To The Citizens of Rotan:

The City Council of the City of Rotan must purchase a new fire truck in the near future if the City is to maintain its present fire insurance rating. A fire truck will cost about \$15,000 and will be purchased from the General Fund. This will be an unusually heavy financial burden and the City Council must decide whether a fire truck, purchased solely from City taxes should continue to be used to fight fires outside the City Limits. According to the Texas Municipal League, the individual Council members may be held personally liable if a City-owned fire truck is unable to fight a City fire because it is on a fire call outside the City Limits. Other cities have solved this problem by entering into a contract with their respective counties, whereby a monthly or yearly payment is made by the county to the city to help defray the maintenance cost. Cities having such contracts are:

Sweetwater: Nolan County pays \$65 per fire
Snyder: Scurry County pays \$1,750 per month
Lubbock: Lubbock County pays \$100 per fire within a 10 mile radius and \$15 per additional mile extra
Jayton: Kent County pays \$100 per month

The City of Rotan has been unable to enter into a contract with Fisher County.

TWO THINGS SHOULD BE MADE COMPLETELY CLEAR

1. The City of Rotan is not asking The Commissioner's Court to buy a fire truck. It is asking them to pay a reasonable charge for maintenance.

2. The City Council is not asking for a County bond election.

The following two letters are included in order that the Rotan tax payer might have the facts in this matter. The City Council is seeking only to negotiate a reasonable maintenance contract so that the City tax-payer does not have to bear the entire burden alone.

AFTER ALL, THE CITY TAX-PAYER IS A COUNTY TAX-PAYER, TOO!

The \$600 referred to in the County Judge's letter is paid directly to the Volunteer Fire Department according to an agreement between the Fire Department and the Commissioners' Court and the City of Rotan does not receive any of this money.

Dear Judge Perkins:

The city Council of the City of Rotan must now seriously consider the purchase of a new fire truck in order to maintain its current low key rate. In view of the fact that forty per cent of the fire calls answered by our volunteer fire department during 1963 were made outside the City Limits we respectfully request that the County Commissioner's Court make available an annual payment to the City of Rotan to help defray the cost of maintaining this fire-fighting service.

The Texas Fire Insurance Commission has furnished us with the proper specifications for a unit which will meet their requirements. Our cost with trade-in should be about \$15,000. Within the next sixty days our City will be considered by this Commission for a reconsideration of the appropriate fire insurance key rate. We must therefore, make some decisions regarding the financing of this new unit in the very immediate future.

The Texas Municipal League advises us that our elected officials may be held personally liable in the event of a fire truck which was purchased solely from the General Fund of a municipality being outside the City Limits at the time a fire occurs within the City Limits. They recommend that some type of joint arrangement between County and City be worked out.

Due to the urgency of this matter we would appreciate your bringing this request before the County Commissioners Court at your earliest opportunity and notifying us of its decision.

Please let me know if the Court would like for me or the Mayor to appear.

Thank you for the courtesies you have shown me in the informal discussions we have had regarding this matter.

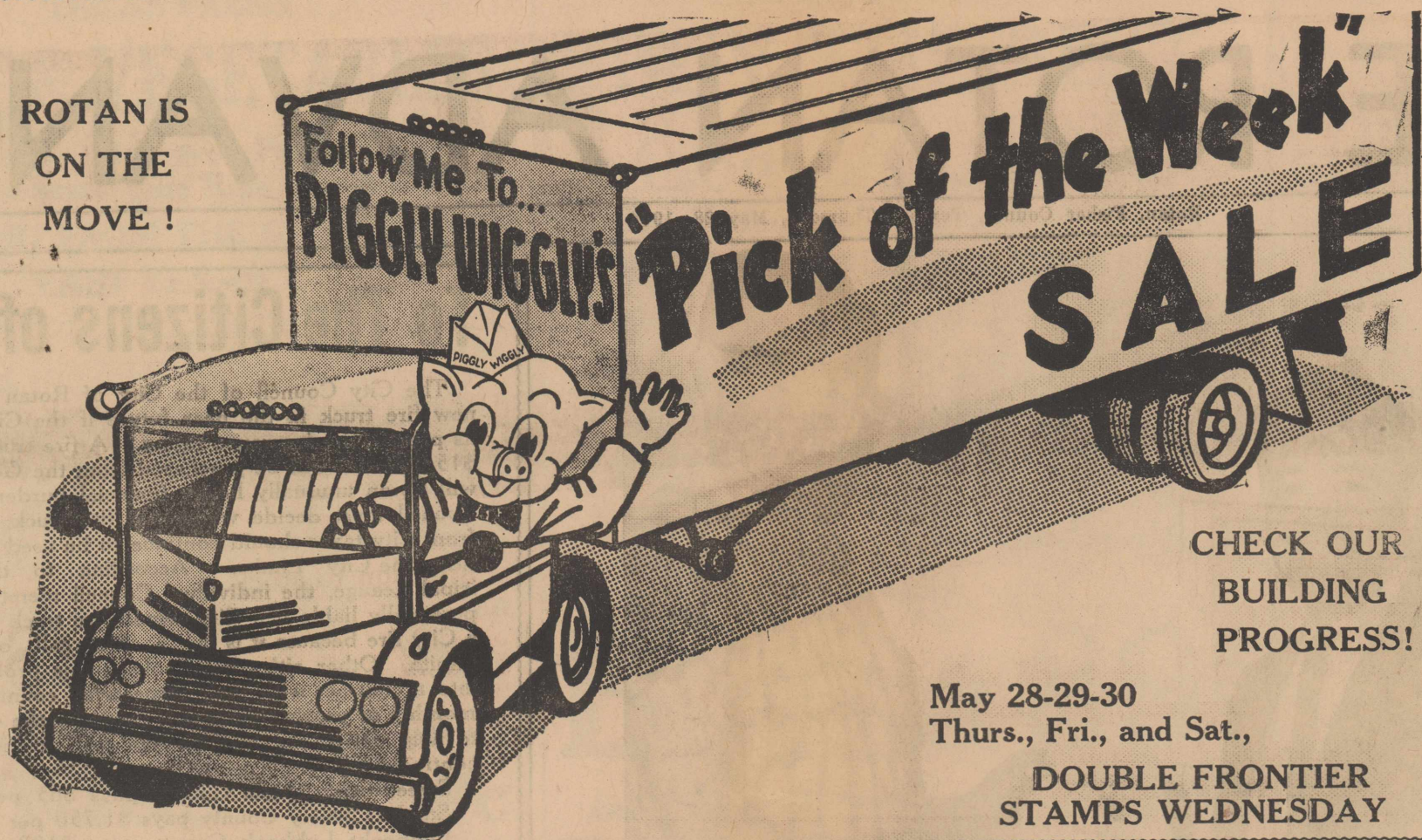
Your request for county funds to help defray the cost of maintaining your city fire fighting service was discussed at our regular meeting May 11, 1964.

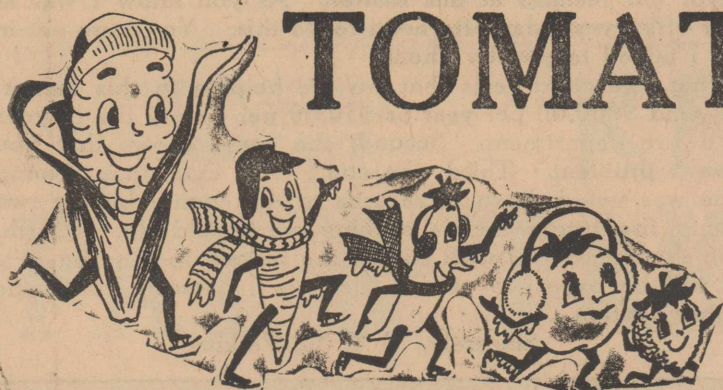

Interesting Study To Be Made On Mule Deer

Fort Collins -- Did you ever listen to a mule deer on your radio? Roger Siglin listens to mule deer in the mountains northwest of Fort Collins. A graduate student working toward his Master's degree in Wildlife Management, Roger is charting deer movements as part of his work at the Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit at Colorado State University.

Roger traps wild rubeys in box traps, places a specially-designed radio transmitter around their necks and then releases them into the wild. The powerful batteries in the tiny transmitter are good for a full year's transmission. With a portable receiver, Roger tunes in on the signal and plots the deer's movements with a radio direction finder. Information gained from this study will assist the Colorado Department of Game, Fish and Parks to more accurately trace movements of muleys from wintering range to summer homes.

The Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit, financed jointly by the Colorado Department of Game, Fish and Parks, the Wildlife Management Institute, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and Colorado State University, trains the wildlife managers of tomorrow, helps solve wildlife problems for the state departments, and works to develop advanced techniques in wildlife management. Siglin's study is one of five currently being carried on by the Cooperative Research Unit.

If you hear a deer with bells on, please tell Roger where you hear it -- it may be one of his study animals.

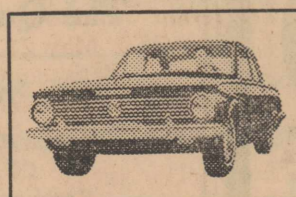

"The Thirtieth Day of May, 1868, is designed for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of the comrades who died in defense of their country."

Not only does this responsibility conform completely with our dedication to the memories of America's departed heroes, but also it helps to instill a firm meaning of patriotism in a younger generation of Americans.

"Let no vandalism or avarice or neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generation that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic."

No one can say how much the character of America has been molded, and will continue to be shaped, by childhood memories of Memorial Day parades to the shrines of our hero dead. Through the reverence paid them, new generations will be dedicated to the same high principles of patriotism of which ALL VETERANS ORGANIZATIONS attempt to meet.

Let us as individuals not forget that Saturday, May 30, is Memorial Day. Let us stop and think what each of these men that did "make it", gave so that we might enjoy what WE ARE ALL enjoying today.

Aerial Spraying To Be Done For Brush Control

May 18, has been the date set by the Great Plains Conservation Program county committee and the A. S. C. S. county committee to begin aerial application of chemicals of brush control.

Research has shown that to get an effective kill, mesquite should be sprayed between 40 and 90 days after the first leaves appear. Sufficient moisture must also be present to give at least 30 days of vigorous growth before spraying.

To get the best control on shinnery it should be sprayed in the spring after the plants are in full foliage. A second application is needed the following year to give effective results.

Much has been written about the invasion of brush on our native grassland in the last few years. This presents a problem on our grazing lands that is becoming more serious each year.

A recent survey made on the densities of brush in Fisher County showed the following:

Specie - Light 10% canopy;
Medium, 10-20% canopy; Heavy over 20% canopy:
Mesquite, 25,883; 79,415; 63,533.

Juniper, 7,999; 30,150; 3,300.
Shinnery, 0; 16,471.

Prickley Pear, 1,500; 100; 0.
This compares with the densities of brush in Texas which showed the following:

Specie - Light 10% canopy;
Medium 10-20% canopy; Heavy over 20% canopy:
Mesquite, 22,094,900; 18,337,100; 15,812,800.

Juniper, 9,813,100; 8,305,900; 3,392,500.

Shinnery, 4,462,300; 1,842,000; 2,426,900.

Prickley Pear, 27,200,700; 6,173,600; 2,378,600.

Since the start of the Great Plains Conservation Program in Fisher County in 1958, there has been \$40,636.02 spent in 9,161 acres of brush control in the Rotan Work Unit Area. This is in addition to what has been spent on brush control through the county ACP of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Program.

The following methods of brush control have been in Fisher County. They are rootplowing, tree dozing, hand application of chemical hormone, and aerial application of chemical hormone.

On some of the areas where the brush has been controlled effectively, it has been necessary to control the regrowth of sprouts by use of a hormone chemical and hand spray.

To obtain a satisfactory control must be supplemented by a sound grazing plan that would maintain a maximum ground cover of grass. The reason for this is probably that young brush sprouts cannot compete for water in a dense turf of grass. This fact is demonstrated by lack of young seedlings in many old mesquite pastures that have been allowed to come back to a high state of grass cover.

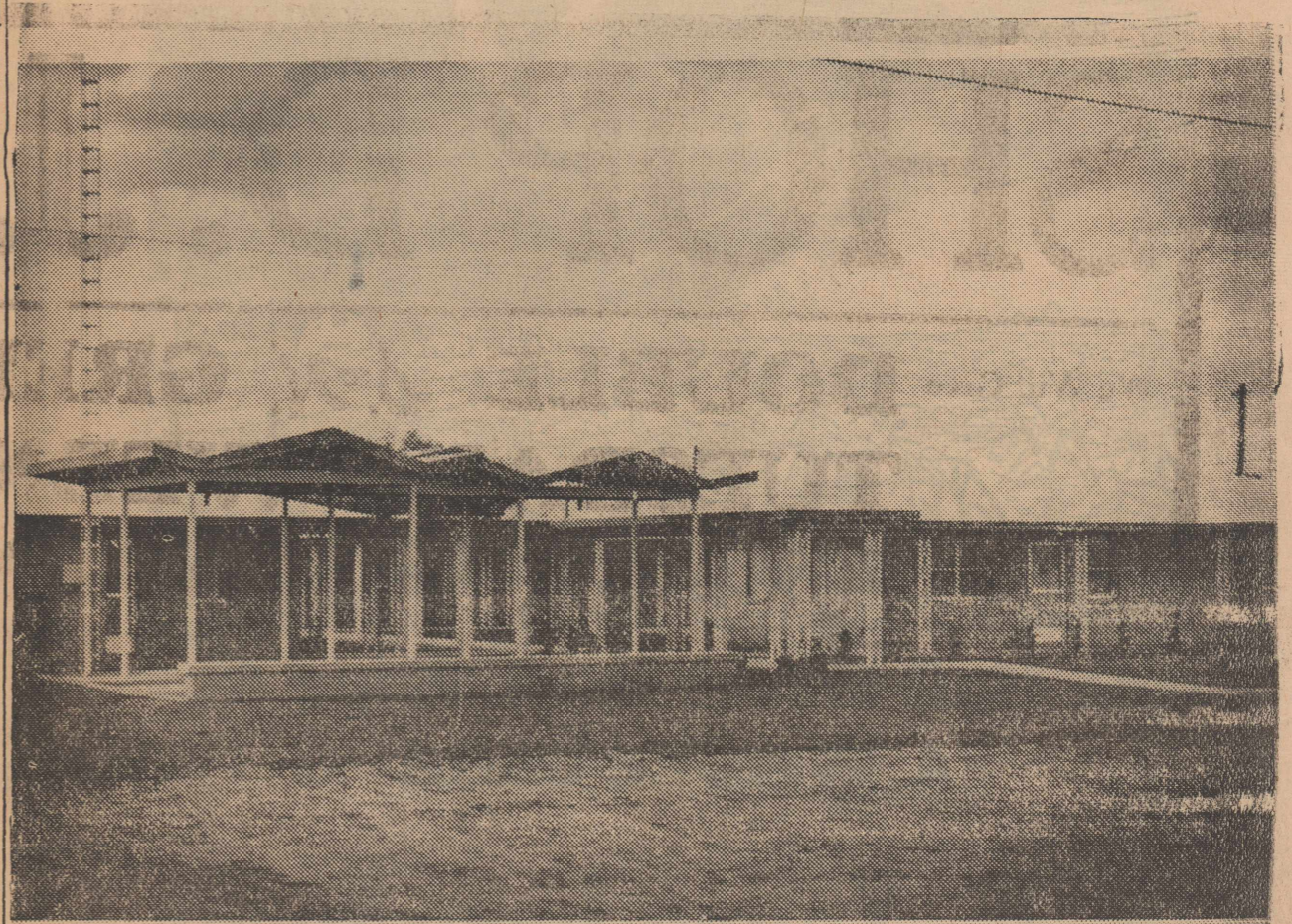

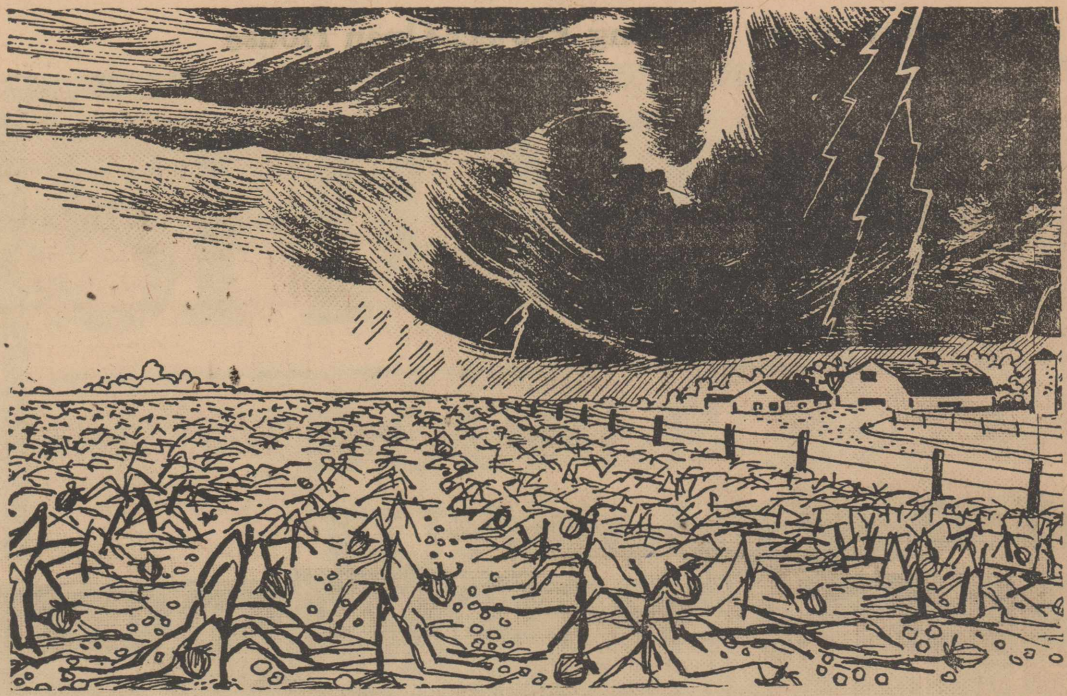

Whether you farm above or below the Caprock, the boll weevil control program and how it will be operated is of vital concern to you. An aggressive, seasonal control program is being put into action below the Caprock, centered primarily in Dickens, Motley and Garza counties. Don Rummel, Area Extension Entomologist, says there are three major reasons for this.

First, the goal is to suppress weevil populations in early season. Not only will this ultimately assist above-Caprock cotton growers but will also reduce damage to cotton for producers in the counties in infested areas.

Second, the program is intended to prevent large-scale weevil migration to the High Plains. And last-but not least-efforts to control the weevil in the infested areas below the Caprock should increase the chances of success for a diapause weevil control program in that area this coming fall.

Rummel, in elaborating on the program said it is broken down into four steps as follows:

1. Treatment for overwintered boll weevils below the Caprock. This practice has been recommended in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service state guide for a number of years and has proven effective in many infested areas. This step will involve an application of a recommended insecticide just before first squares are one-third grown, where weevils are found. This will prevent egg laying, re-

duce the size and slow down development of the first generation. However, care must be taken in treatment for overwintered weevils. Spraying to date might help create an early bollworm problem. Recommendations on overwintered weevil control are listed in the 1964 guide, available at the county agent's office.

2. Late-season control below the Caprock: This step will consist of normal seasonal control based on infestation count. Control should begin when the punctured square count reaches 10%. This step is also outlined in the guide except that in order to hold weevil populations to a minimum Extension specialists recommend starting control at the 10% punctured square level instead of the usual 15 to 25%.

3. Spot treatment on the High Plains: Any weevils found above the Caprock during the season should be controlled at once, regardless of size of infestation.

4. Diapause control program: The diapause control program will be carried out below the Caprock since weevils are known to overwinter in this area. How much acreage above the Caprock might require treatment will be determined by present research and survey during the summer. The use of the diapause control program below the Caprock will not only provide protection for the Plains but should be of real benefit to farmers in the treated areas by reducing the next year's weevil population.

Starting salaries for prospective college graduates are of concern to many young people this spring. Also the following information should be of interest to all of you high school graduates.

Here's information about the beginning average salaries being offered to male college students who

will receive a bachelor's degree this year. This information is from the Extension home management specialists at Texas A&M University.

With few exceptions the industry making the most job offers also was providing the highest salaries. For instance, electrical engineering students were offered 647 jobs from the aircraft and space industry with an average monthly salary offer of \$633. The high was \$692 the low, \$574.

If the same students were interested in working for the electrical machinery and equipment industry, the number of jobs available would be 226 and the salary average would be \$619. The aircraft and space industry ranked highest in the number of job opportunities for five of the technical curricula.

Average beginning monthly salary offers quoted include: Humanities and social sciences, \$452; Marketing and distribution, \$459; business, \$453; accounting, \$538; Metallurgical engineering, \$600; civil engineering \$607; industrial engineering, \$610; mechanical engineering, \$610; mechanical engineering, \$617; chemical engineering, \$617; aeronautical engineering, \$628; electrical engineering, \$633.

In humanities and social sciences, job offers were more evenly divided among all the categories of employers. The highest number -- 32 offers -- came from banking, finance and insurance with an average salary of \$452. From the merchandising-retail and wholesale -- field came only 27 offers, but the average salary was a little higher -- \$468.

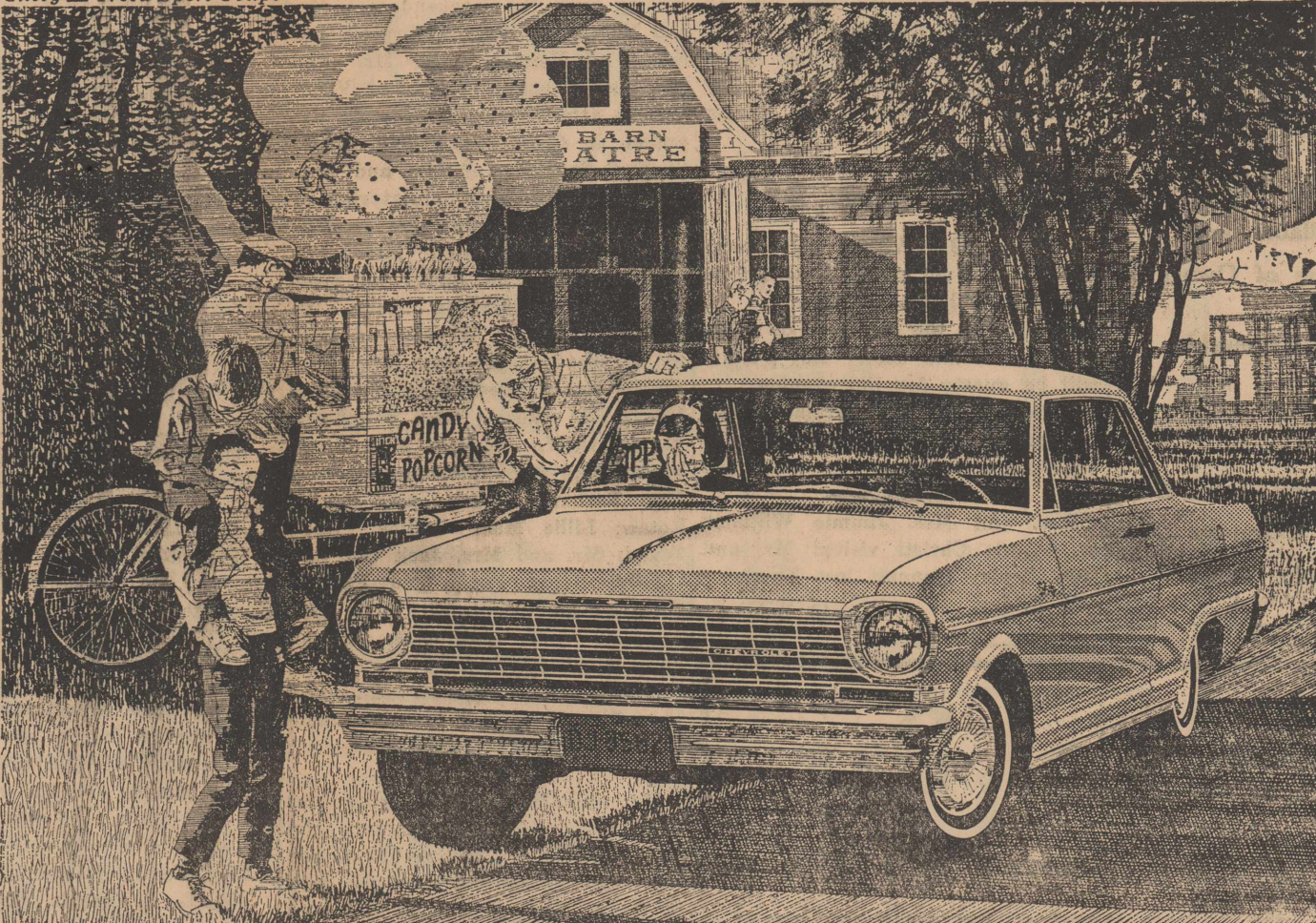

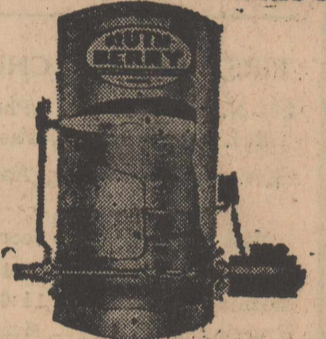

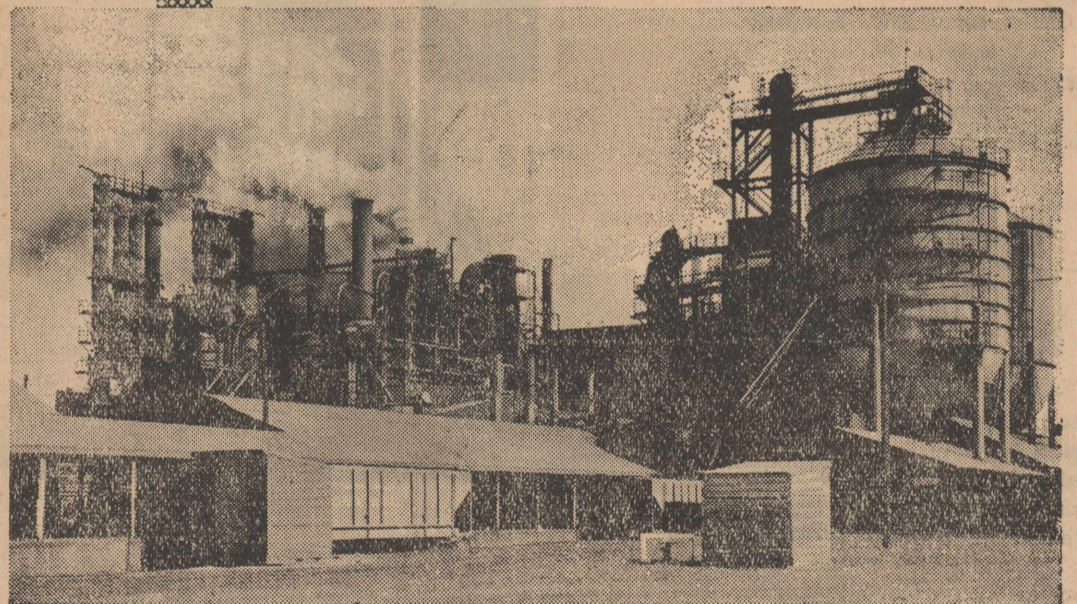

... direct step in industrial development

Many industries locate near the raw materials used by them and are seen throughout the WTU service area. One example, pictured above, is the carbon black plant of United Carbon Company at Shamrock.

This flourishing petrochemical plant has become an important addition to the economy of this Texas Panhandle town. Such development anywhere creates new jobs, brings more payrolls, and adds many other advantages such as helping to provide new schools like the one pictured left.

Again, here is a PATTERN FOR PROGRESS.

In Texas the annual value of raw materials produced is \$700 per capita, while the value added by manufacture is only \$600. Contrast this with the highly industrialized state of Ohio. 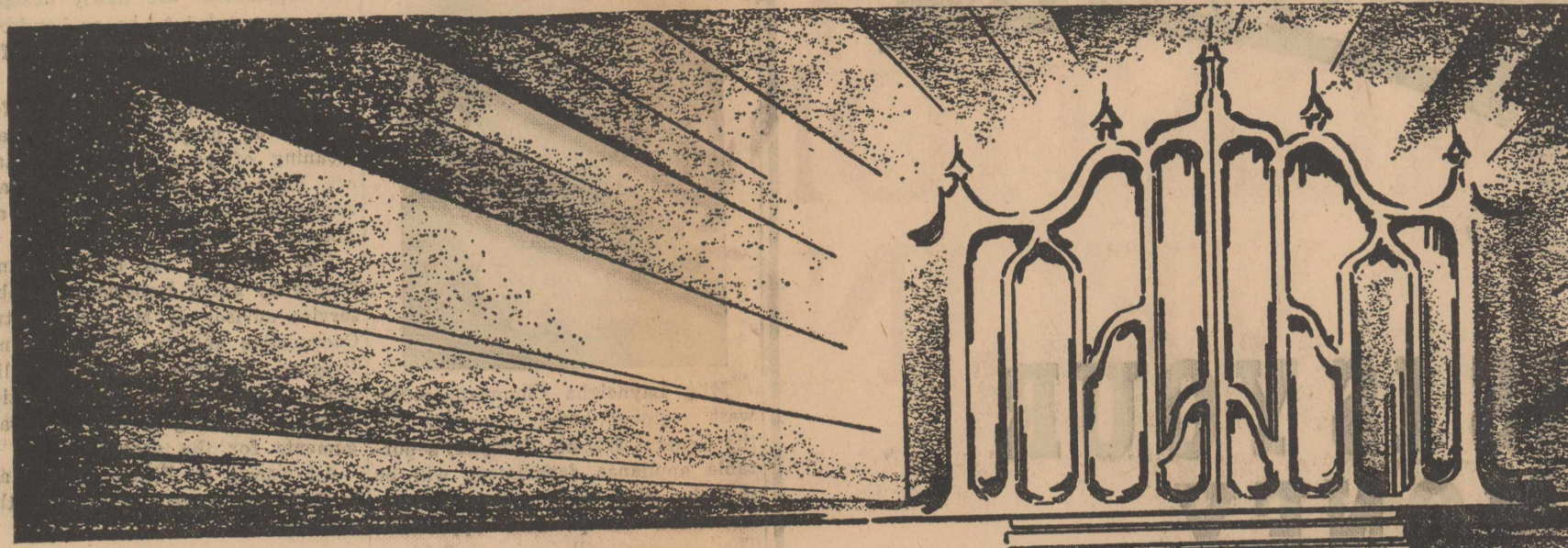

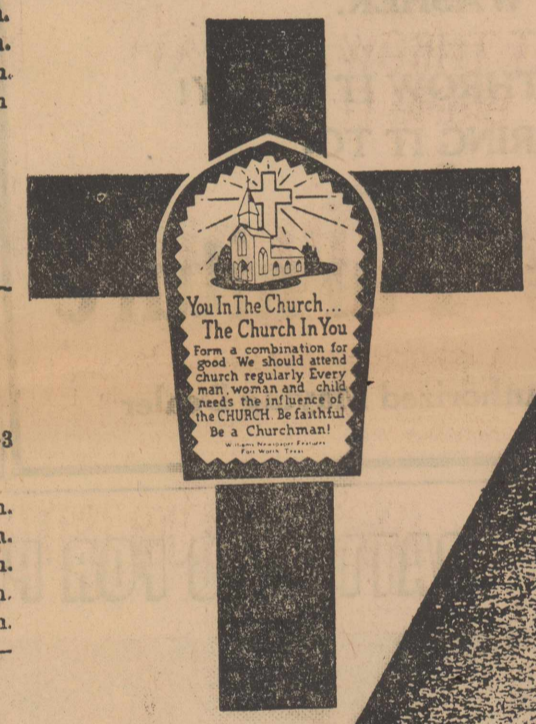
