He is a graduate of Hardin Simmons University, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and received an honorary Doctor of Divinity from Hardin Simmons in 1961. During World War II, he served four years as pilot in the U. S. Air Force, flying P-38's over New Guinea, Philippines, Okinawa, and Japan. Last spring, Dr. Jackson returned to the States and is now serving as associate pastor of the First Baptist Church in Houston.

From 1951 to 1964, Dr. Jackson served as missionary to Japan, during which time he conceived the idea and served as Associate Director of the Japan New Life Crusade. This Crusade was conducted by approximately 1,000 United States Laymen and preachers who went to Japan at their own expense and conducted revivals and visitation programs there for two weeks.

Frontal Assault on TB

What effect does a tuberculosis victim in Korea, Venezuela, Turkey or the Congo have on community health in, say, Kansas City?

Dr. Johannes Holm, executive director of the International Union Against Tuberculosis, gives this grim answer: "Twenty thousand out of each million American citizens stationed out of the country on official duty for one year will return to the United States infected with TB germs."

That figure includes U.S. military men, overseas employees of American companies, Peace Corps volunteers, missionaries and thousands of others on foreign assignments. With a pledge of support

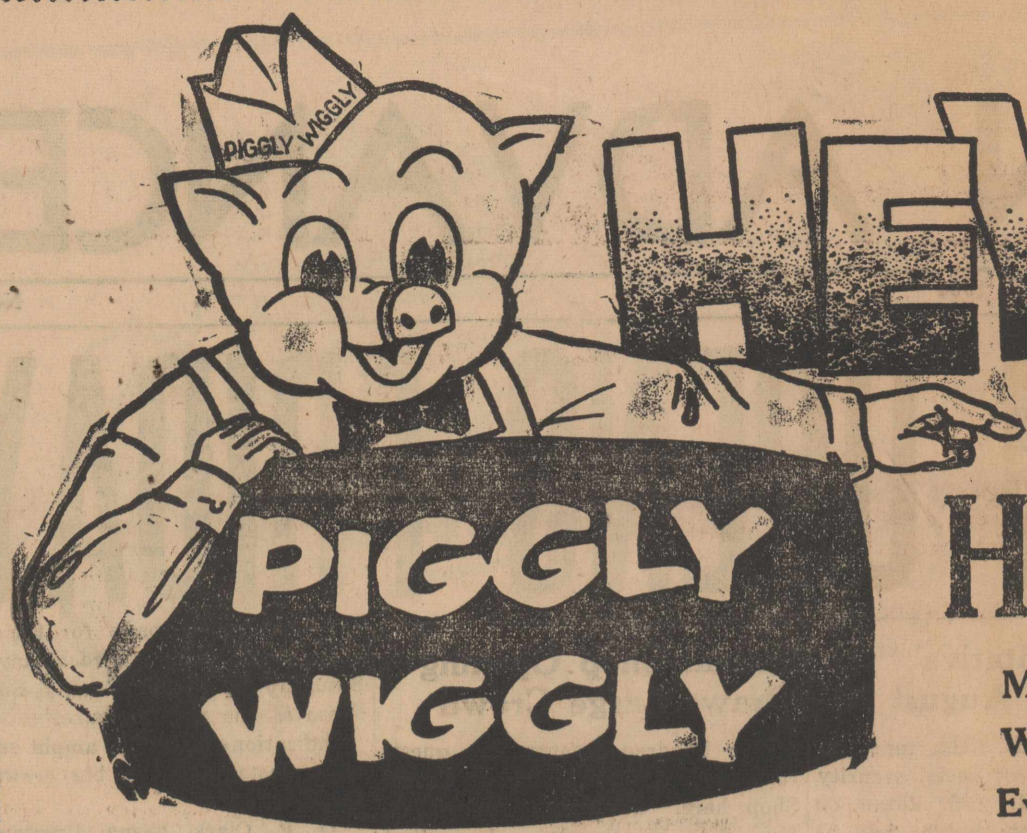
from President Johnson, the World Health Organization (WHO) has just launched a new drive to wipe out TB worldwide.

WHO, a United Nations agency, reports that for the past five years, 55,000 new cases were reported annually in the U.S. Around the world each year, the disease takes 2 million lives.

"Yet all this could be easily prevented by X-ray detection, wonder drugs and vaccination," says WHO. In cooperation with the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), WHO is sponsoring research among its 125 member nations to speed the conquest of the ancient killer-disease.

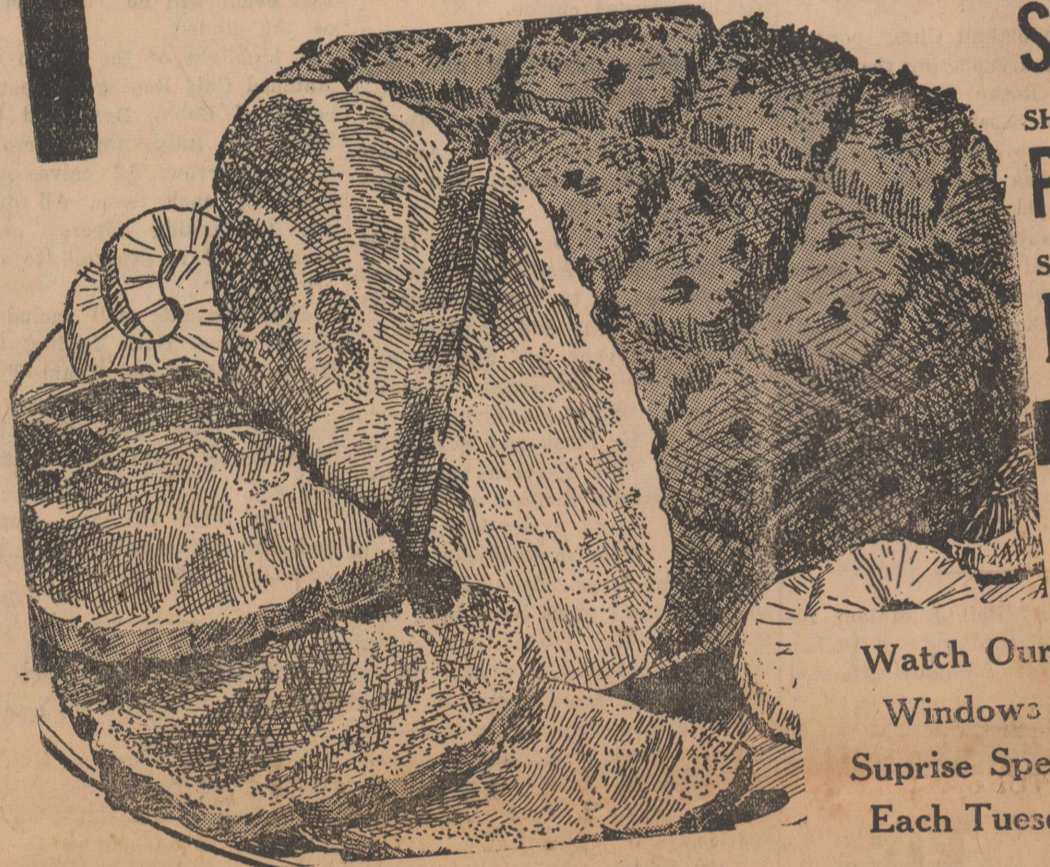

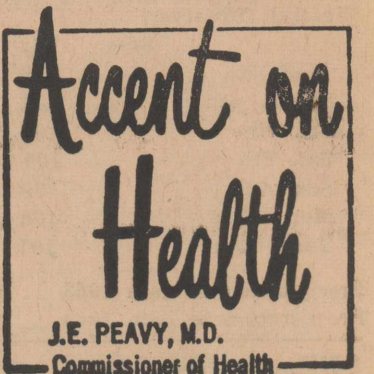

voided if your plan, and act, today.

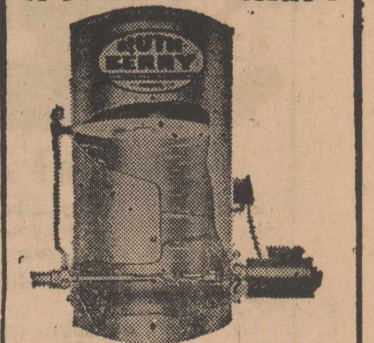

Dove Hunting Regulations Announced

Hunting regulations for the dove season have been issued by Executive Director J. Weldon Watson of the Parks and Wildlife Department of Texas. Game Warden Roy A. Lina said this week. Copies of the regulations and maps of the zones are at local sporting goods houses.

The season in the north zone opens Sept. 1 and ends Oct. 30. Time for hunting will be from 12 noon until sunset. The north zone extends south to a line from the south edge of Bexar County.

The law is unchanged except in one respect, it has been pointed out.

One section of the migratory bird law provides "the retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed migratory game birds is required while being transported between the place where taken and the personal abode of the possessor or between the place where taken and a commercial preservation facility."

Bag limit on mourning doves is 12 daily with a possession limit of 24. The limit on whitewinged doves is daily limit of 10 and possession limit of 20.

White wing season is Sept. 5 and 6 and Sept 12 and 13 from 2 p. m. to sunset in extreme south Texas counties.

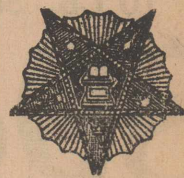

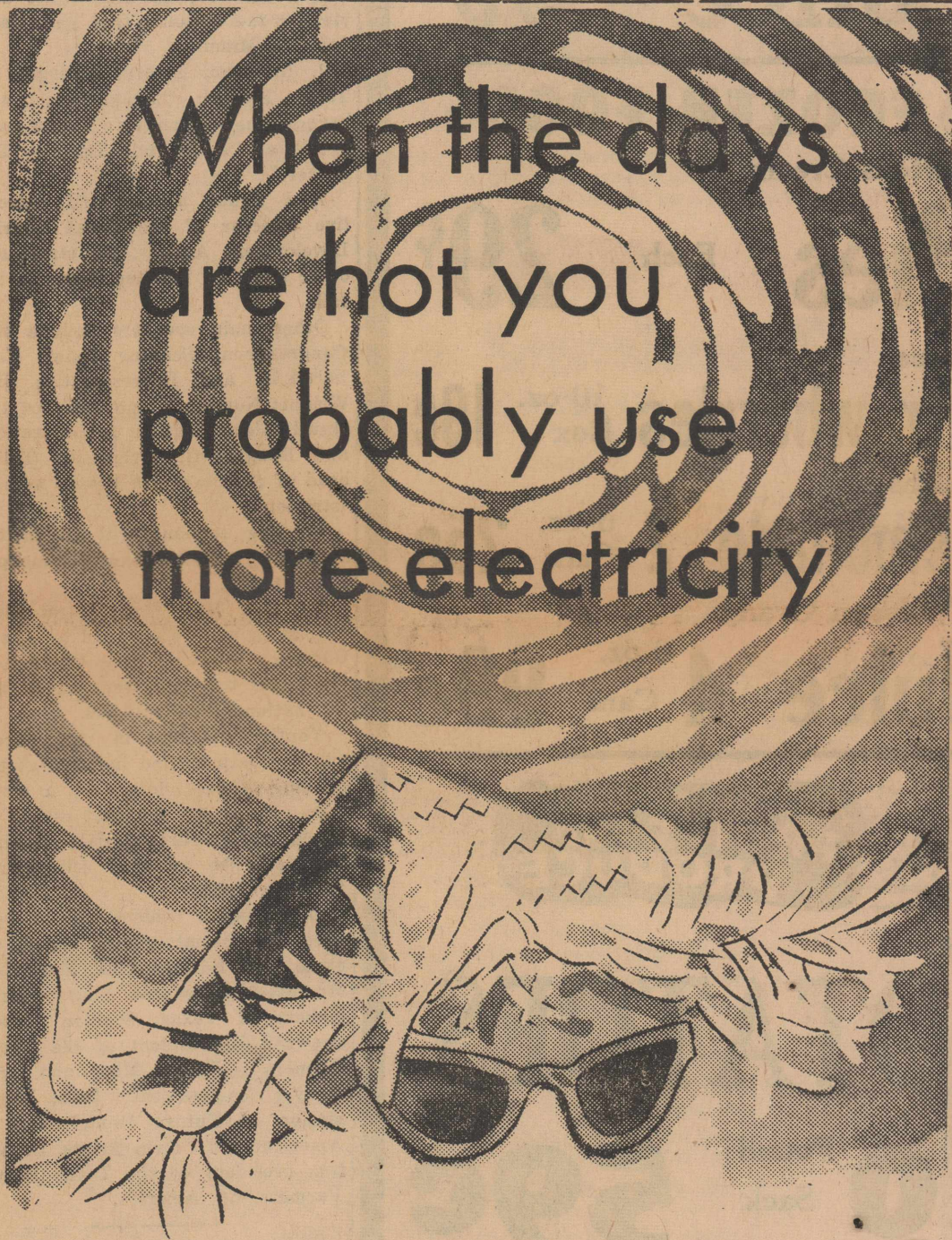

When the first rural electric cooperative was organized, only 2.3 per cent of the farms in Texas had electricity. Today, more than 97 per cent have power and the dozens of labor-saving machines and appliances which electricity makes possible.

Jane Cave, vice-president, Texas Association of Young Homemakers of America, will be an honored guest and appear on TV interview. Miss Cave is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Cave of Roby, former resident of Rotan.

The meeting will be the 24th annual convention of Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., state-wide association of the rural areas grow despite the drastic decline in the numbers of persons in farming and ranching.

But they will take time out for one evening of entertainment which will include a contest to select the 1965 Miss Texas Rural Electrification. This program will be Thursday, August 13, and the winner will vie for the national title next January in Miami.

Youthful leaders in rural areas will be featured and honored at the meeting. Three winners of a state-wide contest for the best essays on the history of rural electric cooperatives will be awarded scholarships totalling 1,000.

Other youth leaders will be honored as special guests. These include Mrs. Edward Weil, Hale Center, president of the Young Homemakers of Texas; Weldon Mason, Brownfield, president of the Young Farmers of Texas; Miss Jane Cave, Roby, vice-president, Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America; and Calvin Brints, Crosbyton, president of the Texas Future Farmers of America.

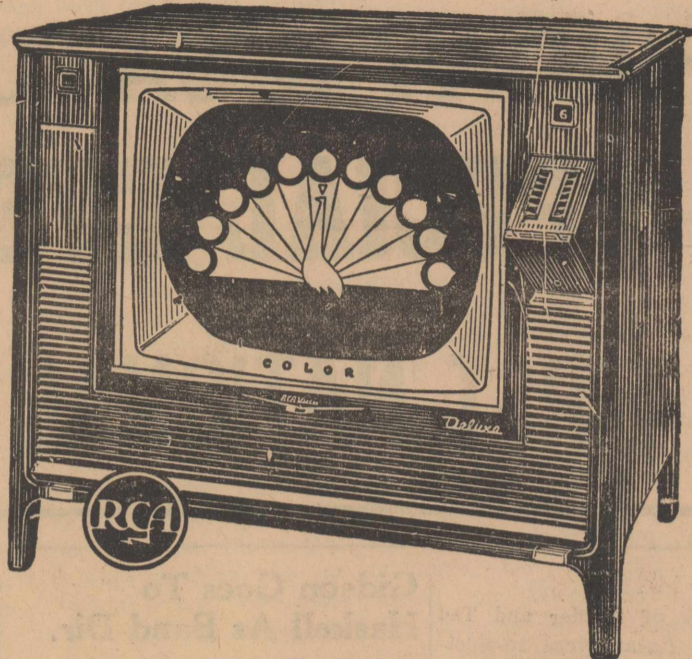
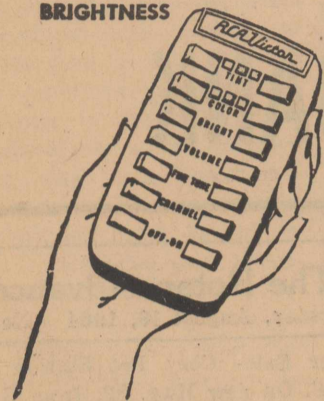

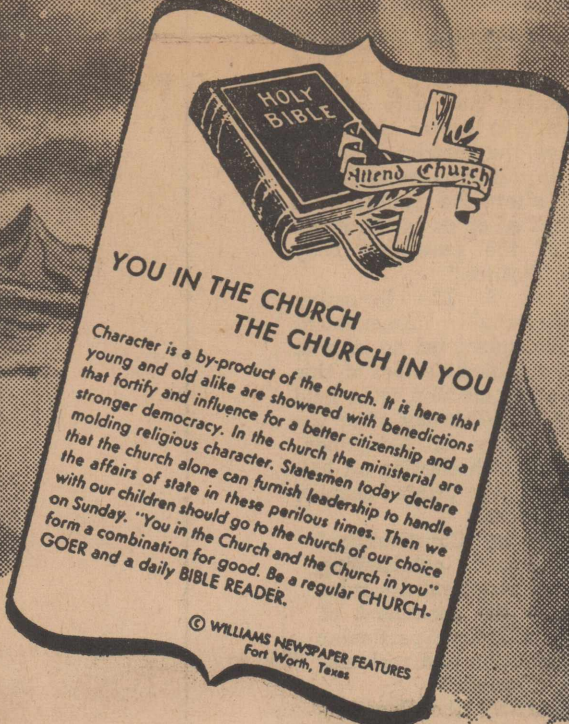

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:
 "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."
