"God Speaks Through His Ministers"

D. S. (Bud) More, Jr. Pastor Cross Roads Baptist Church

Text: Luke 1:67-80

Subject: A Father's Joy

Zacharias had a great vision for his son. He thought of him as the prophet and the forerunner who would prepare the way of the Lord. All devout Jews hoped and longed for the day when the Messiah, God's anointed King, would come. Most of them believed that, before God's anointed came, that a forerunner would come and prepare the way for Him and this is what Zacharias thought of his son. Verses 75-77 give a great picture of the steps of the Christian way.

1. There Must Be A Preparation
All life is a preparation to lead us to Christ. When Sir Walter Scott was young his aim was to be a soldier. An accident made him slightly lame and that dream had to be abandoned. He took to reading the old Scottish histories and romances and he so became the master novelist. And an old man said of him, "He was making himself a' the time; but he didna ken maybe what he was about till years had passed." In life God is working all things together to bring us to Christ.

2. There Must Be Knowledge
It is the simple fact that men did not know what God was like until Jesus came. The Greeks thought

of a passionless God, beyond all joy and sorrow, looking on men in calm, unmoved detachment--no help there. The Jews thought of a demanding God, whose name was law and whose function was that of judge--nothing but terror there. Jesus came to tell of a God who was love, and in staggered amazement men could only say, "We never knew that God was like that." One of the great functions of the incarnation is to bring men to the knowledge of God.

3. There Is Forgiveness
We must be clear about one thing regarding forgiveness. Forgiveness is not so much the remission of penalty as the restoration of a relationship. Nothing can deliver us from certain consequences of our sins; the clock cannot be put back; but the estrangement from God is turned to friendship. The distant God is become near and the God we feared has become the lover of the souls of men.

4. There Is A New Walk In The Ways of Peace

When the first school bell rings this September there will be 264, 783 six-year-old children entering school for the first time in Texas, according to estimated enrollment figures compiled by the Texas Education Agency.

In addition to the million-and-one chores that must be performed in getting the youngster ready for school -- new shoes, clothes, health examination -- most school districts require proof of age for beginning students. A certified copy of a birth certificate is usually requested.

Anticipating this, the Records and Statistics Section of the Texas State Department of Health is readying itself for the onslaught of requests for such copies that comes pouring in during the middle and late summer.

The problem, is, too many parents wait until the last moment before requesting their copy.

Because of this, a temporary increase in staff is necessary. It takes a sizable staff just to open the thousands of letters received daily, let alone search out the requested certificate, remove it from the thick volume, photograph it or make a certified copy, mail it out, and then return the original certificate to its proper place.

Years of experience have eliminated nearly every bottleneck. The operation is smooth and fast. Usually, the copy is mailed within a day or two after the request is received.

However, one serious bottleneck still exists -- persons who insist upon waiting until the last few days before school begins to mail in their request.

In recent years the last-minute rush hasn't been quite so bad, but it is still a serious problem. Requests should be sent in as soon as possible. The State Health Department fee for certificate copies is \$1.50.

Certified copies can also be obtained from county clerks and local registrars for a similar fee.

Most important aid for speedy service -- aside from getting requests in early -- is complete and correct information.

Parents should include the child's name, his place of birth, date of birth, and the parents' name (including the mother's maiden name).

Armed with the correct information, a certified copy or birth card will be speeded on its way as quickly as many years of experience and a well-trained staff can send it.

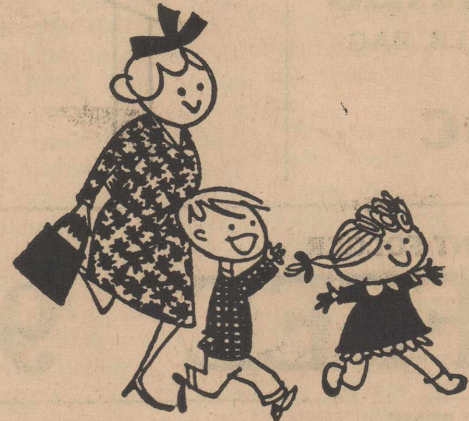
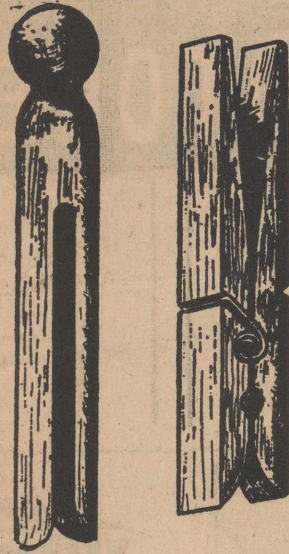

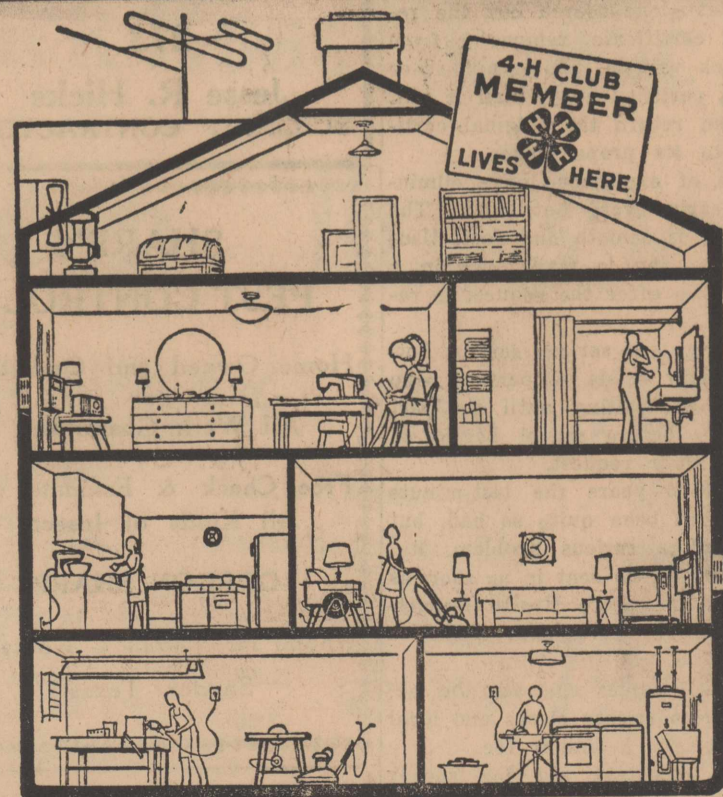

National 4-H Electric program sponsored by Westinghouse Educational Foundation

How many ways is electricity used in this picture?
How many ways is it used in your home? Do you ever wonder what happens when you plug into a wall outlet? Where does the power come from? You usually can't see it unless it is in a light. Why do fuses blow? Why should you NEVER touch an electrical object with wet hands? Scores of 4-H Club members could tell you the answers. They found them while working in the 4-H electric program. Through the Cooperative Extension Service and sponsoring groups, the young people have access to some of the best personal guidance and informative literature in the electrical field. Boys and girls interested in electricity should see the county extension agent.

A knowledge of the seasonal variation in cattle prices is one of the best tools the farmer or ranchman can use to plan a profitable operation.

The chief reason for this seasonal price fluctuation is the change in the number of cattle marketed during different periods of the year, says L-599, "Seasonal Changes in Cattle Prices." Different numbers of cattle are marketed at different seasons due to weather conditions, breeding dates, ranges conditions and production costs, the publication explains.

In Texas, as in most of the nation, calves are usually dropped in the spring months and are weaned and sold in the fall months. Therefore the lowest prices are received in the fall when marketings are greatest and the highest prices in the spring when marketings are at their lowest. The publication points out that the price of higher grading feeder cattle does not vary as much from season to season as that of the lower grades.

Prices quoted in the leaflet are the five year averages at the Fort Worth Stockyards from 1958 to 1962. The cattle marketed were grouped into four main groups for comparison. They are slaughter steers and heifers slaughter calves, feeder and stocker steers and feeder and stocker calves.

The demand for feeder animals remains strong throughout the year while stocker cattle, to be placed on pasture and ranges, are in more demand in the spring, the leaflet

says. The slaughter calf trade, unique to Texas and a few other areas, has increased recently due to our growing population. These animals were originally grass fat or well finished weaned calves, but today more and more calves are being fed for the slaughter calf market, according to the publication. The market for slaughter calves varies more than any other class of cattle and therefore should be watched closely, it adds.

Stop by the local extension office for a copy.

Here's a bulletin that should be of interest to every landowner in Texas. Entitled "Increasing Your Income Through Wildlife Management." The publication discusses just about every point you would need to consider in order to increase your income from wildlife. Included are such things as types of hunting leases, with estimated averages of fees charged; how to increase the game available; fishing permits and how to increase the fishing by proper management and stocking, and fertilization. Also such things as raising and sale of minnows, worms and other fish bait. If you would like to have a copy of the bulletin, "Increase Your Income Through Wildlife Management," stop by the county extension office.

The Texas spring pig crop totaled 612,000 head, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This number is 15% below last spring's crop, and the number of sows farrowed was 90,000 or 13% lower than the spring of 1962. A further decrease in the pig crop was caused by a drop in the average size litter from 6.9 to 6.8 this spring.

Rule 3. All fat steers and fat barrows must be weighed under the supervision of the chairman of their respective divisions.

Rule 4. Exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper place previous to judging upon application to the superintendent of that division. If such classes have been judged, however, they shall not be reopened.

Rule 5. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Fisher County Fair Association, its officers or agents by or on behalf of any persons, firms or corporations, or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on the Fair Grounds or occupy any space thereon.

Rule 6. If any damage, loss or injury to persons or property shall approximately be caused by reason of neglect or willful acts of any person, firm or corporation having license or privilege to exhibit on said Fair Grounds, or occupying any space thereon, the Fisher County Fair Association shall in no manner be responsible herefor, and in case it is subjected to any expense or liability, all persons causing same are liable therefor, and shall indemnify the said Fisher County Fair Association at its domicile, Roby, Texas.

Rule 7. All owners of property or others having same in charge shall care for, guard and protect and preserve the same as the Fisher County Fair Association does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property.

Rule 8. All animals must be in their stalls by 8:00 a. m., Friday, August 30, 1963.

Rule 9. All animals must remain in their stalls until the end of the show, 6:00 p. m. Friday, August 30, 1963. Anyone in violation of this rule will automatically forfeit any prize money and be barred from exhibiting in this show for a period of two years.

The single judge system will be used. His decision shall be final.

No admission will be charged persons for entrance into the Fair Grounds.

No entry fee will be charged for livestock, crops, ladies' or educational exhibits.

Prize money and ribbons will be given to the various winners.

Residents of Fisher, Jones, Nolan, Kent, Stonewall and Scurry Counties will be eligible to enter the various divisions.

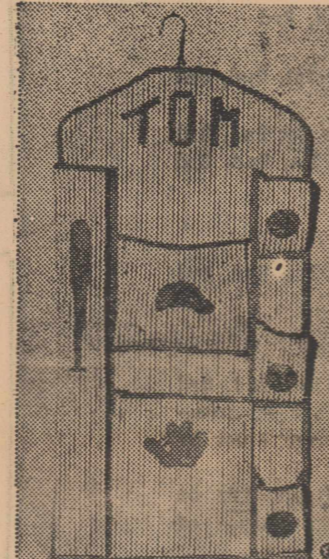
