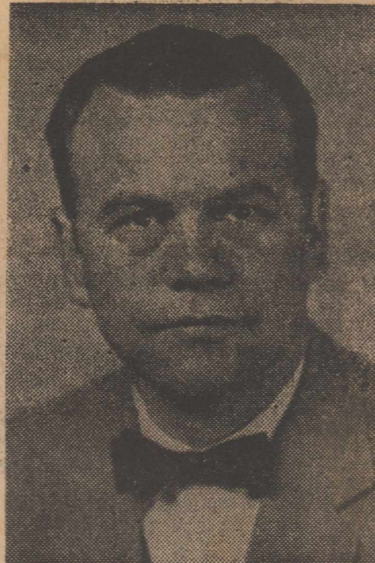
## FB Directors Enjoy Interesting Talk

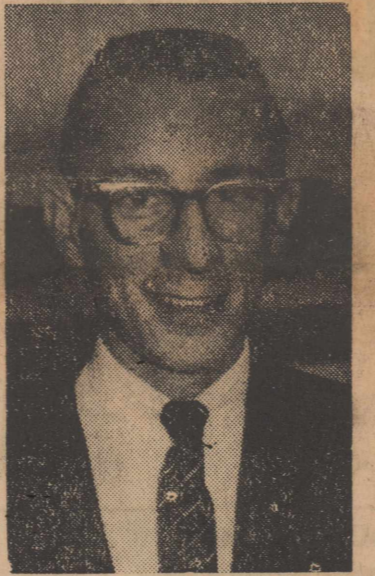

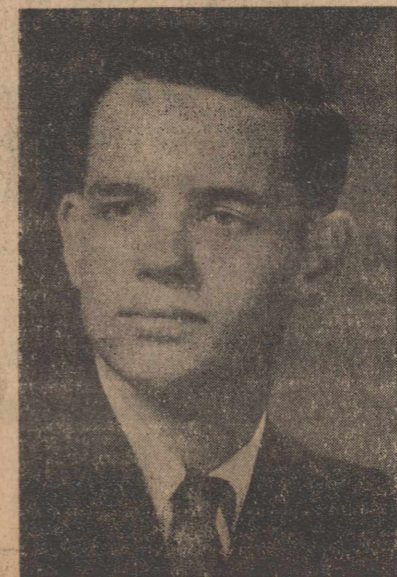

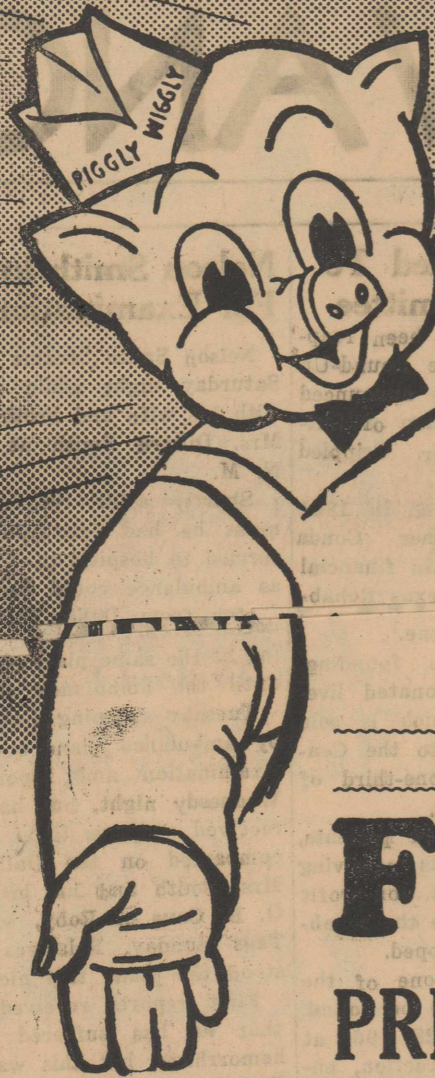

## Cooperator Doing Good Waterway Work

Jess Warshaw, whose farm is located about 10 miles Southwest of Roby, has a good litter crop established in a waterway that he had shaped last spring. Warshaw planted Suncah for dead litter in the waterway to provide protection for grass to be seeded next spring. The litter crop will be managed so that a good cover of litter will be left on the ground to protect the young grass seeding.

Warshaw plans to plant a permanent grass such as Sideoats grama in the dead litter. This grass will provide the protection needed to keep the waterway from eroding.

After several years of trying to control the drain with terraces, Warshaw decided to establish the waterway. He feels that the waterway will be cheaper than trying to rebuild the terraces after ever rain.

Warshaw requested assistance from the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District to solve the erosion problem. Soil Conservation Technicians designed and supervised construction of the waterway. Cost-share assistance was provided through the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Program.

Some other cooperators who have shaped waterways this year and have good litter crops established are Coe Hawkins, Bobby Smith, L. M. Williams and O. B. Landers.

Another method of establishing a litter to seed grass into is to apply such litter materials as cotton burrs, old hay or silage. This provides equal to that provided by a dead litter crop. One advantage from using a mulch material is that a permanent grass can be seeded into the mulch material to consider if a dead litter crop failed due to dry weather or late planting.

Laon AB, France -- Staff Sergeant Landon R. Curlee of Rotan, Tex., has arrived here for a period of temporary duty under the Air Force's new overseas rotational assignment program, Operation Short Spurt.

The sergeant, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Curlee of Rt. 1, Rotan, is a graduate of Rotan High School.

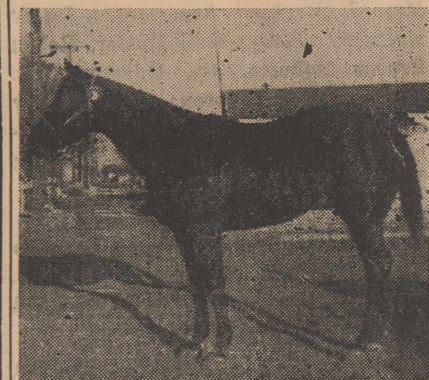
## HD Ladies To Have Day Fair Concession

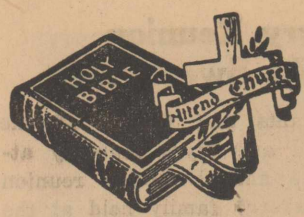

## Accent on Health

Austin -- If you suffer from "midmorning hunger," better revise your breakfast habits, State Health Department nutritionists advise.

More and more people are falling into the habit of skimpy breakfasting. Surveys have shown that two out of every nine children leave for school without breakfast, and four out of ten workers leave for work with nothing to eat.

"Midmorning hunger" is the expression nutritionists use to describe the feeling which comes after an inadequate breakfast. Victims usually feel weak and giddy by midmorning. They may be hungry, yet have no taste for lunch. Or, if they are able to eat a big lunch, they may feel sleepy by early afternoon.

Midmorning hunger therapy, nutritionists say, calls for the "patient" to eat a solid breakfast. The extent of breakfast consumption varies from person to person. Individuals with special problems or modified diets can be guided by their physician.

Many Texas teachers and school nurses place special emphasis on breakfast. One school nurse had a breakfast contest in the elementary grades. Near the end of the school year a mother telephoned to report on the improved breakfast habits and general well being of the whole family. Before the contest, the mother said, none of the family ate breakfast. Her child, involved in the school breakfast contest, insisted on having a good breakfast. Eventually it caught on and the whole family began eating breakfast and feeling better.

It is a false idea that skipping breakfast is good way to reduce. If anything, this highly injurious practice adds pounds. It works like this:

Skip breakfast and by noon you have lost your appetite or else are afraid to eat for fear of being groggy all afternoon. Then for supper you eat the food your body has been demanding all day. Now you go to bed and your supper is converted into fat rather than energy as would have been the case had you eaten properly during hours of greatest activity.

An adequate breakfast pattern can be adapted to any age, bodget or cultural pattern: fruit or fruit juice, protein-rich food -- such as eggs, cheese, meat or beans -- bread or cereal and milk.

If time is a prohibitive factor, some preparations can be made the

night before -- setting the table pattern of daily life that will pay fixing the coffee, pot, etc. Breakfast eating is a part of a and well being.

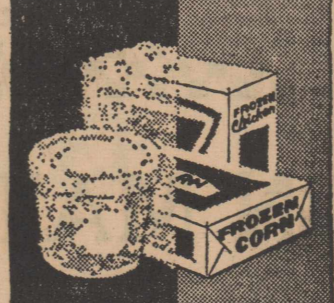

We have received a number of  
calls the last few weeks in regard  
to insect damage of elm trees.  
The insect is the elm leaf beetle  
which feeds on all species of elms.

Repeated defoliations cause a  
weakening or death of the trees.  
The beetle lives over winter as an  
adult. In the spring it eats holes  
in the young leaves and lays its  
eggs on the under side of them.  
The eggs hatch in about a week,  
and the young larvae skeletonize  
the foliage, causing it to dry, turn  
brown and fall to the ground. Full  
grown larvae pupate in the ground  
or in crevices in the bark of the  
lower trunk. In about a week  
they become adults and emerge.

Control: Pupae and young beet-  
les can be killed by soaking the  
ground and the trunk of the tree  
with a spray containing nicotine  
sulfate. For small amounts, mix  
1 pint of summer oil and 4 table-  
spoons of nicotine sulfate (40%)  
in 6 1-2 gallons of water. For  
larger amounts, mix 2 gallons of  
the oil and 1 quart of nicotine sul-  
fate in 100 gallons of water.

The foliage elms can be protect-  
ed by applying insecticides early to  
prevent damage. Young worms  
are easier to kill than older ones.  
The following insecticides mixed in  
water and applied as a spray are  
recommended: Chlordane, DDT,  
Dieldrin, Lead Arsenate, Sevin,

### TRACTOR MAINTENANCE TIPS

Young folks have been learning  
answers to tough tractor questions  
in 4-H tractor maintenance schools  
since 1944. Learning by doing,  
they've found that better tractor  
care results in longer tractor life,  
more power and lower operating  
costs. Here are typical questions  
they answer at the end of their  
course. What's your score?

- 1) Is it best to grease morning or evening? Why?
- 2) Do front wheel bearings with no grease fitting need lubrication?
- 3) Does too much grease on the clutch pilot bearing cause any harm?
- 4) How often should the air cleaner be serviced?

Although only a dozen or so  
tiny grease fittings are on your trac-  
tor, each does a big job, lubricating  
some mighty important parts. Re-  
member, the best time to grease is  
evening, when the bearings are  
warm and take grease more easily.  
Always wipe dirt from grease fittings  
and the gun tip to avoid forcing  
dirt into bearings. Greasing at day's  
end also protects bearings with a

film in case it rains and machinery  
stands idle, susceptible to rust.

If front wheel bearings have  
grease fittings, lubricate at least  
once a day. Use just enough grease  
to "ooze" it out around the inner  
dust seal—not so much the seal is  
damaged. If there are no fittings  
on front wheel bearings, remove  
the wheels periodically, clean and  
pack the bearings.

Take care when greasing clutch  
throw-out or pilot bearing; too much  
grease commonly causes faulty  
clutch operation. Grease on the  
clutch face may cause slippage,  
generate heat and score the plate.  
When the clutch plate becomes  
rough, the clutch grabs. Remember,  
one stroke of the gun is enough.

Engines use more than 8,000 gal-  
lons of air for each gallon of gaso-  
line burned. Or, they require 13 1/2  
pounds of air for each pound of  
fuel that burns. And diesel engines  
suck in a full cylinder of air every  
time a piston moves down on the  
intake stroke. Air is dirty and it's  
the air cleaner's job to clean it.  
When operating in a dusty area,  
clean the cup once every half day,  
or as recommended in the operator's  
manual.

A dirty, plugged, air intake stack  
restricts air flow and increases fuel  
consumption. Also, a leaky hose or  
clamp may let enough dirt in to  
ruin the engine. Check for other  
leaks, too—a leaky manifold gasket  
usually causes the tractor to misfire  
when idling. A simple check is to  
put a few drops of oil on the gasket  
and see if oil is sucked into the  
engine.

Toxaphene.

Another insect causing consid-  
erable damage to some vegetables  
and flowers now is the spider mite,  
also called red spider. These in-  
sects are small, about 1-60 inch,  
yellowish or reddish animal which  
sucks juices from undersides of  
leaves. Causes pale blotches on up-  
per and lower surfaces of foliage.  
Webbing often present. Plants  
gradually lose vigor and die.

The following insecticides used  
as a spray are recommended: Chlo-  
robenzilate, Diazinon, Kelthane, Mal-  
thion, Tedion, Ethion. Usually a  
second application 7 days later is  
necessary to obtain control.

Available from the local exten-  
sion office is L-199, Texas Guide  
for Controlling Insects on Ornamen-  
tal plants which gives information  
on the control of these insects and  
many other species attacking orna-  
mental plants.

Now is the time to have your  
soil tested in preparation for fall  
planting.

Early soil sampling is encourag-  
ed by the chemists to avoid the fall  
rush that crowds the state's three  
testing laboratories. Samples be-  
ing received now are mostly from  
pastures, fall-seeder crops and  
lawn or flower beds, he says.

The number of samples received  
during May and June was about

tested and 495 were examined in  
June.

For more information about soil  
testing and for instructions on the  
method of taking and submitting  
soil samples, come by the county ex-  
tension office.

Sixty-two percent of our present  
cropland needs conservation treat-  
ment, says the USDA. Erosion con-

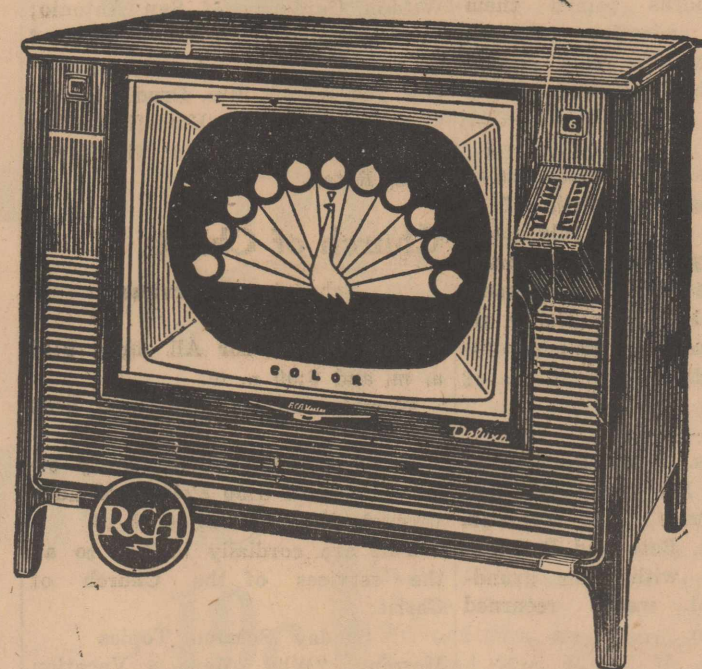
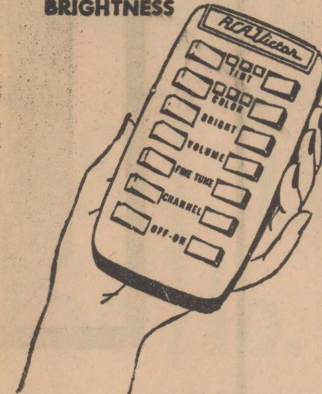

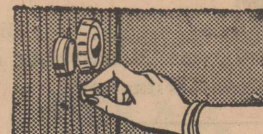

**F-M Road Work Completed in County**

Construction work has been completed on two highway projects in Fisher and Stonewall Counties. A contract was awarded to Cagle Bros. of San Antonio, Texas by the Texas Highway Department on November 23, 1962 for the reconstruction work on F. M. Highway 610 in Fisher and Stonewall Counties.

The Fisher County section began at the intersection of F. M. Highway 610 and State Highway 70 and extended east along the existing route a distance of 1.5 miles to the Stonewall County line. Work consisted of rebuilding the grading, structures, base and two course asphalt treatment. The cost of this project was \$22,940.21.

The Stonewall County section began at the intersection of F. M. Highway 610 and U. S. Highway 83 in Aspermont and extended along the existing route for a distance of 10 miles. Construction work consisted of rebuilding the grading, structures, base and a two course asphalt surface treatment. Drainage was further improved by widening the channels adjacent to structures. The intersection of F. M. Highway 2211 west of Aspermont was reconstructed to current highway design standards which included a concrete median 320 feet in length on F. M. Highway 2211 to properly channel traffic through the intersection.

Authorization for the work was made in December, 1961 under the 1962 Farm to Market Improvement Program. The cost of this project was \$203,579.69.

The contractor began work on December 4, 1962 and completed the work in 118 working days. Repeated heavy rains during the time finishing operations were in progress delayed the contractor in completing the work at a much earlier date.

Nelson Shave, Sr. Resident Engineer of Hamlin, was in charge of the project while it was under construction.

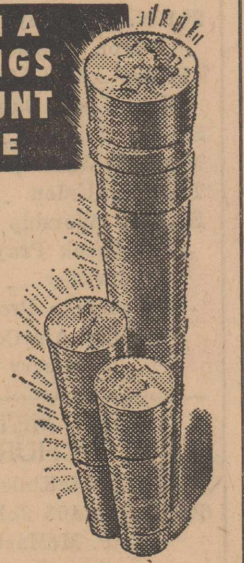

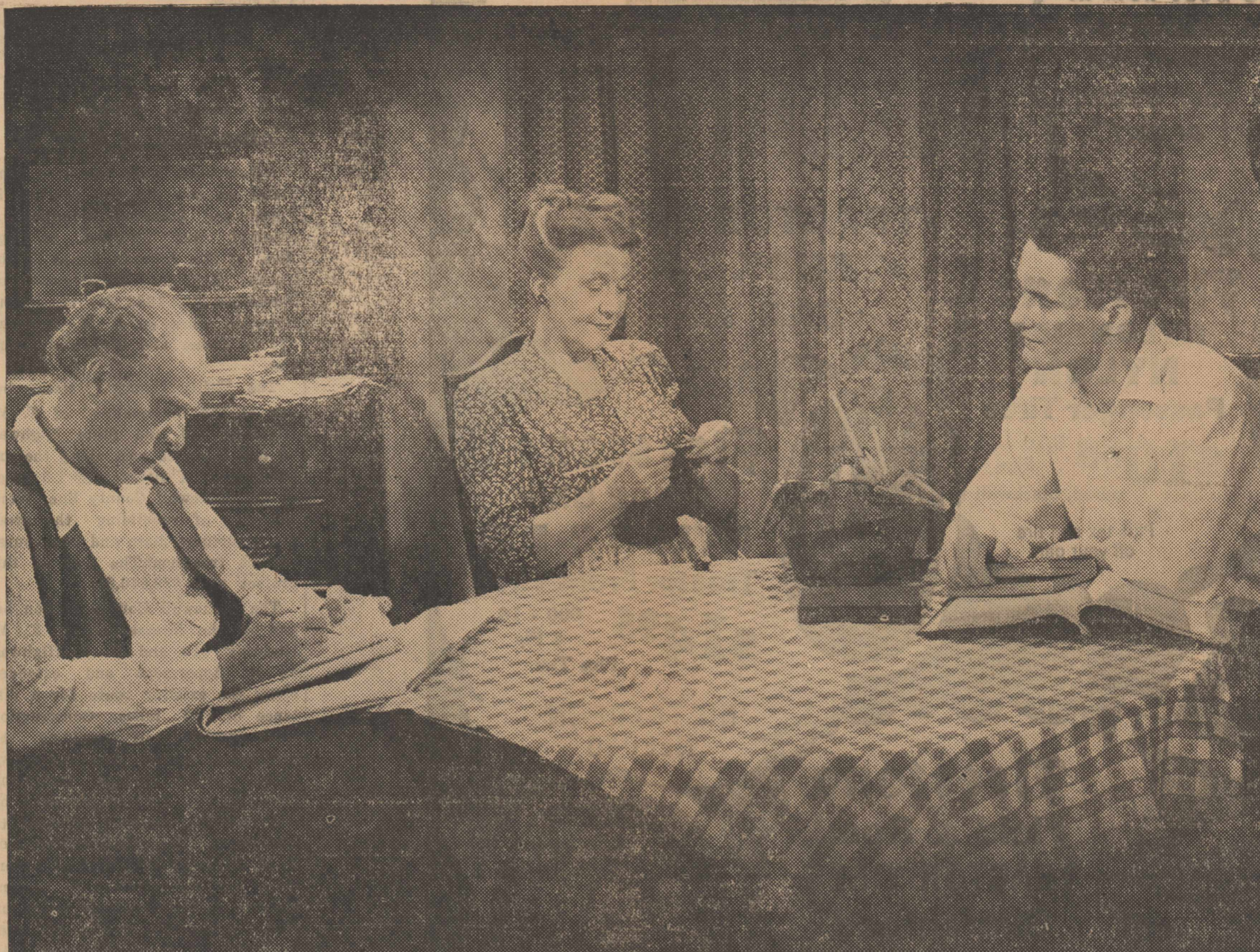
