Washington, D. C., January 11, 1964 - Congressman Omar Burleson has filed for reelection with the Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Fisher County for the Democratic Primary Election on May 2, 1964. Burleson was elected to the 80th and succeeding Congresses from the 17th District. He is Chairman of the Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives, and a ranking member of the Committee of Foreign Affairs.

Local Exhibitors To Show At Ft. Worth

Fort Worth (Spl.)--Among Rotan exhibitors in competition at the 1964 Fort Worth Stock Show is W. R. Noles with twelve sheep; Sandra Herron with a Hereford steer and Tarleton Willingham & Son with 6 Aberdeen-Angus bulls.

The 1964 Exposition, scheduled Jan. 24 through Feb. 2, will have an entry list topping 10,000, shown by exhibitors from more than 30 states. The open show livestock division figure alone is 3,983, exceeding last year's total for cattle, sheep and swine by more than 316 head. There will be nine breeds of beef cattle, 10 breeds of sheep and eight of swine.

The horse division of the 1964 Southwestern Exposition, again featuring the largest Quarter Horse show in the world, will have approximately 1,500 entries.

WTU Executive Changes Made

Executive changes in West Texas Utilities Company's management were announced following a meeting of the Board of Directors, Monday morning.

Effective March 1, S. B. (Si) Phillips, Jr., will succeed Cal Young as president. Also, J. F. Longley was promoted to Executive Vice President.

Si Phillips, a vice president since 1960 and an employee since 1939, will succeed Cal Young as the chief executive of the company. Young, who reaches the mandatory retirement age of 65 on February 27, will be elevated to Chairman of the Board. Phillips was also elected to the Board of Directors.

Young in commenting on Phillips' election as president said, "I feel he is bringing to this position the youth, vigor and ability it needs. He is well qualified and will make a very able president."

Phillips was born in 1915 in Portland, Oregon and later moved with his family to Newton Center, Mass. He is a graduate of Phillips Exeter Academy and holds a Bachelor of Science from Harvard University.

Before joining WTU at San Angelo, Phillips worked with Commonwealth Edison Co. in Chicago. Phillips brings to his new position a wide and varied experience in WTU's operation. He has worked in the District Office in San Angelo at the Concho Generating Station, and directed work of the Western Division of WTU's Farm and Ranch Development Service.

A veteran of WWII, he enlisted in the Army Air Corp at Goodfellow Field, San Angelo, in 1941. He served at the Pentagon in Washington and in the China-Burma-India theatre. He was released from active duty as a Major in 1946.

Longley has been with WTU since 1926. He is a native of Baylor County and a graduate of Texas A and M. Beginning as an engineer, he served successfully as chief dispatcher, superintendent of production and engineering and as vice president in charge of the company's district operations since 1955. He was elected a Director in 1953.

Young's career in the electric field spans more than 42 years. He joined WTU in 1924 and has served as president of the company since August, 1955. In commenting on his role as Chairman of the Board, Young said, "My role will be one of consultation and advice when it is needed and requested." Young has filled the top positions of civic responsibility in Abilene and was elected the outstanding citizen in 1960.

Lubbock Delegation Visited Here Wed.

A delegation of twenty-six Lubbock business men and Lubbock County citizens visited with a group of Rotan citizens at Gene's Cafe last Wednesday afternoon to present their reasons for claiming Lubbock the logical location for a State School for Retarded Children. Bernie Rushing, manager for Hemphill-Wells Co., Lubbock, was in charge of meeting and presented Bill Davis, Lub. County Judge, who with the aid of slides presented facts and figures to substantiate the claim that Lubbock is a better location for the school than any of the other thirty-six cities west of the 100th meridian desiring the school.

Chief of the points given was the geographic advantage of Lubbock, the accessibility of the city by railroad, by plane and by bus. Lubbock has 80 direct bus services and is within 150 miles of 64 percent of the population of the Texas area west of the 100th meridian whereas Amarillo is 150 miles to 41 percent, Odessa to 48 percent and El Paso to only 21 percent.

Other statements made were the local support being given the school if located in Lubbock. Several sites have been offered free of charge as well as many organizations have offered permanent services to the institution should Lubbock be the chosen site.

The delegation was enthusiastic and presented their case with efficiency and dispatch, concluding by asking the heads of different groups to present the facts to their organizations and consider sending resolutions pledging support to the efforts of Lubbock to locate the school there, to the State Board of Hospitals and Special Schools. They also invited individuals to give their assistance by writing letters advising of their desire for Lubbock to be selected.

Some time ago the Texas State Legislature authorized the establishment of a State School for Mentally Retarded west of the 100th meridian.

According to the Catholic Faith, Confirmation is the sacrament through which the Holy Spirit comes to us in a special way and enables us to profess our faith as strong and perfect foundations for the sacrament lies in Acts 8:14-17. "Now, when the apostles, who were in Jerusalem, had heard that Samaria had received the word of God, they sent unto them Peter and John. Who, when they were come, prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Ghost. For he was not as yet come upon any of them; but were only baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus."

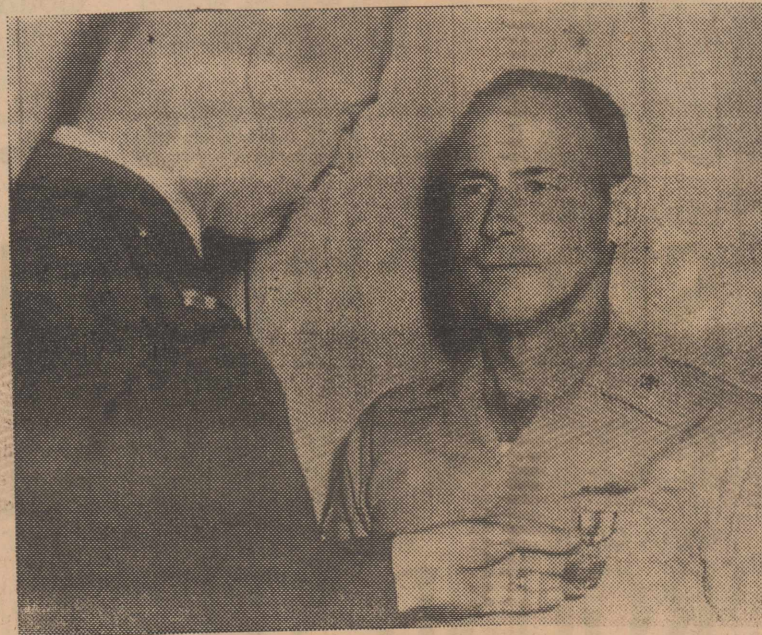
Only a bishop is empowered to administer the sacrament. However, in cases of emergency the faculty may be conferred upon a priest.

When giving confirmation, the bishop lays his hand on the head of the person he confirms, and anoints the forehead with holy oil in the form of a cross as he says: "I sign you with the sign of the cross and I confirm you with the chrism (oil) of salvation, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

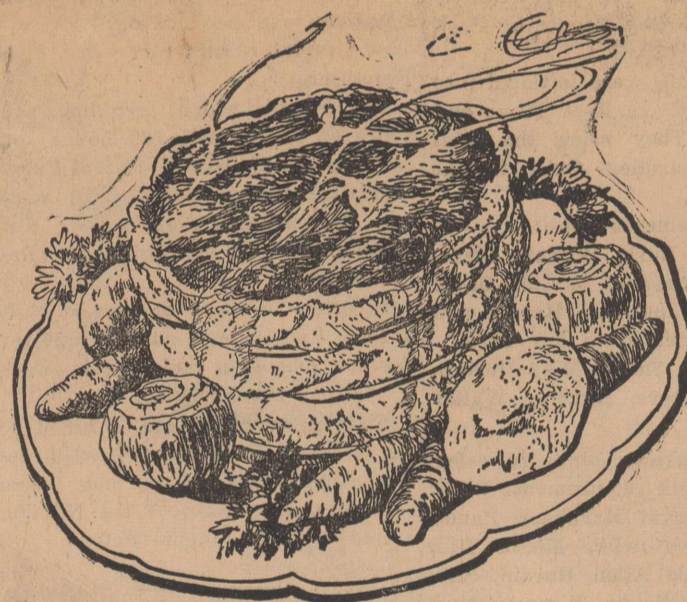

Anyone that has received one of these cards and is not physically able or if you have no way of getting to either the City Hall in Rotan or to my office in the Courthouse at Roby on Monday through Thursday get in touch with me and I shall be more than glad to come to your home and assist you with these cards.

Please do not forget the importance of getting these card back to the Veterans Administration. According to the Veterans Administration, anyone not getting this card back in by January 31, will have their pension checks stopped immediately and there is always the chance that said person will be considered as having been overpaid and will have to reimburse the Veterans Administration any overpayment.

Please do not forget these cards must be in the mail correctly filled in, by January 31.

Fisher County Gains Wildcat Test

Three J Oil Co. and C. A. Fischer, Abilene, have slated re-entry operation at a wildcat in Fisher County.

No. 1 Gabel Estate, a Rule 37 project, is located three miles northwest of Royston. It is spotted 2,310 feet from north and east lines of Section 8, Block 2, H&TC Survey and a 160-acre lease.

Operator will clean out to 5,500 feet with rotary to test the Strawn lime.

The project was originally drilled as Chester Hunter and Hemerich & Payne, Inc., No. 1 J. E. Gabel, et al. It was plugged at 5,528 feet in lime in June, 1960.

Vehicle Inspection Deadline Is April 15

Austin -- The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., today reminded Texas vehicle owners that the 1964 vehicle inspection deadline will soon be upon them.

He reported that some 60 per cent of the allotted inspection period has elapsed and only 20 per cent of the vehicles have been inspected.

"If this trend continues, vehicle owners can expect to have to wait in line in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April deadline," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas experienced its worst traffic fatality record in 1963 and vehicle defects were involved in some of these fatal accidents. He urged all Texans to begin the new year with safe vehicles and to keep them safe throughout the year. He added that vehicles involved in traffic accidents should be re-inspected after repairs have been made.

"Som 5,000 official inspection stations over the state are waiting to inspect the four million vehicles which will have to be inspected by April 15, 1964," the DPS director said. "There can be no extension of time, and after the deadline date of April 15, which come under the provisions of the Inspection Act which do not

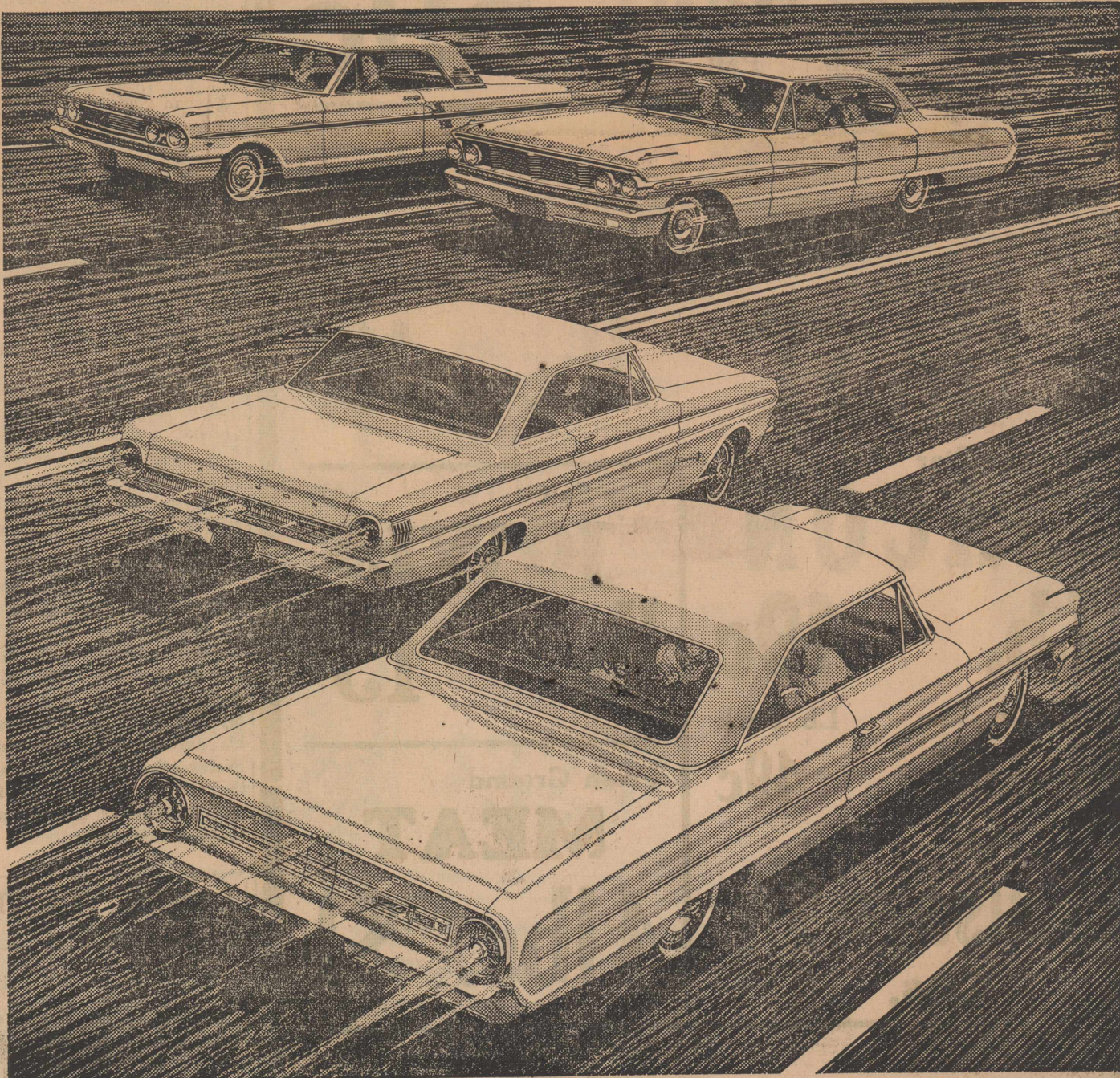

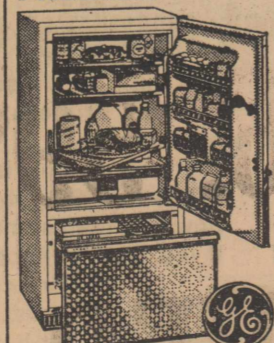

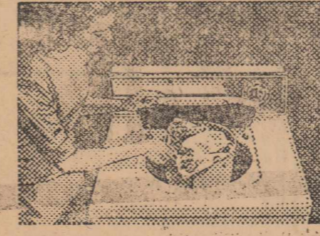

The Interesting Study of Rocks

A part of every year's science course in Junior High School is a study of the earth and its rocks. Mrs. Thomas' fifth and sixth grades have already completed this study. Mrs. Bridges' seventh and eighth grade science students will make their study of rocks in the near future.

Some very rare specimen were found by Mrs. Thomas' class. Rarely found in this area is the arm of a sea lily, which is a small prehistoric animal, but a fossil of this nature, over two million years old, was located by Gary Landes. Another fossil uncommon to this area that was found is a type of oyster, about 1-2 million years old. Other rocks were brought in and studied that are more common to this area, mostly types of gypsum or quartz: for instance, the rose rock, flint and chert.

A preview of a few of the rocks that Mrs. Bridges' classes will study included specimens from almost every corner of the U. S. Among this marvelous collection was obsidian from Yellowstone, a various assortment of flurite in pastel colors from the Big Bend country, and hard-anthracite-coal from Carbondale, Pennsylvania. Ignited by a trash fire, the coal under this city is reputed to have been burning for the last twenty years. Also included in the collection was a large quartz crystal from Arkansas, a lump of lava from New Mexico, silver from Kentucky, limonite from Massachusetts, and copper ore from Colorado. From the beautiful Sonora Caverns of Texas came quartz crystals; the interior of an ordinary appearing rock from Big Bend National Park produced a mass of shining quartz crystals. There were also pieces of petrified wood of different types of gypsum, including a lovely rose rock. However, the rock of most historical interest to our state was a piece of granite from a quarry near Burnett, Texas - the same quarry from which was taken the granite slabs that form the Galveston sea wall and also from which was taken the granite used in the construction of our own state capitol.
