Both of the cotton insect meetings held last Friday were well attended. The first meeting held that morning on J. R. Strayhorn's farm at Rotan was attended by 27 farmers and agricultural workers. The afternoon meeting, hed on L. B. Cauble's farm South of Roby, had an attendance of 30.

Fleahoppers and bollworms were found to be causing most of the damage. A large number of benefical insects were also found.

Don Rummel, Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who helped with conductting the meetings stressed the importance of using and following the information in Leaflet 218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects." Another bullentin used at the meeting was B-933, "Cotton Insects", which lists all major cotton insects, discription, life history, and nature of injuny. The bulletin also lists major beneficial insects.

All cotton producers are urged to pick up these bulletins at the local extension office.

Approximately 100 livestockmen, coutny agricultural agents, county screwworm eradication committee chairmen, vocational agriculture teachers, livestock inspectors and others gathered at Abilene on Friday, June 28, to discuss the screwworm situation in North West and North Central Texas. Representatives from 95 counties had been in-

Screwworm eradication officials briefed the group on the status of the program and outlined some of the things that can be expected during the next months. Officials strongly recommended that producers spray their livestock with Coral or Korlan.

Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission explained how screwworm larvae hatching from eggs laid on sprayed livestock are killed by the residual effects of the spray, even two to three weeks after application. Garrele said program policy continues to be to spray at program expense, all animals in herds where a confirmed screwworm is deected, as well as those herds and flocks immediately adjacent infested livestock. He stated that spray rigs and personnel from areas of South Texas where few or no screwworms were being detected would be brought into the northern areas of the state to assist in program spraying.

The value of livestock spraying was boosted by a testiminal from Ray Forman, Wise County Screwworm Eradication Program Chairman, who said Wise county producers were already feeling the effects of a county-wide spray pragram initiated there several weeks ago. Forman noted that 21 cases had been detected in the county within a 6-weeks period, but no cases have been reported since the spray procedure was started.

Participants in the meeting asked numerous questions concerning the operation of the program, fly release procedure, overwintering, etc. Program officials present includ-

ed: Garrett, Dr. S. C. Gartmen, USDA veterinarian-in-charge of the program; Dr. William C. Burnett, assistant veterinarian-in-charge of field operations; Marvin J. Bridges, SWAHRF executive director, and T. J. Richards of Paducah, SWAH-RF secretary and trustee.





History Of Medicine



BENJAMIN RUSH - Patriot, signer of the Declaration of Independence, leader in the nation's first medical school, Dr. Benjamin Rush (1745-1813) came to be called the first great physician in the United States. In this original oil painting from Parke, Davis & Company's History of Medicine series, an exhausted Rush is shown with a patient during the 1793 yellow fever epidemic in Philadelphia, capital of the new United States of America. Residents who could, fled; those United States of America. Residents who could, fled; those who could not were decimated by disease. Though hundreds died daily, Rush stayed, cared for patients, personally survived two attacks of fever. Educated at the College of New Jersey (now Princeton), he also studied in Europe, returning in 1769 to enter practice and to join the faculty at the College of Philadelphia, now the University of Pennsylvania. During 43 years (1769-1812), more than 3,000 students were registered in his classes. As a teacher he exerted more influence tered in his classes. As a teacher he exerted more influence on the medical profession during the quarter century following the Revolution than any other person.

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
