Morrow To Attend State Veterans Meeting

Juston M. Morrow of Rotan, is scheduled to be in San Antonio during the week of September 7-10, 1964, to attend the 17th Annual Statewide Rehabilitation Conference for Veterans Service Officers. Mr. Morrow will attend this meeting in his official capacity as member of the Veterans Affairs Commission, a State agency. He is presently serving on this State Commission, having been appointed by the Governor last year to a six-year term.

Mr. Morrow, along with the other four members of the Veterans Affairs Commission, compose a policy-making board which directs the work of the State agency. The Commission is a State agency which was established to provide assistance to the veterans of Texas, and to their dependants and survivors in obtaining State and Federal benefits for which their military service might have made them eligible.

Mr. Morrow has long been active in veterans affairs. He is a veteran of World War II, and has served as Post Commander of his local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post on three different occasions. He also served as Department Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in 1953-1954.

The Statewide Conference is an annual affair which is conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission for the benefit of all Veterans Service Officers in the State. During the week of the Conference, panel discussions will be held on the various veterans benefits, and plans call for the attendance of several dignitaries from Washington, who will serve on the program and discuss the latest passed by the United States Congress affecting veterans. On Monday, September 7, 1964, the Veterans Affairs Commission will hold its regular Quarterly meeting, at which time officers will be elected for the coming year. The other members of the Commission at this time are Mr. John E. McKelvey of Electra, Mr. Joe F. Ramsey of Houston, Mr. J. Walter Janko of Somerville, and Mr. Charles C. Ford of Longview.

The meeting was in the public interest and in compliance with the consultation provisions of Public Law 78.

This law provides that where a shortage of domestic agricultural workers exists, Mexican Nationals and certain other foreign workers may be imported to relieve this shortage.

County Committee members met with area representatives of the Texas Employment Commission to review current farm labor forecasts of seasonal worker needs, the estimated supply and shortages, and other aspects of the Farm Placement Program for the next twelve months.

Consultation with members of this committee is of valuable assistance to TEC in serving Fisher County farmers and workers.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Lotief of Rotan, Father Lotief was born in Cross Plains, Texas, one of three children. He attended the Rotan public schools, and after graduation from high school, he entered North Texas State University where he earned the Bachelor of Music degree in 1956.

In the fall of 1956, Father Lotief entered St. Mary's Seminary in Houston where he received a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy. For his theological training, Father Lotief studied in Rome and in Conception Seminary in Missouri. While in the seminary in Missouri, in 1963, he obtained the Master's degree in Religion. In June, 1964, he was awarded the degree of bachelor of sacred theology from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C.

The ministers of the ordination will be the Very Rev. Bernard Biversie, Master of ceremonies, Father Benedict Zientek, personal chaplain to Father Lotief, the Right Rev. 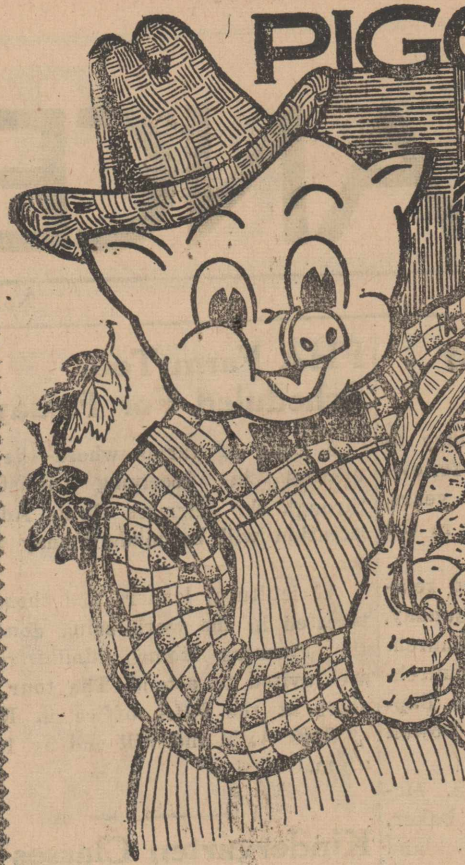

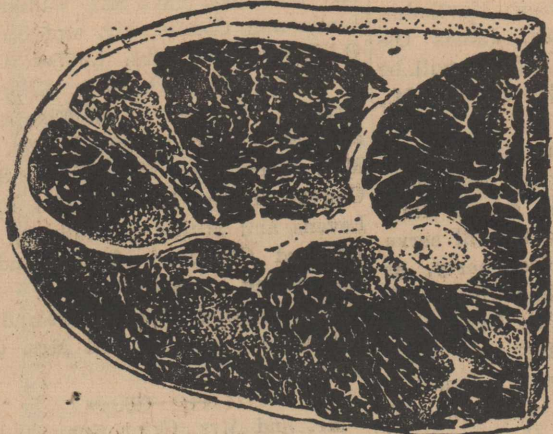

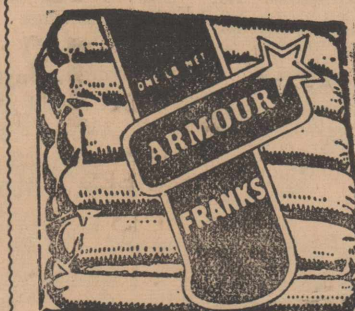

Albuquerque, Special) -- Mrs. Mary Hawkins and children of 712 Lee St. Rotan, visited Santo Domingo, the world's largest Indian pueblo, north of there this week.

Inside the pueblo, they found another world -- where 1,800 Indians practice the beliefs and rituals observed by their forefathers long before Columbus discovered America.

They toured the old Santa Domingo Mission, which contains furnishings and records dating back to 1605. The venerable structure was originally built 15 years before the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock.

Ceremonial dances are held at the pueblo each month throughout the years, and are open to the public without charge.

Santo Domingo is believed to be one of the "Seven Cities of Cibola", south by Coronado when he first explored the area in 1540. Instead of being cities of gold, they were seven pueblos of adobe mud which reflect rich amber in the dying sun.

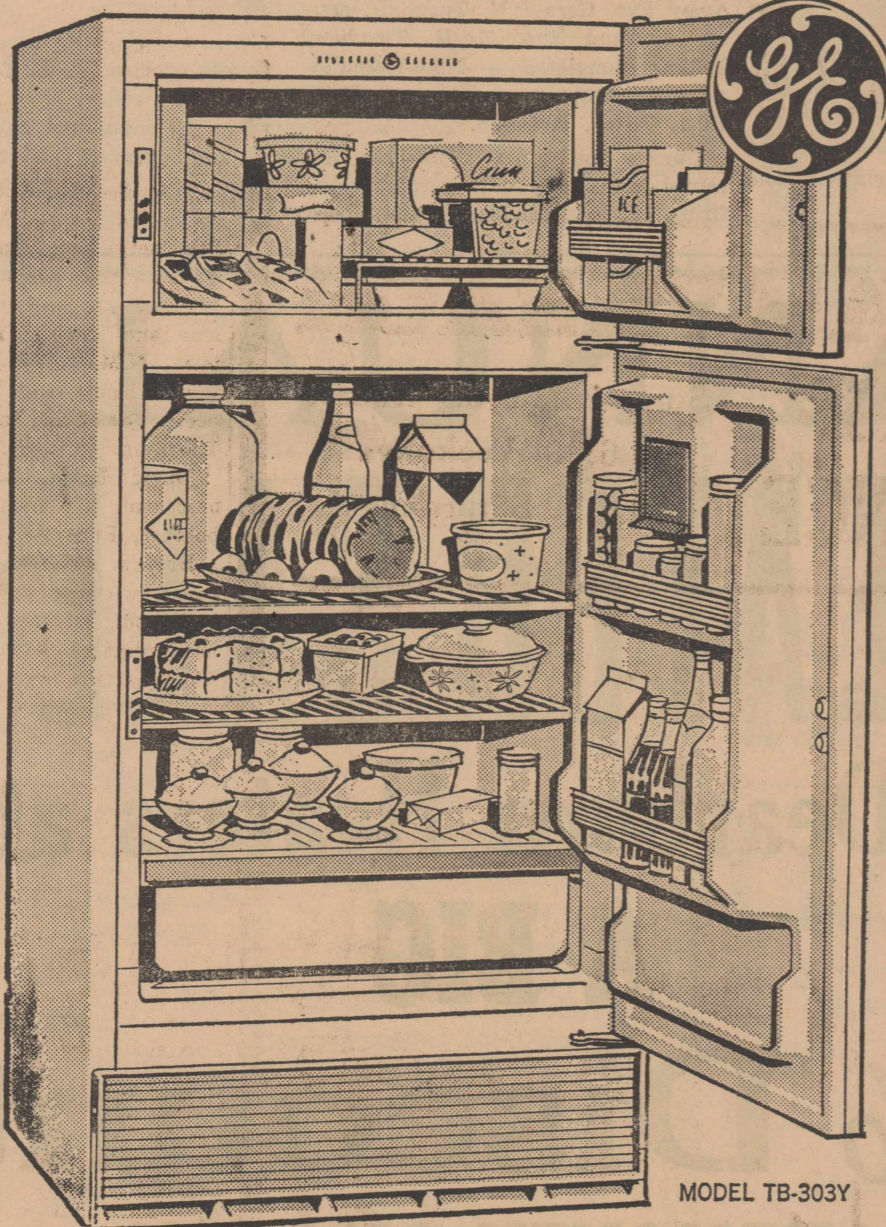

Roy Linn, area Game Warden states that prospects for opening of dove season looks good at this time in most areas. Doves are plentiful, bird counts over the state are above average.

Season opens Sept. 1, 12 o'clock noon, shooting hours noon to sundown with no morning hours; 12 birds daily limit. If birds are picked in field, leave feathers on one wing-tip.

He states that the 60-day dove season would close Oct. 30 and no shooting on public roads is allowed. Doves may be hunted with shotgun of not more than 3 shell capacity with rifles of any kind prohibited.

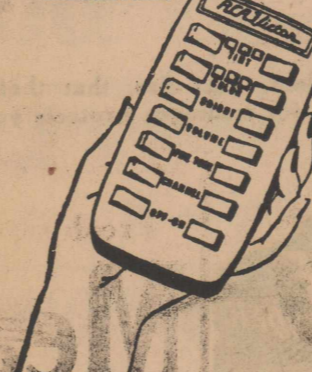

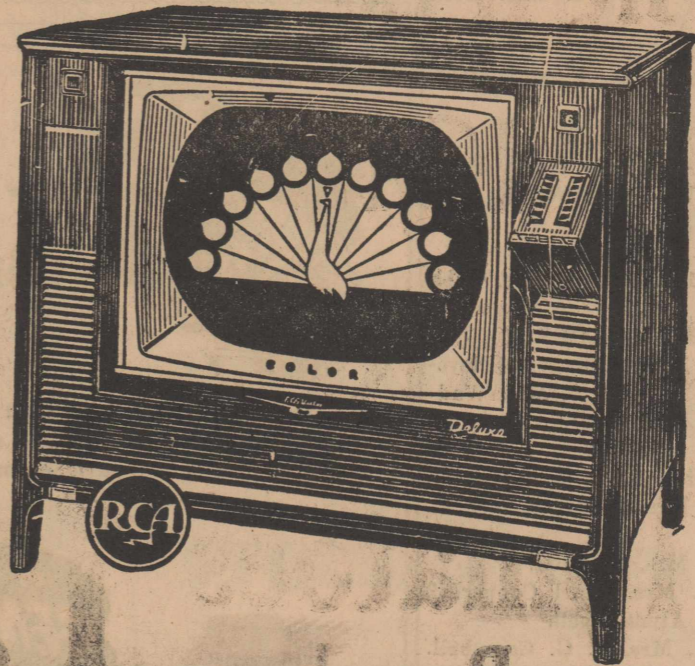
