
In earlier periods of our nation's history, every American family had what we might call a survival plan. It a fire, flood or Indian attack threatened, the plan went into action and everyone swung into his assigned role. It had to be that way because those Americans lived in dangerous times. The same is true today -- we too live in dangerous times. The possibility of nuclear war poses a potential threat to every section of the country. To survive, we must be just as alert, as prepared as our forefathers.

We don't know if the enemy will strike, when or where, but we do know the danger, and more important, we know what to do about it. Just as earlier generations found safe places to which they could retreat when 'danger threatened, so must we.

Our danger is more widespread and all-pervading, but then, so are our resources. The most important pitfall we face is apathy -- the attitude that it's to big to fight. It's not. Of course, nuclear rediation is more dangerous than arrows! At least they could be seen. But then, isn't a car a more lethal weapon than a horse and buggy?

It took faith that, when things look blackest, the possibilities with God are greatest. In the light of history that faith was abundantly justified.

Strangely enough, it takes a black future to inspire bright courage and a quest for the possibilities in the darkness. It takes the prospect of a grim tomorrow to draw out the "hero in the soul". On August 3, 1914, King Albert of Blegium was given an ultimatum by the Germans. He was urged to give the German army free passage thus escape the destruction of his land. The alternative was a forced passage with the outcome hardly in doubt. Albert never hesitated, and the passage was refused. In speaking about it afterward, he said that Belgium had been "cornered into heroism".

The simple truth is that courage is proportionate to challenge, and the promise of a dark future can be a stimulus calling out great powers to meet it. There is an old saying to the effect that "North win'd made the Vikings", and certainby it is true that the cold winds of circumstance have been instruments with which God has fashioned great character. When things look blackest for 'Jewish philosopher named Spinoza, and he was going blind grinding lenses for a living, he wrote his greatest philosophy. When the future looked blackest for John Milton, his eyesight gone, he wrote his greatest poetry. When life was blackest for the Children of Israel, captives in alien land, the prophets wrote their greatest works. When the future was blackest for Germany in the days of Napoleon's triumphant power, Kant and Hegel and Fichte led the German people to intelectual triumph. Clearly the future belongs to those who know that when things look darkest, the possibilities are greatest

A proposal for a joint county junior college district composed of Fisher and Scurry counties will be heard at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, April 9, in the auditorium of Snyder High School. The general public of Fisher and Scurry counties is being invited, in fact urged, to attend the meeting.

The announcement was made Saturday by the Junior College Servey Committee of Snyder. The committee noted that its decision to make the two-county proposal comes after almost a year of study (since May 7, 1962) which inclu'ded visits to junior college campuses, visits with TEA officials and members of the State Board of Education, mail surveys to parents of ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelth grade in Scurry and Fisher counties, a survey by Dr. C. Colvert, Jr., College Consultant, University of Texas, and presentation of some forty public information programs to over 900 people in Scurry, Fisher, Nolan, Mitcheil, Borden, Garza, and Kent Counties.
