Rodeo grounds and stands are now shaping up to point where even a novice can visualize the complete plant of Fisher County Sheriff Posse Rodeo system.

Much work is to be done, but it is now assured that everything will be in readiness for the 8th annual Junior Rodeo.

The organization has 15 acres of land for the system, which assures ample space for parking and future growth. The system if all labor was hired instead of a large part being done by members and other people of the county, would probably run from 25 to \$30,000. The stands and boxes which are all steel with wood seats will seat 1920 spectators comfortably. The 300 x 130 ft. arena, chutes and holding pens etc., are of steel and modern in every respect.

Lighting has greatly improved, with addition of much new equipment. Parking space is ample, as 9 acres are designated for this purpose and Boy Scouts will handle this phase during the current show.

County equipment is hauling in a large amount of sand to complete arena, and just recently the City, American Legion and the various citizens who supplied funds to build the Civil Defense tower near swimming pool, will be moved next week and used as judges stand and office below. This tower was requested by Civil Defense authorities several years ago, but new developments in aircraft made the system obsolete, and it was never used.

A number of nice contributions have been made to help in the construction of the system, and a large amount of labor is still being done by citizens who feel that this is a community project and not "just the Posse."

## Huge Highway Program Announced

Austin, Texas, June 5, 1964 -- More safety and less congestion for 2,076 miles of Texas highways was the objective today of a \$166 million improvement program authorized by the Texas Highway Commission.

The biennial Consolidated Highway Program is beamed at correcting traffic problems on parts of the Primary Highway System of U. S. - and State - numbered highways in Texas.

The Highway Commission called the 2-year program "vital to our keeping pace with a traffic explosion that is increasing five per cent a year." In view of the diffusion of Texas' 22 metropolitan areas -- more than any state -- "These city connecting highways must continue to be systematically upgraded for the good of the cities they serve, as well as the safety and convenience of the through traveler," the commission said.

The 25,000-mile Primary Highway System carries a bigger burden of the state's 50-billion-a-year traffic load than all other systems combined, commissioners pointed out. Yet some 20,000 miles of the Primary system are considered obsolete by contemporary standards, they said.

Of the amount authorized for the Consolidated improvement program, \$151 million is earmarked for construction and about \$15 million for right of way. The program will be funded from state gasoline tax revenue, license fees and federal grant in aid. About 65 per cent of the cost will come from state funds.

Under the new program, heavily-traveled Primary highways will be upgraded, some to four-lane standards. Widening of bridges, paving of shoulders and other improvements for safety are also included for various highways over the state under the extensive program.

Highway Department studies indicate dramatic improvements in safety statistics result from such programs as the one authorized today. Upgrading a two-lane highway to four-lane divided status, for instance, reduces the fatality rate by more than 30 per cent. When "control of access" is added, the rate drops by 45 per cent.

### US 180 To Be Widened In Roby

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$155,000 for highway construction in Fisher County during 1965-66, announced District Highway Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

He said a total of 1.3 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of F. N. Shave, Resident Engineer, Hamlin.

This work is part of the 1965-66 Consolidated Highway Program. More safety and less congestion for 2,067 miles of Texas highways was the objective of the \$166 million improvement program just authorized by the Texas Highway Commission.

The biennial Consolidated Highway Program is aimed at correcting traffic problems on parts of the Primary Highway System of U. S. - and state-numbered highways in Texas.

The Highway Commission called the 2-year program "vital to our keeping pace with a traffic explosion that is increasing five per cent a year". In view of the diffusion of Texas' 22 metropolitan areas -- more than any state -- "these city-connecting highways must continue to be systematically upgraded for the good of the cities they serve, as well as the safety and convenience of the through traveler," the commission said.

District Engineer Roberts said a total of 114.3 miles in this highway district would be involved, at a total cost of \$4,834,000.

The following project will take place in this county:  
U. S. 180, in Roby, from West City Limit to East City Limit, 1.3 Miles Widened, \$155,000.

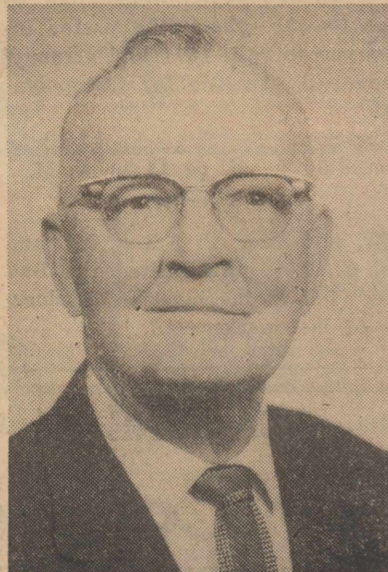

today's consumers. Dr. Graham Hard, Extension Service clothing specialist, says that stretch cotton fabrics mean greater comfort, better fit, more shape retention, fewer alterations, and less

imparted in them may be extended in either width or length or both, under forces customarily encountered. These fabrics will contract to practically their original dimensions upon removal of the force.

Stretch fabrics may be given 25 to 30 percent stretch, but an 8 to 15 percent stretch is considered a good "working" stretch, the specialist says.

Improved stretch cotton fabrics are being used in sportswear, diapers, uniforms, gloves, foundation and sleeping garments. Indications point toward a greater use of stretch fabrics for men's wear this fall.

### Care of Vegetables Is Important

Whether to wash salad vegetables as soon as they are brought home from market or just before preparation time is a question many homemakers ask.

Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Extension Service consumer marketing specialist, says she prefers to wash and trim salad vegetables as soon as they are brought home. "Drain well and store them covered until ready for use. This provides clean vegetables ready to use at a moment's notice," she explains.

The vegetables are not so wet that they make a "watered down" salad. Space is conserved when vegetables are trimmed before storing. Clean, slightly moist salad vegetables seem to "crisp" better than those left unwashed.

Mrs. Clyatt suggests that homemaker put color, flavor and texture into salads by using a variety of salad greens. Break, tear or cut greens into bite-size pieces. Add seasoning and dressing just before serving.

Salad greens now on the market include leaf lettuce, romaine, escarole, and head lettuce. Add further variety with fresh young spinach, celery, cauliflower, or carrot rounds. Radishes and green onions are plentiful and low-priced.

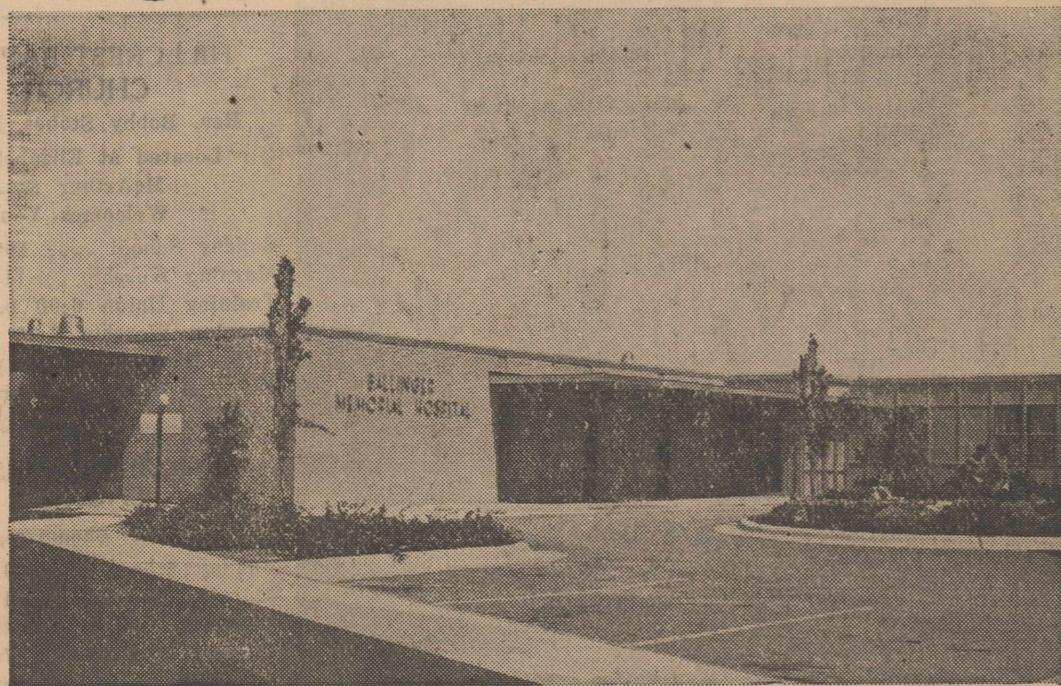
Other vegetables worthy of consideration this week are sweet corn, beets, yellow onions, green beans and potatoes.

At the meat counter, best buys are in the choice grades of beef. Boneless roasts, round steaks, short

ribs, ground beef and liver are some with your menu planning, and are quite economical. Large size eggs Turkey and chicken may help also are good buys.

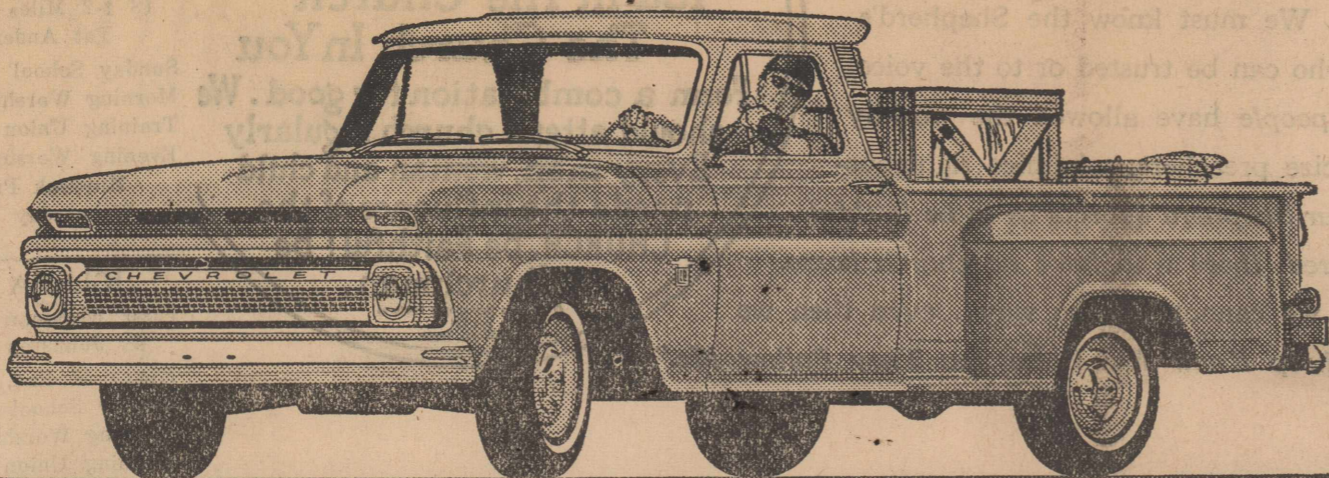
