2 Year Sentence Is Given In Murder Trial

Tom Parker was elected as this year's Rodeo Director.

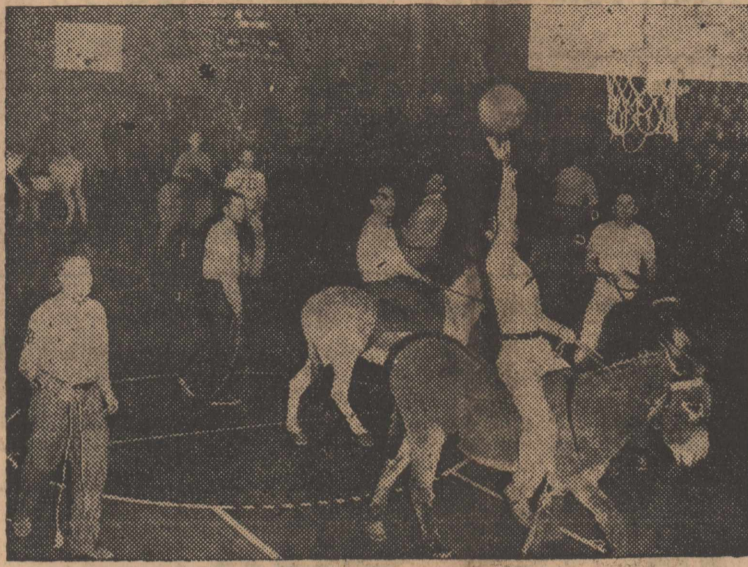
The meeting Monday night is an open meeting to the public and anyone interested in the future of the Fisher County Fair and Rodeo are urged to attend, said Upshaw.

Ratliff Named On Important Committees

On Wednesday, January 13, Lt. Governor Preston Smith announced the appointment of standing committees for the Texas Senate. Senator David Ratliff of Stamford, representing the 24th Senatorial District was named chairman of the Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns and vice-chairman of the Oil and Gas Committee. The Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns in past years has been the clearing house for the second largest number of bills introduced in the Senate. Only the State Affairs Committee, of which the Senator is also a member, reviews more legislation. As chairman of this committee, Senator Ratliff will be an increasingly important person in the eyes of his fellow legislators whose bills concerning local affairs must come before this committee.

Senator Ratliff will also be a key figure in the fate of Senate Bill 2 dealing with compulsory pooling of oil and gas. The bill was introduced by Senator Calhoun of Tyler, Chairman of the Oil and Gas Committee. Senator Calhoun, as is the custom in such cases, will relinquish his chairmanship to the vice chairman, Senator Ratliff, while the committee debates this important measure.

In addition, the Senator was appointed to the committees on Banking, Contingent Expense, Insurance, Labor and Management, Relations, Water and Conservation, Public Health and Transportation. Senator Ratliff will also serve on the Committee and Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts which will be concerned with the controversial question relating to legislative and congressional re-apportionment.

Although the legislature has only been in session since January 12, Senator Ratliff has already received a large amount of correspondence regarding the proposed legislation to legalize para mutual betting and Senate Bill 8, popularly known as the "open saloon" bill permitting sale of liquor by the drink. Consistent with his past record, Senator Ratliff remains opposed to such legislation.

Kerns In Recruit Training At San Diego

San Diego, Calif.—Seaman Recruit Jimmy L. Kerns, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie R. Kerns of Rotan reported January 15, for recruit training at the Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

He is learning basic military law, customs and etiquette, seamanship, and a basic knowledge of shipboard routine.

Also included in the training is extensive military drill, first aid, swimming, water survival tactics and physical fitness.

Official Says Oil Pooling Bill Important To All Of Fisher County

Citizens of Fisher County, producer of some \$13 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature, James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, reported this week.

"Although Fisher County has production, the oil men who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

A measure, supported by all segments of the Texas petroleum industry after two years of intra-industry conference and study, was recently introduced as Senate Bill 2 by Senator Galloway Calhoun, Jr., of Tyler, and as House Bill 2 by Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge.

Sewell stressed that the measure does not affect normal leasing and voluntary pooling arrangements between landowners and operators, nor does it affect in any way reservoirs discovered and produced before March 8, 1961 (date of Supreme Court decision that wells on small tracts could not produce at rates disproportionately higher than adjoining tracts).

"The pooling bill is designed to make it possible for mineral owners - regardless of the size of land they may have - to get their fair share of the oil and gas that may underly their acreage," he said.

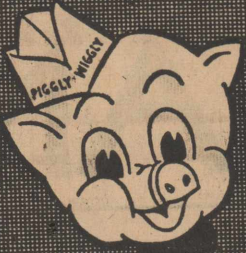
First Baptists To Hold Two Banquets

Fashions Change With Events of Century

The closing of the 17th hundreds found the people on the move. The U. S. was recovering from the Revolutionary War. The events of time were shown in the manner of dress. The women wore long flowing dresses that required seven to fourteen yards of material depending upon whether the dress was everyday or was Sunday best. Everyday headwear was a dust cap. The shoes were high topped with brass ornaments.

During early years of the 18 hundreds people were moving west-traveling by wagon or cart. The journey was often long and hazardous. The clothes were suited to the occasion. Dresses were made of less material than in the previous years. Daily wear was full-skirted dresses that swept the floor. For special occasions the style of dress remained the same but better material was used. The Pike Bonnet replaced the dust cap for special occasions the bonnets were made from straw, velvet, or silk accented with lace, ribbons, or flowers. The shoe style changed for the rugged country wear.

The style stayed the same without many variations until 1849. Then came the gold fever. This was a nation of great wealth and clothes became a thing of great detail. Dresses were satin, brocade, and finishes of silk. Hats were great displays and the women changed from the rugged shoes to slippers and dainty high-topped shoes. The drab colors were out and bright colors, in. White dress lacked in style was made up for in color. Fur muffs and neck pieces were prominent.

Then came the Civil War. This put the U. S. on the spot again, homespun material was in effect. In 1890 the Civil War had ended and women were once again enjoying the finer things of life. Another trend was taking place—lace hose, lace gloves, and gayer colors. This was a period of gay times, which is referred to now as the "gay 90's."

1900 hundred, this found the nation slowing down a bit. The look was in plain style. The Gibson girl look. Head bank came into effect, the more daring wore black cotton hose. By 1912 the style had taken a cultured look, the style of the ballet dresses. 1914 brought the

bobble skirts and continued until WWI broke out. After the war ended then came the flapper style—low waist and short skirts. 1929 the hemline was lowered. 1930 the flapper craze had ended. Then came the crash of the stock market. The clothes took a more mature look. It was the casual look and continued until 1939. 1941 found the U. S. in WWII and a time to conserve everything. Women started wearing slacks and Eisenhower jackets were worn. Hose were almost impossible to get and the bare-leg look came in. Bobby sox were in. 1945 the war ended and the style simple. 1948 brought a longer ruffled look. This continued until 1950. The hemlines were again raised. By 1955 the "A" line look was in. Many variations of this look were seen in clothes through 1960. 1961 the style took on a more regal look, long slim lines. This was the space age. There was another style, brought not by beatniks and folksinger, this was the pheasant look. 1965 finds mostly the same style, with a few variations. Knee high boots and stretch pants. Dresses with short skirts and vivid color. Lace hose are a must. The emphasis is on eye makeup. As one would look about R. H. S. they could see that the styles are the latest.

In looking around one could always find the latest styles in the Rotan Dept. Store. The students of RHS are abreast of the time.

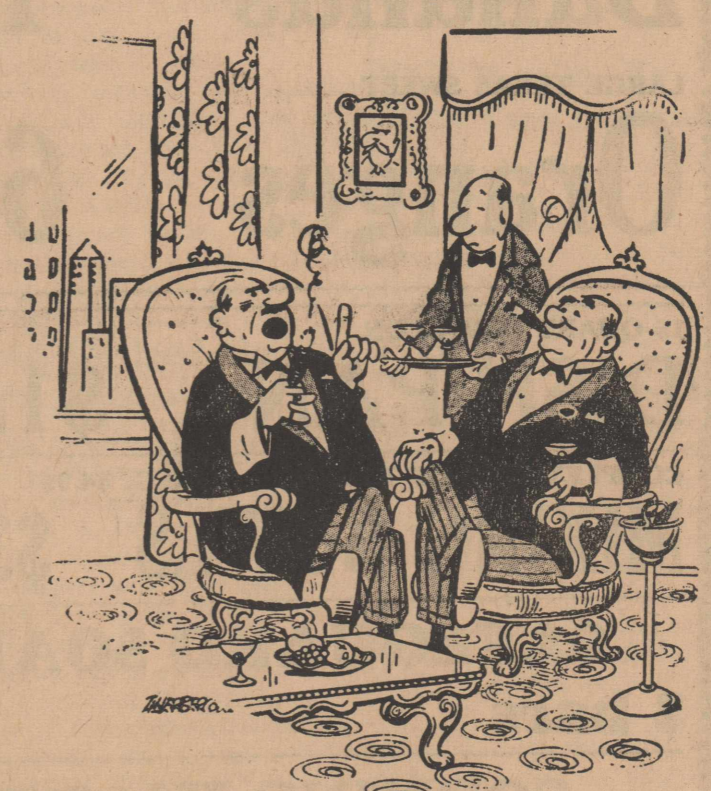

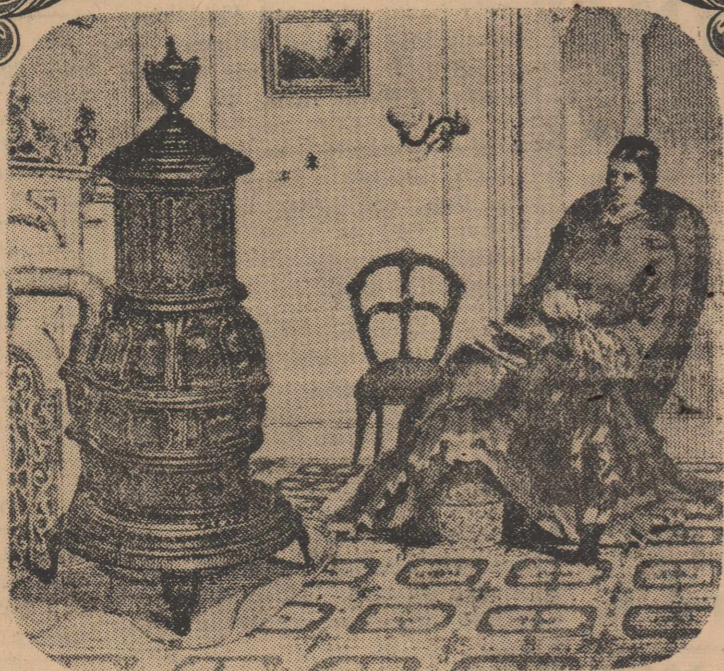

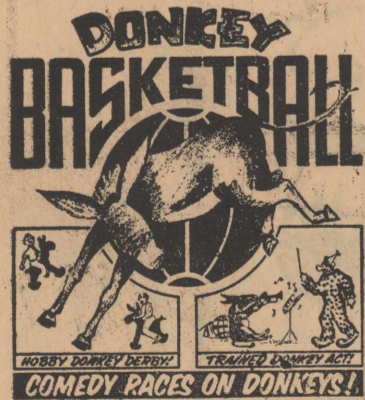

LOAD UP with ideas for more profitable farming

Texas FHA Head Gives Anti-Poverty Loan Inf.

The first loan to help a Texas low-income rural family raise their income and attain a better standard of living under President Johnson's War on Poverty Program was explained today by Lester J. Cappleman, State Director for the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Cappleman gave details on a loan being made to a family who operates a small farm near Long Branch, Panola County, which Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today announced as one of eleven such loans being made throughout the country.

The loan was made to a 57 year old farmer and his wife, parents of 8 children, living near Long Branch, Panola County, Texas; \$2,500 for 15 years to refinance a mortgage which is overdue against his small 25-acre farm, purchase a milk cow and a mule, carry out some land development work and pay operating expenses on his 1965 truck crop which will consist of 2 1/2 acres of tomatoes and cucumbers. The family of ten also will raise a large garden and some pigs to meet their family food needs. Improvements made with the loan will enable this family to make a 50 percent increase in their gross income which last year totaled \$1,540.

Cappleman said approximately 75 applicants for economic opportunity loans have been received.

The loans are authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which includes a rural credit service involving \$35 million in Federal funds.

In addition, three other loans have been approved in Texas; one to a 51 year old farmer who lives in Harrison County near Marshall, Texas.

There are five children in this family. The total amount of the loan is \$2,500. The funds will be used to purchase 12 acres of land, and move and repair a house to be located on the 12 acres being purchased. This will provide a more adequate dwelling for the family.

The third loan made this week in Texas, according to Mr. Cappleman, was one made to a widow living near Hempstead in Waller County. A loan of \$280 is being used to assist this widow in purchasing livestock and drilling a well so that she and her

family will have a sanitary water supply for domestic purposes.

The Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Washington and Waller Counties, Temple Evans, has developed a farming program on the small acreage which should result in an increased gross income of approximately \$400 per year.

The fourth loan was made to a couple living in Bell County who operate a small farm. The loan funds will be used to enable them to add an additional source of income through the construction of equipping of a small tractor and farm implement repair shop. With this additional source of income, the family will be able to raise their level of living from \$1,200 per year to approximately \$2,000 per year after the business is in operation. This will amount to a 50 percent increase in their gross income from all sources.

The State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas stated that all personnel are enlisting the assistance of rural agricultural and business leaders, school teachers, ministers, welfare workers, charitable organizations and others to assist this agency in informing low-income rural families of the opportunities available to them in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

According to Mr. Cappleman, "The 1960 Agricultural Census showed approximately 375,000 rural families, both farm and non-farm, living in the country and in communities of less than 2,500 population, receive a gross income of \$3,000 a year or less from all sources. This means we have a real challenge in Texas in providing opportunities for these families to improve their level of living."

All of the loans bear a 4 1-8 percent interest. Economic Opportunity Loans may be made in amounts up to \$2,500 to finance small family business, trades, services, and farming enterprises.

The rural families eligible for anti-poverty loans are confronted with such problems as limited resources; low incomes; indebtedness beyond their present ability to repay; lack of management skills, and an unsatisfactory level of living. To help overcome these problems and assure success of the new business or farming enterprises, borrowers will be provided with intensive and continuing management aid by local

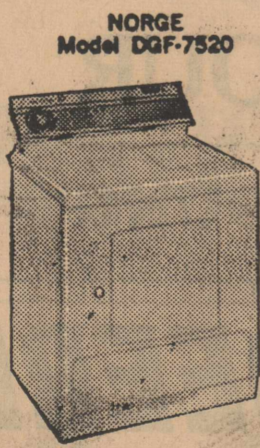

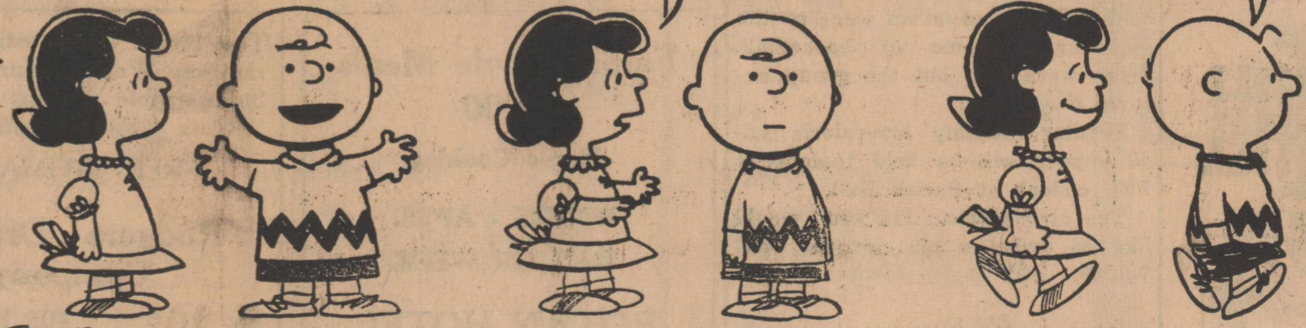
