

With green grazing becoming limited, beef cattle producers need to give special consideration to supplying phosphorous for their herds herds. This mineral is deficient at times in all sections of Texas, with late summer, fall and winter being critical periods in all areas.

Cows fed phosphorus suppliments where the deficiency occurs may average as much as 200 pounds heavier than those not receiving the supplements. Calves may weigh 50-70 pounds more at weaning age, calf crops can be increased as much as 30% and cows may conceive earier after calving.

Practical methods of supplying phosphorus to range cattle include soluble phosphorus in drinking water and phosphorus supplements in mineral feeders.

Where the water suply of cattle can be controlled, adding phosphorus to the water may be the most satisfactory method. Monosodium phosphate may be added to water to water troughs by hand, while there are automatic dispensers which add the desired amount of mineral solution to a given amount of water.

Where the mineral is added by hand, recommendations generally call for one-fourth ounce of monosodium phosphate per eight gallons of water or one-fourth ounce per head daily. A stock solution of two and one-half pounds of this phosphate per gallon of water or 100 pounds to 40 gallons of water is recommended when using an automatic dispenser. This machine automatically proportions the mineral to the water.

Sheltered mineral feeders offer protection from wind and rain and thereby lessen waste. The weathvane type is satisfactory if kept level and treated with a rust preventive. Having the feeding through 12-18 inches above the ground will permit calves free access to the mineral. The feeding box should be divided so that only salt may be supplied in one compartment and additional minerals in the other.

A mixture of one part salt and two parts steamed bonemeal by weight is recommended for selffeeding where phosphorus is highly deficient. Half and half mixes are best under borderline conditions whereas bonemeal without salt is recommended in saline areas. Where salt is fed in mixtures to control protein supplement intake, bonemeal should be fed alone.

Additional information on phosphorus and other minreals needed by beef cattle is available at the county Extension office.

When you have your soils tested, you are getting information needed for making sound decisions about your fertilization practices.

Over 100 soil samples were tested from Fisher County this year. Soil tests also tell you whether your soils are low (L), medium (M) or high (H), in phosphorus and potassium. These are fertility levels and fertilization practices can be varied according to these levels, ev-

en for the same crop. For example, about 100 pounds per acre of potash (K2O) is suggested for a bale of cotton on soils very low in potassium. This amount may be reduced to 40 pounds on soils with a medium potash level. All fo this potash could be applied at or before planting if suitable machinery were available to place the fertilizer in bands or away from the seed to reduce the chances of salt injury. Rates of nitrogen and phosphorus should also be based on

the soil level and expected yield. Soil test information tells you what plant foods or mutrients are most deficient in your soils. Ferfilization practices are suggested to compensate for these deficiences. Investing money in fertilizers containing those nutrients needed for high yields can mean good rturns, provided other recommended production practices are carried out.

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

Protection-Courtesy To BB Game Officials

Before the basketball season got underway, a letter was sent to all the School Administrators, Athletic Directors, and Coaches in Interscholastic League. Its purpose was to establish protection and courtesy to the game officials.

All of the schools in the League are to accept the decisions of officials without protest, to see that officials are extended protection and courtesy by players, school personnel, and laymen; to treat opponents as guests; and to put clean play and real sportsmanship above victory. This is the code that each school must accept when they enter the Interscholastic League.

Nevertheless, during the past, the State Executive Committee has had to inflict more penalties on member schools for misconduct relative to game officials than for any other one rule violation. Therefore the Committee must extend two new rules to be enforced at basket games; they are as follows: 1. Police protection be furnished at all besketball games to insure proper conduct of fans and to provide and escort for the game officials. The officers should meet the officials and conduct them to their dressing facilities both prior to and after the game. They should be situated in the gymnasium that they can protect the game officials. 2. The public address system should be used prior to each game to explain to the fans the meaning of the besketball code and that the officials are guests of both teams and should be so treated. Pre-game invocations along with the playing of the National Anthem are also recommended to help create a proper atmosphere

The State Executive Committee is making an urgent appeal to all schools that these rules be followed. However, if misconduct occurs, it should be reported to the League Office at once, and the person should be proseccuted to legal limits. -- Zana Thompson
