Water Peak Near Million Gallons

With temperature reaching 100 degree mark every day but Thursday of last week, water consumption reached peak of 900,000 gallons in 24 hour period.

According to City Supervisor, Herb Sitz, present average is about 550,000 daily compared with approximately 300,000 gallons before the connection was made for Lake J. B. Thomas water.

Peak periods during summers in the future is expected to pass million gallon mark, as many citizens are making plans for improved yards, etc., with ample supply of water.

Water is now coming to Rotan via the new 10 inch line from City Water Farm at Camp Springs and the old line that has been in use for many years.

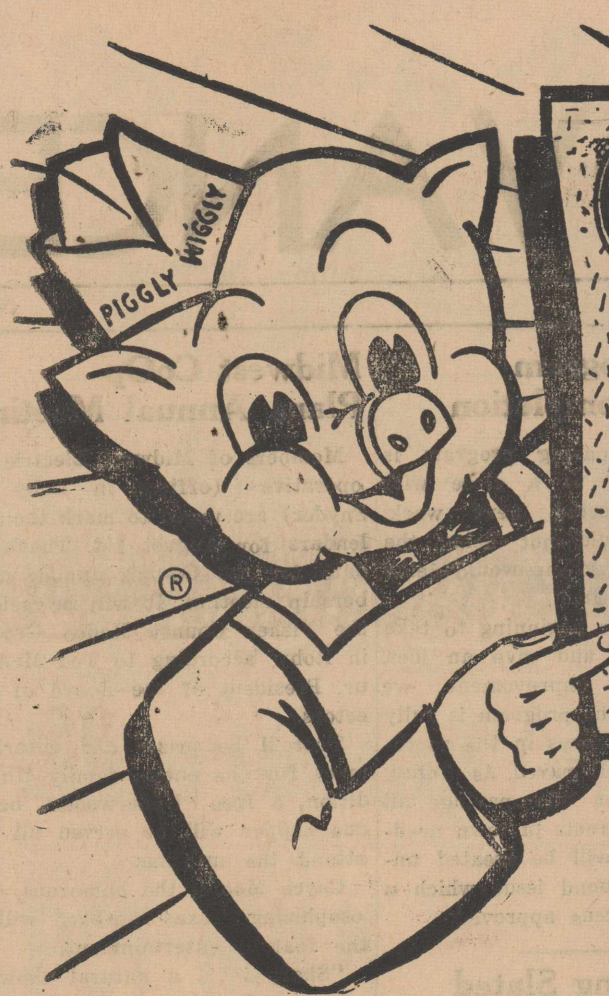
Mrs. Dunaway passed away Sunday night, July 14, in Harris Hospital, Ft. Worth, after having lung surgery.

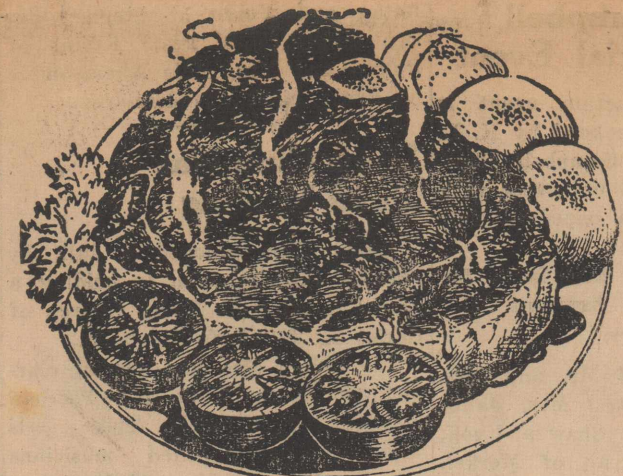

Annual Conservaton Meet Held in Pecos

Thirty members of the Texas Geat Plains Conservation Program Committee, representing most of the agencies, groups and associations working in the field of soil and water conservation, met in the Pecos area June 26 and 27, reported H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

The occasion was the annual field meeting and recommendations for improvement of the program are made.

George Skeete rancher near Water Valley and director of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts explained that the principle of the GPCP, where cost-share assistance is provided in accordance with a complete conservation plan developed for the entire operating unit and scheduled for application on a systematic basis, has proved to be the best demonstration and educational tool for soil and water conservation to date. Skeete explained that management must accompany any treatment applied if it produced the greatest return and was to be maintained over a long period of time.

Jack Stone, supervisor of the Toyah-Limpa Soil Conservation District, talked to the group and showed pictures of the work done on his ranch with GPCP assistance. Stone explained how he spread runoff water over flat draw-type ground that had been rootplowed and seeded to such grasses as Johnson and blue panicum. Stone stated that he was very proud of the results and invited the group to tour his ranch.

E. L. Thaxton, head of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Pecos, explained the research work being carried on there and conducted a tour of the station for the committee.

James Abbott of the Soil Conservation Service reported on progress and accomplishments of the GPCP. He said that approximately 900 contracts had been signed since July 1, 1962, obligating just under three million dollars on over a million acres of farm and ranch land. It was also noted that the Soil Conservation Service had about 300 proposed contracts on hand for which cost-share funds would not be available before July 1. This backlog of contracts illustrates the tremendous build-up in interest in the GPCP that has taken place in the past four or five years. Abbott also said that 209,000 acres of cropland have been planned for conservation to other uses, such as pasture and rangeland. This represents over 21% of all cropland placed under Great Plains contracts. Brush control has been carried out on over one million acres with assistance from the GPCP with an average cost-share assistance of \$2.35 per acre. It was pointed out that since 30.68% of the total cost-share assistance had been spent on brush control, which is a disproportionate share of the available funds, a priority limitation had to be placed on brush control.

Following the business, the committee toured the James P. Goode and Allgood and Axary farms near Barstow, George Avary and Mrs. Anna Herring ranches near Pyote, Edd Cox ranch at Monahans, A. J. Hoelscher at Coynosa and the Winfield Estate Ranch at Fort Stockton. Many outstanding examples of conservation were observed on each farm and ranch.

Others participating in the meeting were: Dr. R. E. Patterson, Dean of Agriculture, A&M College of Texas; Dr. G. W. Thomas, Dean of Agriculture, Texas Tech College; Harvey Davis, Executive Director, State Soil Conservation Board; Ben A. Jordan, Jr., State Director, Federal Insurance Corporation; J. D. Prewitt, Associate Director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; N. B. F. McGuire, State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; John D. "God Speaks Through His Ministers"

C. P. McMaster, Pastor First Methodist Church

Subject: "WHAT IS IT FOR?"

Text: Romans 8:16, 17. For the Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God; and if children, then heirs; heirs of God and joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together".

Saint Paul with his insight says that life is good when it has discovered God's purpose. He would never insist that a man can be sure of material success, but he would insist that, whatever life may bring, it will be a triumphant experience if it is according to God's will. Henry Ward Beecher one time said: "It is a very good world for the purpose for which it was built; and that is all anything is good for". We are dealing here with something that is fundamental and something that is often overlooked.

I. There is a great deal of unhappiness which is caused by demanding what we cannot have. It is due partly to the spirit of our time which seems to increase our wants in order to keep business at a peak. Perhaps no generation was ever surrounded by so many stimulations of desire. This advertising art is partly to blame for the restlessness of people who are trying to keep up with what they think their neighbors have. The false philosophies of our time make promises which cannot be fulfilled, with a consequent despair. Unfortunately for us, wishing does not make it so and only irritates is into depression.

II. The beginning of wisdom is to search for the real purpose of whatever we have to deal with. We cannot know what a thing is for until we know what the maker had in mind. One can imagine a Rip Van Winkle coming back to our time and being entirely mystified by some of the things we take for granted. He would be confused because he would not know what these things are for, and we do. It would be nonsense to criticize a tank because it will not fly, or to complain against an airplane because you cannot use it to plow a field. Things

fit into their proper places when you have learned what you can legitimately expect of them.

III. Now life itself demands this same discrimination. Too many modern persons complain of our life because it does not fit their desires. Many have obtained false impressions from their readings or from the movies. One has to come to terms with what the purpose of this earthly experience seems to be, and, until we do that, we will have no peace in our hearts. Neither the romanticist nor the cynic has come to terms with reality.

IV. One of the great things that Christ does for us is to reveal God's purpose for the world and for men. He teaches us that we are to learn discipline and become free persons. There is none of this nonsense about happiness being the ultimate end of life in his teaching. He leads us into the main stream of God's purpose and helps us to understand these purposes in terms of love. When we have discovered these things, we come to that great moment when, with Saint Paul, we can say that all things are working together for good.
