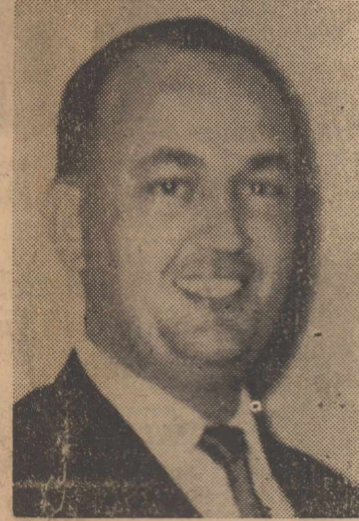
Blank Ballot For Water Board Directors

It Is Up To You--

Sometime during April -- Cancer Control Month -- you will be asked some pertinent questions about cancer and given the answers to them by volunteers of the American Cancer Society who will be calling on you.

It is not necessary that you know the answers to all the questions: Are we getting anywhere against cancer? What signs or symptoms may mean cancer? Which type of cancer is increasing most rapidly? What type of cancer kills most Americans? What can you do to protect yourself against cancer?

But you should know cancer's seven danger signals and visit your doctor if any one of them should persist more than two weeks. Cancer usually starts quietly and spreads without pain. In the beginning, a danger signal may seem very unimportant to you, but it could be the most important to your life.

It is important for you to know that 75 per cent of the 76,000 men and women who will develop cancer of the colon and rectum this year could be saved by early diagnosis and prompt treatment. The best protection against death from this disease is a simple proctoscopic examination once a year.

Cancer of the lung is the most rapidly mounting cause of death from cancer. What can you do about it? Stop smoking cigarettes if you are already a smoker, and if you do not smoke, don't start. The American Cancer Society says that if no one smoked cigarettes a great majority of lung cancers would be prevented.

The American Cancer Society is speaking in the interest of all of us when it urges every adult to have an annual health checkup. Many cancers discovered during an annual health checkup can be cured.

As for the question: Are we getting anywhere against cancer? The answer is "yes". More than 1,200,000 men, women and children are alive today, cured of cancer. Improvements in surgery, radiation, use of drugs, new techniques of diagnosis, better facilities for treatment, the public's concern about cancer and action on that concern, are saving the lives of tens of thousands of Americans annually, who would have died if they had had the disease less than a generation ago.

Costly research has accomplished much of this. And this is one of the reasons why you should support the American Cancer Society's programs of research, education and service. We urge you to give generously to the April Cancer Crusade.

Lampshades For Better Lighting

In a workshop recently conducted by Alice Kemp, County H. D. Agent nine women covered metal lamp shade frames to make new lampshades for their home.

Lighting in the home can be improved by using the correct shade on the lamps you have. To give good light, a lampshade should give light above, below and through the shade. A shade with slanting sides will spread the light over a wider area than one with straight sides. All light bulbs should be shaded to prevent glare.

These are some points the women learned about good lighting as they constructed their shades.

Center HD Club Studies Yeast Breads

The Center HD Club met in home of Mrs. Thurman Terry, Friday afternoon. Mrs. Fred Waddell called the meeting to order. Mrs. Nina Cave read the minutes and gave treasurer reports. The Club made plans to send an Easter donation to the adopted person in Travis School in Austin.

Some recipes are designed for refrigeration storage; however, any good roll dough, a little sweeter and richer than plain dough can be refrigerated successfully. Temperature is highly important in preparing Yeast Breads.

Kneading too, is important in Yeast Breads. It helps to blend ingredients and develop the gluten which in turn develops a good grain and textured bread. A good dough usually requires 5 to 10 minutes kneading. This is the recipe used in "Hurry Up Yeast Bread":

3-4 cup lukewarm water.
1 pkg. cake yeast
2 teaspoons sugar
2 1-2 cups prepared biscuit mix.
Measure water into mixing bowl, sprinkle in yeast and stir until dissolved. Add sugar, add biscuit mix, beat vigorously, turn dough onto surface well dusted with biscuit mix. Knead until smooth, about 20 times. Shape as desired, place on lightly greased baking sheet, cover with damp cloth, let rise in warm place, free from draft, about 1 hr. Bake at 400 F 10 to 15 minutes, brush with butter or margarine. Makes 12 to 16 buns. Caution! don't add too much flour while kneading.

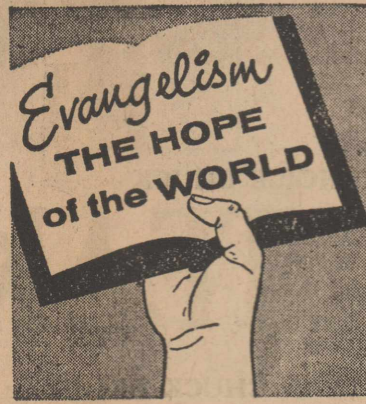

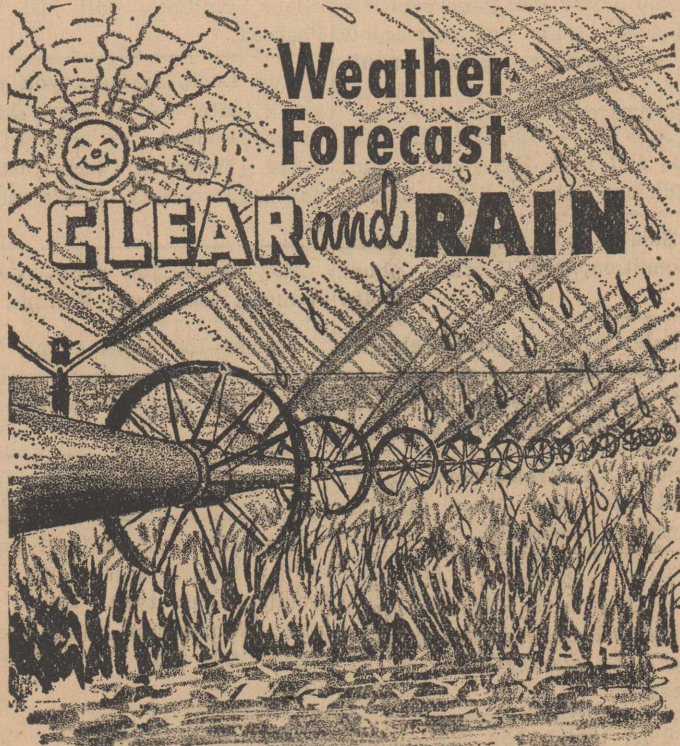

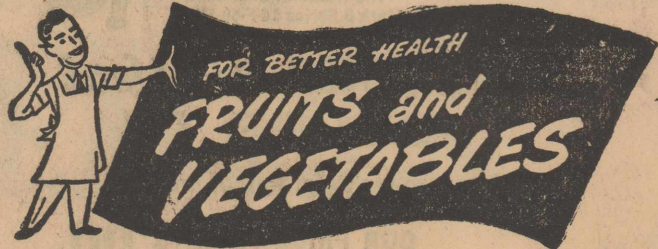

HOW GOD'S WORD IS RECEIVED

In Matt. 13:3-8 Jesus gives us the parable of the sower, and in verses 18-23, he explains the parable.

1. First let us see how unbelievers receive the word of God.

1. Jesus tells us that some seed fell on the hard packed path. This is the person who hears the word but cannot or will not understand. He is not a follower of Jesus.

2. He then tells us of a seed which fell on a thin layer of soil over rock. It grew awhile and gave all evidence of becoming a fruitful plant. But because it had no root it withered and died. This represents a person who makes a superficial decision which is accompanied with joy and excitement. But it is not the "New Birth." He was never saved. John tells us in I John 2:19 "They went out from us, but they were not of us; for if they had been of us, they would no doubt have continued with us." Faith which does not have the vitality to continue does not have the vitality to save. The person who can point to a joyous experience of religion, who was baptized and joined the church, but who has drifted away is not, and never was, a Christian.

3. The seeds which fell among thorns is another class of unbelievers. This group tried to make Jesus "Saviour" without making Him "Lord". It can not be done. If He is not the Lord of all that we have and do He is not our Lord at all.

II. The ones who became the true disciples are much easier to describe. There is a great similarity in all true believers.

1. A true believer is one who understands the conditions of discipleship. He understands that if he will renounce his former life, accept Jesus' death for his sins, and make Jesus the Lord of his life, he will be saved.

2. He will definitely have fruits that will prove that he is a true

disciple. He will live a clean life, his life will be characterized by love, and he will be trying actively to win people to Christ. The difference in Christians is not that some are working for Him while others sit back claiming to have had a saving experience at some time. The difference is that although all Christians do a great deal for God, some will do even more. "Which also beareth fruit, and bringeth forth, some an hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." Matt. 8:23.

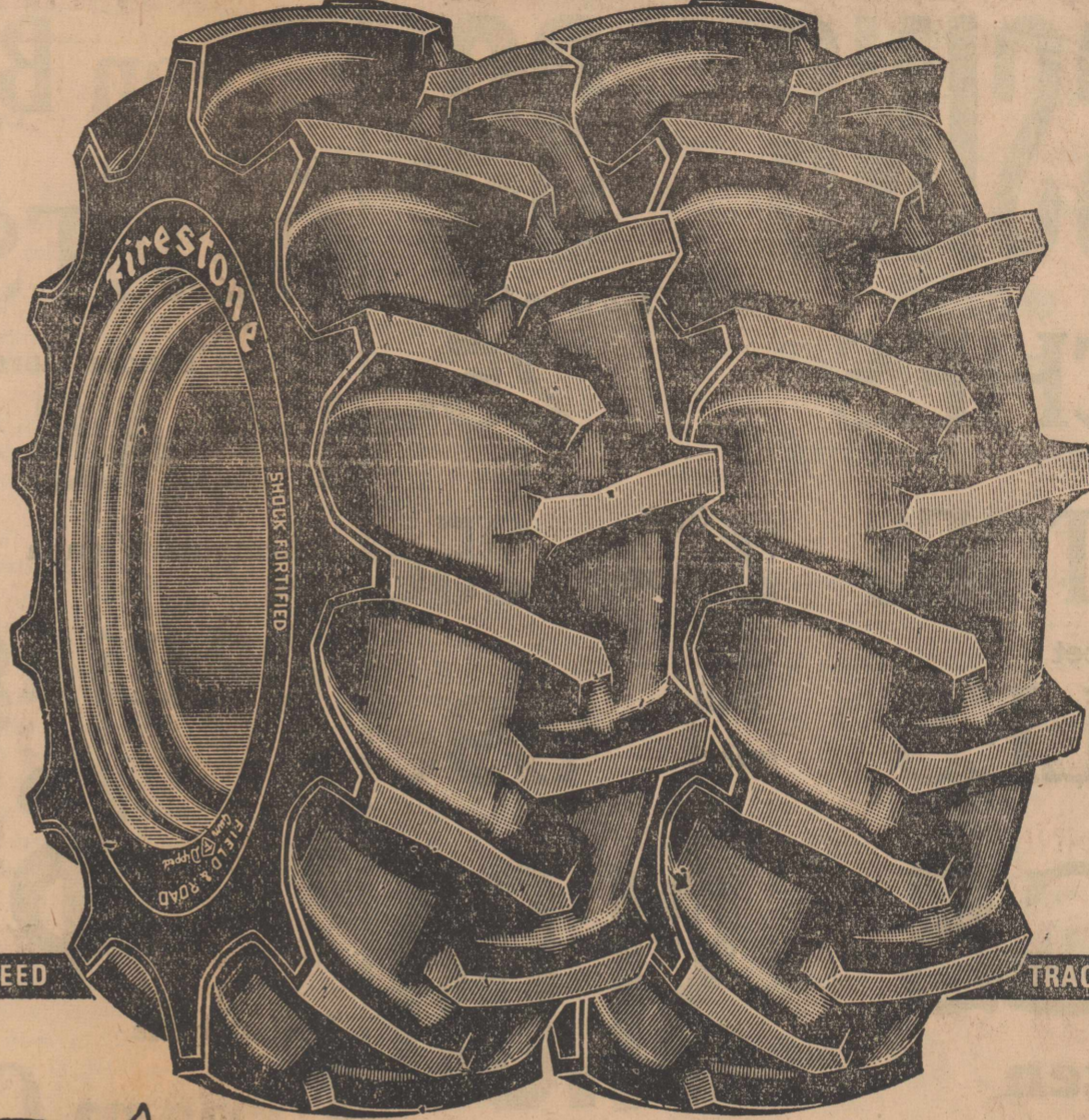

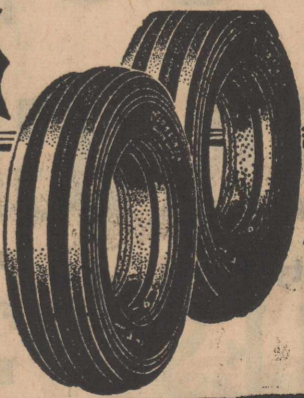

Burleson Introduces Meat Import Bill

Congressman Omar Burleson has introduced a bill to impose import limitations on meat imports, setting the limit at an average figure for the five years from 1959 through 1963.

Burleson stated, "We have got to protect our own interests first. Such action might even strengthen our international position by winning the respect of other nations. That seems to be the way they approach us and, as a matter of fact, a firmer position on all imports could be of help to us in the forthcoming Tariff and Trade negotiations at Geneva. If we took a self interest attitude the same as other trading nations and the European Common Market, and stopped subsidizing their industry and agriculture, we might be able to negotiate from a position of strength."

Burleson went on to say that "we have in our hands the best possible bargaining tools with Australia, the principal importer of meats to the United States. Sugar, which is more important to Australia as an export than meat, could, in my opinion, be a key to our trade relations. She is fourth largest producer of sugar in the world and furnished this Country with 217 million tons last year at world prices, which generally were considerably lower than that of our domestic price. We could give Australia a 200 million ton allotment as a bargaining proposition."

The cattle area Congressman does not believe that an import limit, driving beef prices back up, might enrage consumers and the large city representatives. He explained the housewife pays twice as much for beef now as she did in 1954 when imports were only 2 per cent of domestic production. Ranchers then got 65 cents of every beef dollar the consumer spent, while now they get only 54 cents.

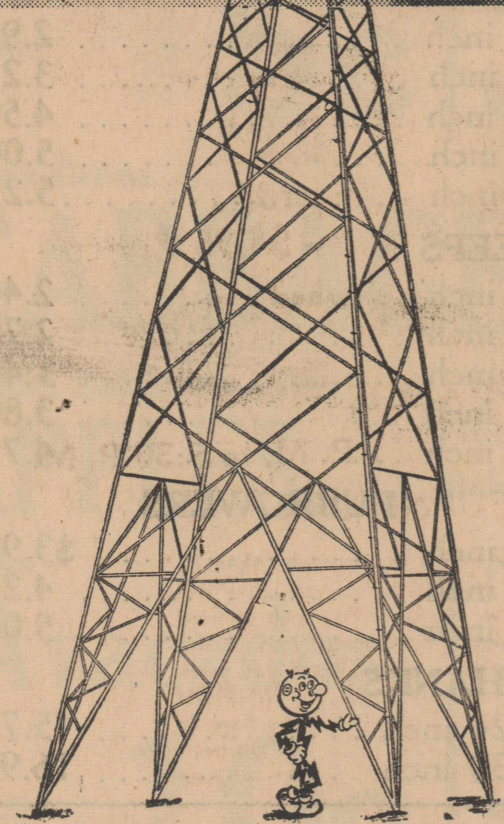

What's New In Junior High

Every morning, rain or shine, Old Glory is raised to the top of the flagpole on the Junior High campus and is lowered again each evening. Nine young Boy Scouts are responsible for this. Divided into three teams; each team of three performs this duty one week at a time, after which time, another group takes over. They are, listed by teams, Ricky Young (sixth grade), Marshal Hariman (eighth grade), and Wayne Thomason (eighth grade); Kevin Wright (seventh grade) Alva Mercer (seventh grade) and Eddie Stewart (seventh grade); Randy Rodgers (sixth grade), Jimmy Markham (sixth grade), and Mike Allen (seventh grade).

The fifth grade history class, taught by Mr. E. E. Armstrong, is studying United States history. The class has recently learned all thirteen of the original states. They also have studied about the lives of the early colonists and how the colonies developed.

The sixth grade is studying European geography. They have studied eastern, western and southern Europe, the Scandinavian countries, Africa, the Soviet Union and the Middle East. The present topic for study is Southeastern Asia. Reports have been given on China and its development and on China's struggle to become a modern civilization.

Mr. Armstrong feels that the main purpose of these courses is to present an overall picture to the student. A detailed study will come later. In the sixth grade, the object is to familiarize the student with the various countries and to learn a little about the people of these countries and their customs. Australia, New Zealand and the South Pacific islands will be studied later in the year.

The fifth grade science class, taught by Mrs. Thomas, has now completed its project on birds of Fisher County. The class watched birds, reported on those watched, and drew a picture and wrote a story on each bird observed. The stories and pictures are now posted in the Junior High School hall for all to see. This was a part of the science class's study of wild life.

Student Opinion Expressed In Poll

Recently, the Journalism class compiled a Student Opinion Poll on the subject of better student-teacher relations. This poll was given to 103 girls in high school.

The purpose of the poll was to determine if the students think student-teacher relations could be improved and if so, how. Five causes of poor relations were listed to be numbered according to importance. Five possible solutions to improve relations were listed also and students checked those they thought were best.

Of the 103 girls who participated in the poll, 101 indicated that student-teacher relations could be improved. Of the suggested causes of poor relations, "No attention is paid to self-expression and individual differences" and Lack of mutual cooperation", tied for first. The next important cause indicated was "Lack of mutual trust." The students also rated "Lack of student respect for teachers" and "Students overbearing" as important causes for poor relations.

The best solutions for improvement were indicated as follows:

1. Mutual understanding and trust (62 votes),
2. Better explanation of actions and rules (48 votes),
3. Organization of a Student-Teacher Council (47 votes),
4. Responsibility-delegated and accepted (27 votes),
5. Better manners (27 votes).

Ninety-seven girls said they would support a program for better student-teacher relations if one were started.

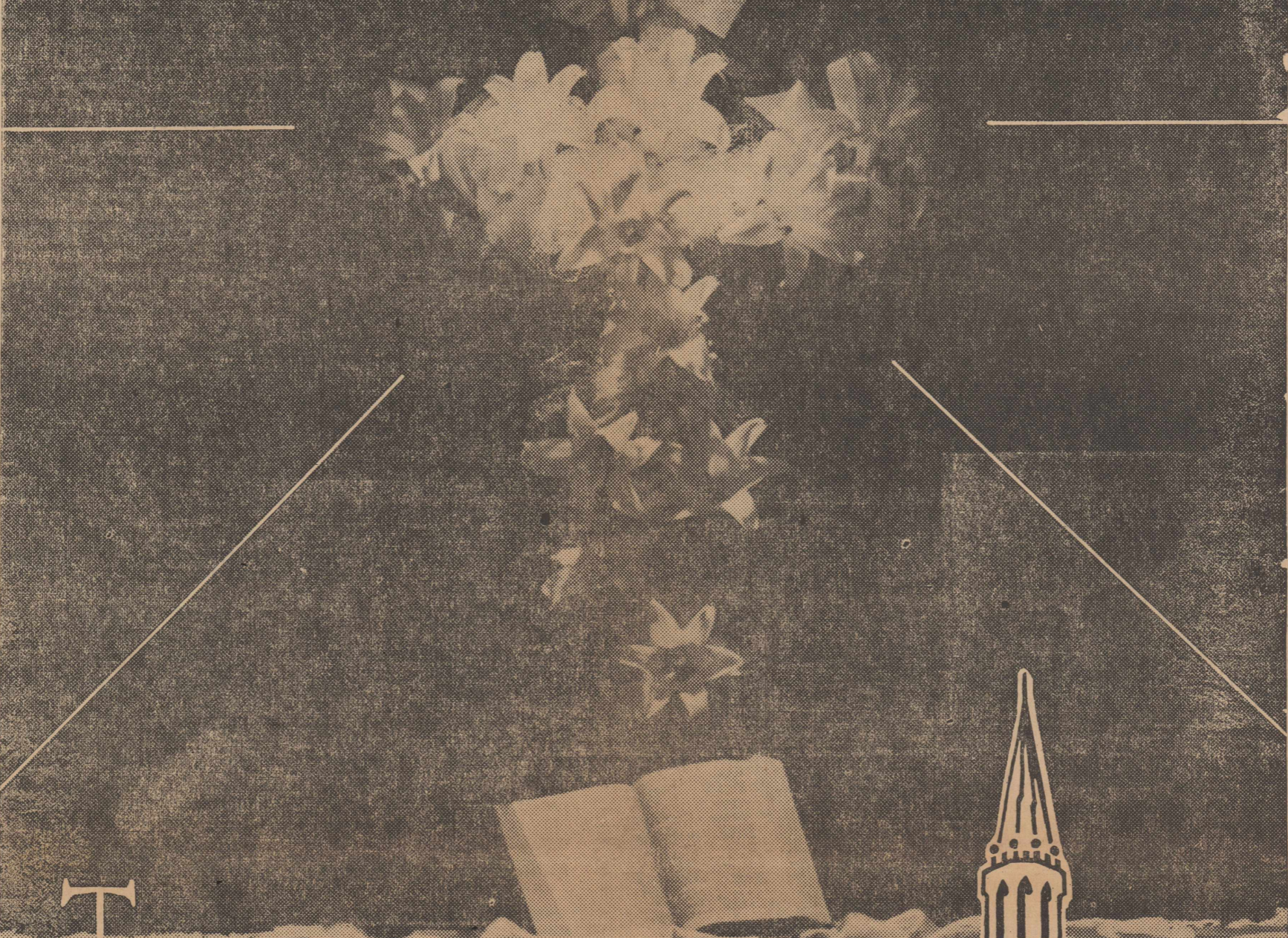
