Hobbs Baptists Plan Roll Call

Pastor, Rev. Royce Shoemate announced this week that the Hobbs Baptist Church will observe Roll-Call at the morning service Sunday March 1. It will soon be 42 years since the church was organized on May 14, 1922 as the Spring Creek Baptist Church. For a number of years the church had no building of their own but met in what was then the Dallas Community School House, which was located about two and one-half miles north-east of the church's present location. Of the original twelve charter members of the church only one remains, Mrs. Addie Scott who still teaches the ladies Sunday School Class. Mrs. Addie's father-in-law, Rev. S. L. Scott was the church's first pastor. Later a tabernacle was built on the present location. This was used as a meeting place until a permanent church building was erected in 1939 at which time the name was changed to Hobbs Baptist Church. The present brick auditorium was built in 1950 while Rev. Thurmond Upshaw was the pastor. As the church records were burned in the late 1930's it is not known the exact number who have been led to faith in Christ through the 42 years of the church's ministry. It is meaningful to recall that the first hymn sung by the newly organized body of 12 members 42 years ago was "Nothing But the Blood of Jesus." This song title suggests the message that the church has been faithful in proclaiming these past years, and still proclaims today. Each of the church's 118 residents members are urged to be present for this special Roll-Call Service Sunday. Each member will answer as his name is called from the Church-Roll. The subject of the morning message will be "THE PURPOSE OF THE CHURCH". A very fine service is expected for this Lord's Day.

Workshop On Recovering Lampshades

A workshop for the purpose of learning to recover lampshades will be conducted by Alice Kemp, Fisher County H. D. Agent, in March.

The purpose of the workshop is to teach homemakers how to recover frames of lampshades that need to be replaced. Many times a good lamp must be discarded because the present shade is too worn to use and it is impossible to purchase the correct shade for the lamp, therefore the lamp must be stored or discarded.

Frames to be covered must be metal frames with at least 6 ribs connecting the top and bottom rims.

The preliminary meeting for this workshop will be Monday March 2, at 2:30 p. m. in the Agriculture building in Roby. At this meeting, material to use, how to measure for material and equipment to use will be discussed.

The workshop meetings will be held on the following days, March 10, 12, and 17.

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School Board Okays Plans For School

The Rotan school board has approved preliminary plans for constructing additional facilities at the primary school.

The board also has called a school election for April 4 and extended contracts of three principals.

Terms of board members Dick Edwards and Bernice Hargrove are expiring. Both are completing three-year terms.

Administrators whose contracts were extended are Neil Wright, high school principal, Marshal Hill, junior high principal, and Mrs. Jewel Tillotson, primary school, principal.

The contract of school superintendent K. C. McCasland was extended through 1967 at the January board meeting.

Max Lovett, San Angelo architect, presented preliminary plans for the proposed school construction Tuesday night; final details are expected to be completed by the March school board meeting.

The board will then advertise for bids, with a contract expected to be let and actual construction started by mid-April.

The proposed brick structure to be located at the south entrance of the primary building will be connected to that building by an enclosed corridor. The new unit will include two large classrooms and a library.

The primary school expects to enroll around 500 students next fall, when integration in local schools will be completed. Present facilities at the primary school are already over-taxed, with one fourth grade class meeting in the Junior High building this year.

Cost of proposed new building will be around \$40,000. The project will be paid for out of existing school funds.

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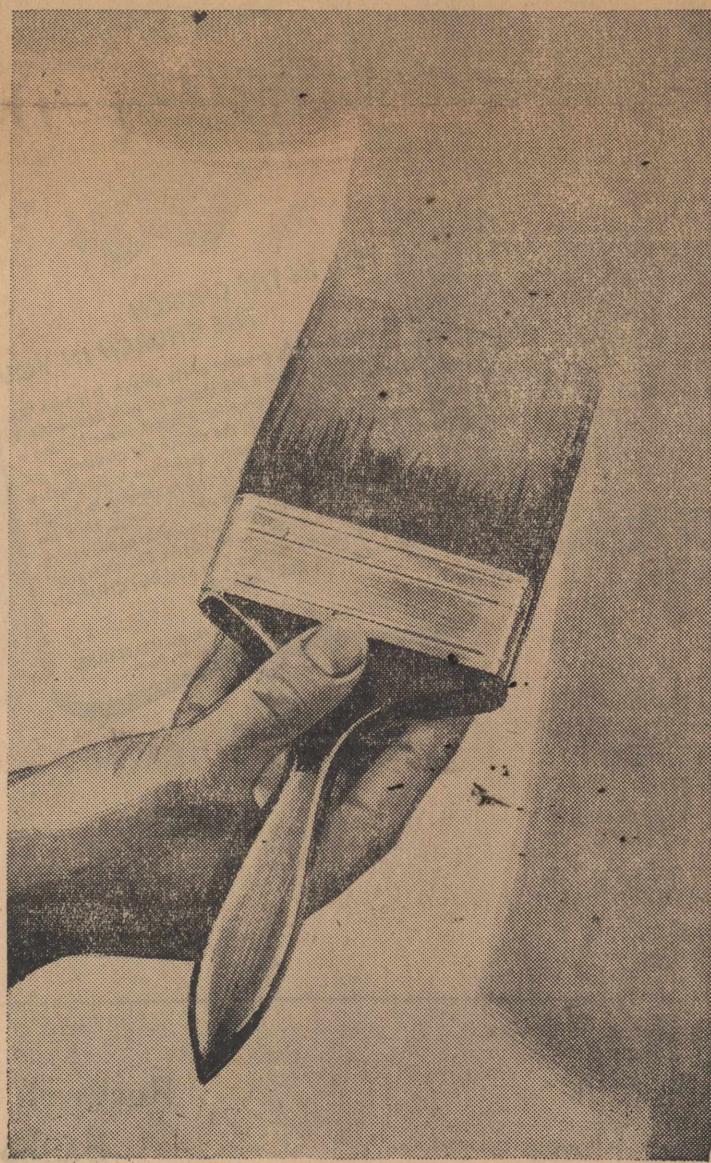

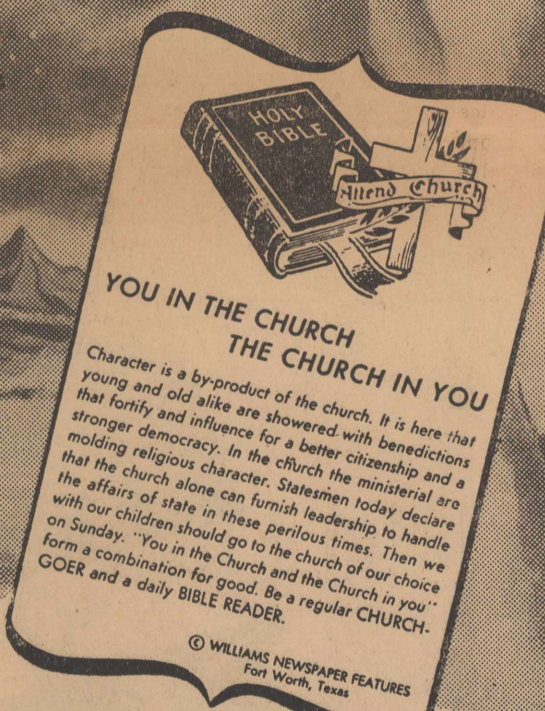
