Kline Brothers of Henrietta, Texas, are the producers and will furnish the bucking stock for the show. Roping calves have been contracted from Roby Roping Club and Snyder Sheriff Posse. J. N. McGinnis will announce the show and Jack Cox is to be the clown and bull fighter.

This is the second year the rodeo has had an approved show and will adhere to the rules and regulations of the American Junior Rodeo Association. Most of the contestants will be members of the AJRA but any person within the age limit can participate in any event in his age group.

Mrs. Glen Webb is the rodeo secretary and will have capable assistants. Entries may be sent to Junior Rodeo Office, Box 607 Rotan, Texas at any time before 6:00 p. m. July 3. Write or call 7001 for entry blanks.

A number of Riding Clubs are expected to participate in a downtown parade at 4:00 p. m. July 4. All merchants, clubs and churches are urged to enter a float or take part in the parade. A trophy will be given to the three best floats or entries in the parade. These trophies and awards will be given after the grand entry Thursday night July 4th. Each float will be recognized and asked to appear in the arena.

Rains Still Delaying Farming Operations

Most farmers in the immediate area are still having trouble getting their crop underway. Some have a good stand of cotton, but most have parts of fields that they have been unable to get up, due to heavy rainfall, and weeds are growing rapidly while it is too wet to work fields.

No hail damage was reported this week during the two hard thunderstorms. Monday night Fred Byerly gauged 2.10 and Tuesday night 1.05. The fall was general over the country in varying amounts.

Byerly's records show 12.72 inches thus far this year against 9.04 last year.

Guar Proving To Be Very Beneficial

With the planting season just at hand as the push for increased guar bean production continues in the drive for expanded acreage in more widespread areas, new interest is being evidenced, based on planting intent.

Guar, while no miracle crop, offers farmers double-barreled benefits with its cash crop returns from bean production along with substantial soil-conditioning benefits for increased yields of cotton or grain that follow in rotation on guar-land. Such rotations in many areas are the answer to dry-land farming success. "Guar's soil conditioning qualities and it's high resistance to drought are only two of several reasons for renewed interest in the crop," explains Henry Stonham, Soil Conservationist at Rotan.

"Guar is also relatively easy to plant and harvest, and it fills a long-felt need for an annual legume that will readily fit into a cotton-grain rotation," he added. "More and more farmers are turning to the sturdy plant to breathe new life into land wearied of successive crops of cotton."

"It seems to be one of our best answers to the fertility problem and the crusting problem of the dry-land farmer," he concluded. "It's roots dig deep for moisture, and they keep soils loose and pliable to absorb and hold what little rainfall that might come."

"You can't make a complete failure with guar," he insists. "Even if it doesn't make you a seed crop, you get your planting costs back in soil improvment. That's an important item to any farmer, especially the dry-land operator."

New Postal System Effective July 1st

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 79546. Postmaster Robert Phillips announced today.

"Everyone in Rotan, Texas will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail."

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Phillips stressed the importance of all citizens of Rotan learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing." "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

Example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

John Doe
Box 900
Rotan, Texas, 79546

The new ZIP Code plan, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination, and each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the possibility of human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, so to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

When ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

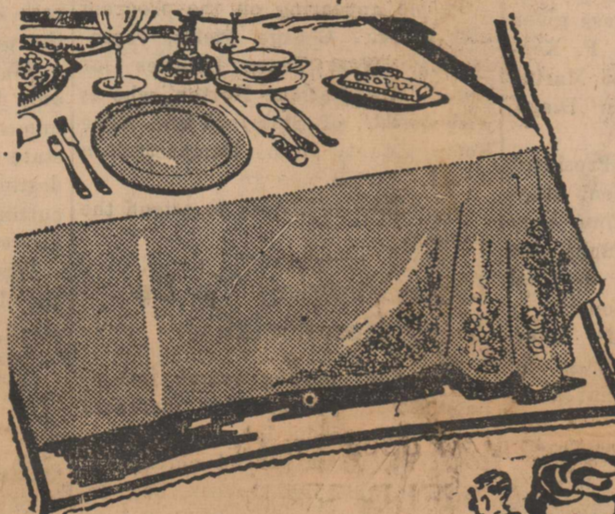

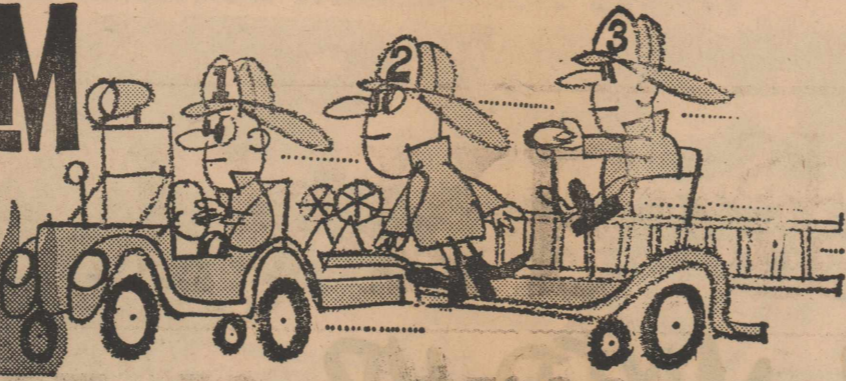

Early season cotton insects have been found in varying numbers in the county.

Thrip damage has run heavy in some fields. Thrips injure young cotton by causing the plants to be malformed and to shed the small squares. This results in delayed fruiting as well as loss of fruit. Sometimes thrip damage is mistaken for wind damage.

Adult thrips are minute, slender, yellowish insects, averaging about 1 1/5th inch in length. Their mouthparts are coneshaped and adapted for rasping and sucking. The adults usually have two pairs of narrow wings fringed with long hairs, which assist in flight.

Thrips appear on growing plants throughout the year in most areas of the State. Eggs are inserted into the plant tissue by the female. The young hatch in about 6 days. Egg-to-adult development requires about 16 days. The average life span is about 35 days.

Light to medium infestations of fleahoppers have been found. The adults and nymphs suck sap from the tender portions of the plant including the small squares. The injury may be characterized by excessive blasting and shedding of small squares and a reduction in the number of fruiting branches.

Adult female fleahoppers insert their eggs through the bark of various host plants including cotton. The eggs hatch in about 8 days. The egg-to-adult stage requires 20 to 24 days depending on weather conditions.

Treatment for thrips should be made when they are found.

Treatment for fleahoppers should be made when infestation counts warrants. Begin treatments when 15 to 35 fleahoppers (nymphs and adults) are found per 100 terminals.

L-218. Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects lists recommended insecticides and dosages. This guide and B-933, Cotton Insects is available at the local extension office.

A few overwintered boll weevils have been found in early cotton.

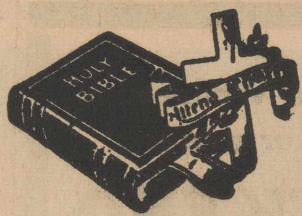
A new wrinkle has been added in the battle to eradicate screwworms from the Southwest. Screwworm flies reared and sexually sterilized in a plant near Mission are now fed prior to being released from airplanes over large portions of the five-state eradication area.

Entomologists have found that feeding gives the flies a better chance for survival after being released and results in larger numbers of vigorous flies available for the program.

A small paper cup containing a cotton ball and corn syrup is placed inside each carton at the same time the box is filled with sterilized pupae. After the flies have emerged, they can feed until they are released.

Experts list these advantages to fly-feeding:

(1) More flies are alive at re-

lease time, since cartons can be held an extra day giving more time to emerge.

(2) Flies live longer after release and are better able to find shelter and food in nature.

(3) Fewer flies are lost during periods when unfavorable weather does not permit aerial release and flies may have to be held for several days.

(4) Also during cold weather, it is possible to hold the flies until they are ready to mate, while otherwise many probably would not survive that long in nature.

Eradication officials are so pleased with the results of fly-feeding tests they are exploring means to completely mechanize the operation. They feel the initial expense could be paid off within a few months through savings in man-hours and reduced loss of sterile flies.

2. The Bible's Ideal Is A World At Peace.

Some passages of scripture may seem to advocate wars but this should be noted, that this was an expression of God's judgment against Godless nations.) 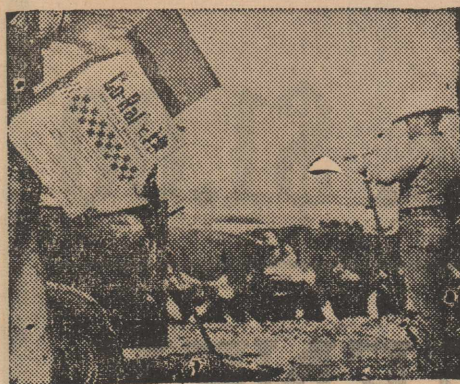

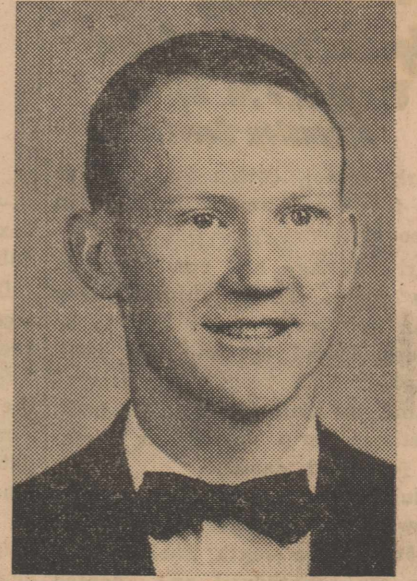

New Development For Cotton Farmers

An important new development will be offered this year to all cotton farmers by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, according to B. B. Manly, Jr., chairman of the local Cotton Classing Office.

This will be in the form of a "mike" service to give farmers another test of the quality of their cotton.

"The Cotton Trade has made the micronaire such an integral part of their business that they also buy according to the 'mike'. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service is furnishing this service to provide the farmer with an additional aid in marketing his cotton," says Manly.

Applications have been mailed to all gins in the Abilene and Munday area so ginners can apply for the service. "Deadline for applying is July 1, 1963, so the Office will know about how many samples to prepare for," says Manly.

Ginners must apply for the service and pay the 8 cents per bale fee charged for the service. All cotton is eligible for the "mike" service, but it must be on an all-or-none basis from any one gin as the local Office cannot separate those who do not desire it.

Last year, 52 gins in this area applied for this service which came into effect after the harvest began. The Abilene Classing Office miked \$9,243 samples and Munday, \$1,383 under this program last year.

"If we have the cotton this year, it seems certain that the number of bales miked will increase considerably," says Manly.

A RESOLUTION CALLING AN ELECTION ON ASSUMPTION OF INDEBTEDNESS IN TERRITORY ADDED TO ROTAN MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF FISHER:

WHEREAS, Rotan Municipal Water Authority (herein called the "Authority") was created under Article 16, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas by Chapter 244, Acts of the 57th Legislature, Regular Session; and

WHEREAS, by virtue of an Act of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, amending said Chapter 244, the following described territory was added to the Authority, to-wit:

"BEGINNING at a point in the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority. Said point of beginning being in the east line of Section 49 and the west line of Section 46 and being equal distance from the north and south lines of said Sections 49 and 46, all sections referred to herein being located in Block 2, H&TC RR Co., Fisher County, Texas;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 49, 50, 53, 54, 57 and 58 to the mid-point of the west line of Section 58;

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the common line between Sections 58 and 61 to the mid-point of the east line of Section 61, being equal distance from the northeast corner and the southeast corner of said section 61;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south line and crossing Section 61 and continuing southwesterly to a point in the center of Section 62. Said point being equal distance from the north, south, east and west lines of said Section 62;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 62 equal distance from the east and west lines of said Section 62 to a point in the south line of said Section 62 and the north line of Section 63. Said point being equal distance from the southeast corner and the southwest corner of said Section 62;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the south line of Section 62 to the southwest corner of said Section 62, the northwest corner of Section 63, the southeast corner of Section 65 and the northeast corner of Section 64;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the east line of said Section 64 and the west line of said Section 63 to a point in the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority. Said point being equal distance from the northeast corner and the southeast corner of said Section 64;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 64 and 67 to a point in the west line of said Section 67. Said point being equal distance between the southwest and northwest corners of said Section 67;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the west line of Section 67 passing the northwest corner of said Section 67 and continuing in a northwesterly direction along the west line of Section 66 to a point in the west line of said Section 66 equal distance from the northwest and southwest corners of said Section 66;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 66 to a point in the center of said Section 66 equal distance from the east and west lines and the north and south lines;

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 66 to a point in the north line of said Section 66. Said point being equal distance from the northwest and northeast corners of said Section 66;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the north line of Section 66 to the northeast corner of said Section 66 and the southwest corner of Section 102.

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the west line of Section 102 to a point in the west line of said Section 102 equal distance from the northwest and southwest corners of said Section 102;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 102, 103 and 104 to the mid-point of the east line of said Section 104;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the common line be-

tween Sections 104 and 105 to the mid-point of the west line of said Section 105, being equal distance from the northwest corner and the southwest corner of said Section 105;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 105, 106, 107, 108, 109 and 110 to a point in the east line of said Section 110 and the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority. Said point being equal distance from the northeast and southeast corners of said Section 110; and

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority and the east line of Section 110 passing the Southeast corner of said Section 110 and the northeast corner of Section 49 and continuing along the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority and the east line of said Section 49 to the point and place of beginning." said described land being herein after referred to as the "Added Territory"; and

WHEREAS, said Act of the 58th Legislature provides that this Board of Directors shall call an election to be held within the Added Territory on the proposition of whether the Added Territory shall assume its part of the outstanding bonds of the Authority and whether this Board of Directors shall levy an ad valorem tax on all taxable property within the Authority, including the Added Territory, for the payment of the principal of and interest upon said outstanding bonds and

WHEREAS, the Authority has heretofore authorized and issued its bonds designated "Rotan Municipal Water Authority Water Supply Bonds, Series 1962," dated September 10, 1962, numbered 1 through 180, issued in the denomination of \$5000.00 each, aggregating \$900,000, becoming due and payable serially in varying amounts on July 10 in each of the years 1963 through 1989, and bearing interest at the rates of 4 percent and 3-3/4 percent per annum;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF ROTAN MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election shall be held in the territory described above and referred to as the "Added Territory" on the 13 day of July, 1963, at which the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the Added Territory described in the resolution calling this election assume its part of the outstanding bonds of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority and shall the Board of Directors of said Authority be authorized to levy an ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said Authority, including the Added Territory, for the payment of the principal of and interest on said outstanding bonds."

2. That the ballots for submission of the proposition stated in Section 1 hereof shall be in the usual statutory form and shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR ASSUMPTION OF INDEBTEDNESS"

"AGAINST ASSUMPTION OF INDEBTEDNESS"

3. That said election shall be held at L. D. McGrew residence, which is within the Added Territory, that L. D. McGrew is hereby appointed the Presiding Judge for said election and that he shall appoint one Assistant Judge and at least two Clerks to assist in holding said election.

4. That a copy of this resolution shall constitute sufficient notice of said election and that such notice shall be given by publishing a substantial copy hereof for two consecutive weeks in the "Rotan Advance", a newspaper published in Fisher County, Texas, and having general circulation in the Added Territory, the first publication to be at least 21 days prior to the date fixed for said election.

5. That only qualified voters who reside in the Added Territory who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

6. After said election has been held, the returns thereof shall be made to this Board of Directors for canvassing.
