**Two Seriously Injured In Traffic Mishap**

Carlton (Corky) Taylor and Miss Kay McCoy of Hamlin were both seriously injured about 6:30 p. m. last Saturday on Hamlin highway in city limits in front of Ed Patton home.

Officers state that James Robinson Jr. Rotan negro was driving at high speed on wrong side of road and caused the accident. Several other cars behind Taylor ran into yards to miss being involved in the accident. Robinson was arrested and lodged in Rotan jail, later being moved to Roby and he entered a plea of guilty to DWI before County Judge Ed Perkins. He was assessed a 15 day jail sentence and \$200 fine plus court costs, which will amount to about 82 days in jail.

Taylor and Miss McCoy were treated at Callan Hospital Saturday night. Miss McCoy was moved to Hamlin Memorial Hospital Sunday and is reported to have suffered internal injuries in addition to cuts about the head, Taylor, on leave from the Air Force and stationed in Puerto Rico was moved to Dyess AFB Hospital for treatment. His family reports that he remains in much pain and Dyess doctors state he has serious back injury and possible internal injuries.

Cars involved were total wrecks and wreckage was scattered in several residences' yards. People inside homes in the area first thought a plane had crashed in the vicinity from the joud crash.

**Much Work Being Done On Rail Service Problem**

Mayor Juston Morrow and Industrial Committee chairman, James Springer have made much effort on the problem of MK&T railway service to Rotan in regard to National Gypsum Co. shipping of manufactured products, during the past week. They with numerous local civic organizations and individuals have wired and written the Railroad Commission in regard to the poor service now being rendered by MK&T to Rotan. Numerous derailments occur and no schedule of days is maintained into Rotan.

This uncertain shipping condition has curtailed business at the local gypsum plant until the recent lay-off of men occurred. This hurts every business and person in Rotan, hence nothing is being overlooked that might help solve the problem. No definite commitments have developed thus far but action is expected in some quarter so that Rotan may have a regular schedule of freight trains.

Competent persons who have inspected the track and rolling stock state that little if any maintenance has been made since 1958 and this same source states that this end of the line is very profitable to Katy, leaving it hard for us to understand why the track and equipment is not being maintained so trains may move faster than the 5 to 10 mph they now move and run on regular schedule.

**Nazarene Church Sets Records For 1964**

Kansas City, Mo. -- Per capita in the Church of the Nazarene was a record \$160.38 in 1964, it was reported at International offices of the denomination here. This was an increase of \$6.82 over the previous high mark in 1963.

Giving for all purposes in 1964 was a record \$55,462,375--a gain of \$3,429,000 over the preceding year.

Gains in membership brought the denomination's world membership total of 415,470 at the close of 1964. Of this, domestic members totaled 349,270--a net gain of 7,238 over 1963--and membership in overseas churches in 46 countries was 66,200.

The annual statistical report by the Rev. B. Edgar Johnson, general secretary, showed the denomination had a net gain of 28 churches making a total of 8,877 in the U. S., Canada and the British Isles.

Other areas of church work had increases during 1964 including world and home missions departments and the young people's society.

The stewardship report apparently assured the Nazarene church of continuing as first in the nation in per capita giving among all churches with 100,000 or more members.

The denomination will complete basic development of its International Center here with the dedication of a third major building on Monday, January 18, 1965. The International Center construction and site are valued at about 5 million dollars.

The local Church of the Nazarene of Rotan has a new building valued at 15,000 dollars. The membership at the beginning of the 1964-65 statistical year was 36 with a per capita giving of approximately \$206.00. We are grateful of God for his blessings both spiritually and financially.

1965 will prove to be a challenging year as have the past year, but our church hopes to grow by the use of the language of dependence, prayer.

The church welcomes those who do not have a church home to join in worship each Sunday and Wednesday.

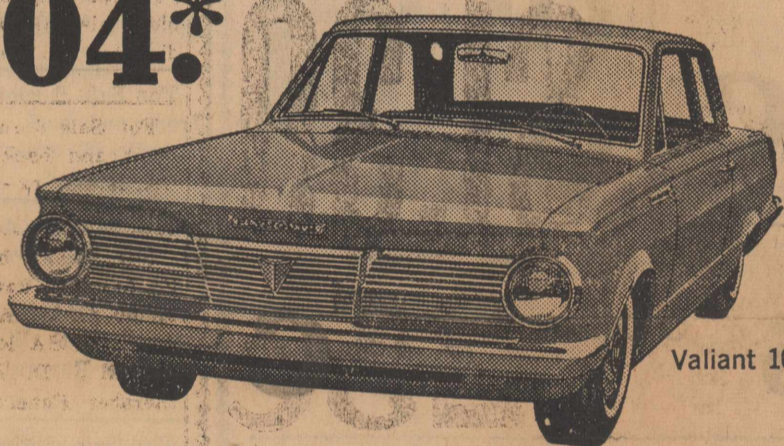

### Rotan High School Has New Lettering System

I. There will be only one jacket given each year to an individual. A. No. individual football, basketball or track jacket will be given.

B. The one jacket will be "Athletic Jacket"

II. To acquire an athletic jacket, one must score 11 points and letter in one of the three major sports (football, basketball, or track).

III. Points are scored in this way:

Football: reserve, 6 points; letter, 1; total, 7

Basketball: reserve, 3 points; letter, 1; total 4

Track: reserve, 3 points; letter, 1; total, 4

IV. 11 points may be obtained by

A. Lettering in football and one other sport

B. Lettering in football and participating in two other sports.

C. Lettering in two sports other than football and participating in football.

V. A person who does not score 11 points will be given a sweater if he letters in one of the three sports.

A person who scores 11 points but does not letter in one of the three major sports will also be awarded a sweater.

VI. The athletic jacket is the symbol of outstanding athletic ability in Rotan High School.

VII. An athletic jacket must pass three (3) subjects at all times to qualify for an Athletic award.

VIII. A person may letter in football by participating in a total of 16 quarters.

IX. A person may letter in basketball by participating in one-half of the total number of quarters.

X. Track Lettering

A. Score 6 points in the district meet, or

B. Run on a relay qualifying for regional, or

C. Score a total of 16 points in meets other than district. Jackets and sweaters will be ordered after District track meet. Rotan Schools feel that it is quite an honor to receive an athletic award. An athlete must exhibit good moral and citizenship standards in judgment of the coaches and the Administration at the time the awards are ordered.

Any exceptions of the above must be approved by the Superintendent.

### Report Stresses Rate of Texas Illiteracy

According to the report prepared by the Texas State Board of Education, the illiterates in Texas constitutes more than 11% of our population, 14 years of age or older, or more than 700,000 individuals with less than a fifth grade education.

Every ninth man in our state walks in the shadow of ignorance. The blackboard curtain has set up real and psychological barriers that separate and isolate him, and his family, from the community.

The educationally deficient individual lacks basic education, the ability to read, write, and do simple arithmetic. Without this ability, he is committed to a future of low earnings, recurrent or persistent unemployment, and dependency on welfare agencies.

He lives in a sub-standard home lacking sanitation and health facilities. He is unable to cope with written instructions in connection with the use of medicine, the direction of traffic, operation of appliances, and the completion of employment and tax forms. Consequently, he is presently unemployed and in effect, he is unemployable.

He is unable to benefit from major vocational training programs because he lacks the basic educational skill. He is dependent upon public assistance, unemployment compensation, public and private charities, and relatives. The cost to the state resulting from his lack of basic education is increasing as automation and high skill requirements displace more unskilled laborers.

The educationally deficient individual lacks; educational skills necessary for personal enjoyment, skills for securing and holding jobs, social skills for community participation, initiative, and knowledge for proper health care, and an understanding of sanitation and health facilities. He is, or is likely to become; suspicious, anti-social, relief participant, and ward of the state.

Lack of employment in the local community forces many to join the migrant stream moving in and out the state. There are more than 130,000 migrants including men, women and children in Texas. More than 90,000 leave the state in search of employment. Illiteracy is extremely high in areas of dense Latin American population, with 1,000 migrants in 14 such counties.

Alien population is a factor related to illiteracy. Texas ranks third in the nation in number of registered aliens with 241,001 of which, 204,382 are Mexican Nationals. The steady immigration of Mexican and other aliens will continue to present major educational problems, unless programs are designed to meet their needs.

There is a definite relationship between illiteracy and crime, and also between illiteracy and unemployment and the inability to pursue vocational training. One of every ten workers who failed to finish elementary school is unemployed today as compared to one out of 50 college graduates. There are more than 50,000 with less than 5th grade education who have registered in the Texas Employment Commission offices in Texas.

In summary, the percentage of illiteracy in Texas counties is interesting geographically. In eight counties, illiteracy is more than 20%. In 28 counties, illiteracy is between 10 and 20%. In the other counties, illiteracy is less than 10%. Only 60 counties have less 5% illiteracy rate.

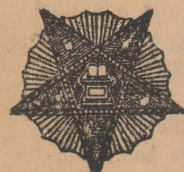

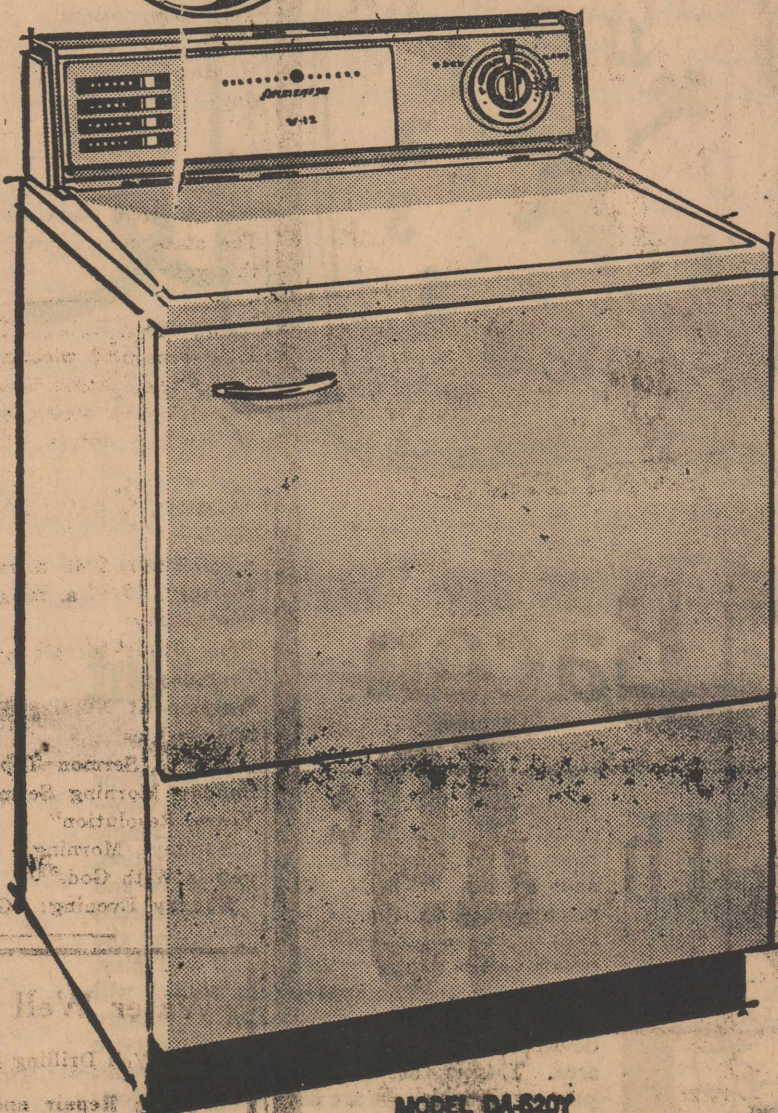

**New Credit Aid For Low-Income Rural Folks**

A new credit service to help low-income families in rural areas raise their income is now available in Texas, according to State Director, L. J. Cappleman, Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Cappleman said today the new service open up Farmer Home Administration credit aid for the first time to many low-income rural families who previously were unable to obtain either public or private loans to improve their earnings.

All County offices in Texas, Cappleman said, are accepting applications for loans up to \$2,500 to finance farming enterprises, small family businesses, trades and services. Rural cooperatives serving low-income families and providing services and facilities not otherwise available may also be eligible for credit under the program.

Borrowers will be provided continuing management aid to help them make a success of their farming enterprises or new businesses.

Farmers Home Administration, a U. S. Department of Agriculture agency, will administer the new loan service under recently delegated authority from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Liberalized loan terms and conditions for participating low-income families allow for an interest rate of 4.1-8 percent.

To be eligible for the new rural credit program, an applicant must live in a rural area, have an income that does not cover basic family necessities, be unable to obtain credit from other sources, including the regular loan program of the Farmers Home Administration, and show a reasonable promise of succeeding in the enterprise to be financed by the loan.

A cooperative, to be eligible, must be primarily composed of and serve low-income rural families and be unable to obtain credit from other sources.

About 3.5 million families in rural areas across the country, including 500,000 farm families, are unable

**U. S. Saving Bond Sales Report Made**

Savings Bond sales for the first eleven months of 1964 totaled \$62,580 in Fisher County. Of this amount \$1,659 were purchased during the month of November according to Mr. Springer Chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November Texans purchased \$11,577,054 in Series E and H Savings Bonds. This represents a 9.6% increase over the same period last year. Cumulative sales for eleven months of 1964 amounted to \$133,954,497 which is 90.6% of the state's goal of \$150 million.

### Vehicle Inspection Urged Before Rush

Austin-Col Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety today encouraged Texas motorists to "start the new year with a safe vehicle" by securing the 1965 vehicle inspection sticker without further delay.

The Public Safety Director said that approximately one-half of the inspection period has expired and only about one-fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. He added that unless the inspection pace is stepped up, motorists may expect to find the usual waiting lines at the inspection stations when the April 15 deadline approaches.

"The inspection stickers for 1965 have been available since September 1," Garrison said, allowing ample time for all vehicles to be inspected without delay prior to the deadline. There can be no extension of the deadline and vehicles not displaying the new sticker will be in violation of the law after April 15."

Texas now has more than 5,200 authorized inspection stations over the state. According to Garrison, these stations are ready and capable of handling the remaining uninspected vehicles without delay provided vehicle owners do not wait until just a few days before the deadline.

He pointed out that the basic function of vehicle inspection is to detect and correct vehicle defects that might cause an accident. He said that last year vehicle defects contributed to fewer traffic accidents than ever before in Texas.
