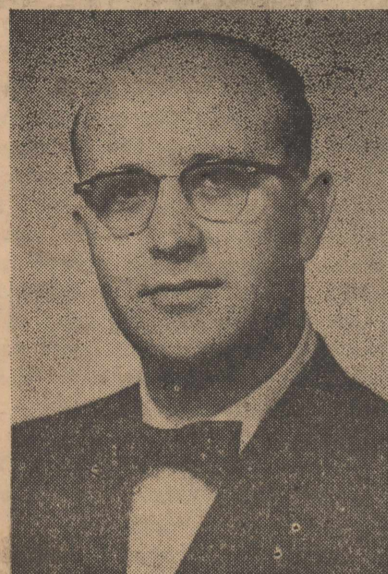

Interest Growing On
Dam Site For
Double Mountain River

A delegation represented Rotan at a public hearing in Plainview Wednesday morning of U. S. Army Engineers, considering projected dam sites on the Brazos River.

Mayor Juston Morrow, Lawrence Weatherman, and Roger Smith and Laurence Sparks made the trip to investigate possibilities of a location being made northeast of Rotan. Much interest is being shown in Rotan, after investigation this week revealed that during the 1930's the Army Engineers made extensive survey and studies on Double Mountain and Brazos Rivers. One site northeast of Rotan is reported to have good natural possibilities for a dam site.

A series of dams on these rivers has been under consideration for a number of years, all of the dams would be solely for the purposes of flood control, not palatable water supply.

While the main purpose of the dams would be for flood control, untold benefit would result from recharging of water wells, water distribution under thousands acres of land. Direct benefits for the entire area would be for recreation and financial gain from this phase.

The proposed dams are probably in distant future we appreciate the representatives going to Plainview meet and letting the engineers know Rotan wants such a dam.

Alice Kemp, County H. D. Agent, accompanied the Fisher County group.

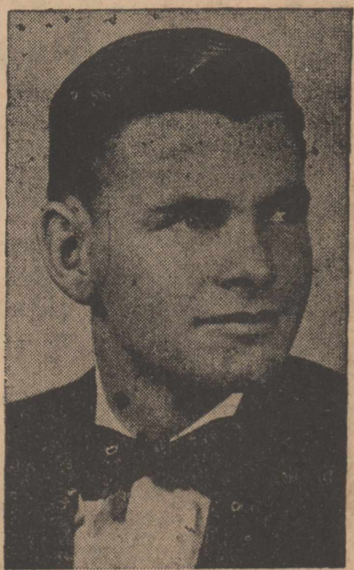

Church Sunday

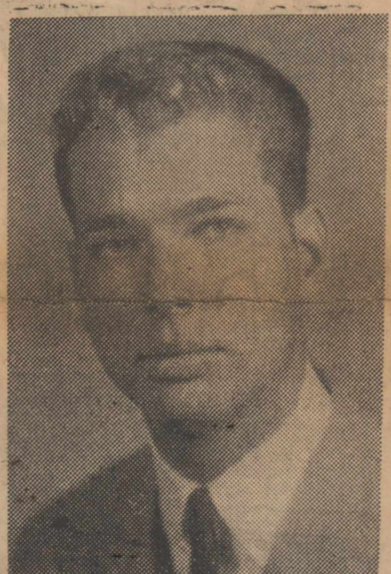

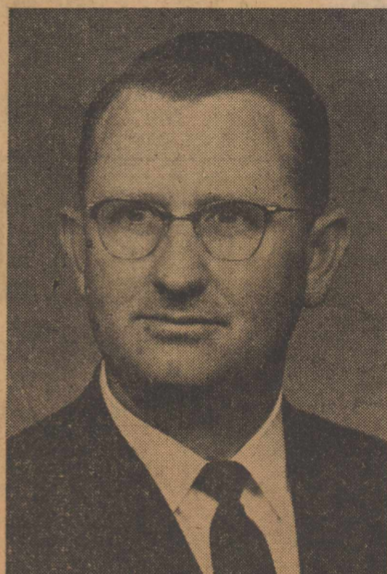
Fashion Show Draws

Noted as a minister, lecturer and author, he also exhibited another quality that places him in great demand as a speaker-humor.

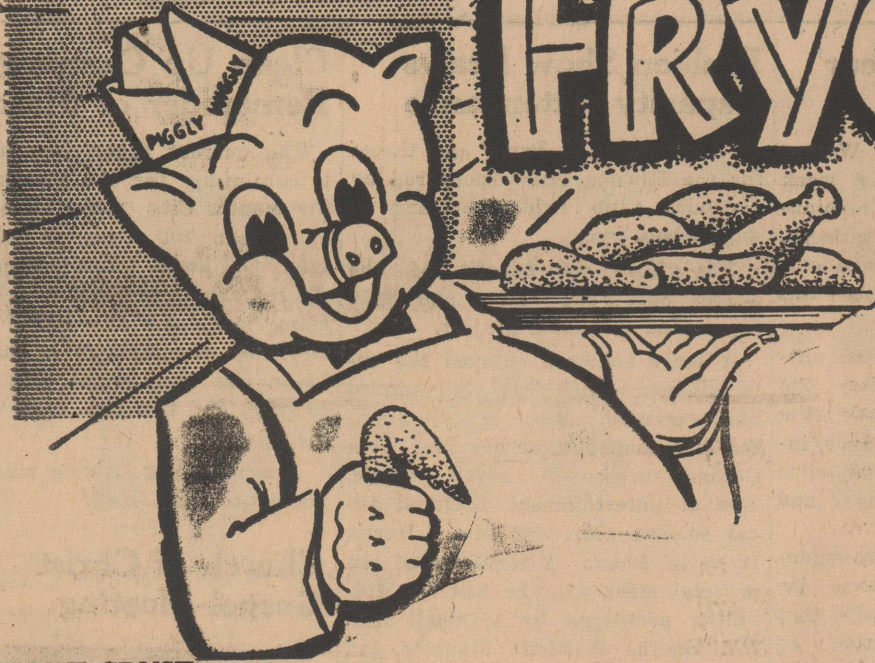
Hendon Makes

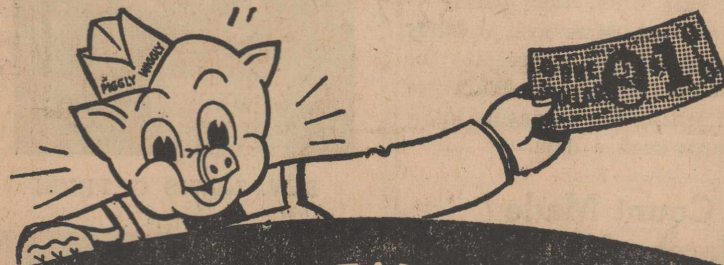

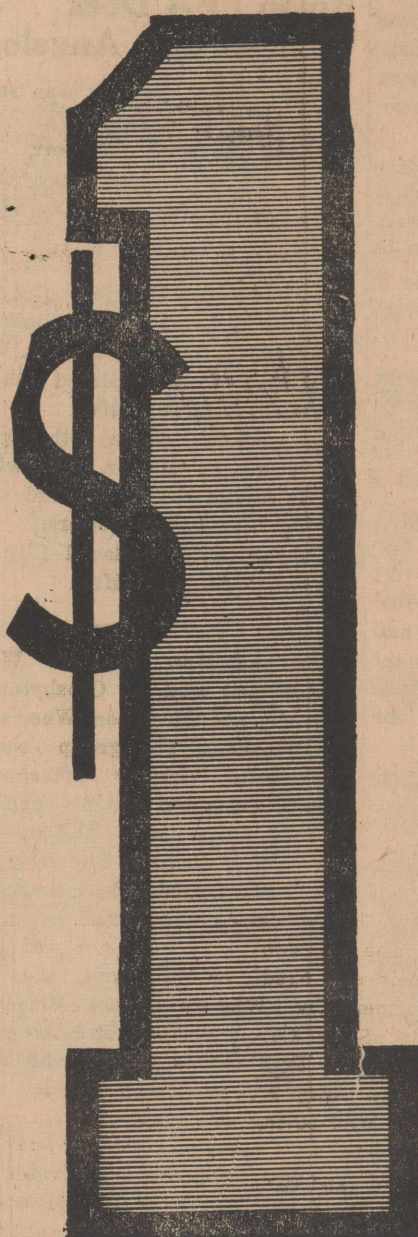

If you are interested in hunting, fishing, hiking, or just relaxing in the woods, you will want to get a copy of the leaflet, "Texas Forests Welcome You." This pictorial leaflet shows and describes the recreation areas available to the public in the four National Forests located in Texas and locates them on a map for easy reference.

Extension Forests Bill Smith says that each year thousands of Texans take advantage of the developed recreation areas in the Forests. He points out that many such areas are maintained for public use. Picnicking, camping and swimming are the main activities. In addition there is boating and fishing on sites which have lakes. All sites provide tables, fireplaces, sanitary facilities and camp sites.

You can get a copy of the leaflet, "Texas Forests Welcome You," from your county Extension agent.

A derivative of cereal grain has been found to make stronger insulation board and paper, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Zinc xanthate, an insoluble cereal product, was used in tests by USDA's Agricultural Research Service. The best experimental boards containing 10 percent of the derivative were lighter but 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 times stronger than commercial insulation boards of similar density.

The process for making cereal-zinc xanthate involves two steps. First, starch, flour, ground wheat or some other grain product is reacted with carbon disulfide and an alkali such as lye to produce the cereal xanthate, which is insoluble. Then xanthate is reacted with zinc salts to form cereal-zinc xanthate, which is insoluble.

Another cereal derivative, cereal-zinc xanthide, has shown promise for use in making paper. Research conducted a year ago with this derivative using a pulp mixture containing 44 percent of the substance, increased paper strength considerably.

The one-day commercial clinic will be held March 17 in the Memorial Student Center of the campus of Texas A&M College. Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman, says the program will feature subjects of current concern to the Texas egg industry. He extends a special invitation to those interested in the industry.

Knowing immediately where every screwworm case in the Southwest is located has become so important to the eradication programs that arrangements have been made so livestock producers can call the Mission headquarters collect when a case is found. Producers are urged to call day or night Justice 5-1646, Mission, whenever an infestation is found. They are asked by the program officials to do two things, - collect about 10 worms from the wound, place them in water or alcohol and hold for instructions and report the infestation by telephone to Mission.

New developments in feeding and practical housing and equipment for the hog farm will be featured on the program of the 12th annual Swine Short Course to be held at Texas A&M College, April 1-2. T. D. Tarkley, extension swine specialist, expects a highlight of the program to be the discussion by eight Texas commercial hog producers on their operations.

About Your HEALTH

AUSTIN--There's really no way of knowing how many economy-minded housewives still indulge in the potentially deadly practice of home dry cleaning.

But it is a fact, revealed in State Health Department death records, that 369 Texans were killed last year in home accidents involving combustible materials, and 34 were fatally poisoned at home by gases and vapors. It is fair to surmise that a number of these incidents could be traced to dry-cleaning activities.

Perhaps many victims habitually used flammable liquids to clean curtains or clothes. Perhaps others were first-timers, motivated by economy or convenience. All were probably ordinarily sensible, fully aware of the peril of gasoline or naphtha or similar materials so often used for dry cleaning. But one brief moment of carelessness turned them from happy homemakers into sad statistics.

Explosions are only one of several involved in home dry cleaning. Some agents are flammable. Others give off injurious vapors. Still others are harmful to human skin. All could be lethal taken internally.

Gasoline is so explosive that to keep it in home is openly court disaster. Gasoline emits vapors which form explosive mixtures in the air. A transient spark from a light switch or cigarette and the mixture may be ignited.

Vapors may flow in an invisible stream for perhaps 200 feet from the point of use, flashing back and exploding the main container when touched off by a flame or spark. Static electricity generated by synthetic or silk fabric being cleaned is fully capable of igniting the fumes of gasoline or naphtha.

Care must be taken to avoid inhaling concentrated vapors, since the common ones--excluding turpentine--are anesthetics. Some, after prolonged exposures, are injurious to internal organs.

If gasoline or naphtha can dissolve dirt and grime on fabric, obviously these same fluids can dissolve the natural oils of human skin.

If you still insist on doing your own dry cleaning, do it right.

Use only non-flammable cleaning agents, keeping in mind that "non-explosive" does not necessarily mean

"non-flammable." Never, under any circumstances, use naphtha or gasoline.

Do your cleaning outside, where toxic vapors will be quickly and safely dissipated. And use a dip stick in the liquid rather than your hands.

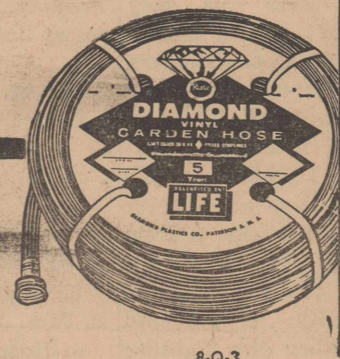
