### Election Called For Fire Trucks and Community Center

Following presentation of petitions asking that a bond election be called for purchase of two fire trucks for fire protection of rural areas and building of a Community Center in Rotan, Commissioners Court unanimously voted to call the special election and set March 30 as date for the election, in regular meeting Monday morning.

The two propositions will appear on the same ballot, but may be voted separately if desired.

Proposition one is for the voters consideration of issuance of fire equipment bonds in the amount of \$14,000. The second proposition calls for issuance of bonds in the amount of \$26,000 of community building.

If the voters approve first proposition, the county will purchase two mobile firefighting units to be used in the rural areas. They will be located in Roby and Rotan. The county at present has no equipment. Rotan and Roby firemen answer fire alarms to the rural area now.

Qualified taxpayers who have rendered property for taxation are eligible to cast votes in the election. Election order is published in this issue and contains full information.

### Local Students Enter Mathematics Contest

Rotan High School has enrolled in the 1963 Annual High School Mathematics Contest. This is a nation wide contest sponsored by the Mathematics Association of America and the Society of Actuaries.

The examination in secondary school mathematics is limited to material from elementary algebra, plain and simple coordinate geometry, and intermediate algebra. The contest examination will be given to the Rotan contestants and to the other participating schools on Thursday morning, March 14.

The papers of the three highest scoring students will be sent to the local contest chairman. The student from Rotan scoring the highest score will receive a mathematics pin.

Awards that will be awarded to the winning schools are demonstration slide rules, a set of mathematical library books, a set of golden gate books, and others. Also individual honors will be awarded.

The aim of this contest is to create and to sustain interest in mathematics among the students of secondary schools and has been placed on the Approved List of National Contests and Activities for 1962-1963 by the National Association of Secondary-School Principals.

### Local Teachers Attend Dist. Educators Meeting

About 3,500 educators wound up a two-day Texas State Teachers Assn. Oil Belt District meeting in Wichita Falls Friday.

In a final session, a leading Corpus Christi teacher and immediate past president of the state organization called for better trained teachers who are free to teach.

Mrs. Ferd B. Norris, one of the main personalities at the meeting which began here Thursday, declared, "I learned last summer in Stockholm that the teaching profession all over the world must have better trained teachers who must be free to teach."

She said all nations must attract "top talent" to devote themselves to the teaching profession.

"We must teach the children not just 'know alls,' but 'know hows,' she asserted.

She urged teachers to be free to communicate truth, to be eternal enemies of superstition, to be free to be trained in the academic world and to train in this world.

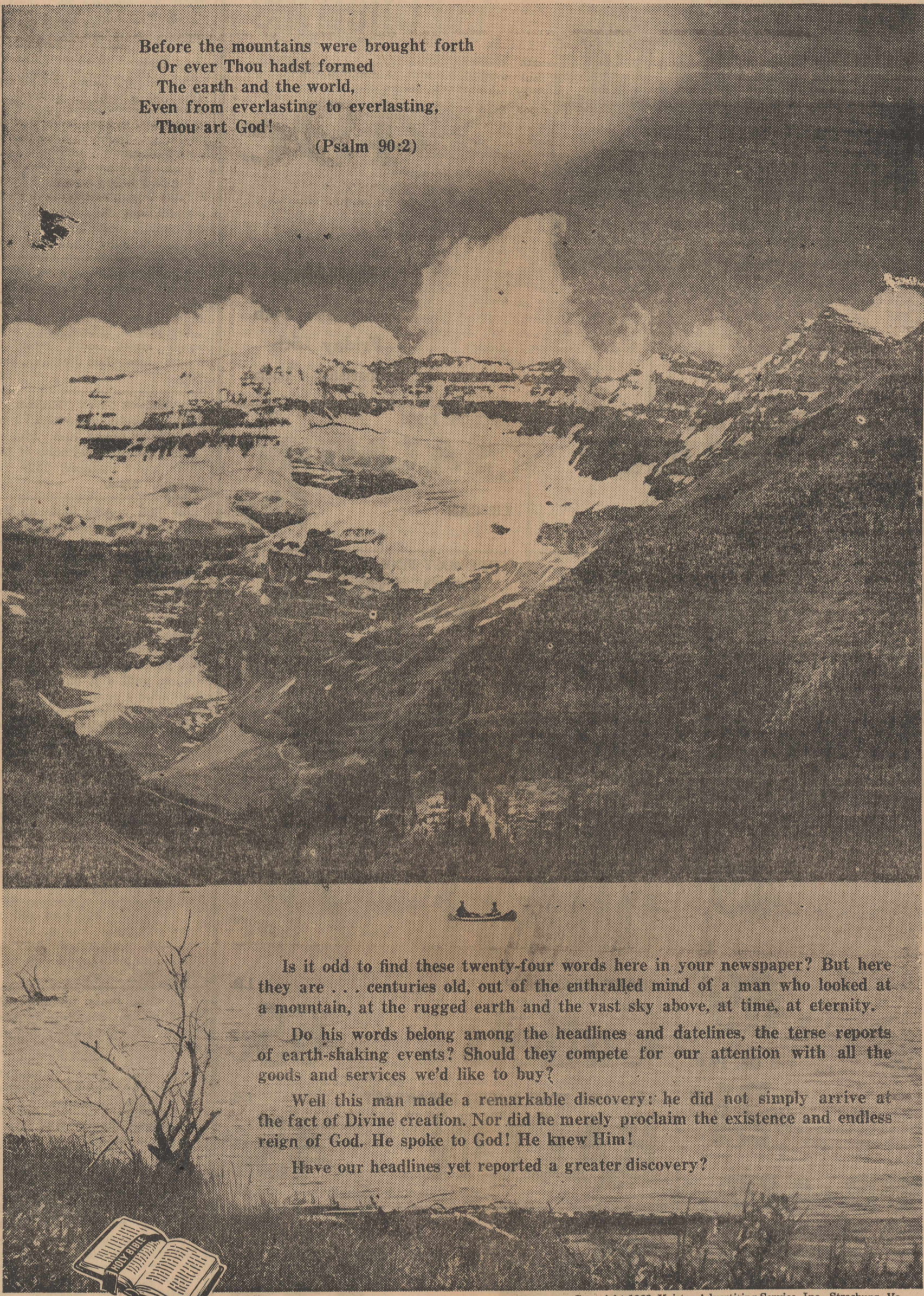

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### March Is Red Cross Drive Month

Washington, D. C. March 10 -- The 1963 Red Cross campaign for members and funds got a big send-off as President Kennedy appeared on radio and television to urge Americans to give organization their full support.

The Presidents filmed and recorded message launched the nationwide ARC drive that runs from March 1 to 31.

Earlier this month, President Kennedy proclaimed March as Red Cross Month, asking "all Americans to honor the American Red Cross by participating in, and strengthening, its work."

E. Roland Harriman, ARC National Chairman, today emphasized that the Red Cross and its 3,600 chapters rely entirely on the voluntary contributions of the American people for the funds needed to conduct what President Kennedy cited in his proclamation as "essential services to the Government of the United States and the American people."

These include help for members of the U. S. Armed Forces, veterans, and their families; aid for victims of disasters; blood for the ill and injured; health and safety instruction; programs of community service for American youth in schools and colleges, and international relief and assistance programs conducted in cooperation with other members of the globe-girdling Red Cross family.

Keying their appeals to the 1963 slogan, "Always There . . . With Your Help," about 2,100 of the 3,600 ARC chapters will campaign during March to raise their share of the funds needed to carry on such services. Another 700 chapters will seek to reach the goals they partially met last fall in united community fund drives.

The remaining 800 chapters, whose fund raising tasks were completed as partners in fall united appeals, will conduct March campaigns to interpret their programs to the public and to recruit volunteer workers and blood donors.

"This year," Mr. Harriman said, "the American Red Cross is one of 90 societies marking the 100th anniversary of the founding of the world-wide humanitarian movement to which they belong."

"In the past century," he continued, "the red cross on the field of white and its sister symbols, the red crescent, and the red lion and sun, have become universal emblems of mercy. People the world over rally to them to bring aid and comfort to the victims of war and disaster."

The universality, effectiveness and value of the Red Cross, Mr. Harriman said, were forcefully pointed up during the past two and one-half months. The American and Cuban societies are playing a key role in the collection, shipment, and receipt of the \$53,000,000 worth of medical and food supplies that brought freedom for the 1,113 Cuban prisoners captured in April 1961. This project will continue, he said, until all the supplies have been turned over to the Cubans. The supplies, he emphasized, have proved of utmost value in helping meet the needs of Cuban mothers and children, the ill and the injured.

Volunteer national cochairman of the 1963 campaign are James A. Linen, president of Time Inc., and Fred A. Bantz, former under-secretary of the Navy and former vice president and general merchandise manager of the J. C. Penny Company.

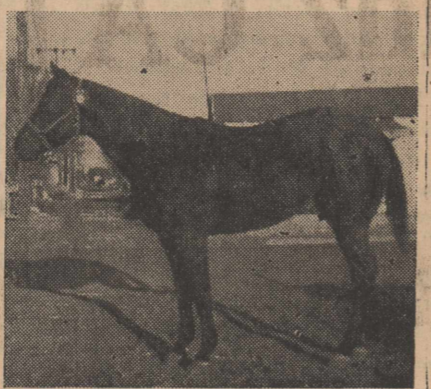

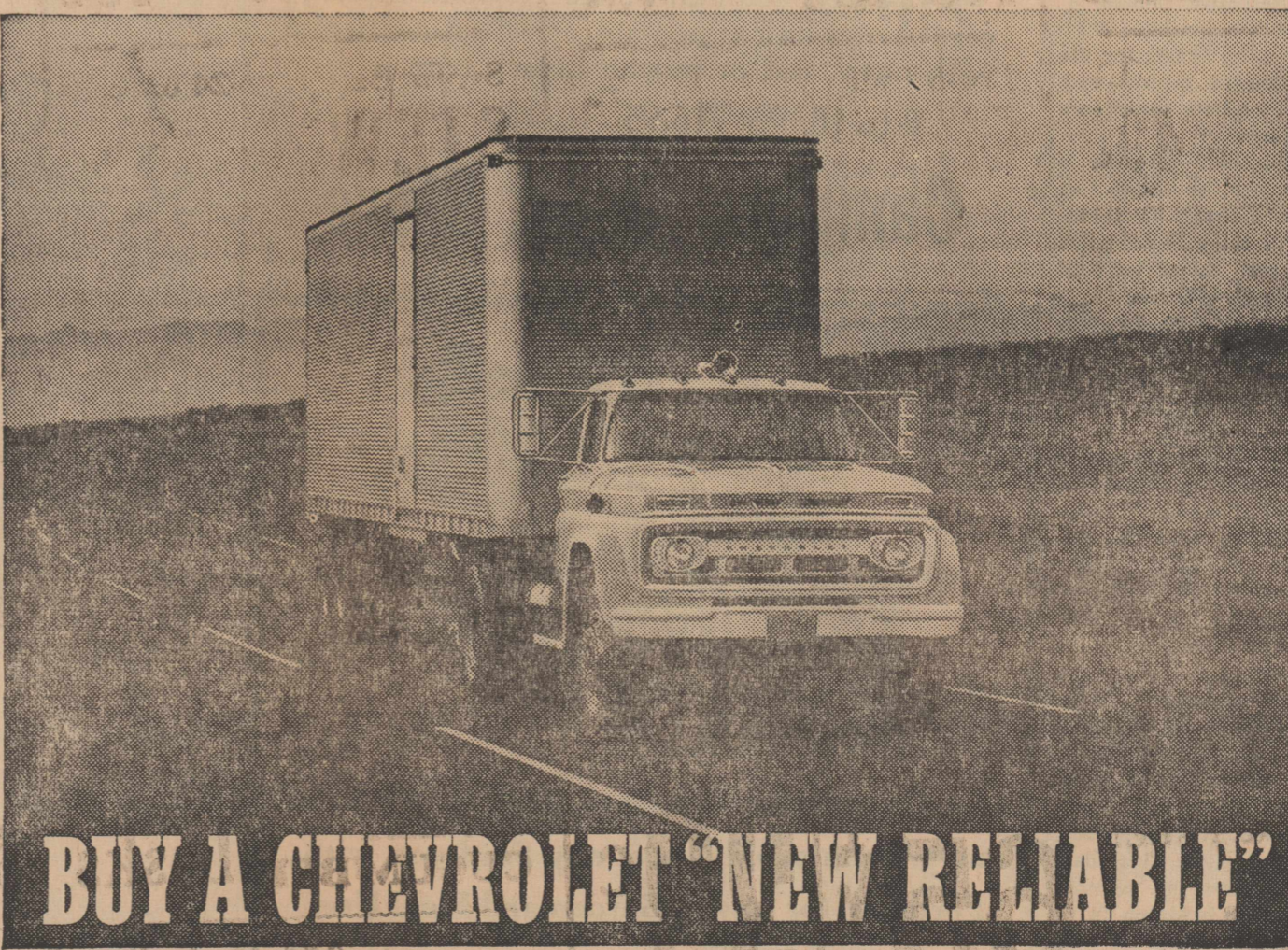

# NEWS

County Agricultural Agent  
Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

Officials of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation announced on Tuesday, March 5 that when state and county drives are completed, sufficient funds will be available to continue the screw-worm eradication project.

The board of trustees meeting in Austin said that telephone calls and telegrams from counties reported about \$850,000 has been banked by county animal health committees in a concentrated drive since February 1. At the same time, county chairmen advised the Foundation that they can collect the additional amount required in early March.

The Foundation trustees issued a call for all counties and states of New Mexico, Louisiana and Oklahoma to follow through and collect funds they advised the Foundation they could still raise. This amount must be collected in order for the fund drive to be completed.

The recent announcement means that when producers wind up county and state drives, sufficient funds will be available to continue the project until September 1. Participation of the State of Texas, through the Texas Animal Health Commission, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture is expected to complete the eradication.

The Southwest enjoyed nine full days without a screwworm being reported -- the longest period since the eradication program began. During the same week a year ago, 77 infestations were recorded. February 1962 saw 113 cases being reported, while in February 1963 only 10 cases were detected.

A screwworm case was detected in the navel of a new-born calf in Willacy County on Monday, March 4. Inspectors were immediately pulled in and cattle were closely checked and sprayed. Expanded fly treatment was initiated. Flies being fed on a mixture of syrup and water are also being dispersed in the county. Eradications have been testing the fed-fly technique to determine whether such flies will be able to survive better and longer in nature and thus be more effective in eradication.

Now that spring is around the corner, all livestock are urged to keep a close check on their livestock for screwworm cases. Should a case show up ten or more specimens should be collected and brought to our office so they may be mailed to the Mission Lab for positive identification. Free vials are available at our office for mailing specimen to the help by livestockmen themselves.

Grain producers have until March 22 to decide whether or not to participate in the 1963 Feed Grain program. The decision is sufficiently important, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, that all commercial growers should consider the income possibilities of the alternative choices.

Budget forms are available from the offices of county agents for use in figuring estimated returns under the program for both compliance and non-compliance.

In general the 1963 program is similar to the one in effect last year. The grower agrees to reduce his feed grain acreage, corn, grain sorghum or barely, by at least 20 percent; to comply with the diversion as shown by his sign-up papers and add the acres taken out of use. This acreage, in addition to the farm's base acreage in conservation use.

The specialist notes a change in the substitute crop provision. A percentage of the minimum diversion payment is available when the diverted acres are planted to certain crops. These and the percentage of payment are sesame, 40 percent; guar, 30 percent; castor beans, 30 percent and sunflower, 20 percent.

Feed grain producers having questions regarding any phase of the 1963 program are advised to contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service staff for detailed information. And, reminds Bates, the final date for making a decision on whether or not to participate in March 22.

## "God Speaks Through His Ministers"

### SELF IMPROVEMENT

A shot in the Arm! a reawakening! a concentration of efforts! All these we hear often quoted as "slogans" to success, to better living. But do we ever stop to think of a SPIRITUAL RENEWAL. We need it. Looking at ourselves through the eyes of Christ, don't we have faults to correct and virtues to attain?

The problem for most of us would be "where to begin". Anyone wishing to be a success in life always takes a tip or lesson from the professionals. Why not take a tip from St. Paul, and old master of the spiritual life?

He told the Colossians in the third chapter how to improve themselves. For instance, "... put them

all away: anger, wrath, malice, abusive language and foul mouthed utterance. Do not lie to one another." His advice from a positive side reads this way: "Put on ... a heart of mercy, kindness, humility, meekness, patience. Bear with one another and forgive one another. If anyone has a grievance against another, even as the LORD has forgiven you, so also do you forgive. But above all these things have charity, which is the bond of perfection." What a lineup!

Aren't some of us rather smug and self-satisfied regarding our way of living? Individuals will say "I am not so bad. Look at some of the other people". In such a case we are making the FAULTS of OTHERS OF LIVING. We'll never amount to much that way. God ex-

pects us to pattern our life on that of CHRIST our STANDARD OF LIVING.

Our Age has much in common with what the master St. Paul found wrong among the Galatians. "It is easy to see what effects proceed from corrupt nature. They are such things as adultery, jealousies, outbursts of anger, rivalries, dissensions, factions, spite, murder, drunkenness, and debauchery . . . . Whereas the spirit yields a harvest of love, joy peace, patience, kindness, generosity, forbearance, gentleness, faith, courtesy, temperance and purity." That array of vices and virtues should give an abundance of food for thought.

How are we going to rid ourselves of the vices we have and acquire the virtues enumerated by St. Paul? First of all, start slowly, in low gear. Let's not try to accomplish too much all of a sudden. The "IMITATION OF CHRIST" tell us "If we could manage to eradicate one of our faults every year, how soon it would make perfect men of us".

Why not pick out your most prominent fault and strive to lessen the times you slip into it? Or single out some VIRTUE you greatly admire in another person and resolve to make that virtue a part of YOURSELF. Don't become discouraged, your EFFORT is God's gauge of achievement.

Settle on a simple plan and stick by it. For instance, be strict on yourself about a prayer each day, only a short and simple prayer, "Lord not my will but THINE be done". Let nothing stand between you and GOD. Check regularly how you fulfill your duties, the main duties of your state of life. These are just a simple way of a KEY to success. An extra challenge could be a close guard on your tongue and eyes. Speak kindly instead of critically, look for the virtues in your neighbor and not always for his vices.

With a prayer in your heart for guidance and courage, read again and again what St. Paul stressed. Remember St. Paul's words to the

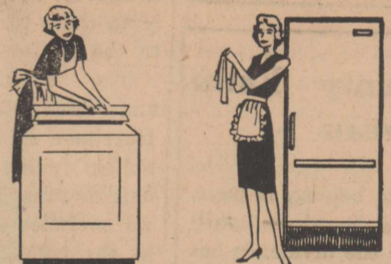
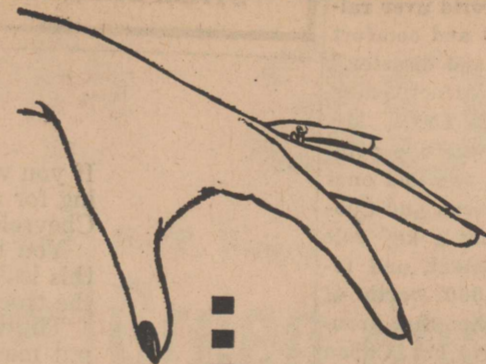
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
