Pioneer Of Area Dies Saturday

L. E. Puryear, 88, who came to Rotan when the town started in 1906, died at 2:30 Saturday in Callan Hospital. He had been in failing health for several years, but still walked to town when he desired, until the last few days of his life. He contracted construction of most of the early day building of Rotan and followed this trade until retirement several years ago.

Mr. Puryear was a charter member of the Rotan Masonic lodge.

He was born January 9, 1875 in Alabama and married Lillie Tomlinson in Hunt County. They moved to Rotan from Greenville and she died about 20 years ago.

Funeral was held at 10 a. m. Monday from Weathersbee Chapel with Masonic graveside rites at Belview cemetery.

Survivors are four sons, Bud, H. R. and L. H. of Rotan; and Billy of California; four daughters, Mrs. Owen Compton of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Ocie Whitfield of Orlando, Fla., Mrs. Jack Denning of LaBelle, Mo., and Mrs. Homer Stephenson of Lawton, Okla.; and a number of grandchildren.

Mr. Puryear was preceeded in death by three sons.

Cutting cotton production costs should be the goal of stepped up cotton research, says the USDA's Cotton Research and Marketing Advisory Committee.

At its annual meeting held recently, the committee proposed more study on breeding, weed and insect control, cultural practices and seed-bed preparation, soil and water management, harvesting equipment ginning and related processes, and storing cotton and seed cotton.

The unattractive appearance of the American cotton bale was criticized and the committee advised the use of new lightweight cotton bagging materials, standardization of the bale size and better methods of sampling the bales.

Research on improving the wash-and-wear properties of cotton were recommended. New developments with stretch cotton, flame resistant cotton, and cloth that resists rot, heat and weather promise to increase the use of cotton, the committee says.

The committee sees a need for more work on uses for cottonseed oil and a better cottonseed meal, with an accompanying improvement in the processing techniques of cottonseed.

The Cotton Research and Marketing Advisory Committee is made up of some of the nation's leaders in the industry and has two Texans among them. They are Otto Goedecke, president of Otto Goedecke Inc., Hallettsville, and Wilmer Smith, a Lynn County cotton grower.

Texas sheep and goat producers are reminded by Ed Uvacek, extension livestock marketing specialist, that the marketing years for wool and mohair have been changed from an April 1 - March 31 year to a calendar year basis.

In order to make the transition from the April-March base to a calendar year, the 1963 marketing year will consist of only nine months -- April through December. The first full calendar marketing year, therefore, will be 1964 explains Uvacek.

These changes are important to sheep and goat producers, says the specialist, since the selling time of their clips and the amount of incentive payments they receive are involved. The incentive payment rate, he explains, is based on the difference between the national average price received by producers and the incentive prices announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The incentive level for wool in the marketing year 1963 - April - December -- is 62 cents per pound, while that for mohair has been set at 76 cents per pound, Uvacek says.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service recently released a new publication B-995, "What you Should Know About Plant Diseases," which should prove valuable to farmers, ranchmen and homeowners. Copies are available from the county agents' office.

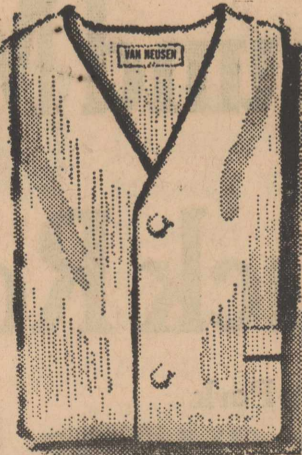

Tornado Season

AUSTIN—"If spring comes, can tornadoes be far behind?"

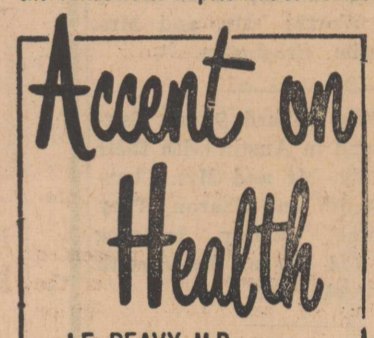
Texans can appreciate the paraphrase of Shelley's poem. In the past two years, the U.S. Weather Bureau tallied 253 tornadoes and 383 other severe storms which resulted in millions of dollars of property damage, 85 deaths and 668 injuries.

With tornado season soon to be in full swing, the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief of the Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a special leaflet containing safety information for coping with these destructive storms. Titled "Tornado Precautions," the leaflet details procedures to follow when tornadoes threaten, whether in open country, in cities and towns, schools, factories or industrial plants. Knowing a few basic rules of what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death.

The leaflet also contains descriptive material on occurrence, frequency and weather conditions most apt to produce tornadoes.

Free copies of the special leaflet can be obtained through local civil defense directors and from the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, Texas Department of Public Safety, in Austin.

AUSTIN -- Water conservation and pollution invariably rank high on any expert list of current problems of modern life.

More than 10 million people now call Texan home. This rapid growth and the trend toward concentrated city living has resulted in a tremendous increase in the volume of waste being released into streams and lakes. Thus, water pollution has become a serious public health problem.

To meet the overall needs of the average Texas community, the municipal water plant must supply 140 gallons per person per day. Approximately 50 gallons of this daily total is used in the home. An equal amount is used by industry for washing and cooling, special processing and air conditioning.

Public needs--fire fighting, street cleaning, recreation and public fountains -- account for 10 gallons of the daily supply. Commercial establishments use an additional 20 gallons for cleaning and service operations. Unhappily, ten gallons are lost through leaks and breaks in underground pipelines.

No matter what use is made of it, it is essential that water be free of harmful bacteria and chemicals.

An adequate water supply is absolutely vital to public health. It makes personal and public cleanliness inexpensive and convenient. Water-borne diseases such as typhoid and cholera have been practically eliminated by hard-working engineers and city water plant operators intent on supplying safe water to the public at the mere turn of a tap.

State and local health department engineers make constant checks on community water supplies, and city water plant operators are rigorously tutored on good operational practices.

Water, from the dawn of time, has been the indispensable element in fire fighting. The better the water supply, the safer the community from damaging fires and the less it costs for fire insurance.

Too, water is the most elemental ingredient of Texas' favorite recreational pursuits--swimming, boating and fishing. They are impossible when the water is polluted by human or industrial wastes.

To be passive or indifferent to clean, adequate water is to be passive and indifferent to life and community growth, for one is part and parcel of the other.

Concluding the meeting volunteers were ask for to serve on a committee to make further study of the conditions and confer with the county commissioners and judge in regard to working out an area study of several counties.

County Agent, James Norman presided for the meeting.

One hundred sixty seven Fisher counties were present.
