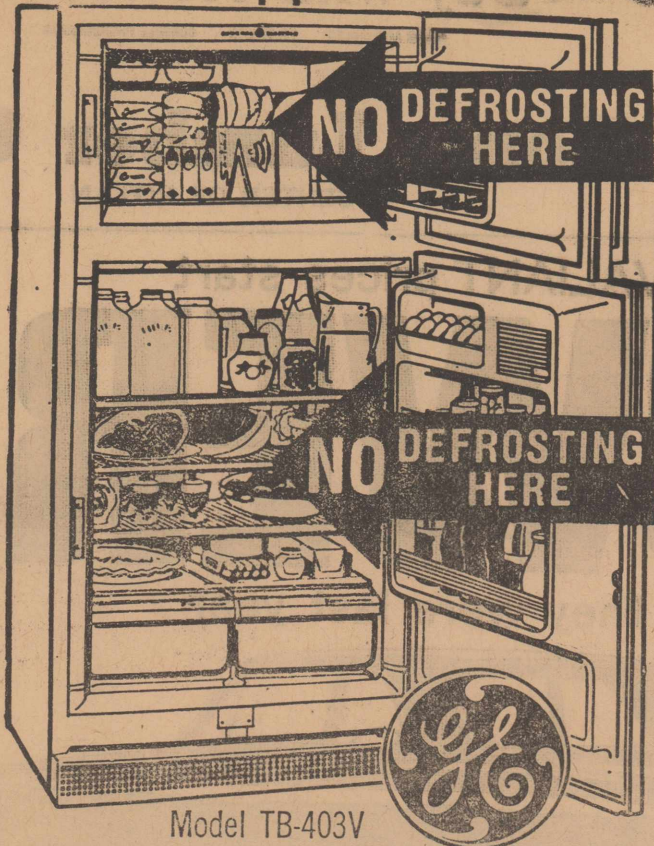

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FTC Announces Shoe Labeling Results

New federal labeling rules requiring disclosure of all materials used in making shoes have been announced recently by the Federal Trade Commission.

The FTC said the rules will go into effect at the manufacturing level in 90 days and will apply both to labeling and advertising.

These were among the principal requirements:

No trade name or coined name may be used if it falsely suggests shoes or slippers are made of a certain material. For instance, it said, non-leather materials may not be described as "dura-leather" or "Barkhyde."

If imitation leather is used, this must be disclosed through such statements as "imitation leather shoe-board" or outersole, innersole and linings composed of imitation leather."

If a leather material is embossed, dyed or otherwise processed to look like a different type of leather, the label must tell the actual type used. For example, "simulated alligator made of split cowhide."

All labeling disclosures must be made in the form of stamps, tags or labels fixed to the shoe in such a way that they will remain in place until delivered to retail customers. All labels must be the type that can be easily seen and understood upon casual inspection of the product.

Motorists Urged To Have Inspections

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 Inspection sticker by April 15 1963. After that date, vehicles not

displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. "There are approximately 5,000

authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline, "Garrison said.

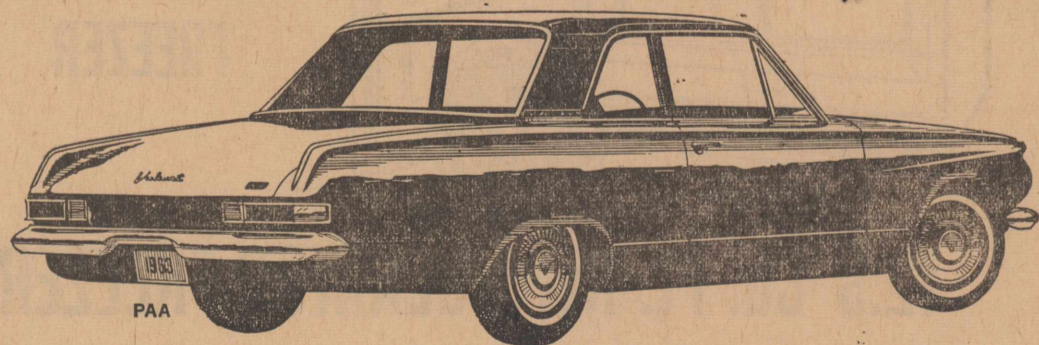

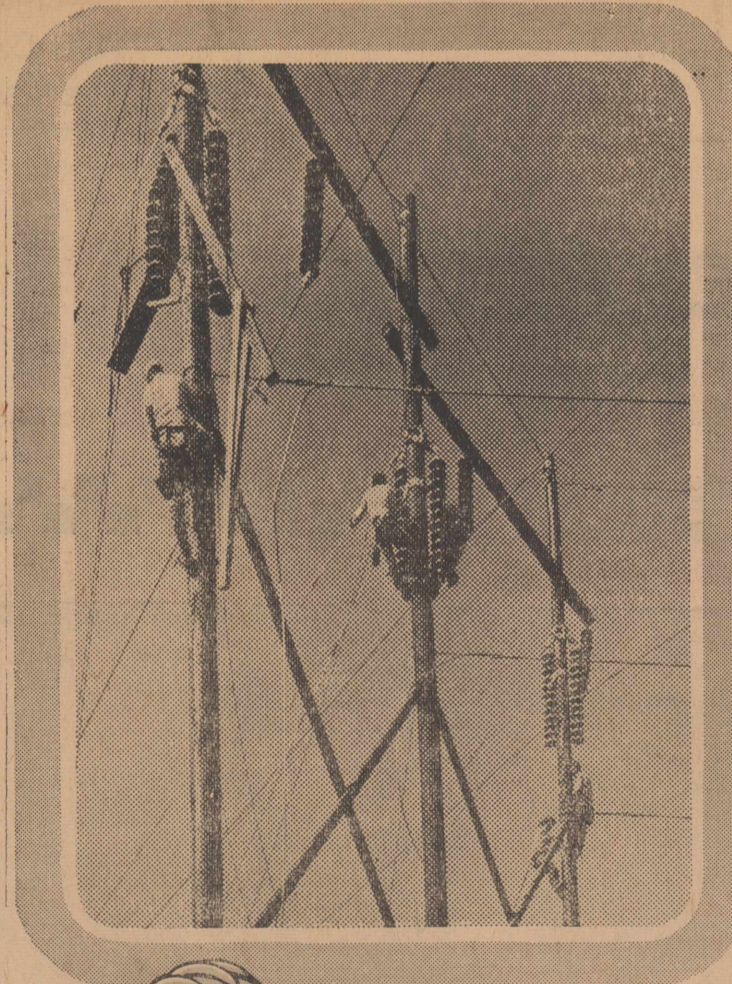

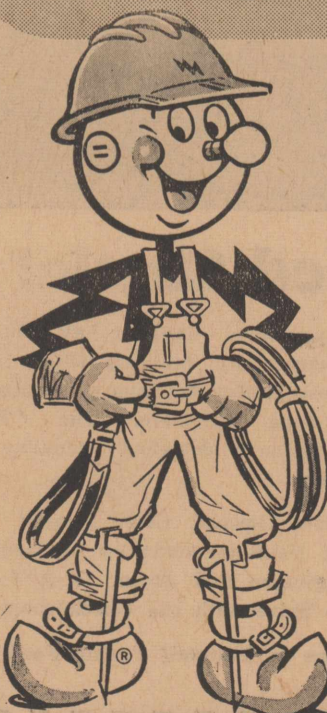
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
