Jaycees Sponsoring Decoration Contest

Rotan Jaycees announced this week that the Club would sponsor the 1963 Christmas Lighting and Decoration Contest. This contest formerly sponsored by Jaycee-Ettes has proved to be incentive in making Rotan beautiful during the holiday season.

There will be two divisions for the contest. One division will be for the stores and commercial buildings. Prize for this division will be the traveling trophy used by the Jaycee-Ettes. The original plan called for the trophy to be presented winner each year and any business winning the trophy for 3 consecutive years would be entitled to keep it. Lotief Dry Goods Co. won the trophy for 1961 and 1962.

Other division will be considered the home division. There will be no specific instructions or rules since many of these displays have already been put up. Any decorations or exhibits on doors, windows and in yards will be eligible if they are well lighted and easily seen from the street.

The Jaycees realize that the holiday season is already underway and the contest is getting a late start, but they promise to do a good job and will have capable judges. Everyone is encouraged to participate in the contest and there is no entry blank to be used, no fee is required, just a little work. The Club would like to point out that in many cases the most striking displays are created of very inexpensive materials.

Everyone desiring to participate in the 1963 Contest is asked to keep their displays lighted from 6 to 10 starting tonight, Thursday, thru Saturday, for benefit of the judges.
