## Hottopping Work To Start Monday

Final stages of the current paving program have been delayed by rains during the past two weeks.

## Earl Martin Studying In Argentina

Earl Martin, instructor of Spanish in Rotan School left Sunday night of last week for eight weeks study in the University Tecuman, in Argentina.

Mr. Martin was chosen by the Federal government in conjunction with Texas Tech, for the National Defense Education Act Scholarship, compiled from Secondary Spanish teachers from over the entire nation, 48 were chosen—three from Texas including Mr. Martin. Last summer he was awarded a Spanish Scholarship and studied at Texas Tech. This years study will be applied toward work on his Masters degree.

## Mrs. Martin Holding Speech Classes

Mrs. Earl Martin is announcing her second year of summer speech classes to be held July 1-August 2. Group classes will be held twice weekly for two hour sessions with pupils in grades 1-6 meeting mornings and those from seventh grade through college age meeting afternoons.

All students will receive training in the basic speech arts. The younger group will study expression in oral reading, and storytelling and will be given an introduction to children's poetry and creative dramatics. Those in Junior High will be given special training in Jr. High Declamation.

The older group will do special work in voice and diction and will study a special unit in dramatics. Emphasis in the older group will be on training for participation in the Interscholastic League speaking events held each spring in the public school. These include extemp speaking, persuasive speaking, prose reading and poetry reading.

Due to the recent increase in screwworm infestations in counties in this area, outside of the fly release zone or over-wintering area, immediate action is required to deal with this situation.

All livestock producers are invited to attend an important meeting Friday afternoon, June 28, at 2 p. m. in the county courthouse in Abilene, to discuss what needs to be done.

All of you farm operators are reminded of your eligibility for a refund of the 4-cents per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline purchased between July 1, 1962, and June 30, 1963.

The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Do not include gasoline used (1) on the highway; (2) in processing, packaging, freezing or canning operations; (3) for personal or other nonfarming purposes; or (4) on the farm of another person even though used for farming purposes (for example - a custom operator).

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate or excessive claims. Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuels.

Form 2240 is available at the local extension service office in the courthouse.

During the month of June, many activities have been honoring the Texas and National dairy industry. The dairy industry deserves such honors because it provides:

1. Nature's most perfect food in a wide variety;
2. One of the most sanitary food products that can be purchased;
3. More than \$150 million to Texas dairymen and \$5 billion to all dairymen in the United States;
4. Approximately \$300 million to this state's economy and over \$10 billion to the national economy;
5. Employment for scores of people who furnish the goods and services used by dairymen and segments of the dairy processing industry.

Nutritionists have set up definite standards on the amount of milk that should be consumed in a balanced diet. For children 12 years of age and under, the standard is one and one-half to two pints daily; for teenagers, some recommend a quart or more per day. For adults, the recommended standard is one pint or more daily. The weighted daily average minimum milk requirements for people of different ages, based on the 1960 population of the United States, is 1.61 pints daily. In 1961, per capita consumption of milk in the United States averaged .71 of a pint daily.

Even when the estimated milk equivalent used in evaporated milk, cheese and ice cream was added to fluid milk consumption, the total estimated consumption of milk was substantially below that recommended by nutritionists. Dairy month is a good time to compare our daily consumption with nutritional needs.

This handy leaflet, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," classifies insects in categories relating to type damage and concise control measures is given for each. ## Legislation Needed By Cotton Industry

Legislation before Congress is aimed at relief for the hard-pressed cotton industry.

Since 1960, cotton has lost almost a million and a half bales in its domestic market. Exports have fallen from a five-year average of six million bales annually to around 4.5 million bales.

With markets dropping off, surpluses are mounting and the threat of a drastic acreage cut looms. This cutback would affect not only the grower whose sound operation depends on sufficient acres for efficient use of his resources but also millions of other people in the cotton industry and in businesses supplying goods and services to the industry.

Cotton's big problem is that it's being priced out of its markets. It needs emergency assistance to enable it to become competitive.

The cotton industry, however, can't expect government subsidies permanently nor is it asking this. It's asking for alleviation of the price situation, coupled with a massive research effort so farmers can lower costs quickly and thereby meet price competition on their own.

Cotton consumption in the Free World is at a level of more than 33 million bales annually and is rising. If U. S. cotton can become competitive, its share of the increase can average more than 500,000 bales annually.

The U. S. cotton industry is a vital one and deserves a fair chance to become competitive.

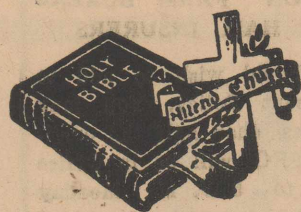

## Accent on Health

Apparently the rule concerning sinus trouble is this: if you're human you're susceptible. Thus, if you suffer from a sinus condition either chronically or occasionally, you are, in excellent company.

A nasal sinus is a lined cavity in the face bone which opens into the nose. There are two important ones on each side of the face: one in each cheek bone, and one over each eye.

Cheekbone sinuses are triangle-shaped, large enough to hold half an ounce of fluid. Oversized ones can hold up to a full ounce. Eyebrow sinuses are smaller, the average having a fluid capacity of one-fifth ounce.

Sinuses are lined with mucous membrane, a continuation of the membrane lining the nasal cavity. When a sinus lining becomes inflamed enough to interfere with drainage, there is trouble ahead.

There are all sorts of speculation as to what good purpose sinuses serve. Some specialist believe they warm and moisten air as it is inhaled. Other believe that sinuses, like the appendix, are evolutionary remnants which are sometimes more harmful than useful.

Sinus sufferers subscribe unani-

mously to this latter theory. But the truth probably is that sinus cavities serve as resonating chambers for the voice. Whether a person has a high or low pitched voice, according to this reasoning, is dependent on the size of his sinuses.

There are as many different causes of sinus inflammation as there are people suffering from it. Infection-producing agents such as viruses, and irritants such as pollens and dust are most often the cause. But facial injuries, infected teeth, and other conditions can also bring on flare-ups.

What to do about it? Make sinuses drain, which is a little like telling the wind to stop blowing. Still, it can be done if the cause of the inflammation is removed.

Temporary relief can sometimes be obtained with dilating drugs or inhalers, but the basic cause should be determined and treated by a physician.

COUNTY OF FISHER:

WHEREAS, Rotan Municipal Water Authority (herein called the "Authority") was created under Article 16, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas by Chapter 244, Acts of the 57th Legislature, Regular Session; and

WHEREAS, by virtue of an Act of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, amending said Chapter 244, the following described territory was added to the Authority, to-wit:

"BEGINNING at a point in the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority Said point of beginning being in the east line of Section 49 and the west line of Section 46 and being equal distance from the north and south lines of said Sections 49 and 46, all sections referred to herein being located in Block 2, H&TC RR Co., Fisher County, Texas;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 49, 50, 53, 54, 57 and 58 to the mid-point of the west line of Section 58;

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the common line between Sections 58 and 61 to the mid-point of the east line of Section 61, being equal distance from the northeast corner and the southeast corner of said section 61;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south line and crossing Section 61 and continuing southwesterly to a point in the center of Section 62. Said point being equal distance from the north, south, east and west lines of said Section 62;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 62 equal distance from the east and west lines of said Section 62 to a point in the south line of said Section 62 and the north line of Section 63. Said point being equal distance from the southeast corner and the southwest corner of said Section 62;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the south line of Section 62 to the southwest corner of said Section 62, the northwest corner of Section 63, the southeast corner of Section 65 and the northeast corner of Section 64;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the east line of said Section 64 and the west line of said Section 63 to a point in the

present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority. Said point being equal distance from the northeast corner and the southeast corner of said Section 64;

THENCE, in a southwesterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 64 and 67 to a point in the west line of said Section 67. Said point being equal distance between the southwest and northwest corners of said Section 67;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the west line of Section 67 passing the northwest corner of said Section 67 and continuing in a northwesterly direction along the west line of Section 66 to a point in the west line of said Section 66 equal distance from the northwest and southwest corners of said Section 66;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 66 to a point in the center of said Section 66 equal distance from the east and west lines and the north and south lines;

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the mid-section line of Section 66 to a point in the north line of said Section 66. Said point being equal distance from the northwest and northeast corners of said Section 66;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the north line of Section 66 to the northeast corner of said Section 102.

THENCE, in a northwesterly direction along the west line of Section 102 to a point in the west line of said Section 102 equal distance from the northwest and southwest corners of said Section 102;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 102, 103 and 104 to the mid-point of the east line of said Section 104;

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the common line between Sections 104 and 105 to the mid-point of the west line of said Section 105, being equal distance from the northwest corner and the southwest corner of said Section 105;

THENCE, in a northeasterly direction along the mid-section line equal distance from the north and south lines and crossing Sections 105, 106, 107, 108, 109 and 110 to a point in the east line of said Section 110 and the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority. Said point being equal distance from the northeast and southeast corners of said Section 110; and

THENCE, in a southeasterly direction along the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority and the east line of Section 110 passing the Southeast corner of said Section 110 and the northeast corner of Section 49 and continuing along the present boundary line of the Rotan Municipal Water Authority and the east line of said Section 49 to the point and place of beginning."

said described land being herein after referred to as the "Added Territory"; and

WHEREAS, said Act of the 58th Legislature provides that this Board of Directors shall call an election to be held within the Added Terri-

tory on the proposition of whether the Added Territory shall assume its part of the outstanding bonds of the Authority and whether this Board of Directors shall levy an ad valorem tax on all taxable property within the Authority, including the Added Territory, for the payment of the principal of and interest upon said outstanding bonds and

WHEREAS, the Authority has heretofore authorized and issued its bonds designated "Rotan Municipal Water Authority Water Supply Bonds, Series 1962," dated September 10, 1962, numbered 1 through 180, issued in the denomination of \$5000.00 each, aggregating \$900,000, becoming due and payable serially in varying amounts on July 10 in each of the years 1963 through 1989, and bearing interest at the rates of 4 percent and 3-3-4 per cent per annum;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF ROTAN MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election shall be held in the territory described above and referred to as the "Added Territory" on the 13 day of July, 1963, at which the following proposition shall be submitted:

3. That said election shall be held at L. D. McGrew residence, which is within the Added Territory, that L. D. McGrew is hereby appointed the Presiding Judge for said election and that he shall appoint one Assistant Judge and at least two Clerks to assist in holding said election.

4. That a copy of this resolution shall constitute sufficient notice of said election and that such notice shall be given by publishing a substantial copy hereof for two consecutive weeks in the "Rotan Advance", a newspaper published in Fisher County, Texas, and having general circulation in the Added Territory, the first publication to be at least 21 days prior to the date fixed for said election.

5. That only qualified voters who reside in the Added Territory who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

6. After said election has been held, the returns thereof shall be made to this Board of Directors for canvassing.

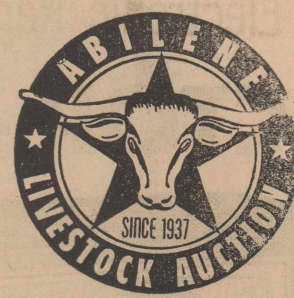
