Co-Op. Annual Meeting Held In Roby Thursday

Stockholders annual meeting of Midwest Electric Co-Operative was held at Roby last Thursday, with attendance reported to be the largest in history of the organization.

J. A. Murff of Roby and Glenn Tate of Hermleigh were reelected to places on the board of directors of the Midwest Electric Cooperative at the 25th annual meeting held at the rodeo grounds in Roby Thursday night.

Murff, board treasurer, was reelected to place one on the board and Tate, vice president to place two.

A total of 652 families from the nine counties served by the co-op were registered at the annual event. Underwood's of Abilene fed 3,000 persons before the program.

Robert R. Patterson of Snyder, co-op attorney, was master of ceremonies. Annual reports were given by co-op officials.

Johnnie Ammons, manager, reported the fiscal year 1962 ended with a margin of \$151,294.58. He said the directors for the sixth consecutive year voted to refund capital credits. The credit checks will be mailed out in early December in the total amount of \$115,921.40.

J. T. Palmer, office manager, released statistics showing that the co-op, which has total net worth of about \$5 million, was serving a total of approximately 4,200 customers. He said the co-op has 2,075 miles of energized lines which include a growth of 47 miles the past year.

Parker Wetsel, assistant manager, was in charge of Minute Men of the Co-op, an organization of young members of the co-op, in the balloting procedure. Oddis Brown, purchasing agent, assisted with the registration and with the program.

Ted McArthur of Rotan, president of the board, gave the president's report.

Cayce Moore of Hearne, a humorist, entertained the crowd.

Funeral for James C. Morrow, 84, retired farmer and pioneer area resident, was held Tuesday at 3 p. m. in First Baptist Church in Anson with the Rev. Robert Evans, pastor of North Side Baptist Church, officiating.

Mr. Morrow died at his home in Anson at 9 p. m. Sunday following an apparent heart attack.

Born near Fulton, Ky., on Sept. 27, 1878, he moved with his family to Texas in 1891, setting on a farm four mile west of Anson. The family moved later to Neinda and to Rotan in 1896.

He married Annie Finch in Rotan in 1902. They moved back to the Anson area in 1920. Mrs. Morrow died in 1928.

Survivors include two sons, three daughters, two brothers and three sisters. He was brother of the late J. M. Morrow of Rotan.

Missionaries From Africa To Show Slides

Missionaries to Africa are presently visiting in the Loy Mitchell home and will be showing color slides of the country in the church of Christ building Sunday night, August 11, at 7:00 p. m. All visitors will be warmly welcomed.

The Mitchells and the Browns worked together in Southern Rhodesia of South Africa before the Mitchell's return to the States in 1962 in order for Loy to finish his M. A. degree. The Browns have just returned for their first time since going to Africa in 1955. This trip was not only to report to their supporting congregations but to show their African born daughter to their people. Mr. Brown is a native of Oklahoma, taking his B. S. degree from Weatherford State Teacher's College. Mrs. Brown is from New Jersey and was an x-ray technician before going to Africa.

The Browns have been working on a mission station where a boarding school is maintained which goes up to and includes grade eight, accommodating approximately 350 students. The main program of those who work on this mission is a three-year Bible course for men of which there are 25 at present.

Religious work in Africa is reported to be very satisfying as the people in general are extremely friendly, co-operative and responsive. Those who work there find it a joy to see the people come from squalor, ignorance and hopelessness to raised standards of living - to become dignified, neat, well-dressed individuals inferior to none.

The Browns feel that world peace is a world better, something which cannot be dealt with in a few outstanding communities only.

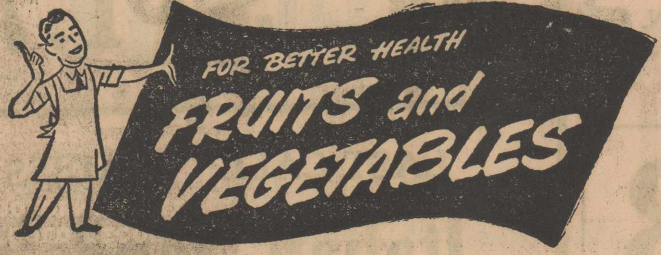

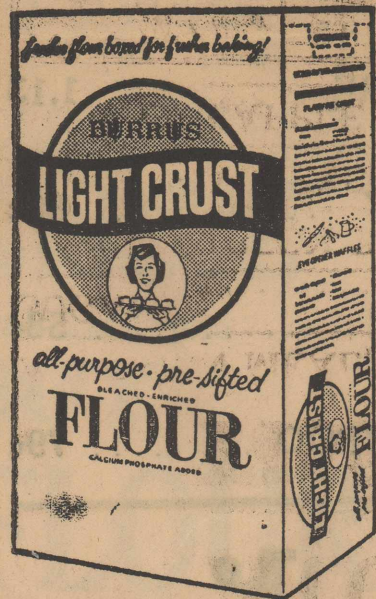

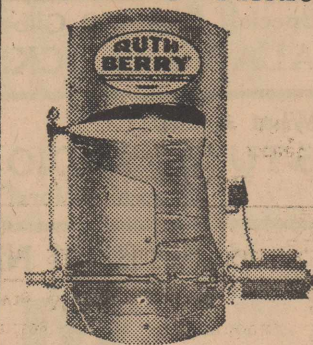

Texas Residents May Obtain Proof of Age From Census Bureau

Last year, more than 14,000 residents of Texas turned to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, for help in proving where and when they were born, the Bureau reported today. They needed proof of age to collect social security and other retirement benefits. They needed it to obtain passports. They needed it to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. They needed it for some forms of insurance.

These persons who requested assistance from the Census Bureau last year were among an estimated 20 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birthplace. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only acceptable source of this information for many of these people. Since its beginning in 1870,

the U. S. Census has recorded identifying data for almost 350 million persons, many of them listed several times in separate censuses. The Bureau has provided copies of these records to about three and one-half million people, as legal proof of age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship.

Persons seeking such a record for social security purposes should go to the local Social Security Office, or, for other purposes, write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for an application form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as a guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a

child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

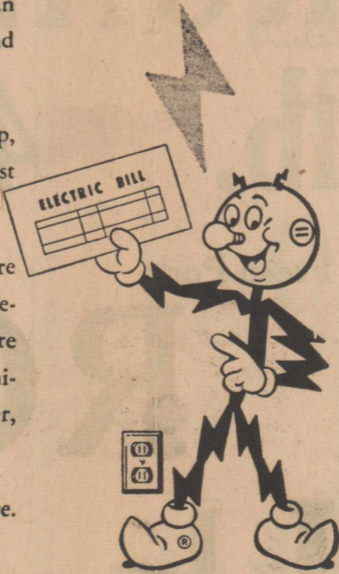

The 1963 edition of Fisher County Livestock Show, Fair and Rodeo catalogue was delivered July 30.

All three days activities of the Fair and Rodeo are listed in the catalogue. Also included are all divisions, superintendents, assistants rules and awards.

Each one who helped make the catalogue possible are to be commended.

Copies are available at the local extension office, so plan now to enter and help make this year's Fair the biggest yet.

Stockmen in many sections of the State with grazed out pastures are turning to supplemental pastures including drouth stunted plants of the sorghum family. Dr. C. M. Patterson, veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension service, points out that some danger of poisoning exists when these plants are grazed.

The danger is from prussic acid, he explains. Prussic acid is the breakdown product of a glucoside normally present in some young, actively growing plants. It does not occur in a plant unless the growth is stopped by moisture stress or frost. Moisture stress may result from inadequate soil moisture or from excess moisture loss due to high temperatures and low relative humidity.

Dr. Patterson says all members of the sorghum family, including Johnsongrass and Sudan, produce the glucoside under favorable levels of fertility and that this group of plants is the most dangerous of commonly grazed forages. The more luxuriant the plant growth, the more likely it will be dangerous when wilted.

If moisture stress is from depleted soil moisture, the plants may remain toxic for long periods, he says. If hot, dry winds cause the stress, the plants may be toxic only during the periods when evaporative losses exceed the plants' ability to pick up moisture from the soil. To illustrate, hungry animals turned into a field during the hot if turned in early in the morning, afternoon might be poisoned, but might fill up and quit grazing during the period of the day when the forage would be toxic.

Younger plants have a higher glucoside content than plants nearing maturity; therefore, if wilted would be more toxic, Patterson explains. He suggests grazing a few animals on fields in question early in the morning and under close watch for an hour. If no trouble occurs, it should be safe to turn in the herd. But, if any animals show a tendency to become restless and breathe fast, get them out in a hurry. Death or recovery usually happens within an hour or two. Drenching with a syrup or sugar solution slows the release of prussic acid in the rumen, but a veterinarian should be called immediately

for further treatment, he says.

Every now and then someone will ask whether their old Savings Bonds, bought during the War, are still drawing interest. The answer is a very definite "yes". In fact ALL E and H bonds still held by their owners continue to earn interest--and in many cases, at a rate higher than originally offered.

This is because the Treasury has offered an automatic extension privilege each time the Bonds neared a maturity. For example, E bonds sold between May 1941 and May 1949 have had two extensions, making them 30 year bonds. All other E bonds have a guaranteed 10-year extension, including those now on sale.

As for the Series H bonds, those bought between June 1952 and January 1957 have a 10-year extension. The Treasury will decide on whether to extend H bonds bought since February 1957.

So don't believe what you read on the back of old E and H bonds. They're better than you think. And you DON'T have to cash them yet.

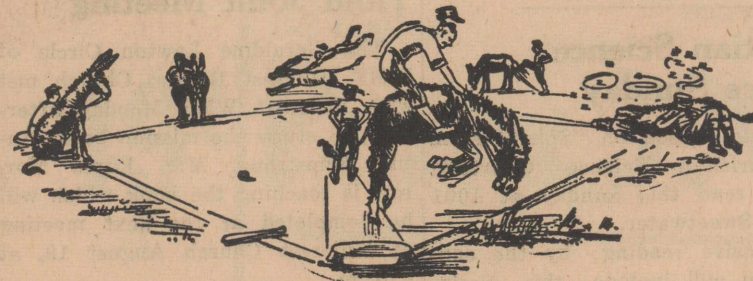

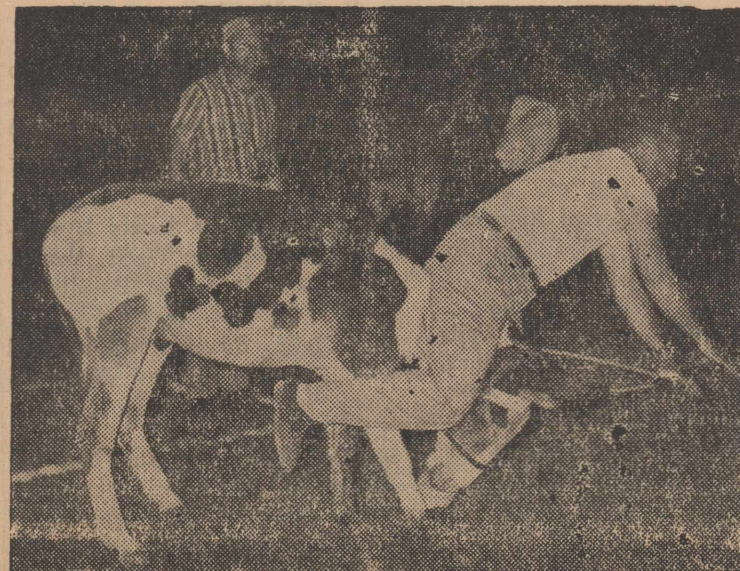

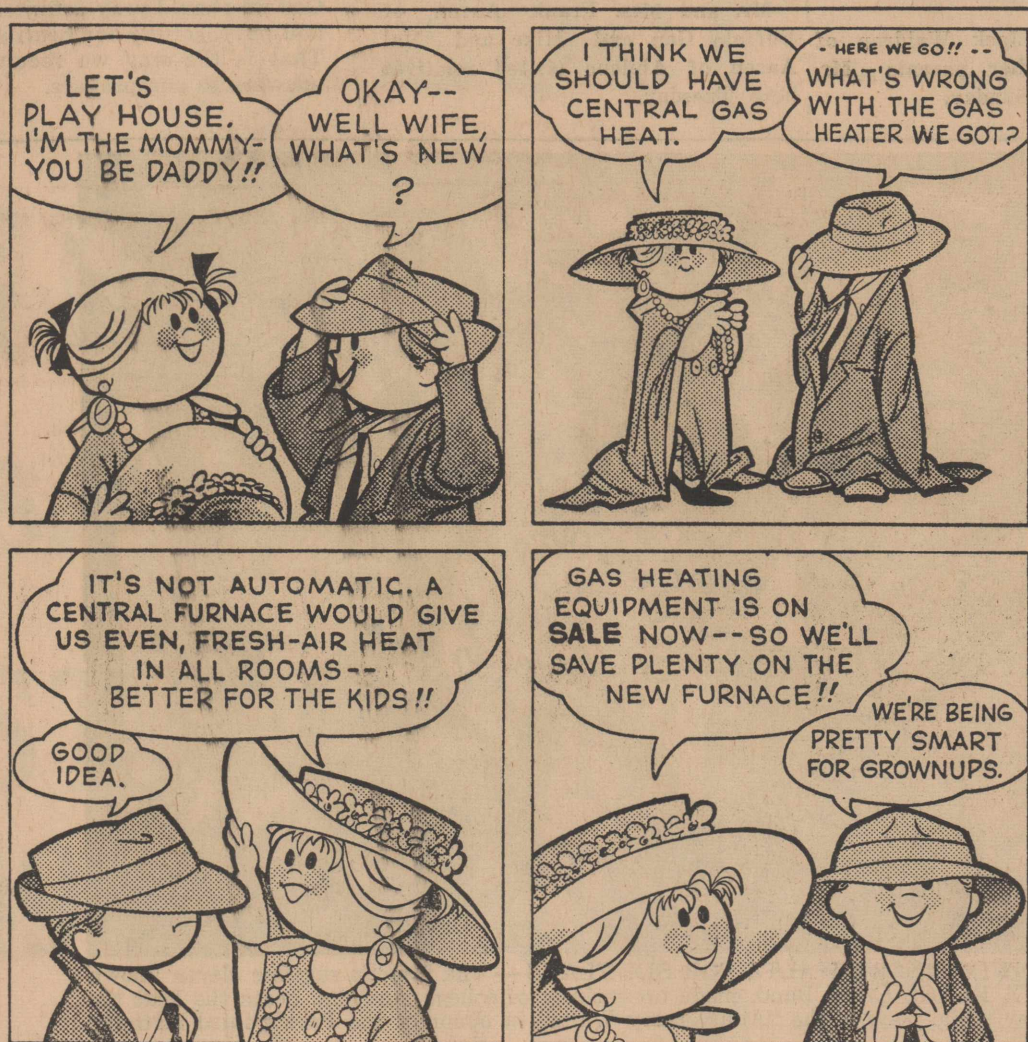

Text: Genesis 3:8
Subject: EFFECTS OF SIN

Chapter three of Genesis is the story of how sin began in the world. It is the story of what sin did to man in those days and it is also the story of what sin will do to man in these days. Let us notice five things that sin will do to man.

I. Sin Will Make Man Afraid of God.

When Adam and Eve had disobeyed the command of the Lord they tried to hide and said: I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself. Sin made Adam and Eve afraid of God, and man has been afraid of God from that day until this. Yes, sinful people are often afraid even of the servants of God, and they try to hide from God's servants. They may hide from God's servants but they cannot hide from God.

II. Sin Will Keep People From The Place of Worship

It was the habit of Adam and Eve to meet the Lord in the garden and to worship him there. The scripture says that the Lord God came to the garden in the cool of the day, and Adam and Eve hid themselves from the presence of the Lord. They had sinned and they did not want to worship. When people sin and has sin in their lives we find that they do not want to worship so they try to hide themselves from God, and from God's servants.

III. Sin Breaks Fellowship Between Man and God

It was the custom of Adam and Eve to have fellowship with the Lord in the garden constantly. But when sin came into their lives and

they had disobeyed the Lord this fellowship was broken. Verse nine says--The Lord God called unto Adam and said unto him: Where art thou? Because of sin Adam had hid himself; he did not want to see the Lord. Because of sin many today do not want to see the Lord or the Lord's servant or the Lord's house and they try to hide themselves, but you cannot hide from God; for God has an all seeing eye. He can see you wherever you are, or whatever you are doing. Sin also breaks fellowship between man and man, so we must be careful and not sin against God or man; for when we do it is hard to renew our fellowship.

IV. Sin Shuts Man Out of the Highest Good in Life

When sin came into the life of Adam and Eve they were cast out of the garden, out of the place of joy and happiness. Swords were placed at the entrance of the garden to prevent their return to this happy place. Sin always separates man from that which is high and holy in life.

V. Sin Must Be Punished

Sin called down a curse on all that was connected with this disobedience of the Lord. Thus an eternal curse was pronounced upon the serpent, the woman, and Adam as punishment for the sin committed.

(Verses 14-17 says--And the Lord God said unto the serpent, Because thou hast done this, thou art cursed above all cattle, and every beast of the field; upon thy belly shalt thou go, and dust shalt thou eat all the days of thy life; And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed

and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel.

Unto the woman he said, I will greatly multiply thy sorrow and thy conception; in sorrow thou shalt bring forth children; and thy desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee.

And unto Adam he said, Because thou hast hearkened unto the voice of thy wife, and hast eaten of the tree, of which I commanded thee, saying, Thou shalt not eat of it: cursed is the ground for thy sake; in sorrow shalt thou eat of it all the days of thy life. So we see that sin is punished it must be punished and it will be punished.

But there is a way out of sin, thanks be unto God.

It is by grace through faith in Christ Jesus. So have faith in Christ that He might lead you in paths of righteousness day by day.

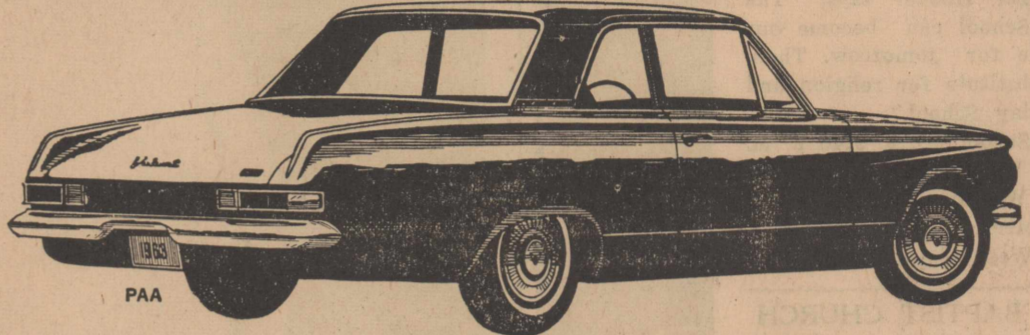

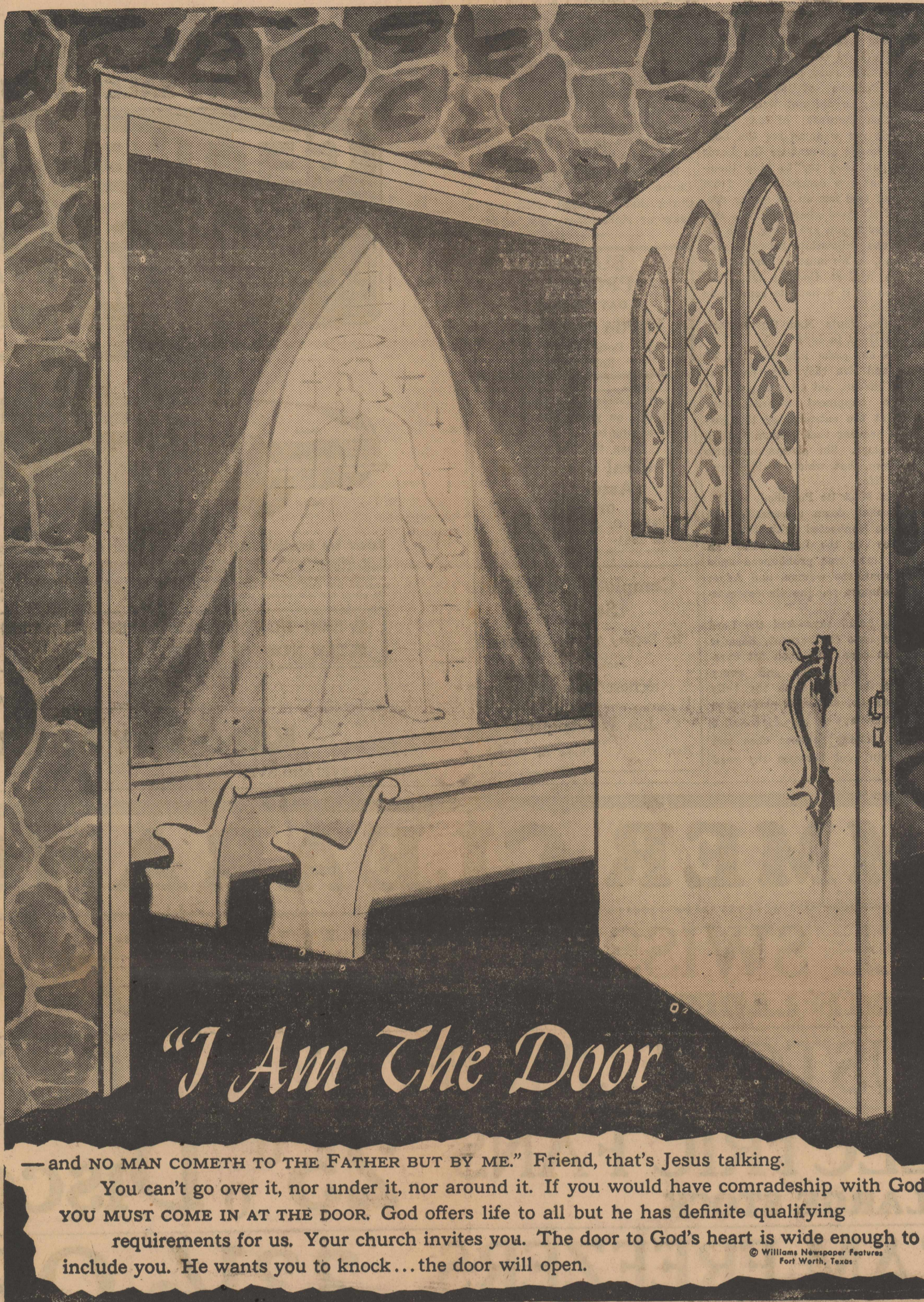
