Yellowhammer Use Air On Wylie 35-0

Yellowhammers used passing attack last Friday at Wylie to swamp the Bulldogs 35-0. James Thompkins and Eddie Mac Lang was the combination that did the work.

The pair teamed up for three touchdowns, with Thompkins doing the throwing and Lang the receiving. The duo got the Yellowhammers off and roaring early in the first quarter with a 44-yard TD play that ended a 77-yard drive. Jimmy Heathington boted the extra point.

In the second period Thompkins hit Lang with two payoff pitches, one covering 15 yards and the other 41. Heathington added the point by placement after the first tally.

Lang climaxed a 53-yard drive in the third stanza by ramming across from one yard out. Heathington's placement was true to the mark and Rotan held a 7-0 lead.

The Baugh brothers accounted for Rotan's final eight points in the fourth quarter. On the first play of the period, fullback Bruce Baugh plunged over from the one-yard line. Quarterback Steve Baugh then passed to Archie Overby for the two extra points that made the final tally 35-0.

Rotan piled up 392 yards total offense, 204 on the ground and 188 passing. Wylie managed 111 yards.

The victory was the Yellowhammers' third against a single loss in 6-A. Wylie suffered its third loop loss against one win.

Tuesdays Voting To Be At VFW Hall

Early Mailing--Use Of Zip Code Is Urged

It is not too early to shop, and mail early! Christmas parcels for overseas should be mailed by Nov. 10 in order to insure delivery by December 25.

All parcels, more especially those for overseas should be well packed in a heavy corrugated box with cushioning material at least two inches thick around and between breakable articles, well wrapped with good, heavy paper, and tied securely.

According to Postmaster Robert Phillips, a list of the articles in the parcel should be included in all packages, local as well as overseas and the complete name and address of sender and address in case the wrapper is torn or damaged.

Parcels may be endorsed "Do Not Open Until Christmas", and should be addressed only on one side, with Zip Code a part of the address and return address.

The Sectional Center method of mail receipt and dispatch, for which the Zone Improvement Program--Mr. ZIP was instituted, will be placed in operation in this area on November 14, making Zip Code a more necessary part of mail addresses for better and faster service to you.

Edwards Appointed Census Leader

W. F. Edwards, Jr., of Rotan, has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, Percy R. Millard, director of the regional office of the U. S. Bureau of the Census at Dallas, announced today. The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U. S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Fisher county to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators. Enumeration of all farms in the county will take place in November and early December.

The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will mail census questionnaires to all rural box-holders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time, the enumerator will answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leader is a key person in conducting a Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules their work, reviews the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventories, and information on farm equipment and improvements and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published starting in 1965 for counties, States, and the nation.

Stockmen are being cautioned to watch for grass tetany, a cattle ailment that sometimes pop up in fall and winter.

Dr. Dixon Hubbard, Extension Livestock Specialist, says such small grain grasses as oats, wheat, barley and rye are capable of producing the sickness, particularly after rain. Common and Coastal Bermuda and mesquitegrass also can cause the trouble.

The disease is believed to be the result of an imbalance in body magnesium. Changing cattle from dry grass to lush winter pastures, or sudden temperature changes can encourage tetany.

It's most likely to occur in the older, more mature cow that has just calves or is near calving. It also is known to occur in yearling calves that have just been put on lush pastures.

The condition is characterized by lack of coordination, muscular tremors, excessive drooling and teeth grinding. Symptoms end with convulsions and coma six to twelve hours after first signs.

Treatment is largely ineffective once the animal reaches coma. But intravenous injections of various magnesium and calcium salts with dextrose is beneficial before coma.

Removal of cattle from lush pasture is the obvious prevention if grass tetany is suspected. However, they can usually be left on the grass if they are supplemented with coarse dry roughage.

The Extension Specialist said California has suffered large cattle losses from grass tetany. The problem has become so serious that the California Agricultural Experiment Station has developed an emergency ration which will prevent the ailment. The ration is magnesium oxide, milo or corn, and cottonseed meal and is fed at the rate of one pound per animal per day.

Farm Land Value Rises -- Market values of farm real estate advanced 6% in year ended July 1, and 3% in March to July period. National index of average value per acre as of July was 135, a record. All states increased in per acre values, adding about \$8 billion to the total market value of farm real estate between March 1963 and March '64. Total value on July 1 was estimated at \$100 billion or \$141 per acre, up \$7 from a year earlier.

Items no longer deductible under the 1964 law are: state and local taxes on liquor, cigarettes, hotel rooms, theatre tickets, local driver's licenses and auto tag fees.

All unreimbursed moving expenses are deductible in computing adjusted gross income. To be eligible, the new place of employment must be at least 20 miles from the former residence. You may be able to choose the water you drink and be selective about your choice of food, but whatever air is around you is the air you are going to breathe.

As a matter of fact, you automatically breathe about 80 pounds-or 15,000 quarts- of whatever air is available each day, while you only eat about three pounds of food and drink at the most about four quarts of water.

A healthy mind and body requires clean, fresh air. This fact coupled with the growing air pollution problem caused by an ever growing human and industrial population is causing a growing concern about the state of our air.

And because of concern, President Johnson set aside October 25 through 31 as Cleaner Air Week.

This is an excellent period for all of us to evaluate the air cleanliness of our communities. It's not all that it should be, then it is time to evaluate the efforts the community is making to control air cleanliness.

It isn't only the big industrial cities that have difficulties. A Texas town that has any kind of industry-chemical plants, petroleum refineries, cotton gins or such- may have air pollution without realizing it. Should there be such a problem, it certainly would be well to take inventory of the efforts your community is making in your behalf, regarding cleaner air.

Already there is much study and effort being done in Texas to evaluate and remedy some of the air pollution problems.

The State Department of Health has completed its part in a national air pollution appraisal.

In addition, the Health Department, through the cooperation of local health units, and National Air Sampling Network of the Public Health Service, maintains twenty-four air sampling stations in points of highest population around the state.

Air samples collected at these stations are analyzed for degree of pollution loading and radioactivity.

One city and two counties have their own separate programs for studying air pollution. And several have an air pollution committee.

Every cleaner air program needs the individual support of all its citizens. What do you know about the air you breathe?

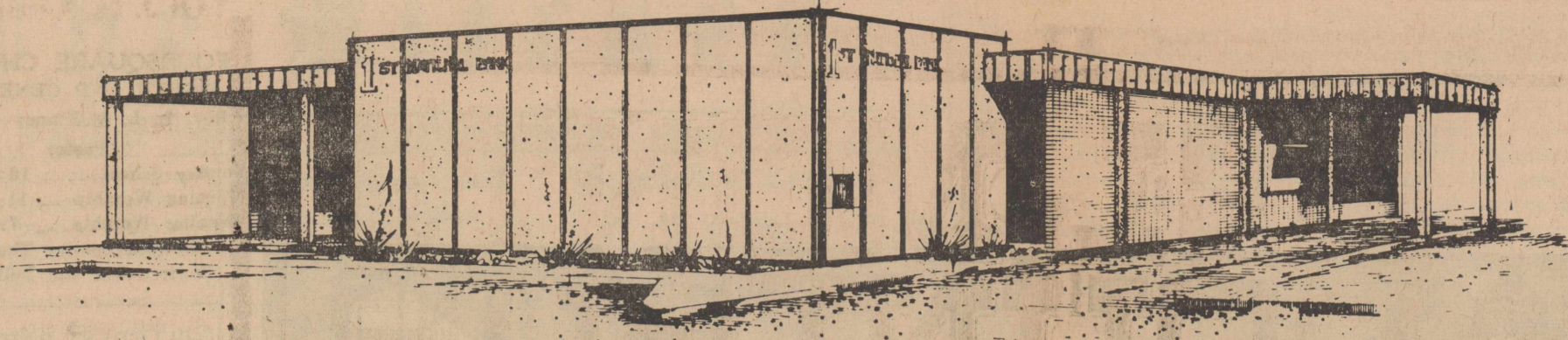

UCFSC Urges That Soil Be 'Tied Down'

The Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District urges that each acre of soil be tied down this year. In 1964 approximately 500 acres of land was damaged from wind erosion caused by the lack of ground cover, in Fisher County.

Cover crops should be planted along turn rows, barrow ditches and along tops of terraces where much of the blowing is triggered. The heavy equipment we use to farm now days pack and smooth the soil along turn rows and get it ready to blow.

On cotton fields where enough protective residues are not produced to control wind erosion, a cover of wheat or rye should be considered.

A small grain cover drill may be used between the rows in a skip row system or the field can be drilled solid if the fields are especially susceptible to blowing.

Small grain uses very little moisture until after February. At this time the small grain should be under-cut by sweeps and the foliage will be left on top of the soil for protection. Small grain such as wheat or rye may be planted successfully up to November 1.

If you are fortunate enough to have some good crop residue or can get cotton burs to go back on the land, take advantage of these. A chisel operation will help to tie the residues into the soil.

If you are unable to plant a cover crop, roughening the surface by deep breaking, listing or chiseling may be considered. Emergency tillage should only be used at the last resort and should not be substituted for other practices to control erosion.

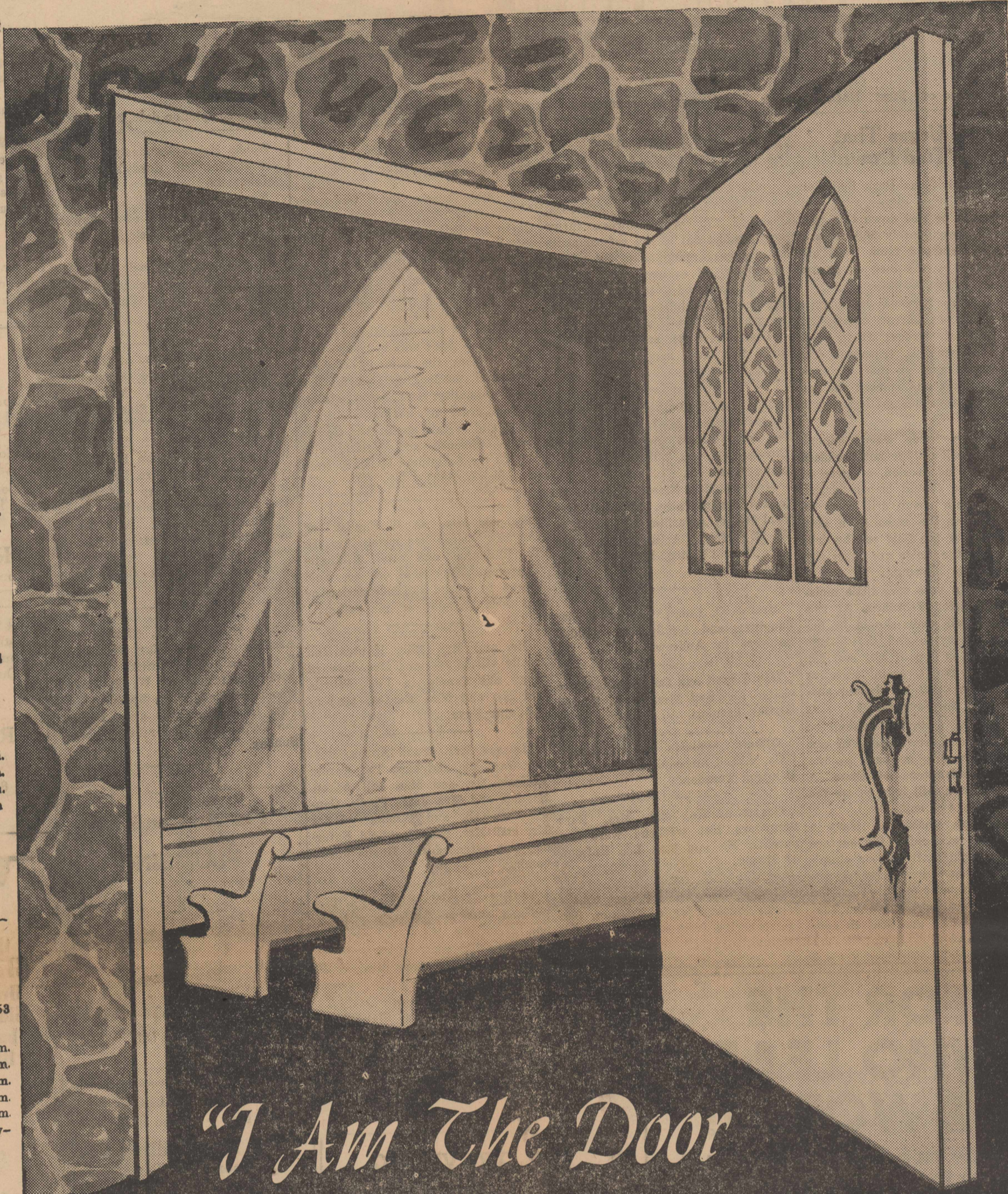
