**Cotton Harvest Getting Underway**

Cotton gathering started on a small scale the last few days with a total of the three local gins of 208 bales at noon Wednesday.

Much cotton has opened rapidly due to the dry hot weather and the crop has been cut short of earlier prospects.

General opinion of most of our cotton 'experts' now estimate Rotan to gin from 15 to 18 thousand which would be a fair crop for the dry summer.

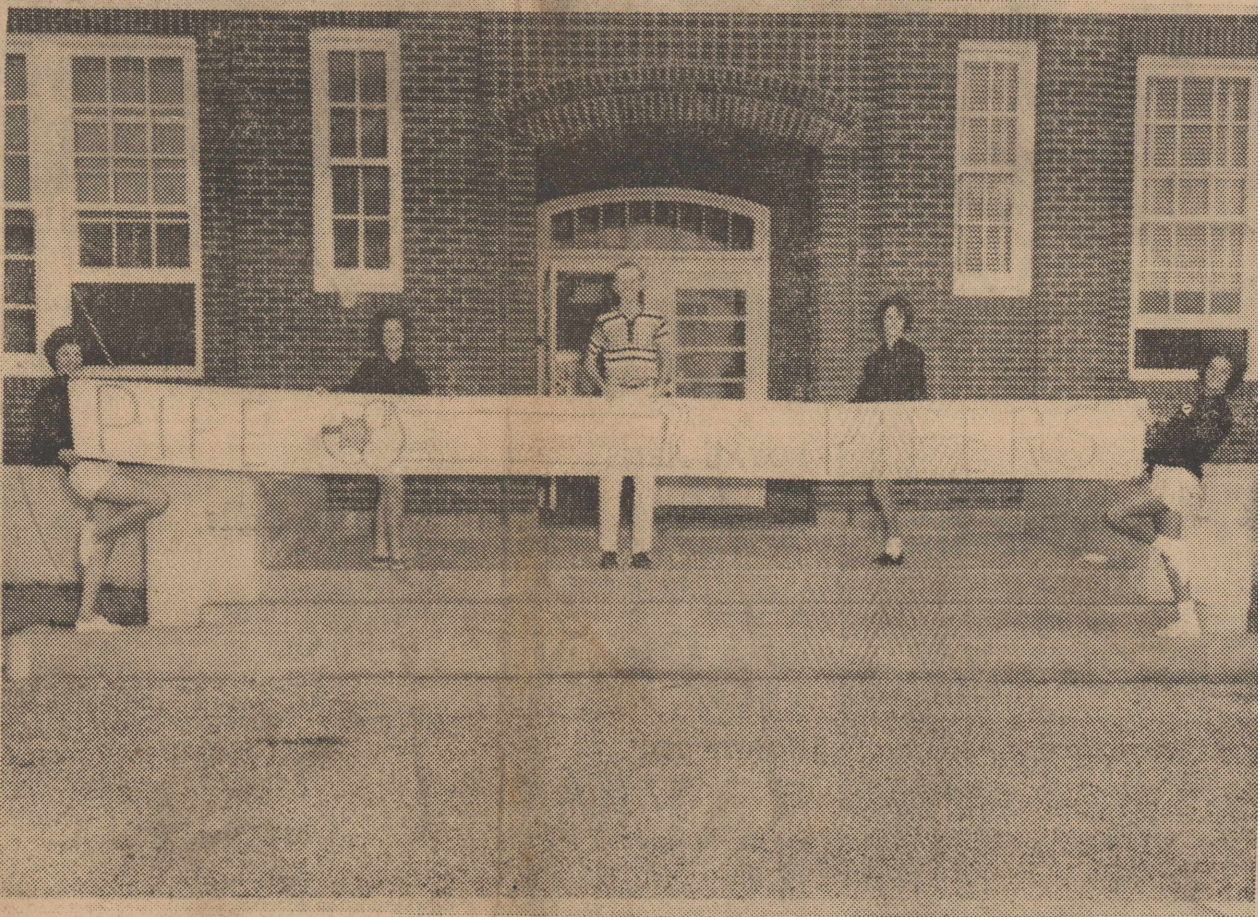

**Ready For Football Season**



**PP&K Contest Ready For Entries**

Rotan area grade school boys from eight through 11 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the nation in the third annual Punt, Pass, & Kick Competition which will culminate with a trip to Washington, D. C., for a White House tour, then to Dearborn, Michigan, and then an appearance at the National Football League Championship game for the top eight winners.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Division of Ford Motor Company and the National Football League, the Punt, Pass & Kick Program -- or PP&K -- will be staged in Rotan by Rotan Motor Co. with Yellowhammer Booster Club as local co-sponsors.

Rotan youths will be tested for their ability to punt, pass and kick (using a kicking tee) footballs on the same day as thousands of other boys all over the country, with warm-up jackets, football helmets and autographed footballs to be given as first, second and third prizes for each age group, or four top Rotan winners in all. Scores throughout the state then will be compared to determine the four top Texas winners, and these scores compared to determine the most skillful eight-, nine-, ten- and eleven-year-old fledgling football stars in each of the areas covered by the telecasts of the 14 National Football League teams.

Area winners and their fathers and mothers will receive all-expense-paid trips to a National Football League game in their area, and will compete during halftime to determine the four top Eastern Division winners and four top Western Division winners. These eight boys, accompanied by their parents, will visit Washington, D. C., where they will tour the White House. They will then travel to Dearborn, Michigan, and tour Greenfield Village. The entire group then will go to the site of the NFL Championship game, for half-time competition to determine the four national winners.

Ray Brown, owner, of Rotan Motor Co. pointed out that there is no body contact necessary in the competition, no charge for entering, and no special equipment needed. "Registration will be open from September 3 through October 11," he said, "with Rotan Motor Co. as the registration headquarters."

"In 1962, the second year of the PP&K program, 431, 921 boys entered the competition," he said, "and President Kennedy said 'Programs this type will enable our youth to build the energy and strength that is their American heritage.'"

Mr. Brown said entrants will be judged on the distance and accuracy of their punting, passing and kicking (using a kicking tee), with points awarded for each foot of distance the ball travels on the fly and subtracted for each foot the ball lands to the right or left of a

**Phillips Named Prexy Of Postal Group**

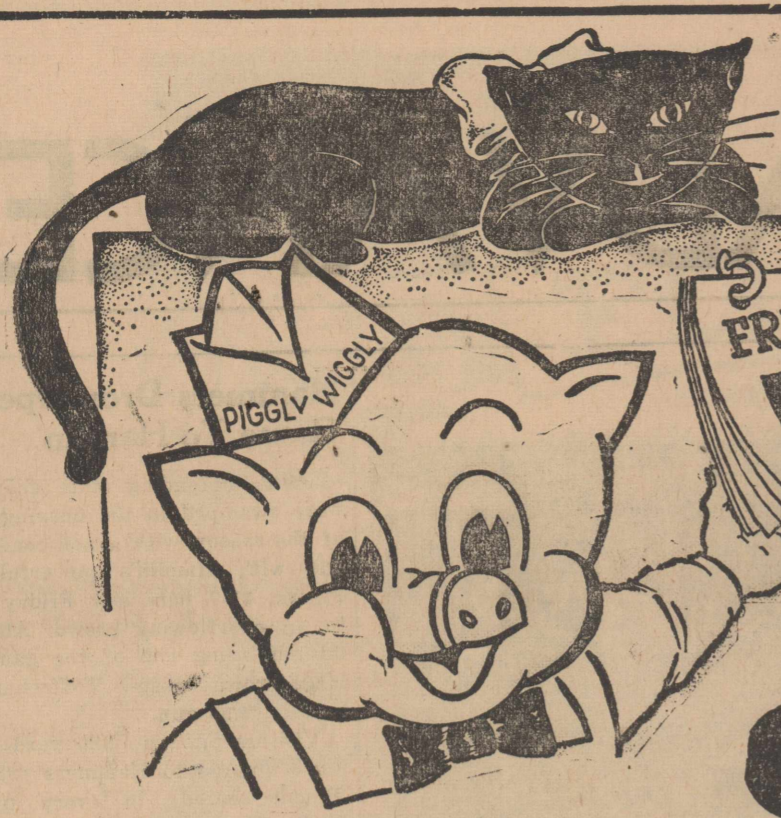
Postmaster Robert Phillips of Rotan was elected president at quarterly meeting of West Central Texas postal group meeting at Abilene Saturday night.

A search has begun for new physical methods to control the four most bothersome flies found on dairy farms, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The house fly, stable fly, horn fly and face fly are the insects under investigation by a team of USDA scientists at the new Beltsville, Md. fly laboratory. The research will study the use of light and other forms of radiant energy, audible and ultrasonic. They will also investigate improved sanitation and management methods that may be used in fly control.

The team of entomologists, agricultural engineers, and dairy husbandmen of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, will attempt to add to the scanty amount of research-development information now available on the physical control of flies.

Although complete control by physical means is not expected in the near future, their use as a supplement to insecticides could reduce the amount of the chemical controls needed. Physical means, if they were effective, available at reasonable cost and easy to use, would be better than chemical ones because they would leave no residue, says the USDA.

The scientists say the first step in the study will be to learn more about the basic behaviour and peculiarities of the flies themselves. They add that practical physical means of control probably won't be found for several years but that their main interest now is in light attractants which have been used for many years but are not yet very effective.

Home gardening is often at a low ebb during the fall, because of heat and dry conditions out there are some jobs that need to be done at this time, says James Franklin, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Annuals begin to look poor by mid-summer, and should be watered thoroughly during a dry period, says the horticulturist. Moisten the soil to a depth of about four or five inches and mulch the plants to conserve this moisture.

Cut faded annual flowers to prevent seed production since plants allowed to grow seed will soon stop producing flowers. Cutting annuals back drastically will help rejuvenate them, and encourage new growth which will flower and produce a new display of color, says the horticulturist.

Mildew, troublesome in late summer, can be prevented by covering the plants with a fungicide. These materials should be applied at the first sign of the disease.

Some shrubs need pruning at this time of year. The greatest error in pruning is to delay too long in controlling the form and size of young plants, he adds.

Light pruning of evergreens and roadleaf evergreens can be done during the summer to shape and control their size. The ultimate size of each tree should be known so that the owner can begin pruning soon enough to prevent plants from getting too large for the space in which they are planted.

The last few pounds that go on the beef animal are the most costly for the producer. As cattle become more highly finished, the daily gain decreases and the feed required per pound of gain increases. For maximum efficiency, slaughter cattle should be marked as soon as they reach the minimum standard for the grade.

Some poultrymen believe that the stress of modern high density housing makes poultry more susceptible to disease. But others say that it is equally possible that the changes in environment have provided better nutrition, not only for chickens, but also for previously harmless viruses.

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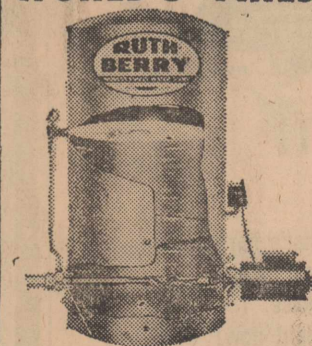
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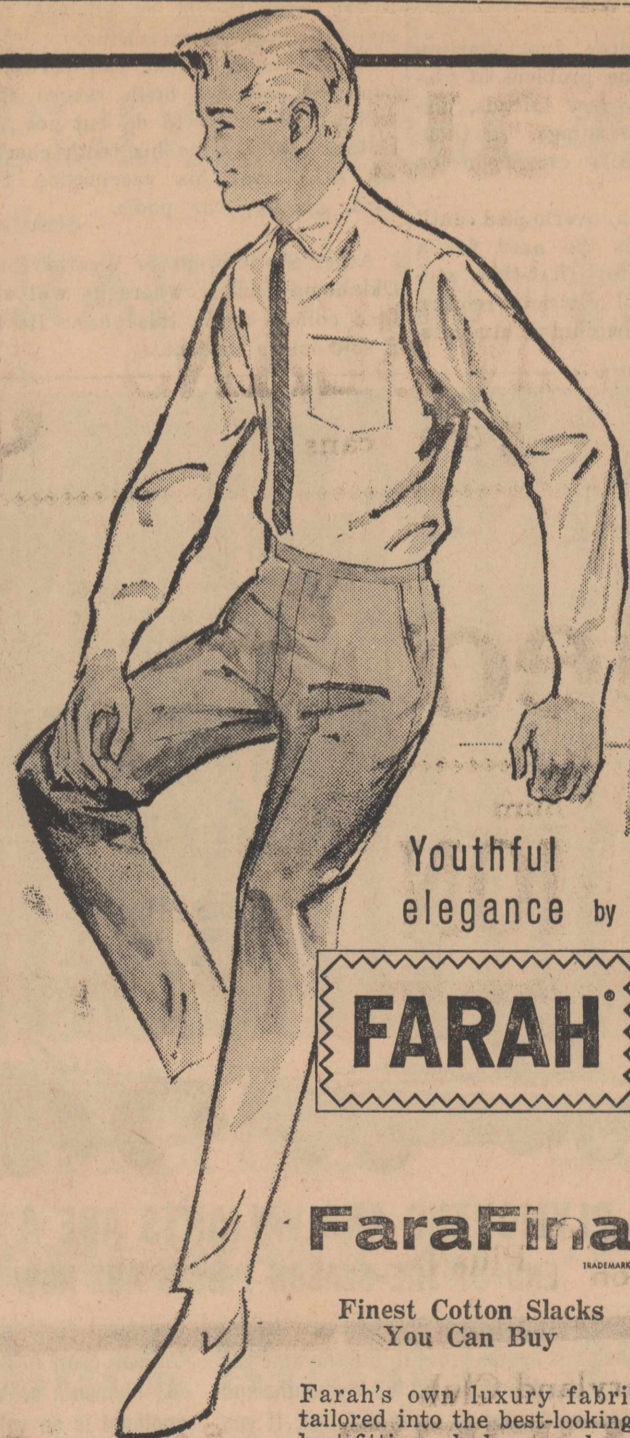

### New Inspection Stickers In Effect

Austin -- Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the new 1964 vehicle inspection sticker becomes available September 1 at all Official Inspection Stations in Texas.

"During the summer months, the department has conducted intensive re-training schools for all owners and mechanics of inspection stations," Garrison said. "These men are now qualified and they are ready to serve the motoring public in their vehicle inspection needs."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official stations between now and April 16, 1964. Operators of vehicles not displaying the new sticker by that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected at the earliest possible time and pointed out:

"Since the vehicle inspection program began in Texas, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle accidents has been reduced from 13 per cent in 1951 to five percent in 1962. We have every reason to hope that with continued voluntary compliance with this law, accidents can be further reduced."

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Smart mothers send for their certificate copies early to avoid the rush of late August requests which pour into county clerk's offices as well as the State Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.

Certified copies may usually be obtained from local county clerks and local registrars for a slight fee.

If unable to obtain a copy locally, a request should be made to the State Health Department as early as possible. The State fee, established by law, is one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50).

Most important aid for speedy service -- aside from getting requests in early -- is complete and correct information.

Parents should include the child's name, his place of birth, date of birth, and the parent's name -- including the mother's maiden name.

A special corps of summer "searchers" who seek out the proper birth certificate from a special "school" index permits quick service even during the burden of late August requests. However, a week to 10 days should be allowed for mailing time and servicing.

When mother gets the certified copy of Johnny's birth record she will have nothing to do but get his clothes ready, have his teeth checked, see about his vaccination record, arrange car pools.

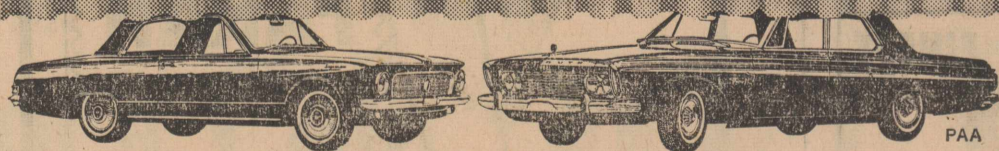

One detail often overlooked until the last minute is the need for a birth certificate for first-time students. Most school districts require proof-of-age for beginning students.

You hear it said that the boll weevil cannot be controlled, and yet there are some farmers in our territory who last year controlled the boll weevil and came out with a bale or more to the acre and they tell us they made money by systematic application of insecticides recommended for weevil control.

Right now the leaf worm is doing much damage to cotton in our territory. The leaf worm is also easy to control, in fact one application of one of the recommended insecticides will usually take care of the leaf worm.

We do not have an entomologist, we believe that any farmer who will take an hour each morning can ascertain if insect control is needed, and it is not necessary to count stalks, count damaged or punctured fruit, etc.
