Pond Spillway Importance Stressed

According to Jack Cadenhead, Soil Conservation Aid who assists the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District the importance to maintain a good farm pond spillway can never be overemphasized.

Farm ponds are designed for a fifty year rainfall frequency. The size of the drainage area above the pond then determines the width and depth required for a spillway. Actulay, the spillway of the pond is a safety device to keep the dam from breaking or to keep the excess water from cutting a ditch around the end of the dam. To attain this objective, continued Cadenhead, a spillway design is even more important than the design of the dam. The spillway should be designed so that it only functions a few times annually. It should be broad, shallow and covered with a permanent grass. Many ponds have natural spillways which is excellent. However, many spillways have to be cut and shaped. Where cutting and shaping is required in a spillway every effort should be made to get the area established to a permanent grass as soon as possible. Often this requires the spillway area to be fenced out so that cattle won't be forming trains in the spillway and destroying the vegetation as it begins to grow.

Mr. Glen Webb, SCD Board Chairman urges landowners to inspect their pond spillways and to do the necessary maintenance before our rainy season begins.

Stubble Valuable For Soil Conservation

How much is a ton of wheat stubble worth? Many people think grain stubble has very little value, but this is not true of a conservation farmer. Conservation farmers such as John "Dickey" Ferguson, Hamlin or Robert Scott, Jr., Sylvester and many others in the County recognize the value of grain stubble in protecting the land. These conservation farmers plan their farming operations so that stubble is kept on the surface where it will do the most good. Stubble managed on the surface proves its worth in terms of increased crop yields in

future years. Properly managed stubble is an excellent conservation measure. When kept on the surface of the soil it helps conserve moisture that can be used by the next crop. Stubble is especially valuable on the heavy soils in helping to get the water into the soil. The stubble protects the soil from the hammering of the raindrops and prevents it from crusting over and sealing out the rain. Soils that are protected by stubble will allow the rain to soak in and be stored in the subsoil. Soils that are left bare often seal over during hard rains causing the water to run down the slope and stand in the terrace channels or run off the field and be lost. It is not uncommon to see water standing behind terraces for several days on fields that are plowed clean, while adjoining fields with good stubble cover have drunk up the water and stored it for future crops.

Reduced evaporation; according to Milburn Cook, local Work Unit Conservationist, is another value of good residue management. Fields that have been tested have shown that soil shaded by grain stubble will run 15 to 25 degrees cooler than bare ground in mid-summer. Lower temperatures means less
