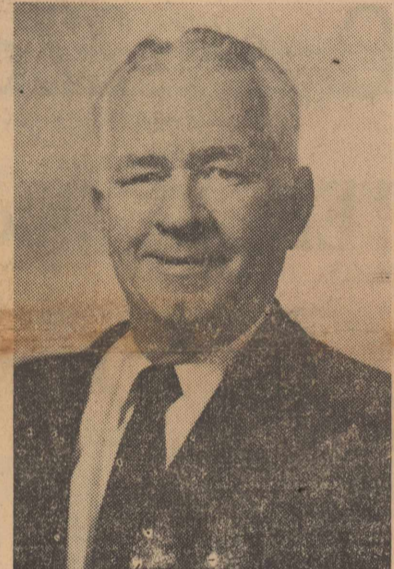
Dedication And Open House For New Postoffice Saturday

Dedication and Open House for the new Postoffice will be held Saturday afternoon. The dedication ceremony will be in First Baptist Church at 2:00 p. m., with L. E. Newton as chairman. Invocation by Rev. Huron Polnac. Mr. Dupree will make dedication address, and a number of out of town postal people are expected to attend. Benediction will be given by Rev. Father Benedict Zientek.

Flag presentation and Open House of the new Postoffice building will follow the dedication ceremony. The 3,016 square foot air-conditioned building is owned by C. A. Wheeler and Charles Swenson of Haskell. All equipment in the building is new and modern in every respect.

Two lobbies give an improved service. The box lobby is always open and lighted, giving patrons access to their mail and to the letter drops 24 hours daily. A self-service stamp machine will be installed in this lobby soon. The service lobby is separated by glass from box lobby, giving patrons quiet atmosphere while transacting postal business. Window service is available 8 1-2 hours daily.

The new office has been badly needed in Rotan for several years, but we now have a modern, well equipped postoffice.

The final portion of the area-wide massive immunization drive against Polio will be held Sunday February 10th, in the High School Gym from 1:30 to 5 PM. Type III Oral Polio Vaccine will be given, and as before donations will be accepted to cover the cost, but no one will be turned away.

If you missed either of the two preceding drives in which types I and II were given, you should take them from your family physician. The order in which the various types are taken does not matter, but a waiting period of 6 weeks must elapse between doses. No makeup for missed doses will be held on the massive scale. All persons over 6 weeks of age should take the Vaccine to eliminate this dread disease from our community.

Contract To Be Let For Water Pipeline

At a meeting Tuesday afternoon Rotan Municipal Water Authority called for bids for constructing of the water transmission line between Rotan and Snyder. They set 2 p. m. February 26 as closing deadline for bids and expect to let contract at that time.

All arrangements have been completed with the State Water Commission in Austin, which has taken much time.

The Authority hopes to be able to get line complete at least to Camp Springs water farm line before warm weather, as Rotan's present water supply is falling rapidly.

Wells at City water farm are now barely supplying demand without watering of trees and lawns, hence the water situation will be critical by air conditioner time if the new line is not complete.

Much detail procedure has been necessary before contract could be let, but now it seems that water from Lake J. B. Thomas should be in our mains before summer.

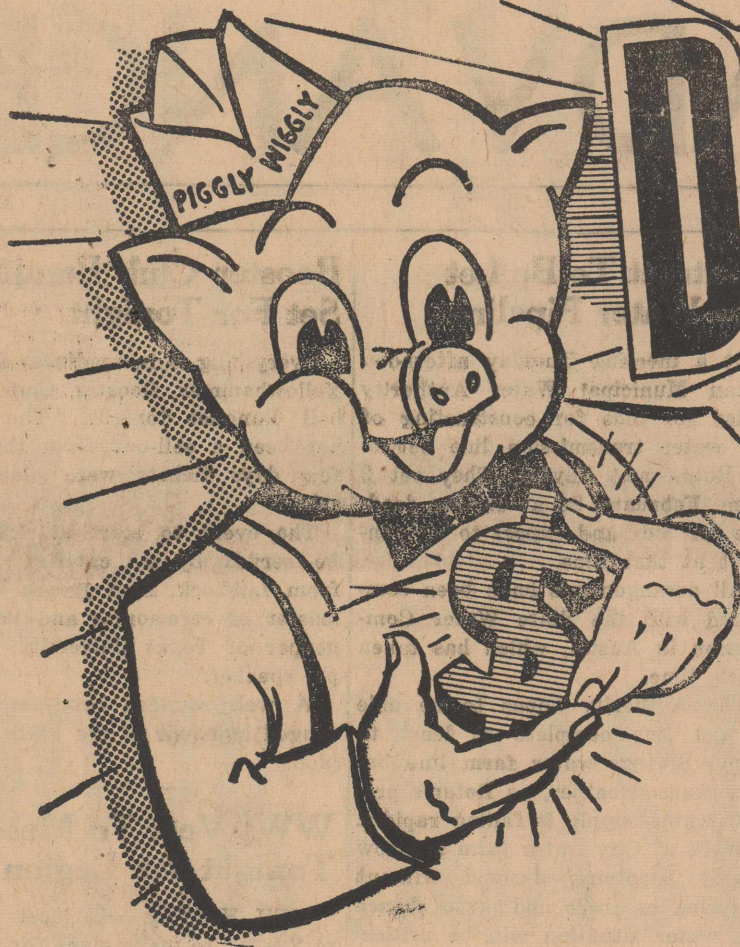

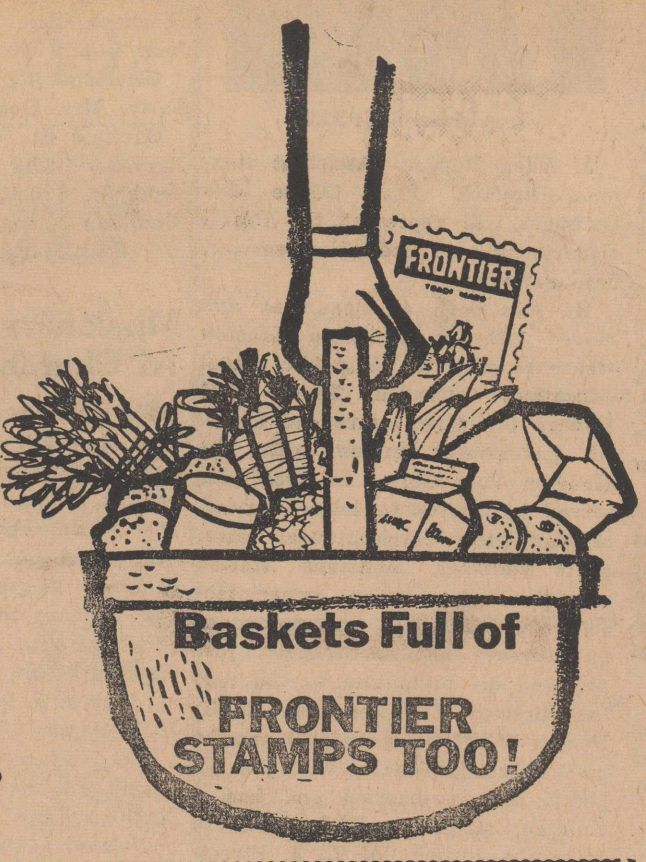

### Cotton Micronaire Readings Available

B. B. Manly, Jr., in charge of the U. S. Government, Department of Agriculture, Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, calls attention to a recent news release from Washington, concerning the availability, of Micronaire readings for next year. Some details remain to be worked out and as soon as they are complete they will be announced.

Micronaire readings on samples of cotton submitted for classification under the Smith Doxey Program will be available, on a fee basis during the 1963-64 season, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This service provides a measurement of fiber fineness of cotton as determined by airflow instruments. Fiber fineness is a quality factor important in spinning. Testing for micronaire readings is authorized under the Cotton Testing Service Act.

The micronaire readings service was introduced during the latter part of the 1962-63 season and was used extensively by farmers in West Texas and Oklahoma. A fee of 8 cents per sample was charged for this service. The fee for the coming season will be announced about May 1.

Applications for the testing service must be submitted by a ginner to the Agricultural Marketing Service cotton classing office serving the territory in which the gin is located. All samples submitted for classification from a gin that files an application for the micronaire service will be tested. Application should be submitted as soon as possible but no later than July 1. Several weeks are required to install equipment and train personnel to provide the testing service. Classing Offices may not be able to provide testing service to gins submitting applications after July 1 due to a lack of equipment and trained personnel.

The gin that submits application for the service will be responsible for payment of the test fee. Applications for micronaire readings and additional details regarding the service be obtained from any local Cotton Division Classing Office of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

### "ALMOST"

"Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Acts 26:28

"ALMOST" . . . Here is a word that is loaded with significance. It's a picture word, a word that tells the story of NEAR-ACHIEVEMENT and TOTAL LOSS.

The world has been crowded with people who ALMOST succeeded only to live and to die unnoticed and unsung. Like Moses, they started well. They climbed far enough to overlook the Promised Land and then found that they could go no further. They ALMOST made it, but almost to succeed is to fail utterly.

I read recently the story of Mr. Kroger, the Chain Store magnate. When just a young man, he and a fellow named Scovanner met in the back room of a little country store. They met to decide, by drawing straws, which of them would run the store and which would haul the produce. Mr. Scovanner made the choice that caused him to miss wealth and fame by a straw.

The word "ALMOST" sometimes makes the difference between life and death. A west Coast newspaper carried the stories about two airplane tragedies. One told of an Air Force plane that went down in the middle of the Pacific. The other concerned a commercial plane that went down just a few hundred yards from the landing field. One went down within sight of the airport, the other a thousand miles from land. Yet there was really no

difference, for ALL aboard BOTH planes perished.

So reads the account in the 26th Chapter of Acts.

"ALMOST thou persuadest me to be a Christian!" Peace and pardon were just within reach! The hand of mercy beckoned to him! Eternity was weighed in the balances for just a moment, and all the Glories of Almighty God were waiting to be claimed! Yet Agrippa chose to take his chances with the storms of life. He who had been "Almost persuaded" chose for time and eternity to remain without God.

Agrippa is just one of many who have let their lives be ruined by an "ALMOST." Pharaoh, who wouldn't listen to Moses; Herod, who heard John the Baptist gladly but had him beheaded; Judas, who lived with the Lord and yet betrayed Him to His enemies; Pilate, who had the choice of "what to do with Jesus."

"Almost" is a word that profits no-one. What does the land gain if it "almost" rains; or if the sun "almost" shines? Can a man satisfy his hunger by "almost" eating? Or his thirst by "almost" drinking? A sailor who is not fully persuaded to escape from a sinking ship becomes a victim of the sea. In just this same way, the man who is "almost persuaded" to come to Jesus for salvation becomes the victim of his own indecision. A near-decision is really no decision at all!

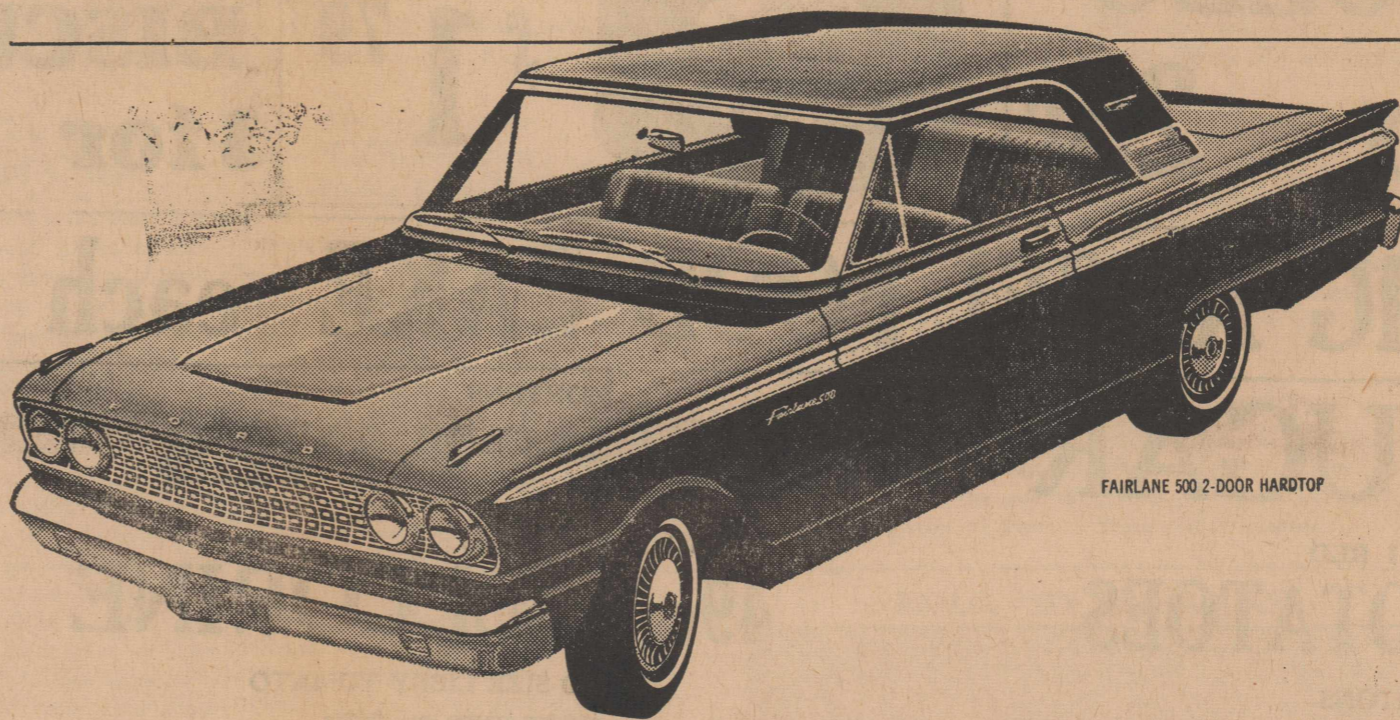

## SPCA Agricultural Financial Report

(Special) — A bright outlook for agriculture in 1963 in a six-county area of West Central Texas is foreseen by an official of the Sweetwater Production Credit Association in a year-end report of the agricultural financing institution released this week.

"The outlook for agriculture and agricultural credit in our six-county area appears good for 1963," commented General Manager H. G. Pitts of Sweetwater.

A good year was experienced by the association in 1962, and with good moisture conditions, 1963 can be another good year, Pitts said. "Ample credit will be available to all qualified farm and ranch operators in our area," he said.

The Sweetwater PCA had one of its most active years in history in 1962, with a loan volume of \$10,936,849, and a net worth of \$1,550,657.

Owned and operated in its entirety by its 1,445 farmer and rancher stockholder-borrowers in Fisher, Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry, Borden, Dawson and the southwestern part of Kent counties, the association has provided more than \$129,000,000 in agricultural credit since its organization in January, 1934.

Loan funds are received through the sale of bonds on the nation's commercial money market by the Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, discount and supervisory agency for all 37 PCA groups in Texas.

"We have but one reason for our existence," Pitts explained, "and that is to provide a dependable source of agricultural credit in our area at the lowest possible cost."

The association's board of directors and loan committee are composed of working farmers and ranchers, each intimately acquainted with the agricultural conditions and problems in the area. Professional credit counselling is offered to help each borrower increase his profits through sound credit practices, Pitts said.

Serving on the association's board of directors are President E. W. Wiman of Roscoe, Vice President T. L. Finley of Lorraine, Frank B. Jones of Lamesa, Audry Head of Snyder and W. J. Harvey Jr. of Roby.

Offices are operated in Sweetwater, Roby, Colorado City, Snyder and Lamesa. Office personnel include General Manager and Secretary-Treasurer Pitts, Assistant Manager and Secretary-Treasurer F. C. Shillingburg, Assistant Secretary

Treasurer John R. Henson, Bookkeeper Anna SaLee Lane and Receptionist Cada Perry, all of the Sweetwater central office;

Also Field Representative W. W. Morton and Bookkeeper Dwalyn Parker, Roby; Field Representative S. E. Rogers and Clerk-Typist Janel Bearden, Snyder; Field Representative R. B. Baker and Bookkeeper Eibyl Walding, Colorado

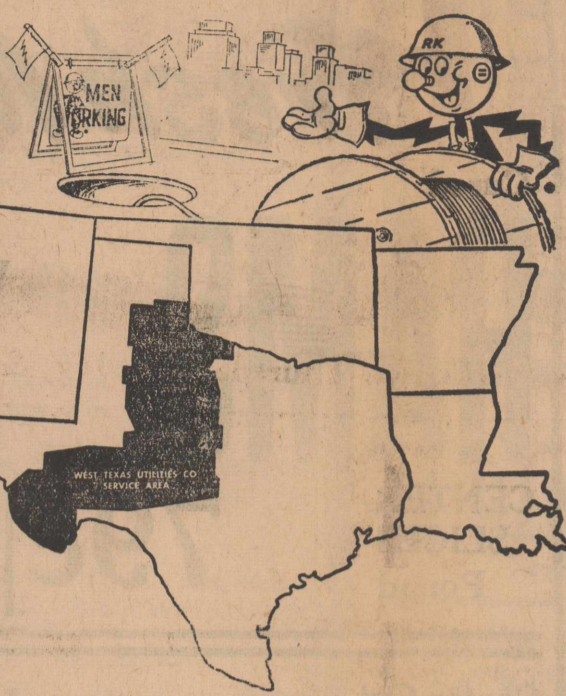
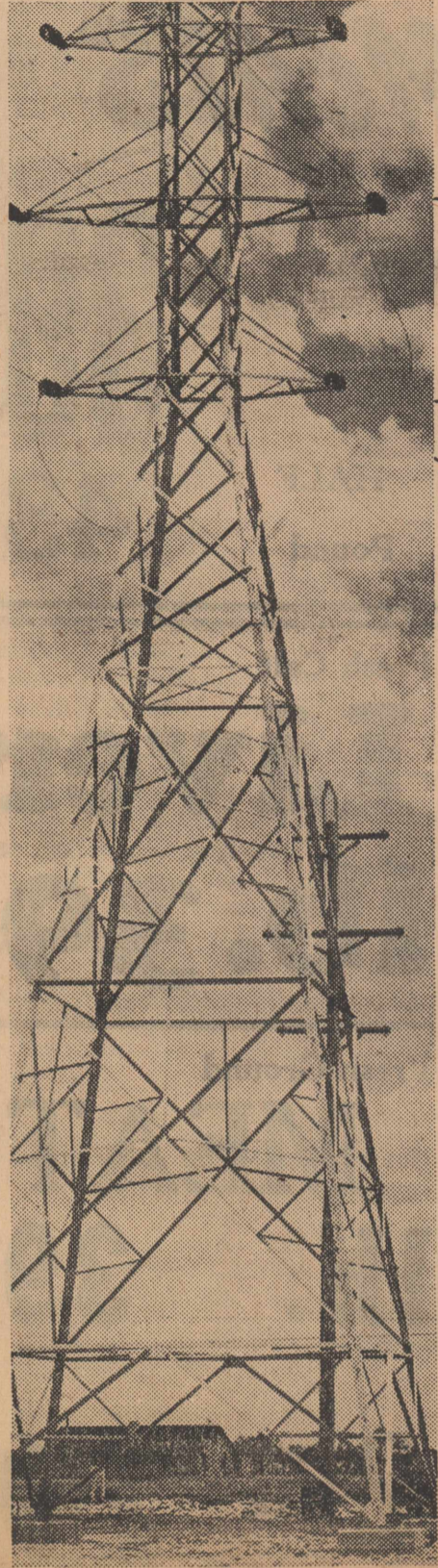

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### Peace Corps Needs Agriculture Experience

"I wish I knew more about agriculture so I could be of more help here," writes Peace Corps Volunteer William Weinhold from Kuala Lumpur, Malaya. Weinhold, whose home is in Kobler, Wisconsin is a graduate of DeVry Technical Institute in Chicago. He is assisting a BBC expert from England design new studios and stations for Radio Malaya.

"Malaya is one of the fastest developing countries in all of Asia, but," says Weinhold, "it needs trained agronomists to conduct a soil survey of the country."

In a letter to Mr. Evan Hirsch of Sheboygan Falls, Wisconsin, he asks his friends to do what he can to get 'ag' people to volunteer for the Peace Corps because of the great need in many countries.

"Some countries need people who can operate tractors and get up dainty farms. Some need skilled Veterinarians. I believe there are wonderful opportunities for young agriculture graduates in the Peace Corps."

James S. Norman, county agent of Fisher County, says the requests for Volunteers with farm backgrounds and training in agriculture, forestry and homemaking are increasing with every new Peace Corps project.

The demand for college trained Volunteers far exceeds the present number of qualified applicants. They are being requested to work in agricultural extension projects, in rural community action projects, as teachers in school systems, as instructors in colleges and universities for men and women without college training, provided they have farm experience, vocational agricultural training, or good 4-H backgrounds.

Applicants are now being selected for projects starting training in late spring and summer for Malaya, Nepal, Pakistan, India, Columbia, Ecuador, Peru, Venezuela, Brazil, Guatemala, Uruguay, Chile, Jamaica, St. Lucia, Guinea and Togo.

### Lone Star Has Largest Gas Supply In History

Dallas, Texas: The largest gas supply in its 53-year history enabled Lone Star Gas Company to meet record-breaking demands for natural gas on its system during January.

All-time high records for gas delivery during a single day and during a single month were recorded by the company in January. Four major northers that blanketed the state during the month kept Texans in an icy grip, with only brief thaw-out periods before the next cold wave struck.

A total of 1,876,500,000 cubic feet of gas delivered to customers on the Lone Star system during the 24-hour period ending on midnight, January 23. This was 18,200,000 more cubic feet of gas delivered than during the previous high send-out record established during the 24-hour period ending on midnight, January 9, 1962.

Total gas delivered by the company during January, 1963, was 43,503,200,000 cubic feet. This topped the previous all-time record of 40,374,400,000 cubic feet of gas delivered in January, 1962.

Lone Star Gas Company has a continuing and sound gas purchase program, designed to insure ample gas supply for current and future use. The company serves some 900,000 customers in 470 cities, towns, and communities in Texas and Southern Oklahoma. Lone Star maintains seven gas underground storage projects with a total current reservoir capacity of 78,440,000,000 cubic feet of gas.

As an added precaution, Lone Star protects its gas supply for residential customers by prior contractual agreement with all industrial gas users to curtail gas during extreme cold weather conditions. Many industrial plants switch to stand-by fuel during curtailment of gas. Curtailment is a planned procedure and does not reflect a shortage of gas in the field. Gas was curtailed in large industrial plants on certain parts of the Lone Star system on January 12, 19, and 23.

### Childrens Health Week February 3 to 9th

This is a sixth in a series of questions and answers on dental health published by the Rotan Advance in cooperation with the Seventeenth District Dental Society, Texas Dental Association, in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week February 3 through 9.

It is ever possible to save a dead tooth?

What is often called a "dead tooth" is really a pulpless tooth or a tooth with a dead or non-vital pulp. The pulp contains the nerves and blood vessels for the tooth.

Neglected dental decay will eventually involve the pulp, and the pulp may die. In many such advanced cases, if they are caught soon enough, the pulp can be removed and replaced with a suitable filling. More than 90 per cent of teeth given this treatment last just as long as the individual's other teeth.

While neglected decay is the chief cause of nonvital pulps, the condition also may result from an accidental blow to a tooth.

When a tooth is accidentally knocked out of the jaw, can it be replaced?

Yes, many times it can be replaced successfully in the dental arch. Generally it is children who accidentally have teeth knocked out while they are playing, riding or swimming. A tooth that has been knocked out should be washed and then kept in water. It is most important that the child and the tooth be taken to the dentist immediately. The sooner the tooth is replaced in the jaw, the longer it is likely to remain in the mouth.

What is malocclusion and what causes it?

Malocclusion is the term applied to irregularities of tooth position and occlusion (the fitting together of the teeth on closing the jaws).

There are two general causes of malocclusion, inherited and acquired. Such factors as size of jaw and size of teeth are handed down from parents to their children. Other

factors, such as harmful habits like thumbsucking prolonged from babyhood into childhood or early loss of primary teeth through decay, are mainly a result of the individual's own behavior.

However, the nature of malocclusion is so complex that usually it is not possible to attribute the condition to any one cause.

Can malocclusion be harmful to general health?

Failure of the teeth to meet properly (abnormal bite) may interfere with chewing. Consequently, the individual may not select the foods he needs for adequate nutrition.

When foods are not chewed adequately, there is an extra burden on the stomach. There also may be a strain on the jaw joints and muscles when the teeth do not come together properly.

Finally, dental deformities often are a factor in causing emotional problems.

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

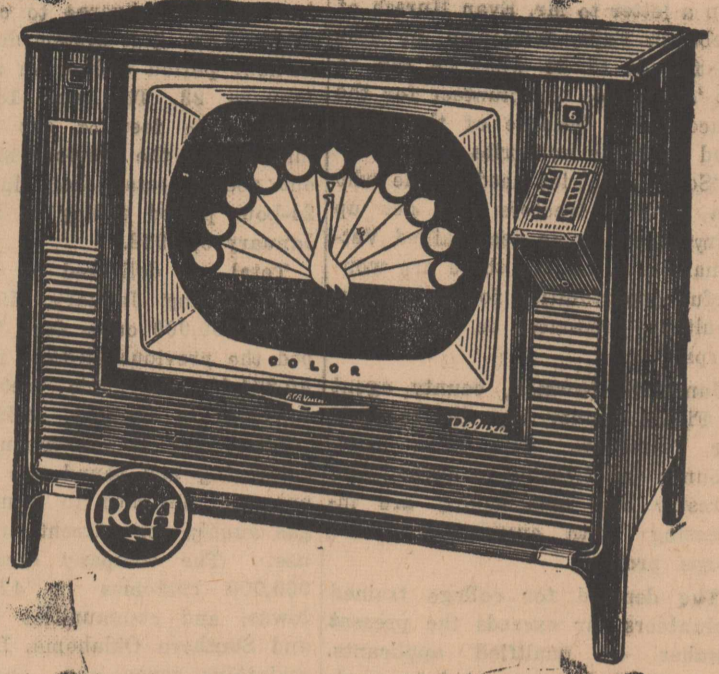
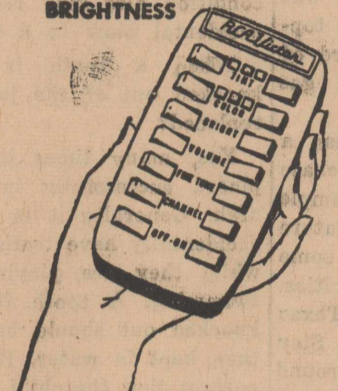
