Former Resident Wins Many Painting Awards

The following article from Houston County Courier, Crockett, Texas is in regard to painting awards of Kent Westbrook, a former resident of Rotan:

"Twice in less than a year, Kent Westbrook's paintings have been awarded top ribbons in local and state competitions.

"Kent began painting as a hobby last January, and since then has completed 32 oil paintings. Last spring he took a few lessons from Vi Nix. He does not paint from life, as his daytime hours are spent at Motor Fuel and Supply, which he and his father operate on North Fourth. "I paint from photographs descriptions given me by people and from memory," Kent paints very fast and says, "If I have to work on a picture more than a week, I consider it tedious."

Kent sees beauty and patterns in crude oil field structures, for he is a petroleum engineer and the adventurous spirit behind these mammoth operations of drilling captures his imagination.

It was his painting of an old oil well site, entitled "Po Boy Producer," which took a second place ribbon and a cash prize at the Dallas Fair in October, and was voted "Picture of the Day" for two different days by visitors to the fair. The painting also was in the local art show here earlier this year. While many of his paintings include derricks, his subject matter ranges from flower paintings to animals (especially horses), rugged landscapes, and portraits. Usually his work is identifiable by the use of strong, raw colors.

Kent received his petroleum engineering degree from Oklahoma University, after he grew up at Rotan, and graduated from high school there. He and his wife, Lanny live on North Ninth Street and have two little girls, Kate and Dixie.

Kent helped organize the Davy Crockett Art League and was elected its first president."

Judge McCloud In District Judge Race

Judge Austin McCloud, appointed by Governor John Connally as judge of the 32nd District Court, today announced his candidacy for election to the district judgeship.

The 34-year-old Colorado City judge, who has resided in West Texas for 25 years, is a candidate on the Democratic Party ticket, subject to the Democratic Primary.

District 32 includes three counties -- Nolan, Fisher and Mitchell.

McCloud, active in law, civic and church programs, has been 32nd District judge since last August when Governor Connally appointed him to fill the unexpired term of Eldon Mahon, who resigned to enter private business in Fort Worth.

"My candidacy," Judge McCloud said, "is based entirely upon my own merits and my personal concern for service to the citizens and communities of this 32nd District. "I shall endeavor, with my every effort, to maintain the respect and dignity which our trial courts must achieve in all legal matters.

"And, I assure you," Judge McCloud emphasized, "that I will serve with strictest integrity -- with fairness and impartiality to all."

McCloud, before being named 32nd District Judge, practiced law in Colorado City as a member of the legal firm of Ratliff & McCloud, and in Houston with Fulbright, Crooker, Freeman, Bates & Jaworski.

He was awarded his law degree, with honors, at Baylor University School of Law, Waco, after earlier receiving a degree in business administration from Texas Tech, Lubbock.

In law school he was recognized for his editorship of Baylor Law Review, awarded the Allen G. Flowers Memorial Scholarship, received the Vernon Law Book Award for legal writing, and was named to Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

Judge McCloud is a member of the board of directors, West Texas Girl Scout Council, active in Chamber of Commerce and Lions, has served as president of Colorado City Junior Chamber of Commerce and Mitchell County Heart Association.

He teaches a Sunday School Class for High School Seniors at Colorado City's First Methodist Church, where he has served on the Official Board and finance committee. In addition, he serves as a lay speaker for Methodist Churches in this area.

At the last State Democratic Convention, McCloud represented the 24th Senatorial District on the State Credentials Committee.

The judge is the father of two daughters, Melinda Lou, 9, and Sharon Lynn, 7. His wife, Mary Anne, teaches in Colorado City's primary school.

Questionable tree doctors, who not only take citizens for tremendous amounts of money but may harm trees, are being reported from across the state, says Wendell Horne, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Unfortunately these so-called tree doctors also give reputable silviculturists a bad name, says the specialist. These operators usually claim that they have secret formulas that will cure ailing trees of all problems. He may drive nails into the tree or spread some "revitalizer" around them. When asked about his cure-all, he usually explains that it is so new that research has not heard about it as yet.

Horne recommends that an unbiased authority, such as the local County Agricultural Agent, be consulted to diagnose the tree's ailment before bargaining with people that make such claims. It is also advisable for the home-owner to inquire about the operator's qualifications to work on trees. Most of the questionable operators usually have no formal training in tree care or plant pathology. The reputable ones are always glad to give their background and qualifications and are willing to backup their claims with scientific data.

Home-owners are reminded that there are no miracle cures for tree ailments, and when new treatments are found, research and educational organizations immediately make the information available to the public without charge.

Before spending money for the treatment of trees, make sure you are dealing with reputable operator and make certain that you know what is affecting the trees, emphasized the pathologist. Tree doctors who appear to be un reputable should be reported to the Better Business Bureau or the local Chamber of Commerce, he suggests.

Beef carcass research at Texas A and M University encompasses the identification of desirable carcass characteristics from the standpoint of quality, palatability and cutability.

"Cutability" is the measure of the edible meat which a carcass will yield, explains Frank A. Orts, Extension Service meats specialist.

Research at Texas A and M is designed to identify sires responsible for the production of carcasses which will yield at least 48 percent of the carcass weight in boneless closely trimmed chuck, rib, round, loin and rump.

Identification of these superior cattle will assure the homemaker of a steak or roast which is lean, yet very tender and tasty, Orts explains.

Quality and palatability characteristics being investigated are tenderness, color of lean and marbling.

Research also is being conducted at all the major livestock shows of the state to determine the estimated cutability of all high-placing steers. This information is being made available to county Extension Agents in an attempt to provide a yardstick for use in selecting steers for shows of the future.

Basic measurements which agents can use from this data are covering over the ribeye, fat thickness and overall cutability in identifying sires which have produced the superior carcass at the show.

A Brazoria County 4-H Girl, Ann Williams, has been named a member of the team which will make the 1964 4-H "Report to the Nation" in April during National 4-H Conference in Washington, D. C. 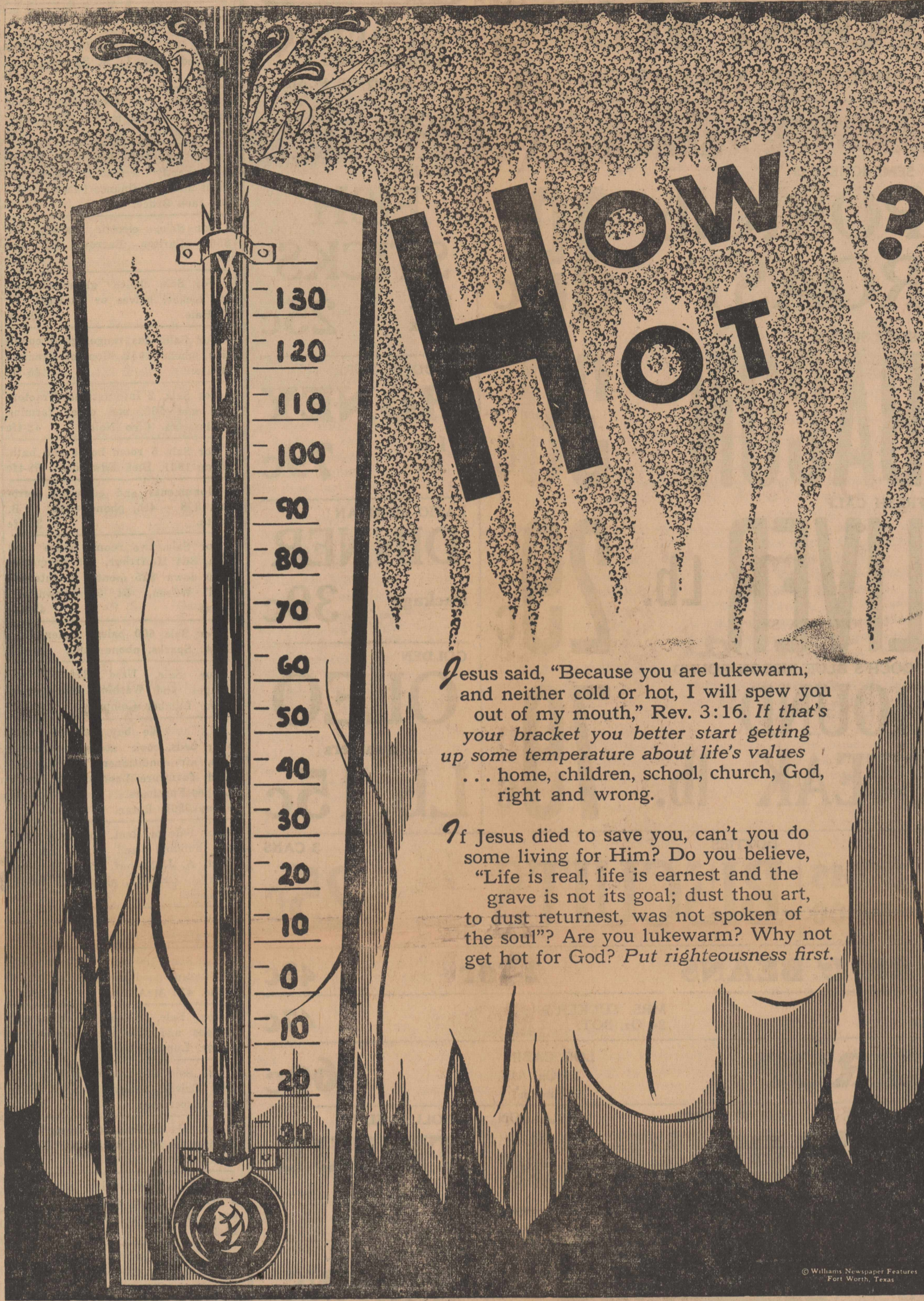

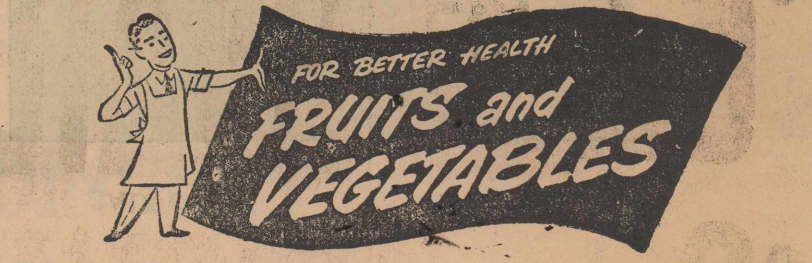

If You Are Swayed by Suede

You will receive dividends if you carefully inspect the suede garments you buy, says Fannie Brown Eaton, Extension Service clothing specialist at Texas A&M University.

This winter, the better coat houses are putting emphasis on quality and workmanship. Sportswear houses also are entering the suede market with less expensive garments. Some of their styles may look identical to those made by experienced craftsmen, and consumers may not be able to tell the difference until after six months to a year of wear. Some manufacturers cut coats individually, while others use mass production techniques. Coats made by the experienced craftsmen will hold their shape, while others may fail to do so after a time.

It is advisable to do a little comparative shopping before you purchase your suede garment, Miss Eaton suggests. Since genuine suede is so popular, manufacturers are producing more and more fabrics that look like suede but cost less.

When you purchase a suede or a suede-type garment, be sure to keep the manufacturer's care instructions, says the National Institute of Frycleaning. "The instructions will help your dry-cleaner," the specialist says.

Candles were lighted by Connie Baucum of Eunice, N. M., and Kois Diffe of Jal, N. M.

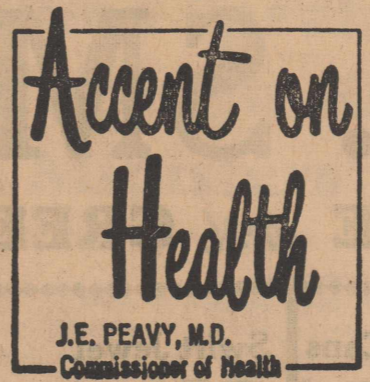

On-the-job injuries result from a psychological process, a study of some 300 industrial accidents indicates.

Analysis of case histories, according to a recent report by the American Medical Association, revealed certain patterns of behavior preceding mishaps.

In fact, these patterns were so sharply defined it may be possible, with further study, to predict and therefore prevent such accidents.

"Before the accident occurs," reports a current article in the AMA Journal, "there is a state of conflict and anxiety within the patient. As a result of this condition the worker finds a self-destructive, injury-producing act which causes his 'death' as a worker. From this moment the patient reacts exactly as do other psychiatrically ill people, except for the character of his symptom. Instead of having a presenting complaint of anxiety, depression,

or other classical psychiatric symptom, he has the physical disorder which is the result of his accident."

Typical behavior before accidents reflects many skilled workers suddenly doing things which even novices would not make the mistake of doing. Often, safety rules are broken and several infractions frequently occur at the same time.

For example, workers received injury after repeatedly walking through well-recognized and marked danger areas without wearing protective helmets. When asked to explain this conduct, the workers gave reasons that were "vague, or even silly, in every case."

Another pre-accident pattern uncovered by the study was a prediction of impending doom made by the worker himself.

Such foredoings have been observed previously in Air Force medicine with the result that flight surgeons and supervisory personnel were instructed to withdraw flying privileges at such times. In the future, plant medical officers may possibly make similar use of workers' forebodings, if by no other means than watching for a sudden increased frequency of sick calls.

These cases indicate that something threatening happens inside of a worker and he may seek pain or injury as a solution, researchers say.

Identifying these patterns as a part of the psychological process may open new avenues toward industrial accident prevention.

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Leather-Fabric Combinations

by Alice L. Kemp

Leather trim on garments and leather-fabric combinations are new on the fashion scene -- yet they can present a cleaning problem. This comment comes from Fannie Brown Eaton, clothing specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

Use special care when choosing and caring for such garments, she suggests.

Garments with piping or trim made of suede, grain or simulated leather require special cleaning techniques. Take the advice of the Extension Service and send such garments to a dry cleaner who is properly equipped and trained in leather cleaning and finishing.

A garment of fabric and grain or suede leather is rather expensive, so consider the cost of upkeep before you buy. Read the label on the hang tag and pass on the information given by the manufacturer to the dry cleaner.

When you buy, find out whether the leather is genuine or simulated. Most items of simulated leather must be wetcleaned, although some are labeled as drycleanable.

Other Extension suggestions for care of leather-fabric combinations are:

Don't let leather items become oversoiled before sending them to the cleaner. Inspect the garment before you have it cleaned, and call attention of rips or stains to the cleaner.

Send all pieces of a garment or ensemble for cleaning at the same time, so there will be no variation from one piece to another. Tell your cleaner how long you have had the garment and give him information on care included on the hang-tag.

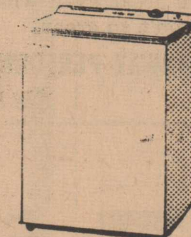

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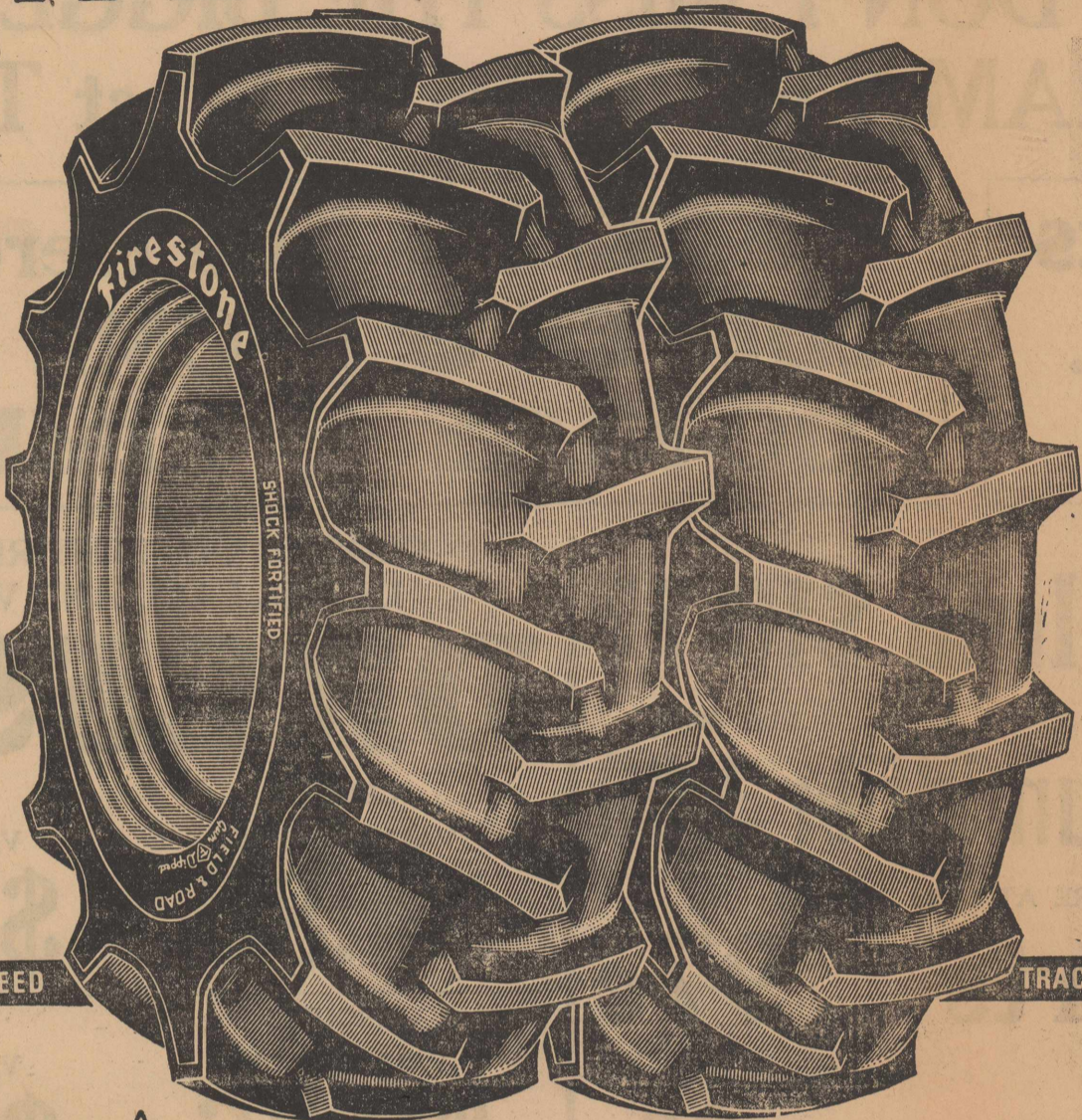
