Each week we receive more good news from the officials with the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program.

During the week of July 28-August 3, 129,423,450 sterile flies were released, the largest number released in any week so far.

The Southwest experienced its first screwworm-free day on Sunday, Aug. 4, since March 27. Tuesday, August 6, marked another day with no cases.

Eighty-six Texas counties reported 304 infestations in July compared to 223 counties reporting 10,267 infestations in July 1962, or 2.96% as many cases.

The following was taken from a Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program progress report: "The famous Texas 'dog days' are upon us. It's a strain to get very excited about anything, including screwworms. Besides, the news from Mission seems to be all good, so why worry?"

Eradication workers fear that many livestockmen will or have already adopted that attitude. It could be that news about the encouraging development in the screwworm eradication program has resulted in complacency, with producer feeling that the need for their continued vigilance and cooperation has diminished. Occasional reports are being received where producers are working their livestock and failing to treat wounds that are incurred. Sheep and goat shearing has started in some parts of the Southwest and the routine fall livestock management activities will soon follow.

Remember last year, when screwworm incidence fell off in hot, dry August? Remember how it zoomed right back up when it rained early in September? Well, the same thing could happen this year; cases are extremely rare right now, but as soon as cool, wet weather arrives, you can bet screwworm activity will pick up.

The time to prevent that fall build-up is RIGHT NOW! There are fewer screwworms now than at any time since March. At the same time, the plant near Mission is producing more flies per week--130 million--than ever before. It's only logical that cooperation and assistance from producers coupled with sterile fly release should prevent a fall build-up from occurring, or at least limit it to the extent that it can be quickly brought under control."

The Third Annual Horse Short Course will be held at Texas A&M University August 23 and 24.

A varied program has been set up to cover: Economics of Horse Industry; Development of Horse Breeds; Breeding Problems; Research Reports on Infectious Anemia, Parasites and Feeding; Fitting and Training; Stud Manager's Session; and Disease Prevention and First Aid for Horses.

The course is being sponsored by the Animal Husbandry Department and College of Veterinary Medicine.

This course should be both interesting and profitable to those of you working with horses. Should any of you be interested in looking the program over, stop by the office in the courthouse.

Married Couple Both Need SS Cards

In Texas both husbands and wives will need a taxpayer identification number for future income tax filing a joint return because of the late Jr., the Administrative Officer at the Abilene office of Internal Revenue Service.

"The community property law creates many situations where both husband and wife have income that belongs to only one spouse in other states," Mr. Fogle explained. "Quite a few wives feel that they do not need a taxpayer identification, or social security, number, because they file a joint return with their husband. There are times when it is to their advantage to file separate returns. Naturally, the wife can not report her share of dividends, interest and other income on a separate return without having a taxpayer identification number. However, she still needs the taxpayer identification number in filing a joint return because of the community property law in Texas."

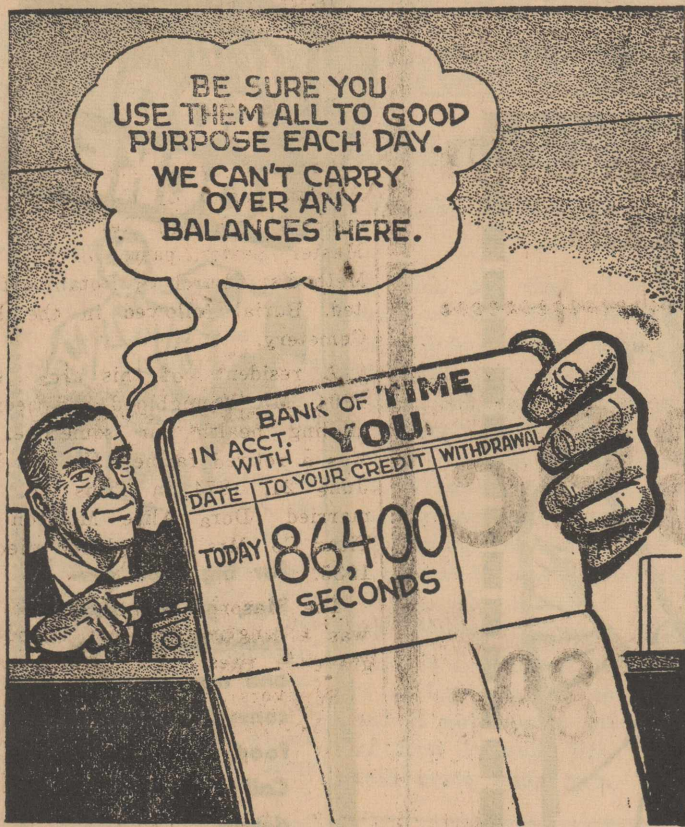

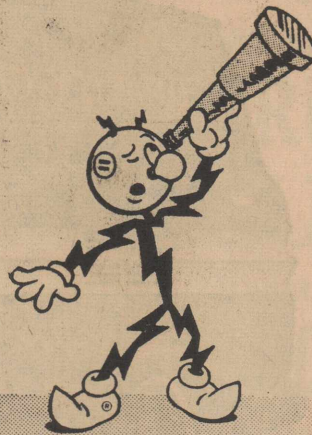

Accent on Health

Austin -- When Texan are looking for fun, they are likely to head for the water. And it should be no surprise to anyone that swimming tops the list of participant recreation. A recent Gallup Poll of sports participation of United States adults puts swimming first on the list. At least a third of the adults swim each year. No less than five million Texans use aquatic facilities annually.

Addition to the water apparently extends from coast to coast. More than 57,800 pools were built last year and 70,000 is the expected figure for 1963, an indication that pool construction is fast becoming a major industry. Some are complete with artificial sand beaches. Others have adjoining tennis courts and playgrounds.

Throughout all this accelerated interest in swimming runs hazards of life and limb and possibilities of disease transmission through contaminated water. That's why the States Department of Health stepped in with a plan for schooling swimming pool operators in the various skills of their jobs. The voluntary plan works like this:

Any pool operator may register for "short schools" being held according to announced schedules. The schools are sponsored by the Department's Division of Sanitary Engineering and the Texas Beach and Pool Association. Operators who successfully complete the instruction and pass a written test will be awarded certificates of com-

Sept. Draft Quota Biggest In 2 Years

Austin, Texas, August 6. -- State draft boards will get their biggest monthly quota in nearly two years in September.

The call for September asks for 609 men for Army service, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

This is the biggest state quota since November 1961, when the quota was 923.

The September call of 609 compares with 552 for August, 349 for July, and 187 for June. The September call is the state's share of a national quota of 12,000 men.

The state Selective director also announced pre-induction physical and mental examinations for 2,060 men in September.

Local board quotas for the September call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The September quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on September 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent under the law, who may be younger.

penalty. Ordinances in some cities make attendance mandatory for its pool operators.

During the first part of 1963, 25 swimming pool operator's short schools were held in Texas. The total attendance hit the 1,350 mark; and 850 operator's certificates were issued. These short schools first began in 1956.

The ever-present possibility of drownings (there were 328 last year), accidents and disease - together with phenomenal surge in popularity of water sports - are compelling reasons behind the Department's program for short schools for pool operators.

Swimming pools, real estate developers are finding, make new houses and buildings lots sell like the well known hot cakes. Tourist court owners have found pools to be an attractive drawing card. Even during periods of normal tourist flow, the courts with pools fill up first.

Although much is being done to prevent hazards for swimmers, the final burden rests on the individual. Swimming is fun; but swim where it's safe.

Speed Limits Increase To 70 MPH August 23

More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective, August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed, August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,460 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-mile-per hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

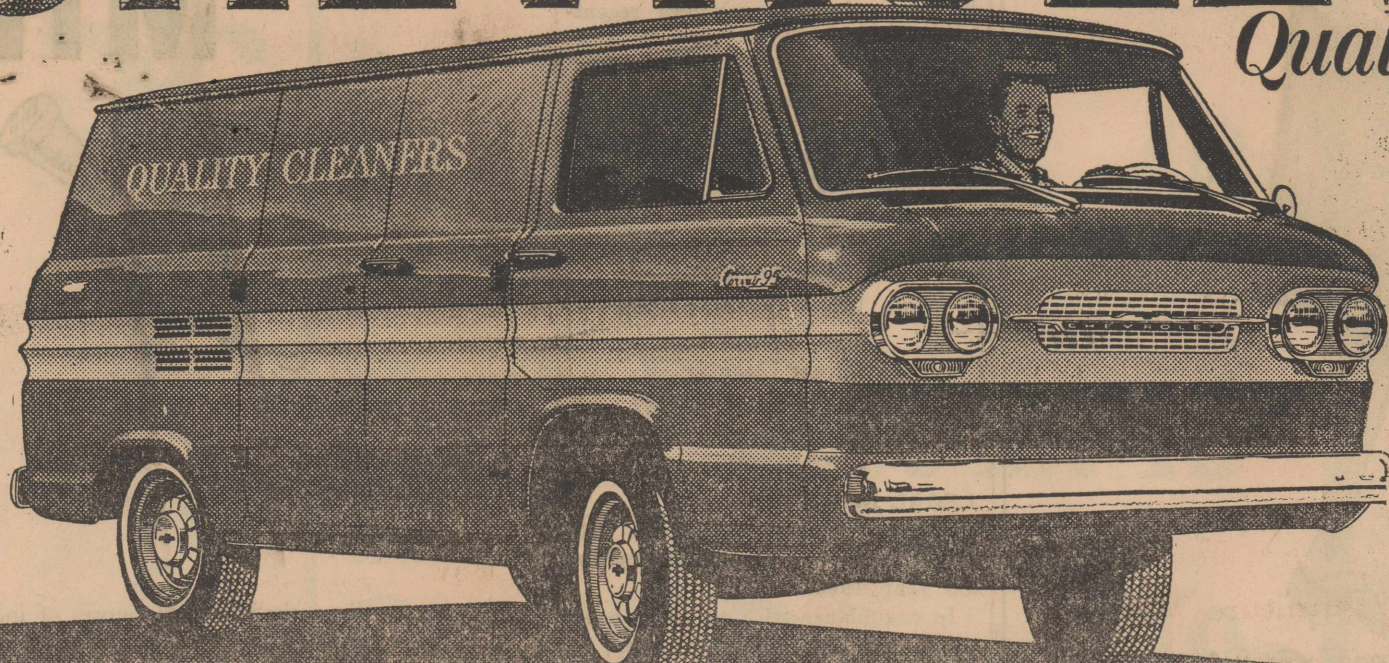
