In earlier periods of our nation's history, every American family had what we might call a survival plan. It a fire, flood or Indian attack threatened, the plan went into action and everyone swung into his assigned role. It had to be that way because those Americans lived in dangerous times. The same is true today - we too live in dangerous times. The possibility of nuclear war poses a potential threat to every section of the country. To survive, we must be just as alert, as prepared as our forefathers.

We don't know if the enemy will strike, when or where, but we do know the danger, and more important, we know what to do about it. Just as earlier generations found safe places to which they could retreat when danger threatened, so must we.

Our danger is more widespread and all-pervading, but then, so are our resources. The most important pitfall we face is apathy - the attitude that it's too big to fight. It's not. Of course, nuclear radiation is more dangerous than arrows! At least they could be seen. But then, isn't a car a more lethal weapon than a horse and buggy?

The first thing to remember about a possible nuclear conflict is that you can survive. Unless you were in the immediate area of the bomb burst, you would only have to contend with radiation. You would have about half an hour before fallout began, more if you were well away from the bombed area. This is time to put a well-made plan into operation and to take advantage of a previously prepared refuge. It is not enough time to scurry around gathering up the many things you would need if you had to stay under cover for up to two weeks.

Obviously, the only sensible thing to do is much the same as our forefathers did: make a survival plan to meet our particular danger. Many areas around a well-run farm or home can give fairly good shelter now with little or no modification. Find the best place available and add some more shielding to make it even safer, then begin stocking up on the things you might need or want if you should have to take shelter there.

Just staying inside your house would reduce your radiation exposure by about one-half. Going to a below-ground basement would cut it to one-tenth. If you added extra shielding along the walls and ceiling, and protected your entranceway, the exposure would be still less.

So you see, the situation is not hopeless by any means. There's plenty we can do to protect ourselves, our families, and our livestock. I have bulletins and other information on radioactive fallout and what to do about it. I'll be glad to supply anyone who asks.

After all, preparing for a possible nuclear attack, which all of us hope will never come, is no different from making plans to cover any other possible emergency. But there is one more reason, if an attack should ever come, a strong agriculture would be vital in putting our country back on its feet and continuing our way of life.

"God Speaks Through His Ministers"

PALISM SUNDAY

Text: "And it came to pass, when the time was come that He should be received up, He steadfastly set His face to go to Jerusalem. Luke 9:51

The behavior of Jesus on his first Palm Sunday suggests his faith that, when things look blackest, the possibilities are greatest.

When Jesus rode into Jerusalem, he was under no illusions. He knew that what he stood for was not popular. He knew also that this was the key to a better future, and that the possibilities in the situation were incalculable. He was confident that, if for the moment he lost his chance for the heart of the world, he would win it in the end. He could have saved his own life. The cross was not inevitable. He could have refused it. Instead of going into Jerusalem, he might have returned to Nazareth or Capernaum and thereafter led a comfortable existence. But he chose to enter Jerusalem, to pass down its main street, through the Garden of Gethsemane, through the judgment hall of Pilate, on out at the other end to die on a cross between two thieves with a prayer of forgiveness on his lips.

It took something beyond courage for Jesus to volunteer for God's sake to set himself against the ugliness and evil of his time. It took faith that, when things look blackest, the possibilities with God are greatest. In the light of history that faith was abundantly justified.

Strangely enough, it takes a black future to inspire bright courage and a quest for the possibilities in the darkness. It takes the prospect of a grim tomorrow to draw out the "hero in the soul". On August 3, 1914, King Albert of Belgium was given an ultimatum by the Germans. He was urged to give the German army free passage thus escape the destruction of his land. The alternative was a forced passage with the outcome hardly in doubt. Albert never hesitated, and the passage was refused. In speaking about it afterward, he said that Belgium had been "cornered into heroism".

The simple truth is that courage is proportionate to challenge, and the promise of a dark future can be a stimulus calling out great powers to meet it. There is an old saying to the effect that "North wind made the Vikings", and certainly, it is true that the cold winds of circumstance have been instruments with which God has fashioned great character. When things look blackest for Jewish philosopher named Spinoza, and he was going blind grinding lenses for a living, he wrote his greatest philosophy. When the future looked blackest for John Milton, his eyesight gone, he wrote his greatest poetry. When life was blackest for the Children of Israel, captives in alien land, the prophets wrote their greatest works. When the future was blackest for Germany in the days of Napoleon's triumphant power, Kant and Hegel and Fichte led the German people to intellectual triumph. Clearly the future belongs to those who know that when things look darkest, the possibilities are greatest.

If you want a thrill, read the

story called Bradford of Plymouth, by Bradford Smith. It is the magnificent story of a man who from his childhood faced nothing but a black, grim, unpromising future and came through gloriously. There was scarcely a day from the landing of the Mayflower until the death of William Bradford that he was not faced with a black unpromising future. At Plymouth, he faced the danger of starvation, invasion, economic collapse, Indian raids, and the treachery of his friends. And says Bradford Smith, "the real rock on which Plymouth was built -- was William Bradford himself" and the character of Bradford was built on faith in God. It is clear in retrospect that the future belonged to a man understood by faith that the possibilities are greatest when things look darkest. When most of the colonists wanted to give up and go home, as other colonists had done, Bradford "set his face to go to Jerusalem". We are heirs to the possibilities of that grim day.

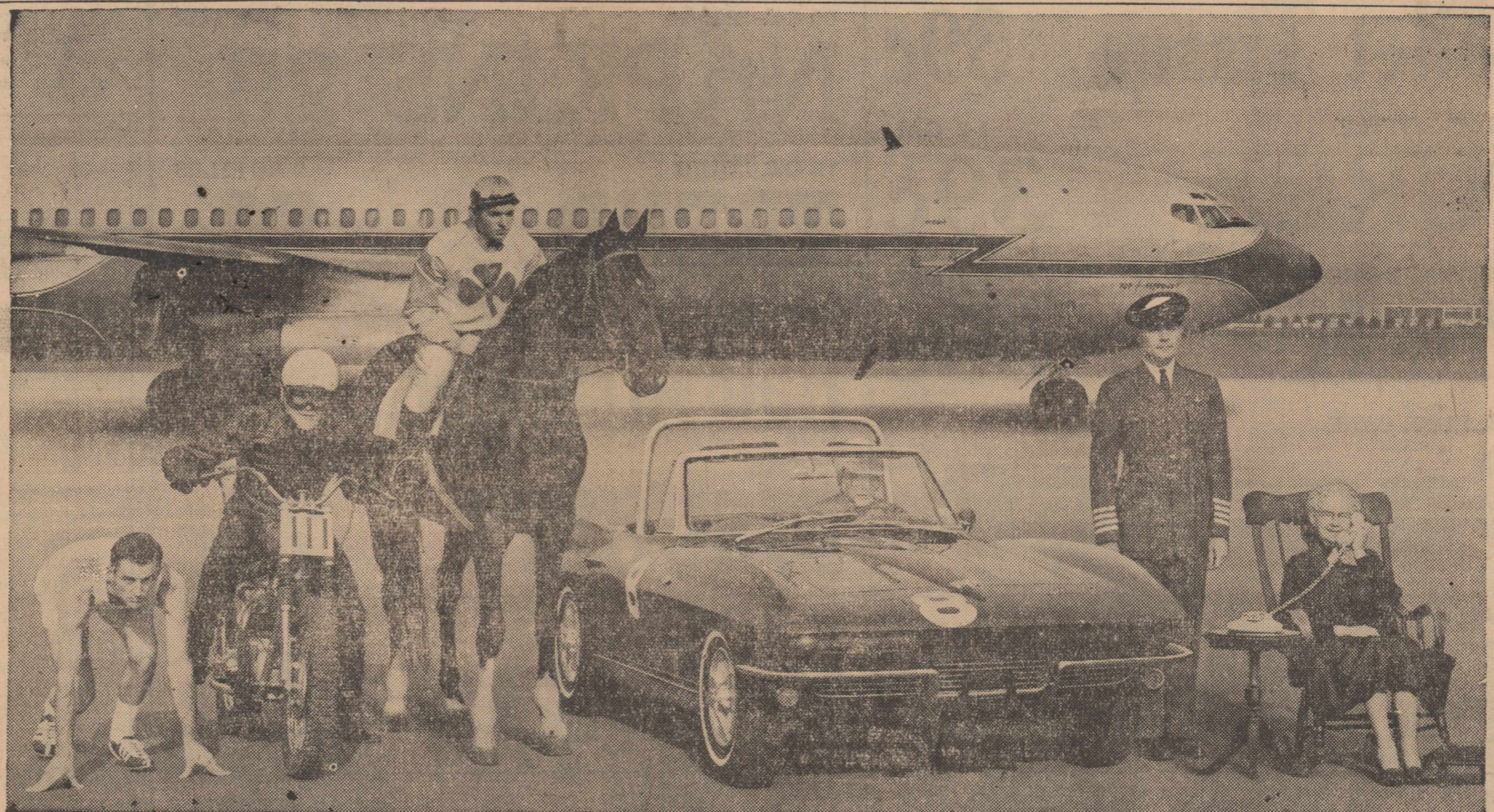

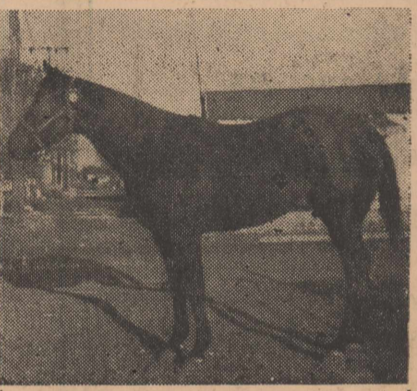

Joint County Jr. College Meeting At Snyder

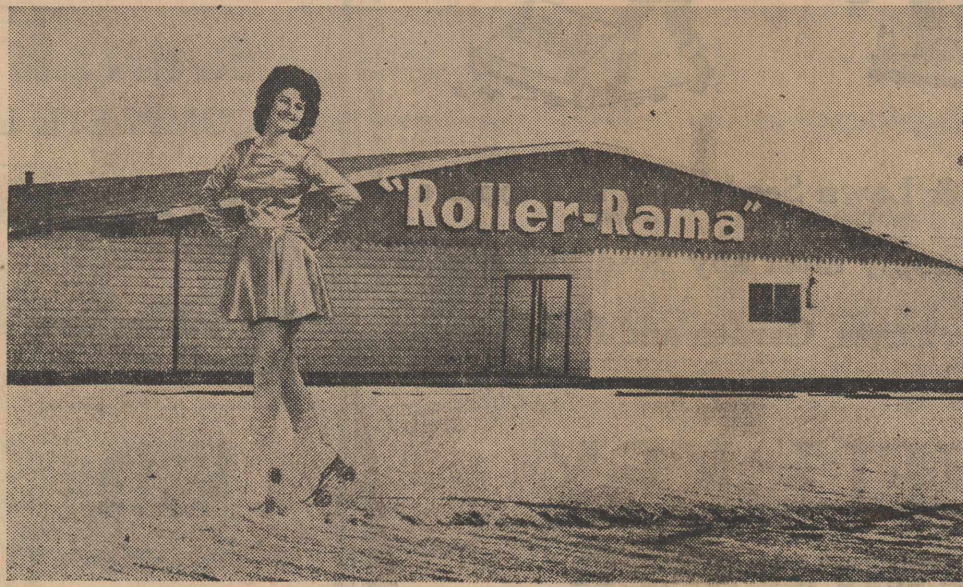
A proposal for a joint county junior college district composed of Fisher and Scurry counties will be heard at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, April 9, in the auditorium of Snyder High School. The general public of Fisher and Scurry counties is being invited, in fact urged, to attend the meeting.

The announcement was made Saturday by the Junior College Survey Committee of Snyder. The committee noted that its decision to make the two-county proposal comes after almost a year of study (since May 7, 1962) which included visits to junior college campuses, visits with TEA officials and members of the State Board of Education, mail surveys to parents of ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grade in Scurry and Fisher counties, a survey by Dr. C. C. Colvert, Jr., College Consultant, University of Texas, and presentation of some forty public information programs to over 900 people in Scurry, Fisher, Nolan, Mitchell, Borden, Garza, and Kent Counties. The committee noted that, as a result of these efforts, it is their conclusion that

there is a great deal of interest in creating a junior college in Scurry and Fisher counties. Consequently, the committee has spent the last few weeks developing specific data in support of a proposal for the two county district.

The legal procedures and requirements and supporting data, as well as the petition itself, will be discussed at the April 9 meeting. Following the meeting, petitions will be available for signatures in the lobby of the auditorium.

To better inform the public of the two counties on this matter, the committee has secured two speakers, one of whom will discuss the educational aspects of a public junior college and the other will discuss his community's outlook on the junior college. Dr. Marvin Baker, president of South Plains College, Levelland, will discuss the Texas public junior college past, present, and future. A businessman from Levelland will discuss his community's reaction to South Plains College. South Plains College in

Levelland is in its fifth year of operation.

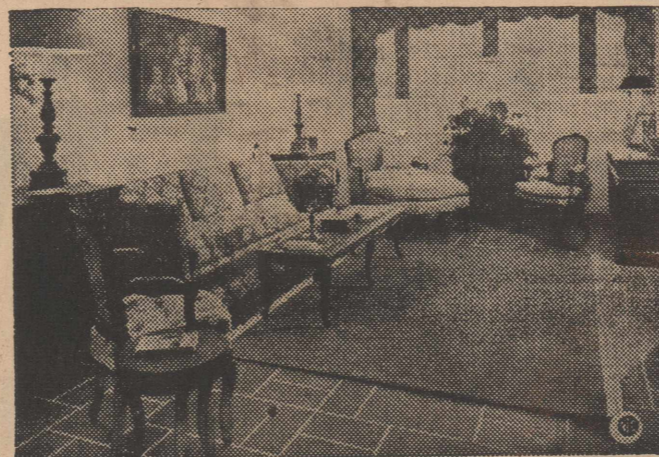
