Fisher and Howard counties was verified at the laboratory of the Southwest Animal Health Foundation at Mission last week.

In less than 48 hours after each was reported, sterile screwworm flies were dropped within a short radius of the pest locations.

The flies were flown in from the laboratory at Mission and dropped by aerial technicians connected with the foundation.

The case in Fisher county was found on the W. T. Martin ranch, about 10 miles west of Roby. Martin sent specimen to Mission for verification.

In the fight to eradicate the pest, foundation officials emphasize that it is important to keep alert to any outbreaks. When a suspected case is found, the foundation asks that 10 specimens be picked up, placed in a small vial or bottle containing alcohol or water and that a telephone call-Collect be made to the laboratory at Mission. It is open 24 hours a day. Phone number is JUstice 5-1646 (Mission). No telephone call should be made unless a sample is available.

Vials for collecting and holding the specimens in are available at the local county extension office.

Fisher county wheat producers with less than 15-acre allotments, for the first time may elect to participate or not participate in a national wheat program.

Among the provisions of the proposed 1964 wheat program were those covering the less than 15acre allotments. Such a producer, if he desire to vote in the May 21 referendum and be eligible for price support and land diversion payment, must declare his intentions at least seven prior to the referendum.

If the small producer files a written intention to participate in the program, thus becoming eligible to vote in the referendum, he obligates himelf to participate if twothirds or more of the nation's growers vote "yes". (All wheat producers, including the 15-acre man, will under acreage allotment pro-

On the other hand, if the less than 15-acre producer does not desire to participate in the program, he files no intention and will not be eligible to vote in the referendum. He will not receive certificates, price support or land diversion payments. However, such a producer still will be required to and his wheat must find a sale on plant within his acreage allotment the open market.

And finally, the county agent reminded small growers of the county not to fail to file an intention at least seven days before May 21 if they would like to have the privilege of voting in the referendum.

May 19 will be observed as Rural Life Sunday and it also marks the beginning of Soil Stewardship Week. Traditionally, the fifth Sunday after Easter is the day set aside for emphasizing the spiritual values of rural living.







Accidents of this type will be on the increase now -- this is lawnmoving time, you know -- until fall weather brings a welcome respite from the weekly chore.

The State Department of Health does not keep statistics on nonfatal accidents, so the extent of injuries from carelessly handled power mowers unknown. But one Central Texas city reports, conservatively, that 15 to 25 serious accident are reported each year.

Like the man who stopped his car at the curb, intending to say hello to his perspiring neighbor busily mowing the grass. Neighbor wheels up with mower to return the greeting. Man in car -- elbow resting on window -- finds his forearm pinned to bicep with a five inch piece of wire flung at him by the whirling

Power equipment is a tremendous boon to the man who likes to keep his yard neat with a minimum of effort. But it takes constant concentration to do the job safely. Even experience is no substitute for concentration.

A garden club member in a major Texas city used to pride himself on this safe and sane use of power tools that helped him maintain the sharpest yard in the block.

But no more. One afternoon recently, while trimming his driveway with a power trimmer, he reached down to lift a bloom-laden branch of a rose bust out of the

When he withdrew his hand two fingers were missing. "I wasn't alert," he wryly explained.

One of the most frequent mower accidents has this sequence:

A stick or wire or rock jams between cutting bar and blade. The operator attempts to clear the jam without going to the trouble of killing the motor. Results: Badly
