Austin -- Ask the first 100 people you meet to name their favorite sport and chances are good that at least 70 will say swimming. Even golf and fishing have taken a back seat as sport choices.

There are some great days ahead for Texas' swimming enthusiasts. They have 13,000 pools to choose from, and the season is right at hand.

And things stand to break even better for the wet set in days to come. According to the National Swimming Pool Institute, Texas will have some 70,000 pools in 1970. All this is good, because swimming lends itself to social adjustment. It teaches coordination and builds stamina. A child who overcomes fear of water has learned courage.

But play for the plungers means work for someone else -- namely State Health Department engineers and local health department sanitarians who sponsor and conduct training courses for pool managers and personnel from border to border.

"Short schools" for pool operators are concentrated during April, May and June, the intention being to enroll as many operators as possible before hot weather and overflow crowds make it hard for them to get away from their work.

Co-sponsored by the Texas Beach and Pool Association, courses consist of eight hours of intense technical and practical instruction. It covers such things as how to disinfect the water, and how to control water acidity -- the factor, incidentally, which causes swimmers' eyes to burn, rather than chlorine as is popularly supposed.

The course also cover pool safety, bathhouse sanitation, and the various filtering systems used in modern pools.

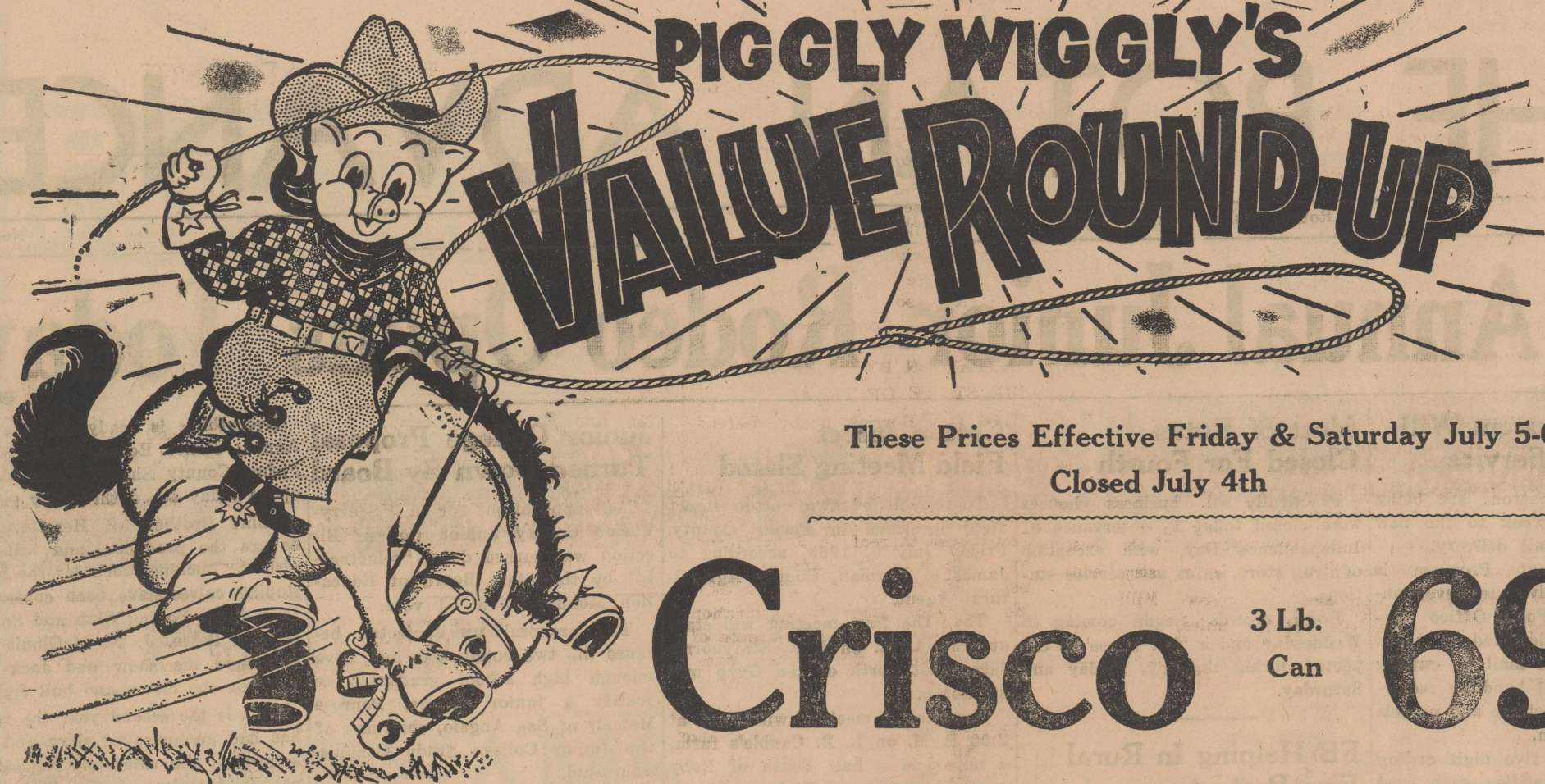
How important are swimming pools as links in the chain of disease transmission? Eye, ear, nose, throat, skin and intestinal infections are among the most common conditions spread in swimming pools.

Most prevalent, however, is ringworm of the feet -- commonly called "athlete's foot." It is not contracted in pool water, but by walking on wet walks and floors on which spores flourish.

In well-operated pools there is little chance of contracting any of these conditions. That's the reason the State Health Department puts such emphasis on swimming pool sanitation.

Swimmers, too, have a responsibility toward pool cleanliness. Like most public places, a pool quickly assumes the character of its least desirable patron.

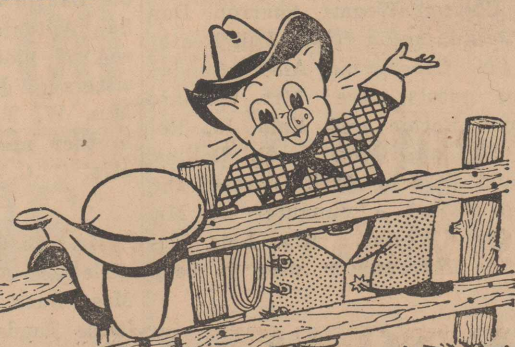

We have received word from Dr. R. M. Zirkle, Veterinarian with the Animal Disease Eradication Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, stating that Fisher is due for brucellosis re-certification and tuberculosis re-accreditation within the next year. "We plan to be testing in Fisher County as soon as possible in an effort to complete the work before the due date May 22, 1964."

All herds which had reactors when the testing was done in 1961 will have to be re-tested. A percentage of the other herds will also have to be re-tested.

According to information we have now a practicing veterinarian in the county and Loren Little, who is working with the Animal Health Commission will work together on the re-testing.

Six fertilizer dealers and USDA Agency personnel from Fisher County attended a three session short course on the use of fertilizer, in Anson June 20, 27, and July 1.

The Short Course was designed for fertilizer dealers, lending agency personnel, USDA and other interested persons, so that they might have a better understanding of the use of fertilizers, when discussing this subject with people in their own county.

The Clinic covered: Nitrogen-Behavior of Nitrogen in Soil; Nitrogen and Organic Matter; Ammonium and Nitrate Nitrogen; Time and Method of Application, Function in Plants; Deficiency Symptoms, Plant Requirements; Sources, and METHOD OF Manufacturing.

Phosphorus- Function in Plants; Plant Requirements; Phosphorus Uptake; Behaviour of Phosphorus in Soil; Time and Method of Application, Sources; and Manufacturing.

Potassium - Function in Plants; Behavior in Soils; History and Manufacture of Potassium Fertilizer; and Need for Minor Elements.

Soil Testing- A tool for Profit; How Recommendations are Made; and Dealer Sampling Programs. Fertilizer Use in a Sound Soil Management Program.

The Clinic was conducted by John Box, James Valentine, Dill Gunter and Dr. W. F. Bennett, Extension Service specialist; Walter O'Neal, Dr. F. L. Fisher, E. K. Chandler and Sherman Clark of the Plant Food Society.

Those attending from Fisher County were: Foy Mitchell, Frank Mitchell, John Gray, Neil Carter, N. I. Templer, and the county agent.

All irrigation waters contain salts and even water with low levels of certain salts can be harmful, says W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Each time water is applied to a crop, salt is applied and if it is allowed to accumulate, reduction will be affected, points out Bennett. Not only is the total content of the water important but the types of salts present can also lower the quality of irrigation water.

For example, calcium and magnesium salts are not as harmful as sodium salts. Even if the content of sodium salts in water is small, it can be very harmful.

Therefore, Bennett recommends that irrigation water be tested for total salts as well as for chemical composition. Such knowledge can aid the farmer in using irrigation water to its best advantage by determining what water management practices may be needed, he says.

Tests are available through Texas A&M College to determine water quality. They may be submitted with Form D-617 which can be obtained from the county extension office.

SIMPLICITY IN PRAYER

It is often said that religion should effect a transformation in the lives of men. This means of course that religion provides the motives through which sinful actions are avoided and good actions, like prayer and deeds of charity are performed. But it should mean more than that. Religion provides the means whereby all indifferent actions are transformed into expressions of love of God and means of merit for the soul. This is done by use of good intentions--often neglected by so many people.

God wants not only the direct service and homage of His people, as is given in keeping Holy the Lord's Day and in saying an occasional prayer. God wants everything man does to be directed to Him. St. Paul makes this clear when he says "Whether you eat or drink or whatever else you do, DO ALL TO THE GLORY OF GOD."

It is almost impossible for an ordinary person to be thinking of God constantly and consciously directing to Him "all whatsoever he does." God does not expect that. But He does ask us that at different intervals a conscious intention be made by which every thought, word and deed be directed to Him.

There are certain opportune times for making that intention, and that intention is the most simple prayer any man can offer. The most obvious time is when one awakens in the morning, or before beginning one's daily activities, before beginning work, before recreation; at a time of suffering or difficulty is a most opportune time.

The expressions by which indifferent actions are transferred to prayer or are transformed into prayer are very simple. A short morning prayer or daily repeated prayer can be "All for Thee, O Lord" or "O God, I give You all

my thoughts, words, and deeds of this day as expressions of my love for Thee." "May all my actions of this day be to the Glory of God" or "All for Thee, O Lord". These are only a few samples of simplicity of prayer.

The reward of using the good intention is beyond conception because it covers the whole day's actions in one's life with the vesture of prayer. It obtains the special Providence and protection of God during the day. It makes avoidance of sin easier because it keeps the soul mindful of the positive actions that can be pleasing to God. It takes away the feeling of futility that so many people experience because they have so little time for prayer. It makes holiness out of the ordinary "stuff" of the ordinary man's life--and GOD HIMSELF ASKS for no more.
