New Mower In Use At Golf Course

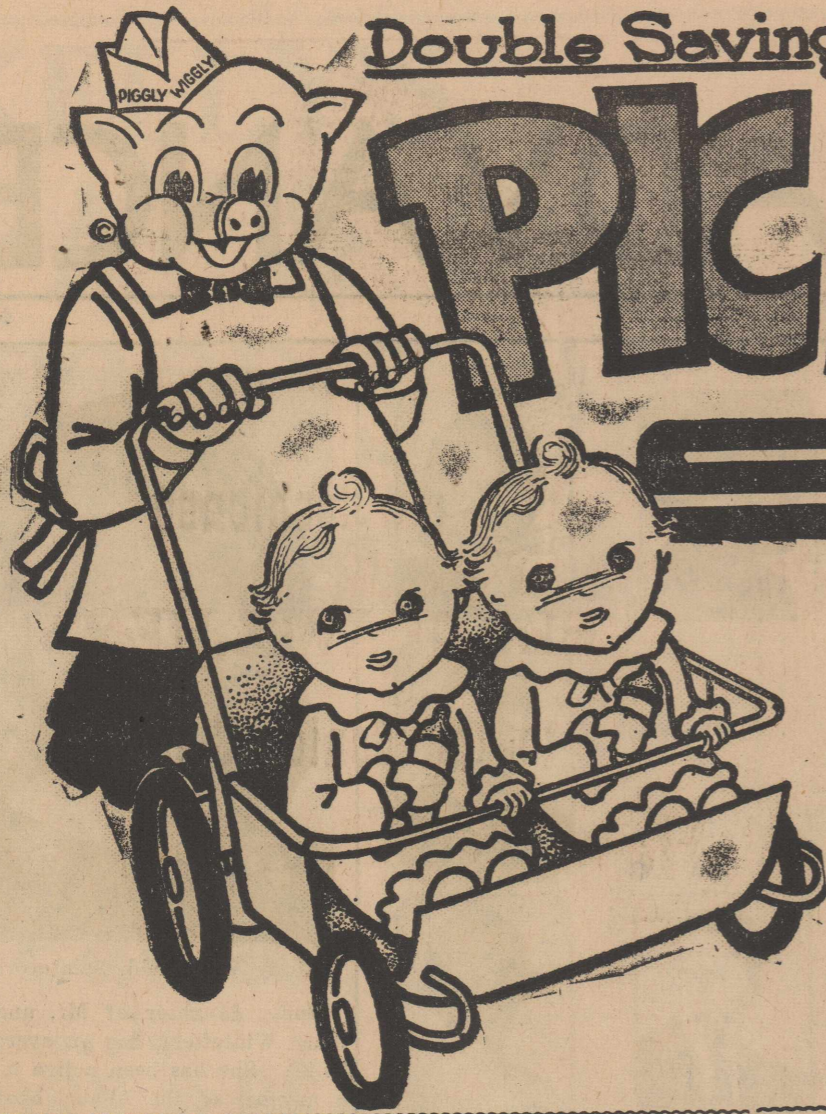


Pictured, left to right: Arvin White, Mrs. Morris Watson, W. W. Mc-Naron, Mac Weathersbee and J. D. Sharp.

ACC Fund Drive During Month

Beginning Thursday, May 4, and running through May 28, six alumni of Abilene Christian College will be calling upon the ex-students of ACC in Rotan and this community. Longworth Man Has Waterway Program

Cleo Hennington of Longworth, Texas, has recently completed shaping waterways on his farm south of Longworth.

These waterways were located in natural drains that run through his farm. Before the waterways were shaped, these natural drains did not have adequate capacity to carry the outside water. Hennington also could not control the growth of weeds and brush in these areas because they were inaccessible to farm machinery.

Hennington hired a local contractor to do most of the heavy dirt work. He completed the final finishing of the shaping with his own farm equipment. Hennington has drilled the waterways to a hybrid forage sorghum for dead litter. The dead litter will provide protection for grass to be seeded next spring. The litter crop will be managed so that a good cover of litter will be left on the ground to protect the young grass seeding.

Hennington plans to plant permanent grass such as Sideoats grama in the dead litter. This grass will provide the protection needed to keep the waterway from eroding.

The establishment of the two waterways is a part of a long range conservation program which was developed with the assistance of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District and technicians from the Soil Conservation Service.

Construction of the waterways was supervised by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. Cost-share assistance was provided through the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Program.

Some other cooperators who have shaped waterways this year or who plan to establish waterways are Tennis Justiss, Jimmy Scott and Dario Flores.

All pecan growers should be on the alert now for the pecan nut casebearer.

Reports received from L. D. Ramberg, horticulturist at the U. S. Pecan Field Station at Brownwood, states that all signs point to a heavy first generation infestation of the research orchard there at the station. Mr. Ramberg points out that they will need to do a good job in spraying this year in order to come through with a crop. He states that he expects the casebearer to be about average as far as stage of development this year.

The pecan nut casebearer is the major insect pest attacking in this part of the state. Casebearers can be successfully controlled if insecticides are applied in the proper manner and at the correct time. According to the information we have, looks like the correct time for spraying for first generation in this area will be the last two weeks of this month.

The following practices are of primary importance in carrying out an effective control program:

1. Proper timing of the spray application.
2. Adequate coverage.
3. Use of adequate spray equipment.

Insecticides must be applied at about the time the eggs are hatching or before the young worms have entered the nuts. Proper coverage is essential to deposit an insecticidal residue on the nut cluster and on the stem a few inches below the cluster. Good equipment is essential to force a sufficient volume of spray through the foliage directly on the twigs and nut clusters in all areas of the tree. Spray pressure needs to be around 350 pounds or more. Inadequate coverage, more than any other factor, is responsible for poor control of the pecan nut casebearer. Spray needs to be applied until it starts dripping of the tree. Since the insect feeds over a small area, the insecticide must

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be uniformly distributed. On full grown trees adequate coverage can be obtained if approximately one gallon of spray mixture is used per foot of tree height.

In carrying out a successful casebearer control program, it is very important to know and understand the life history. Casebearers overwinter as small worms inside silken cocoons called hibernacula which are usually attached to a bud. In the spring, the larvae emerge from their hibernacula, feed for a short time on the buds and then tunnel in the developing shoots and the moths emerge in late April and May. About 9 days are required for development of the pupal stage. The presence of wilted shoots which have been tunneled out is a good indication that control measures will be required for the next generation of larvae in the nuts.

Two or three days after the adults emerge, females deposit eggs on the tips of the nuts. The bluish-white eggs are deposited singly. In a few hours, small red spots appear in the egg. These spots increase in size until the egg is pinkish to redish. The worms which hatch from these eggs are known as first generation casebearer larvae. The period of egg laying usually co-incides with the completion of pollination at which time the tips of the tiny nuts turn brown. This is the period during which the nut clusters should be carefully examined for eggs to determine when the control program should be started.

Casebearer eggs hatch in 4 or 5 days. When the small worms hatch, most of them leave the tips of the nuts and migrate to the buds below the nut cluster to feed. After two or three days' feeding, the worms leave the buds and enter the base of the nut. From the time the eggs are deposited, about 68 days pass before the nuts are attacked. The length of the larval period is about 25 days. To obtain good control, insecticides should be applied during the interval when eggs are hatching or when the young worms are feeding on the buds. Ordinarily, only one application of spray is required to control the casebearer. The following insecticides are recommended for the control of casebearers:

DDT, Malathion, Nicotine sulfate, and Sevin.

For further information on pecan insects refer to Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication MP-313 Pecan Diseases and Insects and their Control, which is available at the local extension office.

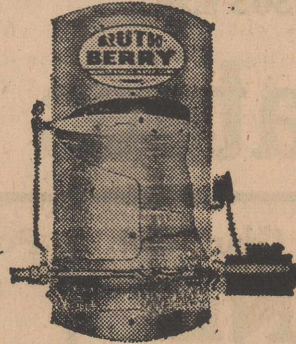
"Every student who is getting a summer job or graduating from school this year should get his social security card now," said R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Many employers will not hire a student unless he already has a social security card. Students who do get jobs should show the card to the employer so that the name and number may be copied correctly. This is important because social security tax money must be credited to the correct record.

Duplicate cards will be issued to students who have had cards but have lost them.

Cards may be obtained at the local social security office, 203 Fannin Street, Abilene. Students living in a town without a social security office can get application blanks at their local post office.

Experts Say This is Critical Time For Bermuda Grasses

The months of April and May is one of the critical periods for bermudagrass pastures. It is critical because April is the month when the plants begin growth.

The first growth must come from food that was stored in the plant the previous year. This stored food will produce new stems and leaves will use the energy from the sun to start the factory to producing grass.

The important point to remember is that grazing too early can reduce the capacity of your grass factory. If the first leaves in the spring are grazed off before the plant has an opportunity to build up a new supply of food then the plant will be weakened. Top production can not be expected from weak plants.

By delaying spring grazing until the plants have had an opportunity to grow 3 to 4 weeks, larger yields can be expected. Studies have shown that yields can be increased by 25% when the grazing is managed so that plenty of leaves are left on the plants during the entire growing season.

A grass plant can be compared to a motor. A motor cannot operate efficiently unless it has the proper number of spark plugs; a plant can not produce efficiently unless it has an adequate amount of leaves.

Good pasture management requires delayed grazing in the spring and proper use of the plants to leave plenty of leaves throughout the growing season.

Extensive FM Road Program Planned

Austin, May 11, 1964--A sweeping program to build more than 1,000 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in 166 Texas counties was announced today by the Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission placed an estimated cost of \$23 million on the total package of 227 projects financed for construction by the action. Construction on a total of 1,032 miles of Farm to Market Roads is involved.

The Farm to Market Program is an annual roadbuilding undertaking of the Texas Highway Department under legislation authorizing a yearly budget for new FM construction.

The Farm to Market Road grid in Texas now stands at 37,143 miles of designated roads. "Designated" includes both roads already built and those financed to be built in the near future.

With addition of new miles authorized by the Highway Commission today, the Texas Highway network exceeds 65,000 miles for the first time. New total for highways of all types in Texas: 65,778.

Of this designated mileage, 3,031 miles represent Interstate Highways and 25,604 miles are U. S. and State numbered highways of the "Primary" system. The remaining mileage is Farm to Market Roads.

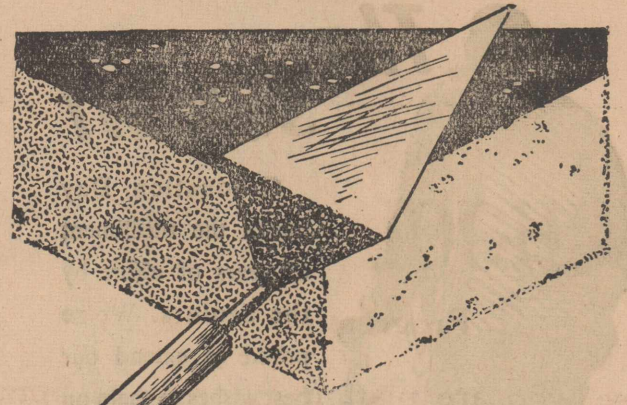
Of the new farm roads to be added to the Texas highway system under the 1964 program announced today, 69 per cent are school bus routes and 67 per cent are mail routes.

Today's sprawling Farm to Market Road system in Texas traces its genesis to a 6-mile stretch built in 1936 between the communities of Mount Enterprise and Shiloh in Rusk County. From this first Farm to Market Road the Texas Highway Department has been pointing toward an ultimate system of 50,000 miles of such roads. Biggest expansion of the system has occurred since 1949.

"The 1964 Farm to Market Road Program is a good illustration of the Texas Highway Commission's 'balanced program philosophy,' according to Chairman Herbert C. Petry Jr. "Within this concept of highway development, the Commission views all highways as lifelines and strives to integrate the various highway systems for the overall good of the state."

Pointing out that there are more Farm to Market Roads in Texas than all other federal and state highways combined, he said: "In the total structure of our highway system a farm route has a place just as vital to our transportation complex as does an Interstate route. Nor is a farm route an advantage only to the farmers it serves. The urban population explosion notwithstanding, farms and cities are more interdependent than ever."

According to Petry: "Total road service to all Texans, rural and urban, is the ideal we hold before us in every highway program. Today's action is another step in this direction."



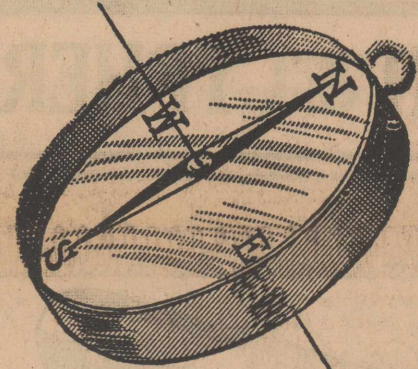
