July Draft Call Up

Austin, Texas, 10. -- The state quota for Texas draft boards in July calls for 249 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Tuesday.

The state's July call of 349 compares with a quota of 187 for June and 462 for May. The July call is the state's share of a national quota of 7,000 men, all for the Army.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that local boards will send 1,500 men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in July.

Local board quotas for the July call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The July quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on July 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent under the draft law, who may be younger.

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

Stock Water Project Being Encouraged

Stock water development - the purpose of this conservation practice, according to R. W. Webb, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Rotan, Texas, is to furnish stock water at locations which will bring about desired protection of vegetative cover through proper distribution of grazing or better grassland management.

There are different types of facilities; farm ponds, water wells and water storage facilities constructed from concrete or metal. Farm ponds provide besides livestock water and recreation, an improvement of wildlife habitat.

When considering any type of water facilities for storage the requirements of one peeks supply should be planned for. They may be figured by multiplying the number of livestock times an average of fifteen gallons of water per day. In the case of farm ponds, the requirements should be for a one year supply.

According to Webb, the following cooperators of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District have developed better water supplies this year: James Green, John Cox, Carl Martin, Oliver Loving and Carlton Parker.

Local Boys Going To Salvation Army Camp

Some 800 boys from cities, towns and rural communities all over Texas, including the 247 Service Units now in operation, will take leave of their parents and youthful playmates - some for the first time - to travel by bus, train and private car to the Salvation Army's Camp Hoblitzelle near Dallas. During the summer camping season four camp periods of one week each will be conducted for boys in Texas, with accommodations for 200 boys during each camping period.

Leaving for camp on June 23, will be Eddie Stewart and Jerry Clawson from Rotan.

The boys will be met at the bus station in Midlothian or Waxahachie, towns near Camp Hoblitzelle, and transported to the camp by representatives of the Salvation Army. At camp they will be housed in attractive brick and redwood cabins, and will be furnished meals in the large and airy dining room, prepared by expert chefs to meet the physical needs of healthy, growing youngsters.

Marshall Hill and Mac Weathersbee, camp chairmen for Rotan have been busy for several weeks selecting boys, who otherwise would not have an opportunity to spend a full week in camp. For these boys there will be fun, recreation, companionship, relaxation, crafts, organized sports - all directed by men whose lives have been dedicated to the task of helping others.

Located on a beautiful wooded tract of 340 acres, Camp Hoblitzelle is seven miles south of Midlothian and eight miles west of Waxahachie, less than an hour's automobile drive from Dallas. There are well arranged playgrounds for all boys' sports with modern playground equipment: swimming pool; a lake for boating, water-skiing and fishing; archery, horseback riding and other organized sports under the direction of experienced coaches.

Camp Hoblitzelle has been provided by the Salvation Army for the boys of Texas, through the generous gifts of more than hundred men and women of the state, who provided money for the purchase of the land, buildings and other improvements that have been made. The camp is operated by the Salvation Army for the benefit of boys who will find good food, pleasant experiences, and happiness during their camp period there.

In Rotan, the Salvation Army is supported by a committee headed by R. L. Springer, which sponsors a drive each fall to raise money in this community for the support of the Salvation Army service Unit.

Three more cases of screwworm cases were confirmed in Fisher County last week. These cases were found and reported by J. J. S. Smith, J. A. Murff, and Walter Estes.

As soon as the cases were confirmed the places were marked and Eradication Program also moved into the county last week and started spraying the cattle where the cases were found.

A few boxes used to drop the sterile flies in have been found unopened. If anyone finds one of the boxes unopened they are requested to bring the box to the local extension office so it may be turned over to officials with the eradication program.

The Sterile Screwworm Fly Production Plant near Mission is being modified to accommodate production of more than 180 million flies per week. Modification is expected to be complete by mid-July.

No increase in building space will be required to gain the extra production, Southwest Eradication Program officials announce.

The plant was completed a year ago and was designed to rear an average of 50 million flies per week with a maximum production of 75 million. However, because of experimentation which led to the development of greater efficiency and improvements in fly-rearing techniques, it has been possible to rear more than 100 million flies per week for several months with little change in plant and equipment.

The sterile fly plant is housed mainly in a converted airplane hanger on the grounds of old Moore Air Force Base. It has more than 76,000 square feet of floor space and employs more than 300 people, working in three shifts of 8 hours each, 7 days a week. The plant also contains the largest source of radioactive cobalt kept by USDA. This radioactive material is used to sexually sterilize the man-reared screwworm flies.

The additional sterile flies will be used to combat isolated screwworm outbreaks occurring in the five-state eradication area. They will also be used to strengthen efforts to eliminate overwintering populations of the pest in the southern areas of Texas and New Mexico where winter temperatures are warm enough to permit year-around survival.

Dr. S. C. Gartman, veterinarian-in-charge of USDA operations at Mission, said the additional flies will give the program increased capability to deal quickly and effectively with each screwworm infestation as it is reported.

He emphasized that this move would not take the pressure off the individual livestock producer, who must continue to check for larvae-infested wounds, collect samples and treat wounds, but would make it imperative that every case be reported so that the extra flies will be used effectively.

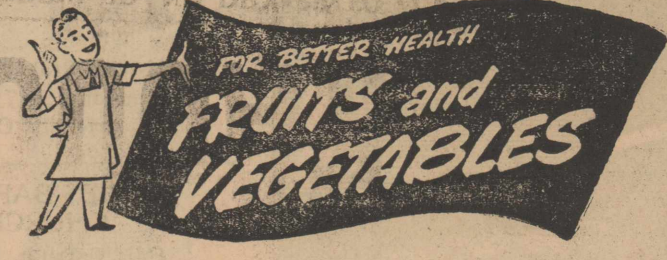

### Jr. College Proposal Information Given

The following information is supplied by the committee on proposed Junior College:

"It is proposed that there be established a public junior college to serve Fisher and Scurry Counties. There is substantial proof that more than seven counties would provide its student enrollment. However, the proposition is made on the basis that which we can, with some degree of accuracy, predict with experienced and professional guidance.

This proposition has not been hastily contrived. A committee has endeavored to evaluate all facets of the proposition to determine as accurately as possible the student potential and make recommendations on that basis, and to be as conservative as possible, yet demand a quality institution and to be factual.

Acting as an unofficial group, committee members met with members of the board of trustees of the Snyder Independent School District for the purpose of determining whether facilities could be made available in which to begin a junior college. The consensus was that facilities could be made available, but it would be for the board of trustees of each institution to determine which and what arrangements could be made.

It is the opinion of the committee that representation of the area should be the goal of the citizenry. Seven members constitute a board of trustees who are nominated an elected in the same manner as public school trustees. However, it should be pointed out that such elections are district-wide.

The committee has proposed a tax rate of 20.3 cents per \$100 tax valuation, based on values of the present county and state rolls. Although the committee recognizes that it doesn't have authority to set a tax rate, it believes this rate would be sufficient to purchase land, construct new buildings and purchase equipment and provide operation and maintenance facilities for a quality junior college. It should be recognized that if existing facilities are used, the committee feels that a lower rate would be sufficient.

Therefore, a maximum tax rate, the most a board could assess without a vote of the people, of 40 cents per \$100 is proposed for the district. This would provide flexibility in the event of fluctuation of valuations.

The committee has been guided in its projection of enrollment of full-time student equivalents by the techniques used by Dr. C. C. Colvert of the University of Texas."

### Guard Against Clothes-Moth Damage

Want to guard against clothes-moth damage? Then you may want to spray DDT on surfaces of closet walls or on clothing and blankets stored in tight trunks about twice a year, suggests Charlotte Tompkins, Extension specialist in housing-home furnishings who has just resigned to accept an Extension position in Alaska.

Rugs and the top of rug pads can be treated with DDT to prevent carpet beetle infestations. Spray bookcases and other areas where silver-fish crawl to eliminate these pests from your home, the specialist suggests.

Malathion sprays can be used in similar manner, except that they should not be sprayed on clothing or blankets. One should spray malathion behind drapers, water pipes, baseboards and other hiding places to get rid of cockroaches.

Chlordane is another useful household insecticide. It should be used as a 2 percent spray or 5 percent dust to rid the house of ants, carpet beetles, flour and meal moths, cockroaches, and silverfish. Applied to the soil as a 1 percent water emulsion, it will prevent subterranean termite damage to your house.

Other useful insecticides are lindane, dieldrin, ronnel, DDVP, Diazinon, and several others. When you purchase a product containing any insecticide, read the label carefully and follow instructions, observing the precautions listed. The USDA does not approve of continuous action vaporizers for use in the home, no matter which insecticide is to be used in the vaporizer, the specialist cautions.

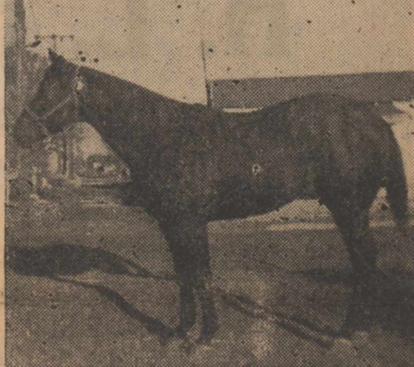
