## Heavy Snow Adds Good Moisture

The best snow in many years covered most of Rotan territory Sunday night. An estimated 6 inches was reported in Rotan and the fall was heavier to west and north. Several 'old-timers' say this is the best snow in amount and moisture content since 1927.

Fred Byerly gauged .62 inch moisture from the snow, bringing the 1963 total to 19.94. While this falls short of last year by some 3 inches, farmers tell us the soil is in wonderful condition. This was the third snow of the season and greatly added to the fair season that existed.

In spite of warm days some snow remained on north side of protected places late Wednesday, but most of it melted during Tuesday afternoon.

## Father of McDonald Dies December 15

The following article is taken from the Denton Record Chronicle in regard to death of George E. McDonald, father of George McDonald of Rotan. Mr. McDonald had many friends in Rotan, as he had visited his son and family here many times during past years;

George E. McDonald, 86, a long-time civic leader and retired pharmacist in Pilot Point, died Sunday afternoon, Dec. 15, in the Veterans Administration Hospital in McKinney following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Dec. 17, at 11 a. m. at the First Methodist Church in Pilot Point. Rev. Ed Painter, pastor of the Ponder Methodist Church, and Rev. Strader Taylor of the Pilot Point Methodist Church, officiated. Burial was in Masonic Cemetery in Pilot Point under the direction of Beck Funeral Home.

Mr. McDonald was born July 23, 1877, in Spanish Fort, Tex., to Mr. and Mrs. A. R. McDonald. He came to Pilot Point with his family when a small child. He married Miss Jessie Scott June 6, 1906, at Corpus Christi.

From a farm boy, he became a National Guardsman when the Spanish-American War began. He was appointed a second lieutenant in the National Guard by the governor of Texas.

He studied pharmacy in Pilot Point and Dallas, and returned to Pilot Point to open his pharmacy. He took his pharmacist's examination in 1905. He was a pharmacist in Pilot Point for more than 50 years.

He served Pilot Point as mayor for two years, was a member of the city council, and served on the school board for 13 years. He was a steward in the Methodist Church for 50 years and was church treasurer for 43 years.

He is survived by his widow and three sons, W. Scott McDonald, who is assistant city manager of Dallas, George R. McDonald of Rotan and Dr. Donald McDonald of Abilene; three brothers, Frank McDonald of Pilot Point, Lawrence McDonald of Denton and Lee R. McDonald of Everett, Wash.; eight grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.

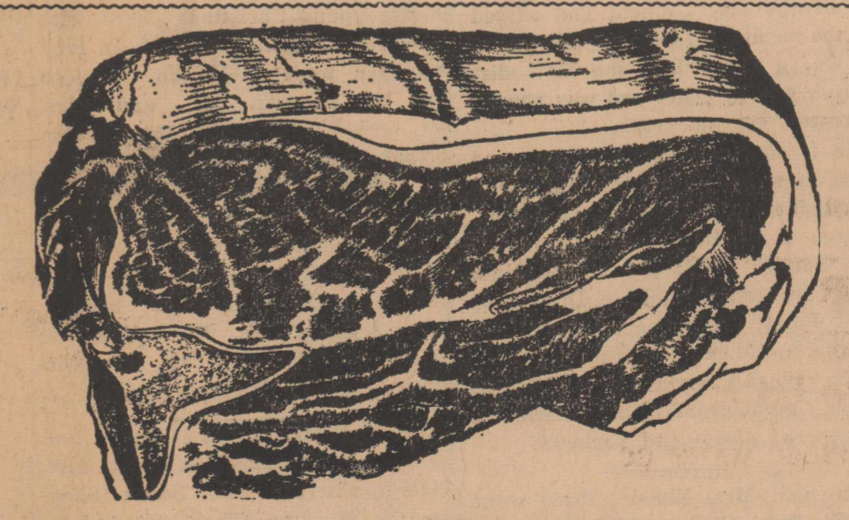

**Home Economics News Briefs**  
Freeze your leftover Christmas turkey, then magically produce it weeks later in tasty salads, meat pies and sandwiches, says Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Turkey frozen in large pieces will hold its quality a full month in the freezer. Smaller pieces or slices covered with gravy to keep out the air have a storage life of six months at 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

Fancy party sandwiches and hors d'oeuvres can be prepared a week in advance and stored in the freezer until party time, Extension food specialist say. Most meats freeze well, and so do cheese spreads, olives, pickles and nuts. But, they caution, avoid moist fillings such as egg salad and tuna salad, and don't use mayonnaise or salad dressing. Instead, use lemon, orange, or pineapple juice, milk, dairy, sour cream applesauce or cream cheese as binders in fillings. Spread the bread or pastry with soft -- not melted -- butter or margarine to form a protective coating. Thawing time before using will take about an hour at room temperature.

New on the market is a 100 percent cotton blanket in an open weave construction designed to serve either as a spread or blanket. The blanket weight about 3 1-2 pounds and is completely launderable.

"For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work should he eat." II Thessalonians 3:10.

"The world owes me a living; why work? Someone will take care of my family for me." "Something for nothing, that's my motto."
