'No Pit' Order For Fisher Oil Fields

The following press release was given in Austin this week:

"The Railroad Commission moved Friday to end salt water pollution of fresh water sources in six oil fields in Fisher County.

The commission ordered operators in the Pardue, Pardue West (Ellenburger), Toler, Judy Gail, Ida (Strawn) and Royston fields of Fisher County to end the use of unlined salt water disposal pits by June 4. Pits must be drained and filled with earth by that deadline.

In addition the commission cancelled all previous permits it has issued in those fields for the disposal of salt water through the annulus of an oil well and permits allowing disposal of salt water into strata shallower than the Flippen lime.

The action followed a complaint by W. B. Trammell, a rancher in the area, that his stock tanks were becoming contaminated. The hearing was held by the commission and the no-pit order followed."

Santa's reply to the children's note, to be delivered free of any additional charge through the courtesy of the Postal Service, will be a gaily-decorated card with an appropriate reply to please the children. All that is required is the child's note to Santa with regular 5c first class postage on the envelope, together with the ZIP-coded address and return address.

Postmaster Gives Mailing Information

Postmaster Robert Phillips issued the following statement Wednesday: "We are again asking your cooperation in our 'Shop Early - Mail Early' program for Christmas 1962. Many Christmas cards and gift parcels have already been mailed, and the Post Office Department expects a nationwide record mail volume of 12 billion pieces of mail during December, and we are expecting a sizable increase in local volume.

Fragile articles should be packed with at least 2 inches of cushioning material all around, and all articles should be well wrapped and securely tied to prevent damage.

Early mailing gives us time to get your cards and Christmas gifts to their destination in good condition with less chance of damage or delay because of the last minute rush period. You may endorse parcels "Do not open until Christmas."

The usual rates apply to the mailing of Christmas greeting cards as follows:

4c Third Class Rate: May be mailed anywhere in the U. S. must be left unsealed and contain no writing except sender's name.

If forwarded 4c additional must be paid by addressee. May not be returned to sender if undeliverable.

4c local rate for First Class mail dropped at the Postoffice addressed for delivering at the post office. May be sealed if desired, but if sealed, patrons should be sure mail is not for delivery on route as 1c additional will have to be paid by addressee.

5c First Class letter rate: May of course contain written messages. Will be forwarded at no cost if addressee has moved. Will be returned if undeliverable, if sender places return address on envelopes.

Remember "Mr. ZIP" will speed delivery of your cards, gift parcels, and letters. Use ZIP Code on all mail.

TB Christmas Seals

Every week my mail brings me dozens of letters like these: "Dear Ann Landers -- I am engaged to a girl who came down with Tuberculosis just before we were going to be married. She is in a hospital now. I don't want to marry anybody who has a disease. How do I tell her?"

"Dear Ann Landers -- I am trying to hold the family together and pay the bills while my husband is in the hospital with Tuberculosis. My boy is a teen-ager and he is getting to be too much for me to manage."

Most often Tuberculosis is viewed as a medical problem, a community problem, of a fund-raising problem. As my mail testifies, it also creates devastating mental, moral, emotional, and marital problems.

Tuberculosis costs this country at least \$700 million every year. Experts can see no drop in this enormous cost until the disease is reduced to the point where special control programs no longer are necessary.

The dedicated efforts of the Christmas Seal associations, health departments, medical and nursing professions, and community and social agencies have given us the means to combat and control this disease. Yet the battle continues, and tuberculosis remains a leading health problem in the world today... and one of the major communicable disease problems in the United States.

What still remains to be conquered are ignorance and apathy. This is a year-round job. We need to spread the word, TB and the problems that come with it can be eliminated if everyone pulls together.

The meaning of a "yes" or a "no" vote in the Dec. 10, referendum on cotton marketing quotas has been explained by W. L. David, Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

The Chairman explains the basic program choices as these: First, if at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop. Also, marketing penalties will apply to any 'excess' cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments, he says.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1964 upland cotton crop. Then price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Allotments are not affected by the outcome of the balloting, David says. They will remain in effect, whether or not quotas are approved, as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

David points out that, while the Secretary of Agriculture is directed by law to proclaim quotas for the next crop when the total cotton supply exceeds normal, it is the growers themselves who decide whether or not quotas shall be used.

Allotments for individual farms will be made available to growers prior to the December referendum, the Chairman said.

It is possible to double the per acre yield and double or triple the returns from cotton and at the same time, maintain a high level of organic matter in the soil, John Box, Extension Agronomist at Texas A&M, told those attending the Cotton Production Conference last month.

He outlines a program beginning with increased organic matter resulting from higher crop residues. This in turn would result in improved soil physical condition and better control of erosion. Balancing fertility by addition of fertilizer, based on soil tests would increase production, giving higher crop residues to complete the cycle.

Box emphasized however, that for such a program to work all of the steps necessary to good cotton production must be taken and at the right time. These include such things as insect and disease control, good seed and proper cultivating and harvesting practices.

Box was a featured speaker at the Cotton Production Conference held on the Texas A&M campus.

The birth of twins or triplets is always welcome by sheeplmen, and science has now discovered how to increase these multiple births, says Dr. A. M. Sorensen, of the animal husbandry department at Texas A&M University.

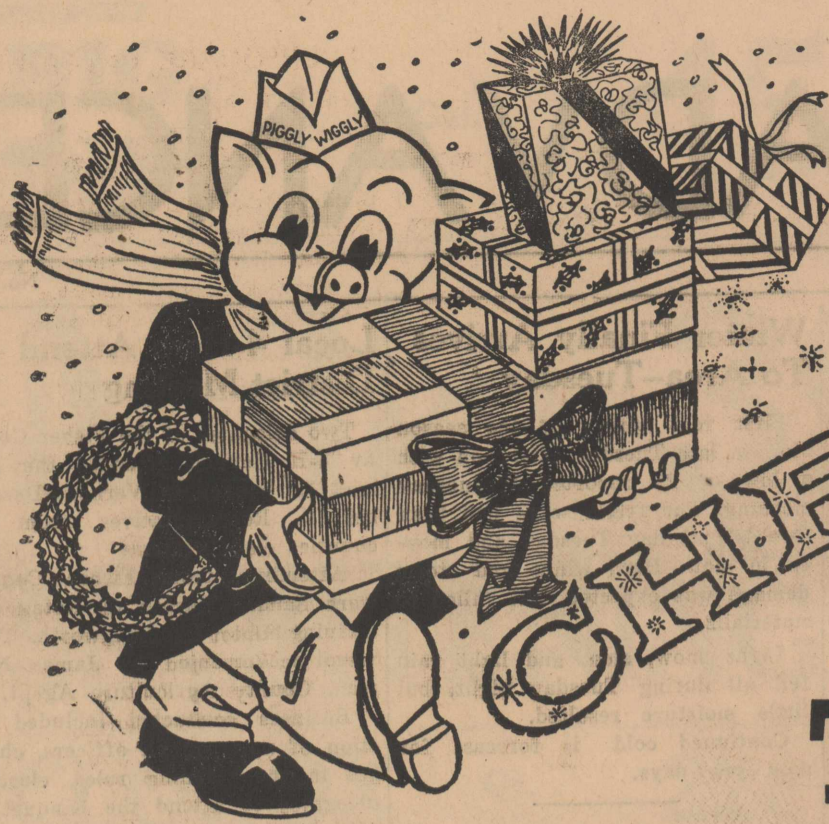
He explains that gonadotropic hormones, when injected into test ewes has caused a decided increase in the number of twins, triplets and other multiple births. The hormone stimulate the ovaries of the ewes to produce more eggs and thus there are more chances for fertilization and thus more young.

Lambs born from ewes receiving the injections were as strong, healthy, and vigorous as lambs produced by uninjected animals, according to the tests. This means that the method is a natural easy to increase the number of lambs born with no harm to the ewe or the lambs.

Dr. Sorensen predicts that this method will gain wider acceptance and use in this country as our agriculture become more intensive and as land must produce more and more. England, a country now farming intensively, is using hormone injections to increase lamb crops, he explains.

This is another example of how science is helping to increase the productivity of our resources.

"Referral to a State vocational rehabilitation agency of applicants for disability benefits under the Social Security Act is an important part of the whole disability benefit program," R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abi-

lene reports.

"While many applicants are so severely disabled that to the layman they would present no prospect for rehabilitation, the State office of vocational rehabilitation is successful in restoring a substantial number of such persons to self-support, both by therapy and retraining as well as by furnishing them with special equipment or prosthetic devices.

"In order to encourage disabled beneficiaries to make the effort to regain their independence and return to gainful employment, the law provides for a trial work period of as much as a year, during which the beneficiary's full benefits are continued," he added.

"If benefits are discontinued because the claimant is found able to work and later on again becomes

unable to work, benefits can be resumed immediately if the second period of disability is within 5 years of the end of the first period.

"In many instances disabled persons will, after undergoing a period of rehabilitation, be able to engage in only parttime activities. Whether the social security payments will be continued after such partial rehabilitation depends entirely on all the facts in the individual case," Tuley said.

Information on this and other provisions of the disability program may be obtained from any social security office. The office is located at 203 Fannin, Box 5168, Abilene 79605.

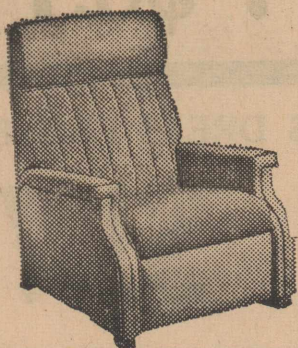

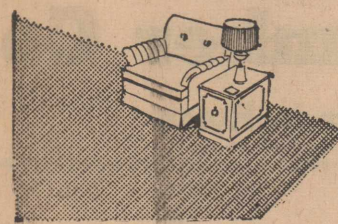

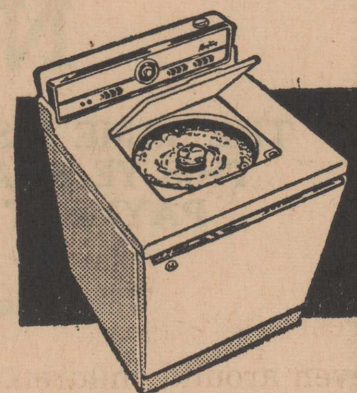
