Former Resident Dies In Fort Worth

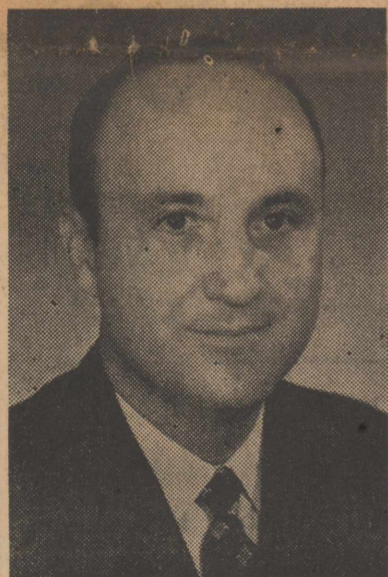

H. L. Davis 'Wagon Boss' For Boys Ranch

H. L. Davis, has been named a "wagon boss" for the fourth annual West Texas Boys Ranch Roundup, July 22 to August 3.

This means he is to be busy from now through the Roundup, persuading local stockmen to donate livestock which can be sold for the ranch.

A number of West Texas auction and commission firms are donating their sales services for the Ranch's benefit. A stockman may take donated animals to any one of these firms. There it will be sold without sale fee and all proceeds remitted to the famous boys home near Tankersley.

The Ranch currently has 80 boys in its care, 64 of them in actual residence on the Ranch and 16 placed in foster homes and work homes under its supervision. The Ranch has become famous in this area as a home for "hard-luck" boys, most of them from broken homes, or no homes at all.

The Ranch is financed entirely by free-will offerings of West Texans. It receives no tax support.

J. R. Canning of Eden and Harvey Hargrove of San Angelo and Paint Rock are chairmen of the drive this year. The Roundup is being concentrated into a two-week period.

The Roundup has furnished as much as 1-6 of the Ranch's total annual budget. This means the stockmen's donations of unwanted animals have supported more than 60 boys for two months.

Added Water Dist. Election Barely Carries

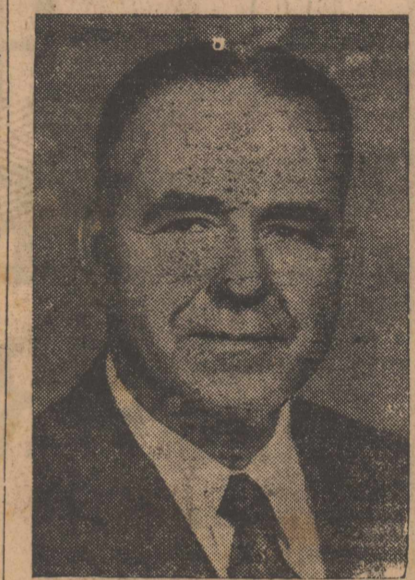

Screwworm eradication program officials report that producers from 104 Texas counties discovered 439 screwworm infestations during the month of June. This is less than six percent of the 8300 cases that were reported during the same month last year.

Although the number of cases are extremely low for this time of year, eradication workers warn, livestockmen cannot afford to become complacent. Infestations have been reported from widely-scattered areas of the state; as a result of trying to provide special sterile fly treatment for each reported case, production and release capabilities are being strained to the limit.

To prevent further stress, officials recommend producers spray their livestock with Co-ral or Korlan every two or three weeks. These materials, which kill newly-hatched screwworm larvae, also give protection against other livestock insects such as horn flies, gnats, lice and ticks, officials stated.

Overhauling a tractor's governor may save farmers as much as \$48 a year, says Henry O'Neal extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M College.

In a study of 50 farm tractors at Kansas State University, it was found that 40 of these tractors had faulty governors and did not maintain proper engine speeds. Of the 40, only 10 could be corrected by governor adjustment while the other 30 required a complete overhaul of the governor. The 10 tractors with governors that could be corrected showed an overhaul maximum horsepower increase of 9.1 percent and a fuel consumption decrease of 4.8 percent after the adjustments were made.

Thus, O'Neal says, farmers who spend \$1,000 annually for tractor fuel can reduce their fuel expense \$48 a year on this one service item alone if their power unit is operated with a faulty governor.

Proper engine speeds are essential if maximum tractor efficiency is to be obtained.

Speeds higher than those recommended by the manufacturer can lead to overheating and tractor breakdown. Speeds less than recommended cause loss of horsepower and poor performance.

A check of the engine's speed while it is not under load is not enough, O'Neal states. Engines must be checked when under a full load as well as without a load to determine the governor response. He recommends having a qualified mechanic check the tractor under with a dynamometer.

One farm worker in the U. S. today supplies food, fiber and other products for 27 people as compared to only eight in 1920. Good Report Given On Social Security

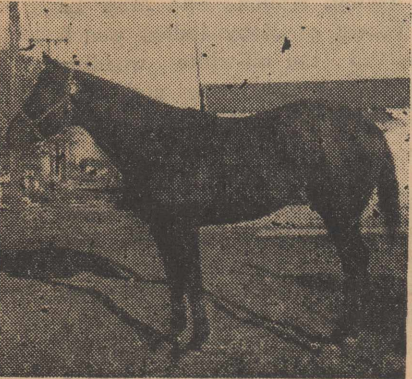
Don Austin, the Social Security representative that visits Rotan every two weeks reports that local residents continued to check up on their social security rights and responsibilities during the first six months of 1963.

Boys Ranch Roundup Is July 22 to August 3

Fourth annual West Texas Boys Ranch Roundup is to be concentrated into a two-week period July 22 to August 3.

This biggest fund-raising campaign of the year for the famous boys' haven near Tankersley is slanted toward livestock and farm products.

All over West Texas, livestock auction and commission firms are offering to sell without fee any livestock donated by stockmen and turn all proceeds directly to Boys Ranch. During the two-week period, donors may carry livestock to any one of the participating firms and be confident the money will go to the Ranch.

J. R. Canning, Eden ranchman, is chairman of the drive. Harvey Hartgrove, San Angelo and Paint Rock ranchman, is co-chairman.

They are currently lining up "wagon bosses" all over West Texas to help see that livestock gets in.

Last year's drive was stretched over most of the summer. Volunteer workers this year thought it would be better to concentrate it into a shorter period.

"We'll take any gift at any time," said Canning. "But this is the time to get the livestock in."

With most of West Texas showing good grass now, Canning predicted that ranchmen will be inclined to give more livestock.

Boys Ranch is set up to care for 64 boys in residence. It has been forced to move into placement away from the Ranch by way of foster homes and work homes because of large numbers of boys. Sixteen of these currently are under Boys Ranch supervision, meaning the Ranch currently has 80 homeless boys directly or indirectly under its care. A number of boys are out on work placement and trial leave this summer. They will return to the Ranch when school starts.

Eight out of 10 Boys Ranch boys released since 1956 have made excellent adjustment, according to a national survey published by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

Boys Ranch director Morris Craig said the annual Roundup has been of tremendous importance in financing the operation. Economic pressure is critical as the Ranch tries to answer a constantly growing number of calls to help West Texas "hard luck" boys. He said previous Roundup have been a lifesaver for the Ranch.

Austin—"Pedodontics" is a big word with a simple meaning--the care and treatment of children's teeth. A major part of pedodontics is preventive dentistry, and preventive dentistry for the very young is the one great hope for a realistic solution to our dental woes.

If a child's teeth are properly cared for up to age 15, a strong foundation has been laid for minimizing rental troubles in later years.

At about 6 months of age the four front teeth--two upper and two lower--begin to peek out. These front teeth are incisors, the cutting teeth. By age 7 to 11 months, four more teeth, upper and lower, start to come in. These are the lateral incisors at either side of the central teeth.

Then Mother Nature wisely skips a few spaces in order to properly shape the jaw. In 12 to 16 months, the back teeth or molars, come in. Ten the cuspids show to fill in the space between. At about 24 months, the second molars come in. Up to this point all teeth which have erupted are primary teeth, and although temporary they are vital. They help shape the face, help the youngster learn to speak distinctly, help him nutritionally and must serve the child until he is 12.

While all this has been going on, the permanent teeth are slowly developing in the jaw bone so they can come forth at the proper time.

The first permanent teeth to erupt are molars--sometimes called "six-year" simply because they emerge at about age 6. Because they do not replace the first teeth but come in just behind them, these molars tend to confuse parents who think they are also temporary teeth.

This error can lead to unfortunate consequences. Since the "six-year" molars are permanent teeth, they will not be replaced if lost.

Family dentists strongly emphasize the importance of watching for

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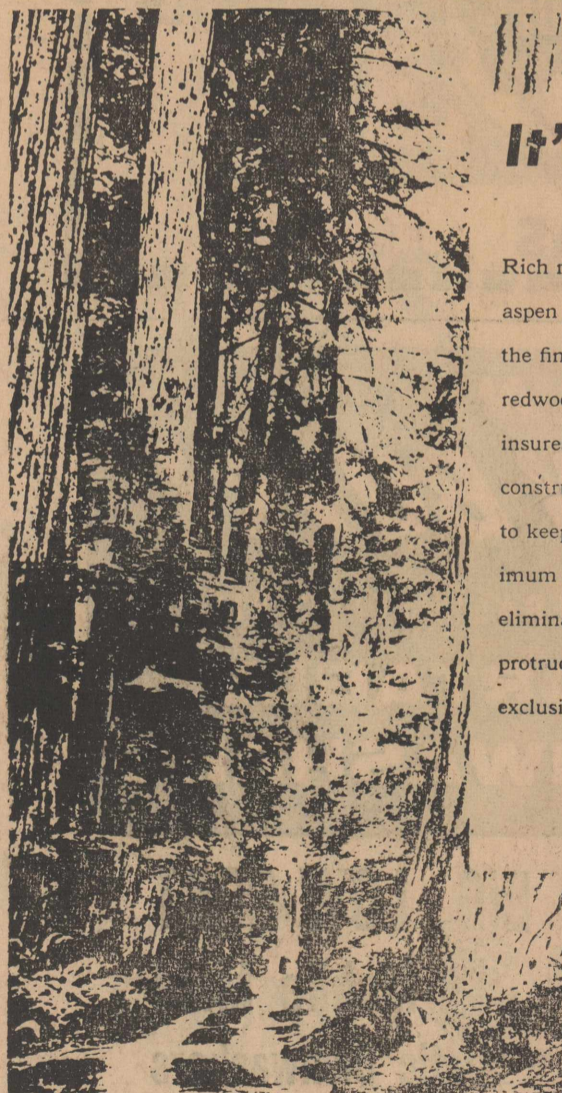
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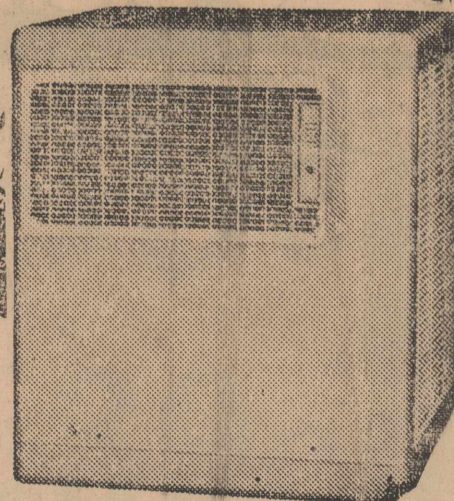
