Schcade Named P P & K Director

Rotan Yellowhammer Football Coach, Fred Schcade, has been named Competition Director for the Rotan Punt, Pass & Kick Program it has been announced by Ray Brown, owner of Rotan Motor Co., sponsor of the program in Rotan. Co-sponsor here is Yellowhammer Booster Club.

As Competition Director, Mr. Schcade will be responsible for all arrangements for the contest which puts boys eight through 11 against others in the age groups in tests of their abilities to punt, pass and kick (using a kicking tee) footballs for distance and accuracy. The Rotan competition will be held Saturday, October 12 at Yellowhammer Football Stadium.

"It is a great honor and pleasure to be asked to help make the Punt, Pass & Kick Program a success," Mr. Schcade said. "President Kennedy has said this type of program will enable our nation's youth to build their energy and strength, which is highly important; moreover, I know all the boys who enter will have a lot of fun, and I hope every grade school boy within the age limits will want to practice up and compete for the many prizes and trophies in this great national competition."

C. and Dearborn, Michigan, and a "play-off" at the National Football League Championship game for eight finalists, will be open from September 3 through October 11 at Rotan Motor Co.

Accident Near Roby Kills 1 Injures Four

A Longview man was killed and six other persons were injured, none critically, in a wreck involving four vehicles five miles east of Roby on U S highway 180 at 10:50 a. m. Friday.

Earl Henry Horton, 19, of Longview, died at Wilkinson Clinic Hospital shortly after noon from injuries received when the pickup truck in which he was riding, being towed by another vehicle, overturned in the path of a truck and trailer driven by Robert Hubbs of Hulbert, Okla.

Highway Patrolman Walter Wood said the small car driven by Orville Reese Harris, 53, who was moving back to Longview from Kermit, ran off the road and went out of control, overturning in the highway.

The pickup truck which was being towed overturned in the right lane of traffic as the truck driven by Hubbs approached.

Injured were both drivers Mrs. Ruth Harris, 36, Elaine Horton, 10, and Kay Horton, 7, Mrs. Harris' daughters, who were passengers in the sedan, and Frank Allen, 57, of Hulbert.

Harris received broken ribs and other injuries and the remainder of the victims were treated for lacerations and other injuries.

The busy highway was blocked by the wreckage for sometime. Sheriff Rollans and Deputy Hollabaugh and patrolman directed traffic around the accident scene.

Officers said Horton was thrown from the truck and the motor of the vehicle landed on him, crushing his chest.

The Hubbs truck, after colliding with the disabled pickup, struck the rear of the Harris auto, demolishing it.

The Hubbs truck was owned by Corrosin Service Inc. of Sand Springs, Okla., and was loaded with electrical equipment. It was towing a trailer loaded with a ditch-digger and tractor.

An increase in the screwworm population this fall must be prevented if early eradication of this livestock pest is to be realized, officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program emphasize.

Favorable weather conditions and shearing and other ranch operations usually result in a marked increase in screwworm infestations in both livestock and wildlife from early September through November.

Eradication machinery is poised to move quickly onto farms and ranches where screwworms are reported. Officials stress livestockmen should watch closely for infested animal wounds; they should have samples of the larvae and immediately report the discovery to the county agent or veterinarian.

The 19-month old program has already reduced the annual incidence of screwworm infestations by more than 95 percent. As fall operations approach, screwworm cases are at an all-time low for the season. For example, less than 75 cases were reported during August as compared to over 5,000 for the same month last year. Only two of those cases were reported in area of South Texas where screwworms can survive during the winter. This area must be kept free if eradication is to be achieved, officials said.

Several other factors are considered favorable for early eradication: First, the capability for producing sexually sterile screwworm flies is at an all-time high; more than 135 million sterile flies per week can be released to mate with native flies and prevent reproduction. Next, inspection stations, to prevent the transportation of infested livestock into the eradication area, are operating along the western edge of the area. A barrier to prevent reinfestation from Mexico is in operation along the U. S.-Mexico border, and finally, livestock inspectors are ready to deal with any emergency.

Eradication workers consider each new screwworm case an emergency situation. Increased number of sterile flies are released near areas where infestations are discovered. Livestock in the vicinity are sprayed and livestock inspection intensified in an effort to find other infestations that may be located in the area.

For all of these measures to be effective, however, full support and cooperation from livestock producers must be received, officials stress.

Mr. Burris Jackson, Chairman of the American Cotton Congress, has informed us regarding arrangements for a meeting in Dallas on September 26, featuring the European Common Market and the U. S. Cotton Industry under the sponsorship of the American Cotton Congress and the Dallas Council on World Affairs.

This meeting should be of vital interest to cotton producers, bankers and others interested in this matter.

A number of well informed people will be on the program to bring out thoroughly just what the Common Market means and its implications to this nation. Dr. Paul Henri Spaak, Foreign Minister of Belgium, and one of the world's greatest statesmen, will be the principal speaker at an evening dinner on September 26.

Arrangements for the dinner, including reservations and tickets, will be handled by General Philip H. Bethune, 2727 Oak Lawn Ave., Dallas, Texas. If any of you plan to attend and wish to participate in this dinner and hear Dr. Spaak, please make your reservations with General Bethune. Applesauce Recipe

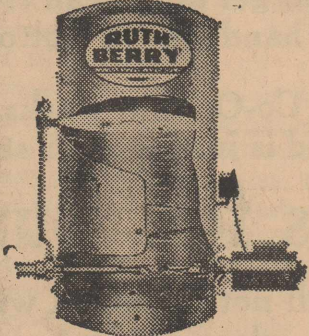
Jellied cranberry sauce is popular with turkey. Why not jellied applesauce with pork or other meat, in salads, as desserts?

This intriguing idea has prompted engineers M. E. Lazar and Arthur I. Morgan, Jr., at the Western Utilization research laboratory in Albany, Calif., to devise a processing method for Golden Delicious apples that produces a tasty, firmly jellied applesauce with a crunchy texture and an attractive golden yellow color.

Unlike products made with gelatin, this jellied applesauce keeps its firmness at temperatures up to 120 degrees F. It can be served on the same plate with other foods, even warm foods, with spreading.

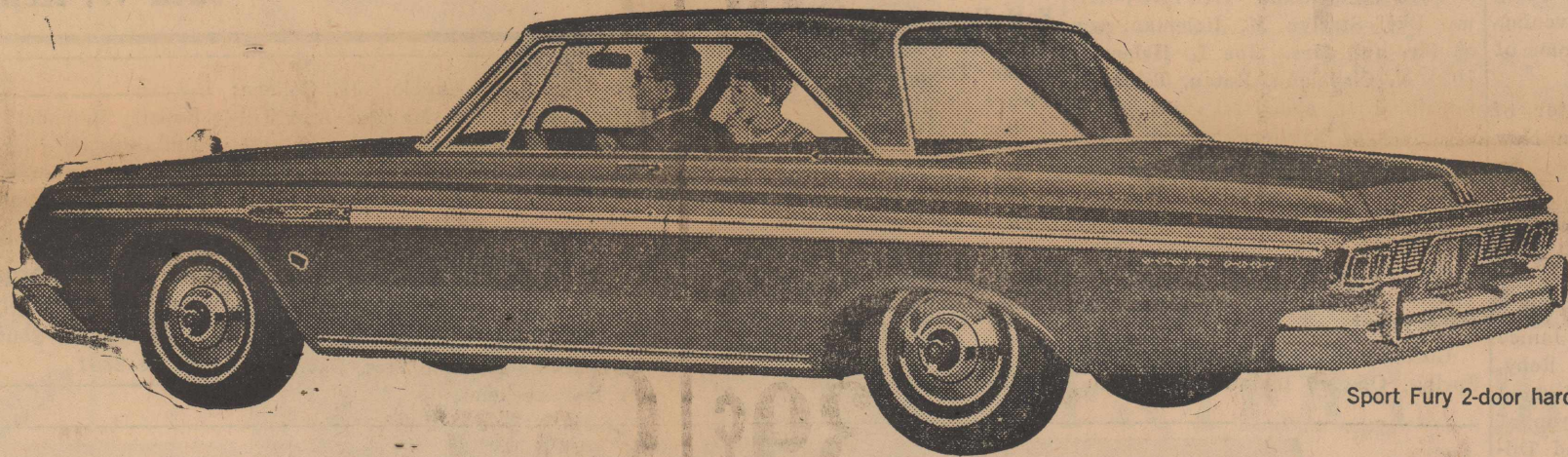

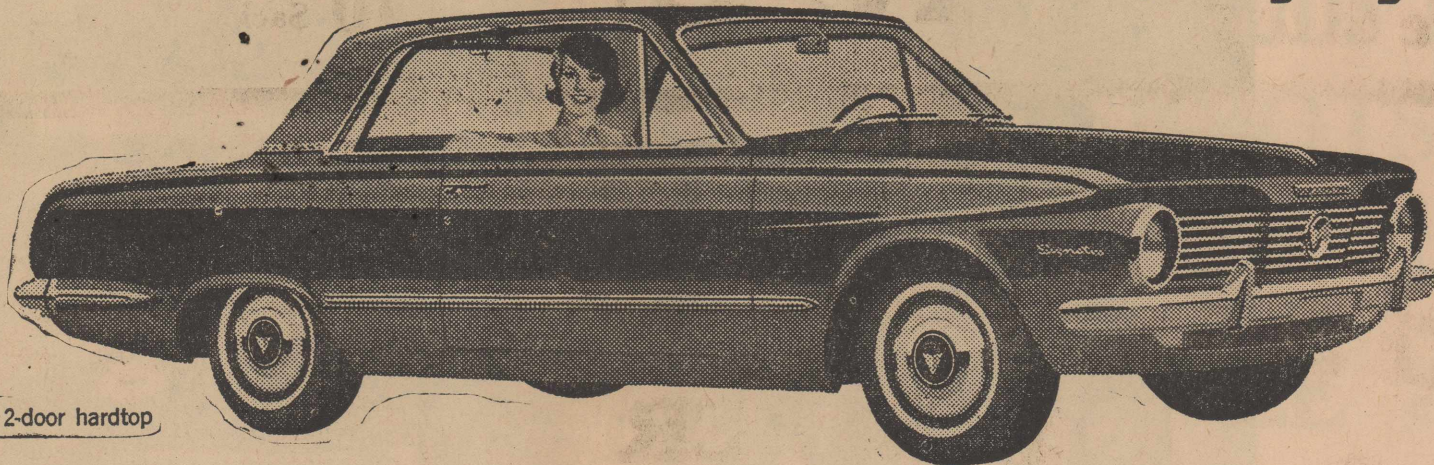

"God Speaks Through His Ministers"

PROOFS OF THE LORDSHIP OF JESUS CHRIST

John 5:30-40
In these verses we see the proofs of Jesus Christ being the promised Saviour. Four different witnesses are brought forward. Four kinds of evidence are offered.

First, the witness of God the Father. "I can of mine own self do nothing: as I hear, I judge: and my judgment is just; because I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which hath sent me. If I bear witness of myself, my witness is not true. There is another that beareth witness of me; and I know that the witness which he witnesseth of me is true." John 5:30-32, God is not going to bear false witness of His Son.

Second, the witness of John the Baptist. He was honoured by Christ because he honoured Christ. "Y sent unto John, and he bare witness unto the truth." verse 33. "He was a burning and shining light:" verse 35. John the Baptist was murdered and forgotten by the men of his day but not forgotten by Jesus. Yes Jesus Christ cares for people. He never forgets. We may be despised by the world but not by Jesus. The Psalmist says, "Our tears are all in his bottle." Psalms 56:8. When we are the lowest we

can still say with David, "I am poor and needy; yet the Lord thinketh upon me." Psalms 40:17.

Third, the evidence of the miracles. "The works which the Father hath given me to finish, the same works that I do, bear witness of me, that the Father hath sent me." John 5:36b. The miracles do not have their rightful place today as proof of the Divine Mission of Jesus Christ. Some say they simply are not possible. Others explain them away by saying they are only weak stories which are of no value. Call them what you will, they had an immense effect on the minds of men. They aroused much attention to Him that worked them. Men may doubt them now but no one pretended to doubt them 1900 years ago. Explain away the fact of the resurrection; it was the greatest of all the miracles.

Fourth, the testimony of the Scriptures. "Search the scriptures;" . . . Jesus says, "they are they which testify of me." John 5:39. This is a reference to the Old Testament because the New Testament had not been written as yet. This is an important truth that is much overlooked. Every part of the Bible is meant to teach us about Christ. Jesus is not only found in the Gospels and Epistles, Christ is found

directly and indirectly in the Law, the Psalms, and the Prophets. In the promises to Adam, Abraham, Moses and David. We minimize God's word because we are not faithful too, "search the scripture." Ignorance of God's word is the root of all error and sin.

Jesus says that even in the light of all this infallible proof most of us still refuse to come to Him for salvation. "And ye will not come to me, that ye might have life." John 5:40. A man once asked the Apostle

Programming, New Method of Teaching

This year in RHS two subjects, physics and trigonometry, are being taught by a new method called programming.

The physics students are in a class with chemistry students and work on physics assignments. Goals are set up by Mr. Kamstra, science teacher, to reach by the end of the six weeks and then a test is given over the material covered.

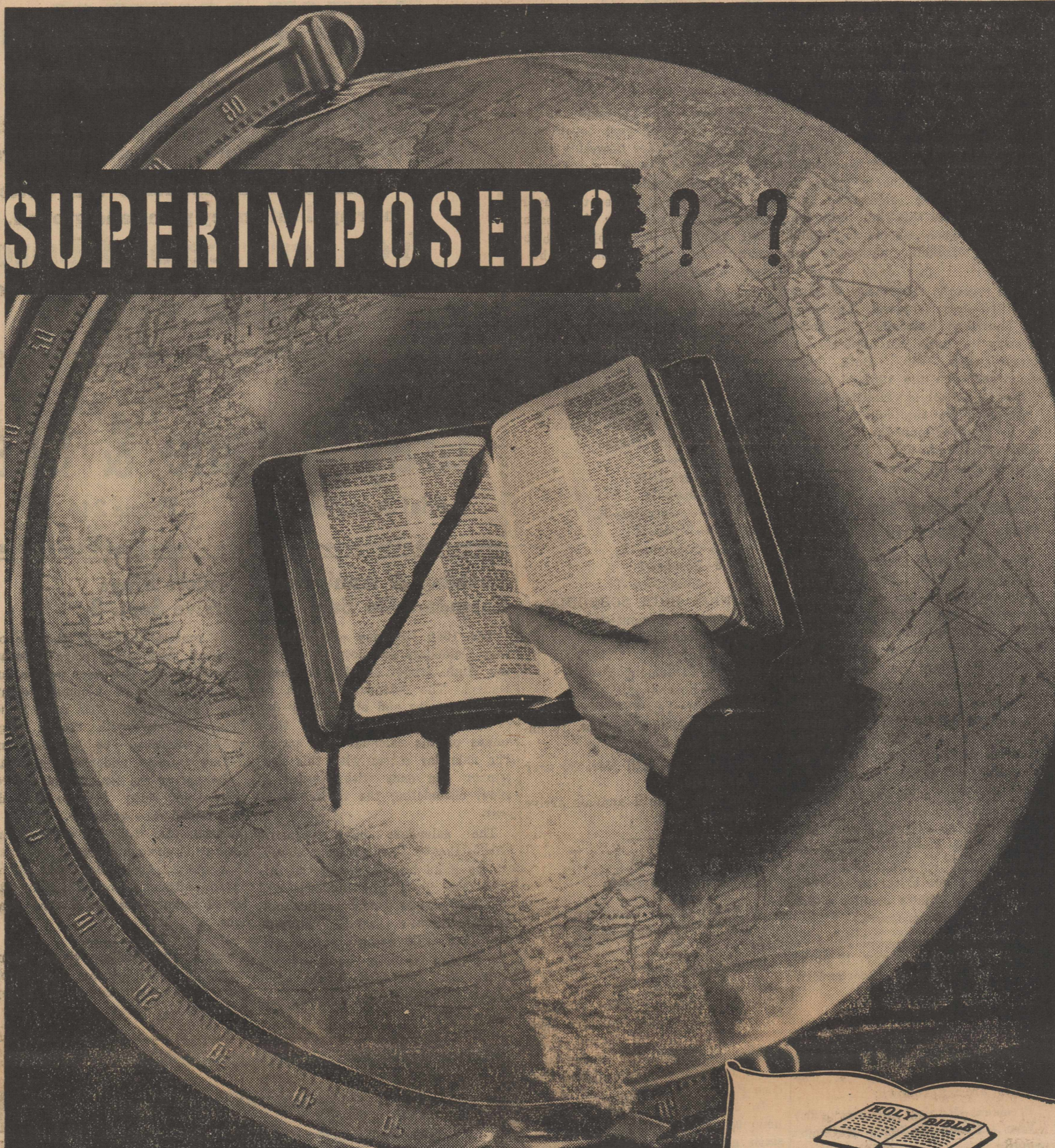
