Sardis Baptist Church Active For 67 Years

The following story on Sardis Baptist Church was written by Mrs. Maybell Parker, editor of Roby Star Record and we are indebted to her for this history of the Church. She did much research and interviewing in gathering information as little history had been preserved:

The Sardis Baptist Church, located southwest of Rotan has been in active existence since its organization in 1896. The organization of the Church, with the late Rev. I. N. Alvis, associational missionary of this area, acting as chairman, took place in the Chicken Foot school house which was located about a mile east of the present site of the church.

Rev. Alvis was called as pastor. Services were held in the Chicken Foot school house for a time, then later continued in the home of the Scott family. In 1898 it was decided to build a church house.

The late R. C. Cpane owned land in the area and deeded four acres to the trustees of the young church, G. A. Gulette and S. B. Ashley, for \$25. The deacons, J. D. Skinner, A. P. Kelley, George Boren and D. M. Hughes, with other members hauled the lumber for the building from Sweetwater and Merkel with mule drawn wagons.

J. F. (Bud) Upshaw, of near Roby and a present member of the Sardis Church, remembers being around 12 years old at the time the Church was built. One day he was told to take a team and wagon to Merkel and help with hauling some lumber. Because his team was the road. The men were well on needed to help clean out a well he was several hours late getting on the way before he could leave. When he was ready to go he realized he had no idea where Merkel was or how to get there. That, he recalls, was his first trip into the great unknown alone.

A. W. Kingsfield of Rotan and a charter member of Sardis Church was one of those helping to build the Church and one of the men hauling the lumber. He was a bridegroom of a few weeks when the work started and found it convenient to bring his and Mrs. Kingsfield's first cook stove out from Sweetwater on one of the loads of lumber.

Rocks for the foundation were gathered from the Cave ranch and from around Camp Springs.

It was decided to let the then oldest member name the Church. This was Mrs. S. B. Ashley, or Grandma Ashley as she was affectionately known. The name which she gave was held throughout the years.

The original building stood practically as first built until in 1928 when under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. Phil J. Little, Sunday School rooms were added. A number of the men who worked on the first Church helped with these improvements. Among them were A. W. Kingsfield, who is now 88 years of age.

A complete list of charter members are not available, however the following are known to have been charter members: D. M. Hughes and wife and daughter, Miss Roxie Hughes; J. D. Skinner and wife; Mrs. J. R. Pickett and daughter, Lula; A. P. Kelle, wife and daughter; A. W. Kingsfield and wife; C. C. Hawkins, J. B. Upshaw and wife.

Included in the long list of pastors serving the Church are the names, Dr. Frank Kiefer, C. B. North, J. M. Rankin, W. P. Shelby, A. J. Morgan, M. F. Richardson, J. D. Vaughn, Ben Etheredge, F. P. We will not give up."

Local Gins Pass Thousand Mark

Local gins reached the 1044 mark Wednesday with cotton gathering picking up during the week.

Continued dry weather and more transient labor arriving daily should speed up the harvest.

This is the time of the year to plant small grains, says E. Cole, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Many small grain producers in Texas have more than doubled their yields during the last few years by the use of fertilizer.

Small grain readily responds to fertilizer. The best way for a grower to determine the most profitable rate of fertilizer to use is by having his soil tested, says Cole. Now, before the grain is seeded, is the time to obtain a soil test.

Research has proven phosphate placed in the drill row with the seed at planting time. This can be done with a combination type drill.

Nitrogen should not usually be applied to small grain until it is well established. If the soil test shows a severe nitrogen deficiency, ten to twelve pounds of nitrogen can be placed in the drill row with the seed at planting time, explains the agronomist. Larger amounts of nitrogen at planting time could affect the germination and reduce the stand, he says. A spring application of nitrogen usually proves beneficial by increasing yields.

Results from the 1963 statewide grain performance trials are now available, according to Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist and small grain section leader, Texas A&M University. Performance trials for the northern Rolling Plains area are conducted by Keith A. Lahr at Texas Substation No. 12, Chillicothe, and by L. E. Brooks at Texas Substation No. 16, Iowa Park.

Recommendations of varieties are based on several years of testing and include, not only information on grain yields, but cold tolerance, forage characteristics, disease resistance, agronomic characteristics and, in wheat, the milling and baking characteristics.

Twenty-five varieties and strains of wheat were grown at Iowa Park and 36 at Chillicothe. Under irrigation at Iowa Park, Crockett yielded 53.4; Gage, a Nebraska variety, 49.8; Kaw 47.7; C. I. 13536, an experimental strain, averaged 47.0; and Tascosa 46.0 bushels per acre, respectively.

At Chillicothe, Kaw yielded 28.2; Newest Improved Triumph 27.9; C. I. 13536, and experimental strain, 27.3; Super Triumph 26.6; Scout 26.5 and Tascosa 26.3 bushels per acre, respectively. Performance trials over a period of years show that Tascosa, Kaw, Ponca, Bison and Warrior are among the best producers and also are of superior quality. Cockett, Improved Triumph and Concho are mellow gluten strength wheats which have yielded well.

Barley variety trials were seriously by low temperatures and their yields reflect survival. Among commercial varieties now available, the highest yields were produced by Rogers, Harbine and Kearney. Will, a new variety from Oklahoma, produced good yields but seed is not yet available. At Iowa Park it averaged 68.0 bushels, Rogers 61.2 and Kearney 54.7. Cordova and Wintex were seriously damaged by low temperatures averaging only 16.6 and 14.4 bushels respectively. At Chillicothe, Will averaged 23.8, Rogers 22.1, Harbine 20.9 and Cordova 13.8 bushels per acre. The most winter hardy varieties were Kearney, Chase, Meimi and Will.

Survival was the major factor in determining oat yields in 1963. All but the most hardy, were near failures. Two experimental oat strains, bred by J. H. Gardenhire of the Denton Substation, produced 92.4 and 85.5 bushels per acre respectively. Cimarron, Mustang, Winter Excel and Wintok averaged 85.2; 77.9; 77.3; and 63.8 bushels respectively. Less hardy varieties were nearly destroyed. New Nortex produced only 19.4 bushels.

Cold tolerance is extremely important in this area and the hardy varieties, Cimarron, Mustang, Bronco, Wintok and Winter Excel should be sown if seed can be obtained. Less hardy varieties such as New Nortex, Alamo-X, Moregrain and others may be grown but will frequently winterkill, Dr. Atkins said.

H. A. Turney, area extension entomologist, reminds us that fields which have been planted in small grain for the past three to four years should not be replanted to this crop, because of the possibility of winter grain mite damage. The rotation will help to control the destructive pest.

The winter grain mite builds up to damaging populations in late winter and early spring. The necessity of chemical control can be eliminated or decreased to a great extent by the use of rotation.

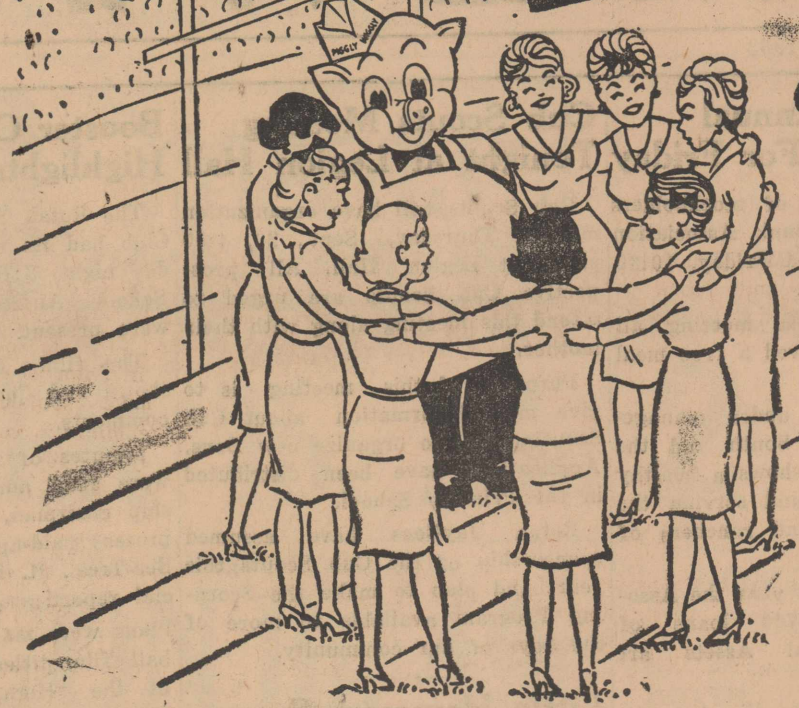

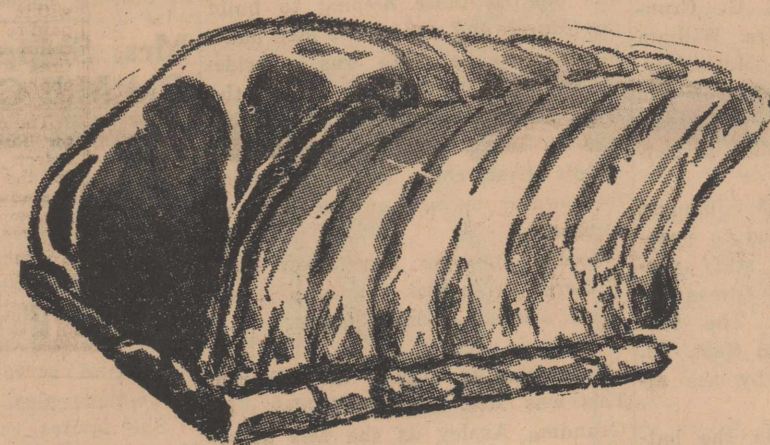

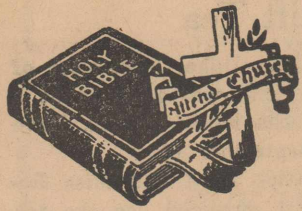

Sewing On Double Knit Fabrics

Need some information about sewing on double knit fabrics?

Double knits for home sewing are relatively new, although jerseys are familiar to most women, points out Mary Routh, Extension Service clothing specialist with Texas A&M University.

While no special skill is required to sew double knit fabrics, an understanding of their characteristics can simplify and speed the handling.

Select a pattern with few seams, a rather easy fit and no buttonholes. It is wise to avoid circular skirts and bias cuts, reminds Miss Routh. Weight of the double knit fabric should be chosen to conform to the design of the pattern. And if the knit fabric is "off grain" more than one inch, it should be straightened by pulling slightly on the bias while steam pressing it.

"All knit fabrics should be shrunk before cutting -- steam pressed at home or at the dry cleaners," the specialist reminds.

Double knits are made in tubular form and some are sold this way. Others are cut along the fold of the flattened tube and edges are overcast. The lengthwise edges should be examined before buying the fabric to see that they follow the grain line. In knits, the grain line is a continuous rib. In the finishing process, some tubular knits

twist as much as 4 to 6 inches. This cutting along the fold cuts across the continuous ribs the depth of the twist. To straighten such fabric will cause some loss.

"If the tubular knit has not been cut, baste along the rib the entire length of the fabric, refold on this baste line and pull the fabric into a flat shape as it is steam pressed," the specialist adds.

BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO PEACETIME VETERANS

You will find listed below a number of benefits available to veterans of peacetime service and the basic qualifications that must be met to be eligible. Although this list does not mention all benefits that may be available, it does list some of those that are inquired about most frequently. (Peacetime service simply means the following dates: all persons who entered military or naval service for the first time, on or after Feb. 1, 1955 have peacetime service as the Korean Conflict ended officially on Jan. 31, 1955. The second period of peacetime service was between World War II and the Korean Conflict, or after Dec. 31, 1946 and before June 27, 1950. The third period of peacetime service was between the two World Wars, or after Nov. 11, 1918 and before Dec. 7, 1941, when World War II started. The fourth period of peacetime service was after July 4, 1902, when the Spanish-American, the Philippine Insurrection and Boxer Rebellion Wars ended for all, except a few, and before April 6, 1917 when World War I started. Military occupations and expeditions are not war periods, but are considered peacetime service. A discharge from Draft in World War I were given to men not accepted for military or naval service, therefore they are not considered as veterans of a war period.)

AID FOR THE BLIND

Veterans in receipt of compensation for a service-connected disability and who are blind in both eyes may be eligible to receive dogs and or electronic and mechanical aids to the blind. The blindness itself need not be service connected.

BURIAL FLAGS

An American Flag may be issued to drape the casket of a deceased veteran who received an honorable discharge from the service and who served at least one complete enlistment during peacetime, unless discharged sooner for a disability incurred in line of duty.

BURIAL IN NATIONAL CEMETERIES

Peacetime veterans whose last period of service terminated honorably, whether by death or otherwise, may be buried in a National Cemetery.

HEADSTONE OR GRAVE MARKER

A headstone or grave marked is available for the grave of any peacetime veteran whose last period of military service terminated honorably.

REIMBURSEMENT OF BURIAL EXPENSES

Payment not to exceed \$250 towards a veteran's burial expenses may be granted if the veteran of peacetime service was in receipt of service-connected disability compensation at the time of death, or was discharged or retired from service for a disability incurred in line of duty. Also, additional costs of transportation of the remains may be allowed if the veteran died while: (1) Hospitalized or domiciled in a VA hospital or domiciliary; or (2) Hospitalized or domiciled at VA expense; or (3) In transit, at VA expense, to or from a hospital, domiciliary, or VA Regional Office.

DISABILITY COMPENSATION

Veterans of peacetime service may be eligible to receive VA compensation, payable at 80% of the wartime rate, for diseases or injuries incurred or aggravated in service provided they were discharged or released under other than dishonorable conditions.

HOSPITALIZATION AND OUT-PATIENT MEDICAL CARE

Veterans with peacetime service may only be eligible for VA hospitalization and/or out-patient medical treatment and dental care if they were discharged, retired or released from active service for a disability incurred or aggravated in line of duty or if in receipt of VA compensation for a service-connected disability, or if in receipt of retirement pay. They may also be entitled to the above benefits if they are applying for treatment for a disability rated by the VA as service-connected, even though it is noncompensable. Peacetime veterans, may also be eligible for VA domiciliary care if they are permanently disabled, were discharged for a disability incurred in line of duty, or receiving compensation, and have no adequate means of support and physically unable to earn a living.

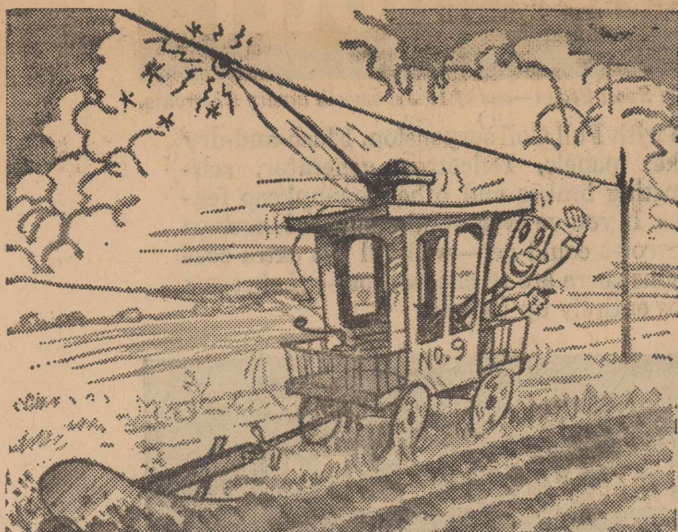
