Farm Bureau Week Is February 3-8

Waco -- (Spl) -- "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas will mark the beginning of an intensive campaign to boost membership in the state's largest farm organization, according to Wayne Little, director of organization for the Texas Farm Bureau. Three areawide membership rallies will be held Feb. 3 in Lubbock, Dallas, and San Antonio to kick off the organization's 1964 enrollment drive.

Gov. John Connally has designated that week of Feb. 3-8 as "Farm Bureau Week" to point up the importance of agriculture to the over-all economy and the necessity of having "an informed, prosperous, and organized agriculture in our state."

Little said that drive plans are aimed at hitting a new high membership record this year which will make the twelfth consecutive year for the organization to gain members. Another goal, he said, is to regain the standing of being the largest state Farm Bureau in the South and fourth largest in the nation, a position that was lost to Alabama last year when that organization edged ahead of Texas in membership.

Purpose of the three rallies is to provide the inspiration and information to accomplish the goals, he said. All county Farm Bureau leaders and volunteer membership workers are being encouraged to attend the meeting nearest them.

Some State Farm Bureau officials, including Little and TFB President C. H. DeVaney, will attend all three meetings, traveling by plane between the widely-separated points. In addition, each meeting will have a special speaker. Woodrow Luttrell of Chicago, director of the American Farm Bureau Federation's information division, will speak at the Lubbock meeting which will begin at 10 a. m. at the Holiday Inn Parkway. The Dallas meeting will begin at 4 p. m. at the Adolphus Hotel with Warren Newberry of Vernon, area field services director for the AFBF's Southern Region, as guest speaker. Highlighting the San Antonio meeting, which will be held at the Gunter Hotel beginning at 3 p. m. will be an address by Austin Crowmover of Waco, state sales director for the FB insurance companies.

In the official proclamation designating the special week, Gov. Connally pointed out that agriculture, including related service businesses and trades, provides employment for a large portion of the state's population. He also noted the "voice in state affairs" Texas have achieved through organization.

Following is the text of the governor's proclamation:

"Agriculture is an essential part of the economy of Texas and the United States. About 40 percent of all Texans derive their livelihood directly or indirectly from agriculture. Nationally, agriculture is our largest industry.

"American agriculture has advanced more in the past fifty years than in all the prior years of our history. The abundance of food and fiber, produced ever more economically by an increasingly efficient agricultural industry, helps assure our citizens of the highest living standard in the world.

"Through organized effort and by democratic procedures, the have sought and achieved a voice in State affairs and have campaigned for improvements in the economy and government of Texas.

"These groups recognize the necessity of having an informed, prosperous and organized agriculture in our State.

"Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas do hereby designate February 3-8, 1964 as Farm Bureau Week in Texas, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Texas Farm Bureau."

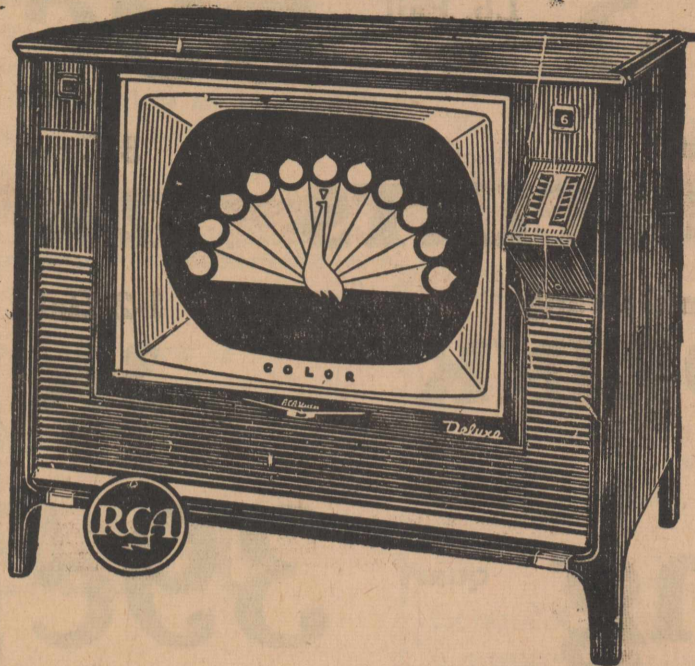
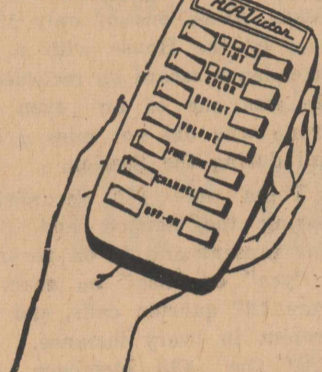

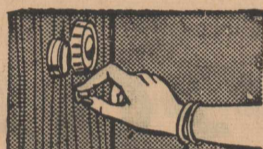

THE CHRISTIAN'S GOAL

One of the greatest faults of Christian people is to set for themselves goals which call for a reasonable amount of righteousness. A middle of the road approach to the spiritual life is considered to be good enough to meet the approval and example of most religious leaders.

But "what saith the scriptures?" Paul tells us in Phil. 3:13-14 that he set for himself a goal which is most radical. He set for himself a goal of making a higher grade on his spiritual report card than any saint throughout the ages. And this he intended to do by submitting his life entirely to Jesus Christ. Many of God's warriors ran the race well, but all fell short of Jesus command: "Be ye perfect!"

First, we must be perfect in moral righteousness. We cannot excuse ourselves in saying it is human to have moral failures. Our goal is to be more than any mere human has ever been. With our lives submitted fully to Christ we can surpass them all.

Secondly, we must have a perfect attitude. A person who is morally pure has a tendency to be proud. But Paul who leads the race thus far was humble about his own contribution giving glory to God. He was constantly forgiving those who hurt him, praying for those who slipped, and loving them all with a very tender love. Jesus would urge us to do better than this.

Finally, we must be perfect in purpose. Paul's goal was not just to be a "good old man." His purpose was not just to be nice and sweet and friendly. Paul's purpose was to do the will of God, and that purpose for us all is a missionary purpose. God sent His Son to save us. And He wants to send us to make that salvation known with a passionate concern.

The goal is staggering, but He says "Lo, I am with you always."

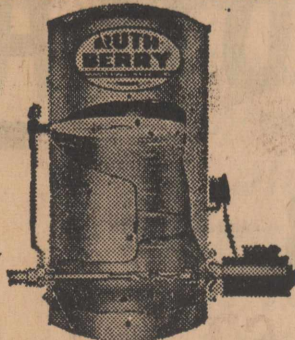

RHS Homemaker Of Tomorrow

Judy Whitefield is our school's 1964 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She achieved the highest score here in a written knowledge and attitude examination given Dec. 3, 1963. General Mills, Inc. sponsor of the program, will award her a "Homemaker of Tomorrow" pin to signify her achievement, and her test paper will be entered in competition for state honors.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship and will be named a national finalist. Her school will be presented with a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, awarded by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The state's second ranking girl will receive a \$500 scholarship.

In the spring, state Homemakers of Tomorrow, each accompanied by a school advisor, will enjoy an expense-paid educational tour to Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D. C., and New York City. The trip will be climaxed with the naming of the 1964 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will be chosen on the basis of her original test score together with personal observation and interviews during the trip. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. National runners-up will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

All-time highs in the number of senior high school girls and schools enrolled marked this, the tenth annual Betty Crocker Search program. More than 484,000 girls in 14,000 of the nation's schools participated. Since the program was launched, more than three and a half million girls have participated and scholarships approximating one million dollars have been awarded.

The Betty Crocker Search is approved by the National Association of Secondary-School Principals. Judging is by Science Research Associates of Chicago, nationally known educational publishing and testing organization.

Negro Enrollment

Negro enrollment has decreased in both high school and Junior High. Since the beginning of the school year, twenty Negroes have enrolled in high school. Twelve of these have withdrawn. Of the twelve Negro students enrolled in Junior High, six have withdrawn, leaving a total of fourteen Negroes attending Rotan schools.

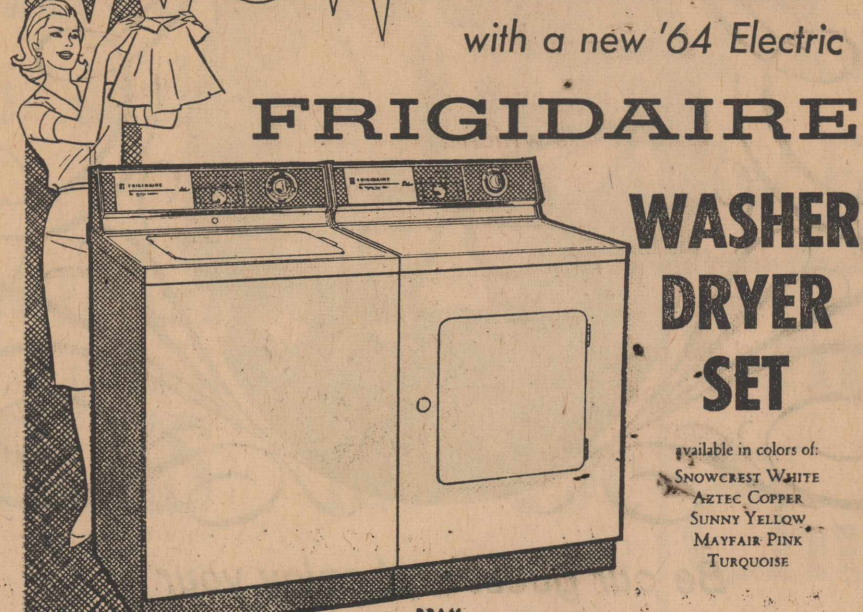
