Rotan Yellowhammers lost a 19-8 district game to Coahoma Bulldogs there Friday night.

The Hammers offense could not get going until the last quarter.

Coahoma tallied early in the second quarter after both sides had played deadlocked through the opening stanza. The first marker came on a 7-yard run by quarterback Marshall Williams to climax a 61-yard drive that started when halfback Eddie McHugh ran back a punt 39 yards from the end zone. Twenty seconds before the quarter ended, McHugh came back again with an 11-yard run around end, capping a 44-yard drive that started when McHugh intercepted a Yellowhammer pass. Ed Wolski kicked the extra point.

Coahoma scored again after an 88-yard drive midway in the third quarter on a five-yard run by halfback Travis Reid.

Rotan's lone score came with less than 90 seconds left in the game on a fourth-down play against a tight defense inside the five-yard line. Fullback Howard VanLoon carried the last two yards and Eddie Mac Lang ran around end for the bonus points.

The Hammers go to Roscoe Friday night and final game of the current season it at Jim Ned, Nov. 15.

### Mexican Killed In Fight Near Hobbs

A roadside fight a quarter of a mile north of the Hobbs School in Fisher County left one Latin-American dead of knife wounds and another in the Fisher County jail charged with murder.

Juan Sanchez, 21, who lived southwest of Snyder, was pronounced dead on arrival at Cogdell Hospital early Saturday morning. The fight took place about 1 a. m.

At first reports, it was unknown in which county the incident took place, and Scurry County Sheriff Earl Abercrombie and District Attorney Wayland Holt went to the scene as did Fisher County Sheriff, Bus Rollans.

When it was determined that the killing took place in Fisher County, Tony Silva, 21, who lives on North Avenue S in Snyder, was taken into custody by the Fisher County sheriff. Silva has been charged with murder at Roby.

The victim was on probation at the time of his death. He had been given a probated sentence because of his involvement in a stoofing several months ago at the county park in Thirteenth Street in Snyder.

Sanchez body was taken to Poteet, Tex. Saturday morning by Bell Funeral home. Services were held there Monday.

The victim is survived by his mother, Mrs. Juanita Alvera of Sinto, Tex.; his father, Cliseria Sanchez of Snyder; and five brothers, Joe, Roy, John, Rubin and Alberto, all of Snyder.

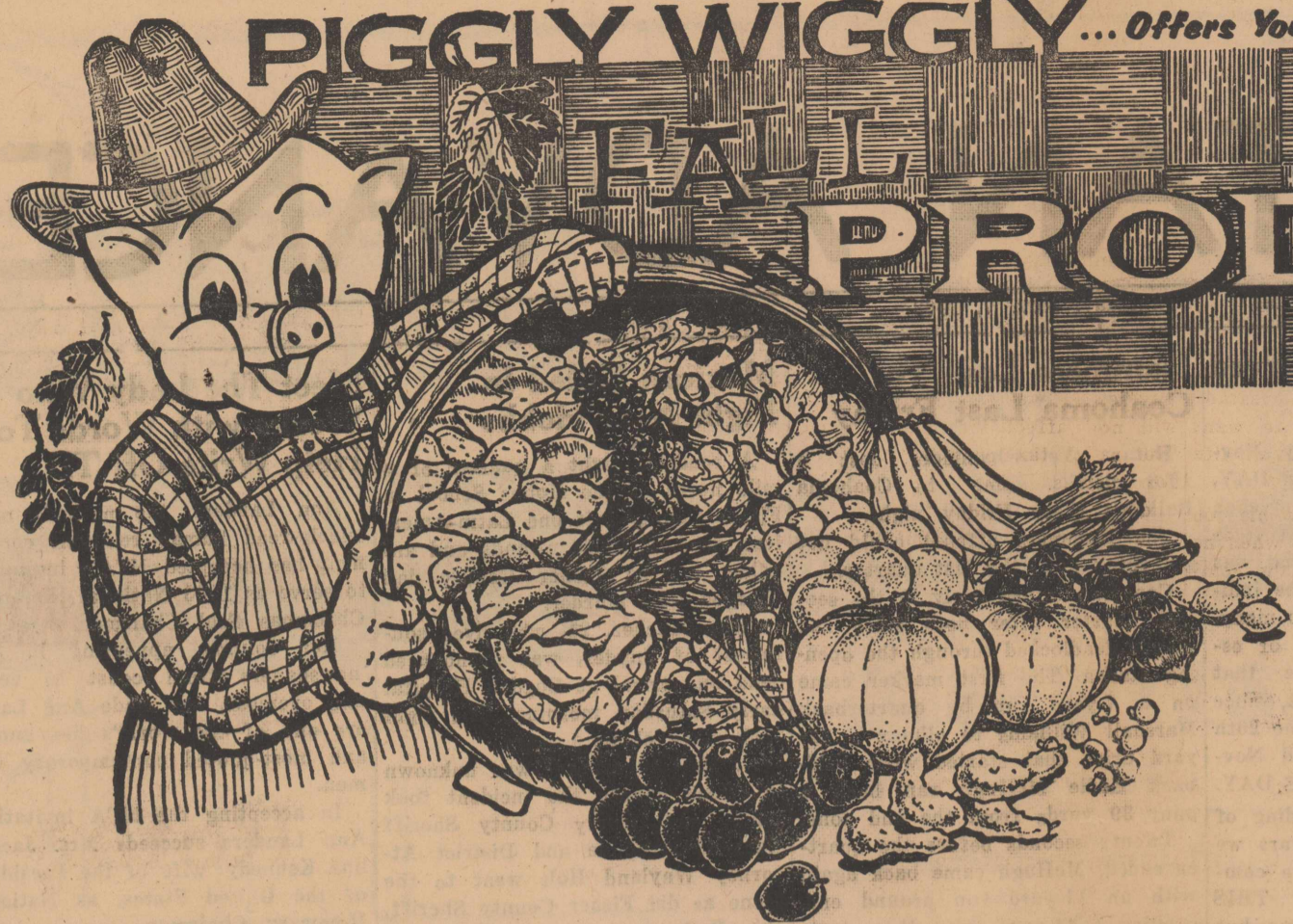
### Gins Near 12 Thousand

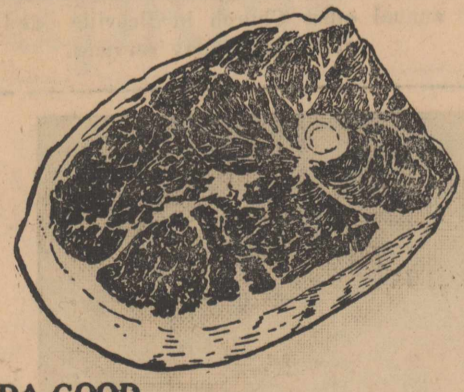

The marvel of new pasture plants, Coastal Bermudagrass, has impressed nearly everyone with its rapid growth and drought resistance. And now the full potential of this grass is being discovered by teaming it with fertilizer to produce yield beyond expectations.

A publication explaining how fertilizer and Coastal Bermudagrass can be combined profitably is "Partners for Profit" and was recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. L-602 explains that Coastal is an excellent plant for hay production because it has a low moisture content and cures into a high quality hay faster than most other forage crops.

The quality of hay produced is greatly affected by the time and frequency of cutting, according to the publication. Quality generally goes down rapidly after about four weeks of growth, although total tonnage may continue to increase. The publication recommends that hay be cut at this interval though some yield will have to be sacrificed to maintain the quality of the hay.

On well fertilized meadows, Coastal Bermudagrass should be 14 to 16 inches high by harvest time. Though Coastal makes maximum growth during hot weather, prolonged periods of adverse conditions reduce production, explains the publication.

The various fertilizer elements are discussed as to the response and needs of coastal Bermudagrass for them. Recommendations for fertilization are listed and some results of experiments on the use of fertilizer with Coastal are given in the leaflet.

The bulletin also lists some sound forage practices for Texas and some management tips for the production of hay from the grass. For more information on the winning combination of Coastal Bermudagrass and fertilizer stop by the local extension office in the courthouse and ask for a copy of L-602.

A new fire-retardant outside paint is being developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The new paint looks like ordinary paint and can be applied with brush or roller, says the USDA. But the paint's reaction to fire is entirely different.

When exposed to flame, the paint develops a thick, carbon-containing layer that acts as a fire-retardant, insulating barrier.

The experimental formations contain oil derived from tung nuts, an important crop in the Gulf Coast region, the Department says. Research that led to the discovery is being continued at the Southern Utilization Research Laboratory at New Orleans.

The scientists are now seeking formations that will require less paint for effective protection and still possess other properties desired in plants. No paint formulations or samples will be available for industrial testing until this work is completed, says the Department.

Cows milked four times daily produce nearly eight percent more milk than those milked twice daily in experiments conducted at the University of Minnesota. Investigators also discovered that cows would milk faster and hold less milk back if the machine rate was 70 pulsations per minute rather than 50 or less.

To prevent hens from laying eggs on the floor of colony type houses, pick up the eggs every hour and destroy the nests. If this remedy is started when the pullets begin laying, most floor laying can be cured before they come into full production.

A potential export market for over 60 million pounds of pork a year will be opened up to American producers when hog cholera is eradicated from the U. S. This market for some \$15.3 million worth of pork is not now available because 11 foreign countries bar U. S. pork due to cholera.

## Accent on Health

Austin - Did you know that it's possible for perfectly good teeth, with absolutely no decay, to simply fall out?

Teeth in excellent condition are often lost because the structure on which they rest gives way.

Teeth are not locked in the jaw, contrary to some beliefs. The rest in a springy hammock of gums and bone.

When this support becomes diseased and gives way, the teeth become loosened and may fall out if treatment is not started early.

Gum disease precipitating tooth fall-out is popularly known as pyorrhea. But the term is misused. Dentists apply pyorrhea to only one stage of a sequence of events grouped under the general heading of periodontal diseases.

While tooth decay is the chief cause of tooth loss in young people, periodontal disease takes a greater toll in people over age 35.

Add ten more years - or by age 45 - one of every two men is afflicted with periodontal disease.

Years ago, the disease was thought incurable. Now however, dentistry saves many teeth if gum tissues are treated in time.

Periodontal diseases usually start with gingivitis, or inflammation of the gums. Bleeding is a frequent symptom. Bleeding gums may be shrugged off as a fairly common occurrence. But dentists point out that this is symptom calling for attention.

Bleeding gums grow progressively worse if untreated, as a general rule, and lead to more serious involvement.

The gums, which ordinarily hug the tooth like the collar of a turtle-neck sweater, begin to fall away. Debris then works itself down into the pocket formed between gum and tooth. This leads to periodontitis with inflammation extending deeper into the tissues.

As disease progresses, pus pockets form and the springy hammock-like tissue - or periodontal membrane is destroyed.

Finally the root is affected and the tooth becomes loose. By this time, the possibility of saving the tooth is slim.

To keep your own teeth, develop a good strong pattern of dental care and have a prompt check-up when danger signs occur.

Ezekiel 33:1-6

NEXT SATURDAY-PLEASE VOTE

There is an amendment to change that old out-of-date \$1.75 poll tax. This amendment not to repeal but to reduce poll tax for registration instead of paying \$1.75 it will be 25c only. There are only 5 states that requires poll tax to vote and 45 states require registration only. And in 1964 election the Federal law will permit us to vote for all Federal officials without poll tax. But it will take a separate ballot at big cost to taxpayers as well as confusion. This will not affect the school revenue. The sales tax provides the money for schools.

### ORDINANCE

1. An ordinance providing for fire limits and regulations governing the construction, alteration, removal, demolition, equipment, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of buildings and structures.

2. An ordinance entitled: An ordinance to provide for plumbing inspections for all plumbing wherever water originating from the Rotan Municipal Water Systems: providing for Plumbing Inspector: fixing qualifications of Plumbing Inspectors: providing for adoption of the Southern Standard Plumbing Code: Fixing of water service: repealing ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith: declaring an emergency and for other related purposes.

3. An ordinance establishing minimum Health and Housing Standards: providing for an enforcing official: creating a Board of Housing Appeals: providing for the inspection of dwellings and remedies: and for other purposes.

4. An ordinance to provide for the adoption by reference of the National Electric Code Standard of the National Board of Fire Underwriters for electric wiring and apparatus for the City of Rotan, Texas, for creating the office of Electrical Inspector, for licensing of electricians and for other purposes, and regulating the installation of electric wiring and apparatus and other purposes.

The City Council met in Special Session October 1, 1963 and adopted the above captioned Ordinances. By this action the City has adopted by reference the Southern Standard Building Code, the Southern Standard Plumbing Code, the Southern Standard Housing Code, and the National Electric Code. These codes have been in effect since their adoption (Oct. 1, 1963) and all builders, plumbers and electricians should refer to them when building or doing repair work within the city limits. Fines of up to one hundred dollars may be levied for failure to comply with these codes, therefore the state law requires that the captions of the adopting ordinances be published.

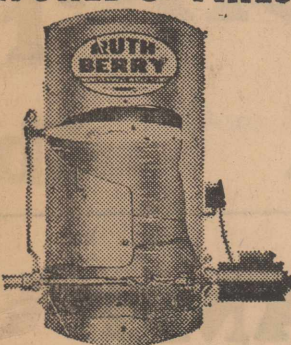
Most local builders, plumbers and electricians are already using these codes and are familiar with their requirements, therefore there will be only the following changes in the City's operations:

A. There is now a BUILDING PERMIT FEE of \$1.00 as well as the normal plumbing inspection fee of \$2.50 and the gas inspection fee of \$2.50.

The City staff will more actively enforce the existing ordinances making the stockpiling of building materials on the streets, parkways and sidewalks illegal.

C. All persons doing any type of plumbing work inside the City Limits, except on their own property, must have an appropriate state license, or be under the supervision of a licensed Master Plumber.

The Hobo Party theme was carried out in the decorations in the dining room, which featured a birth-

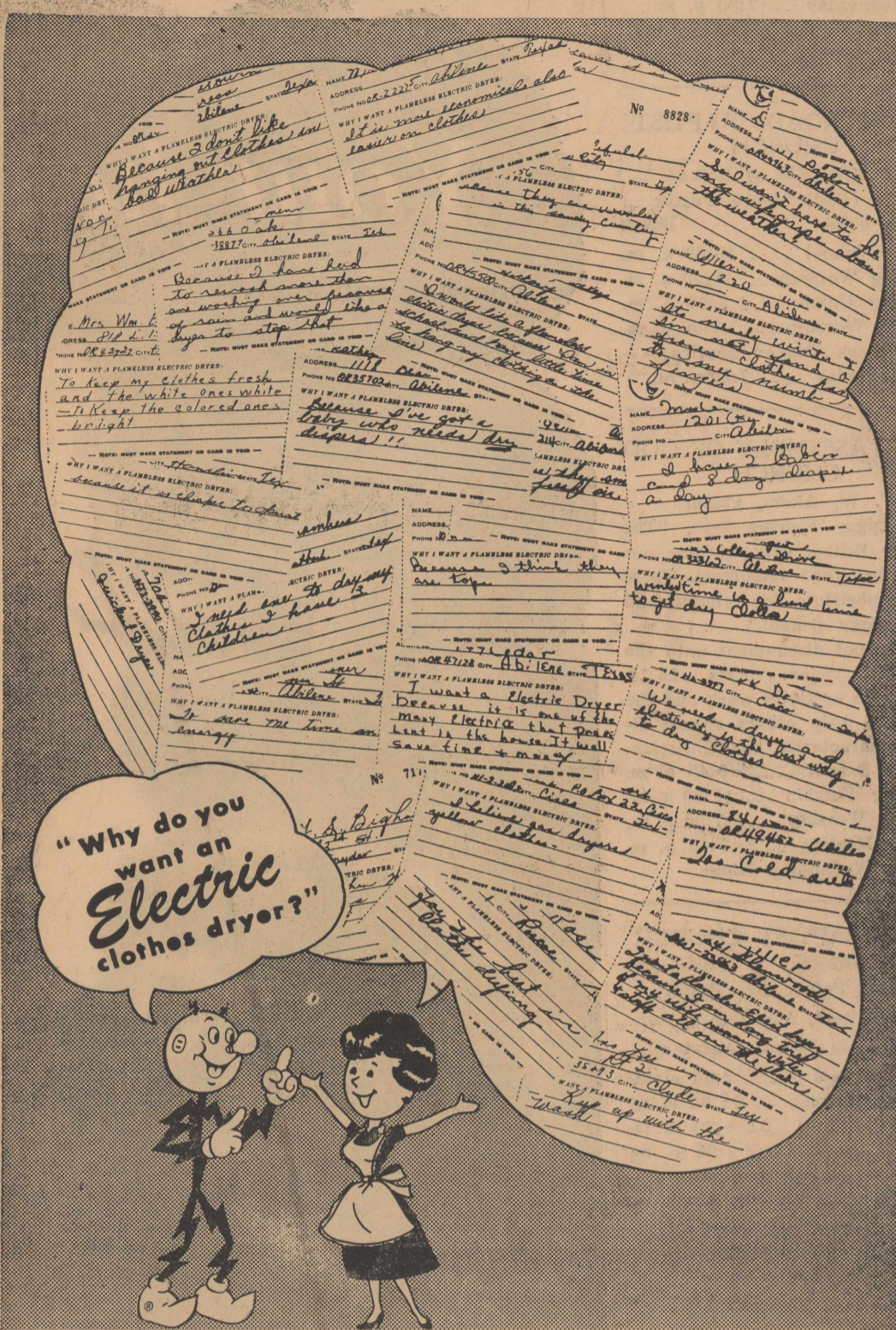
