WHEREAS, the terms of three Directors will expire on April 6, 1965, and now it is deemed necessary to hold an election for the purpose of electing three Directors as required by the law above mentioned; BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF ROTAN MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election be held within said Authority on the 6th day of April, 1965, for the purpose of electing three Directors for said Authority, with each of said Directors to serve for a term of two years, from the date of this election or until his successor is elected and qualified.

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, Rotan, Texas.

3. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon substantially the following:

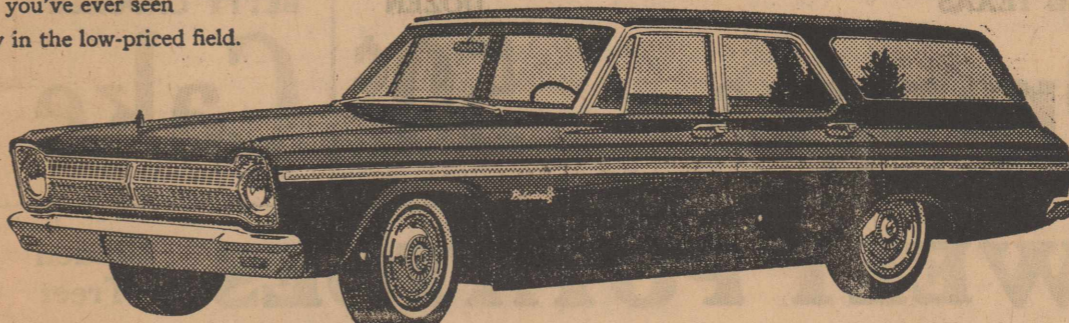

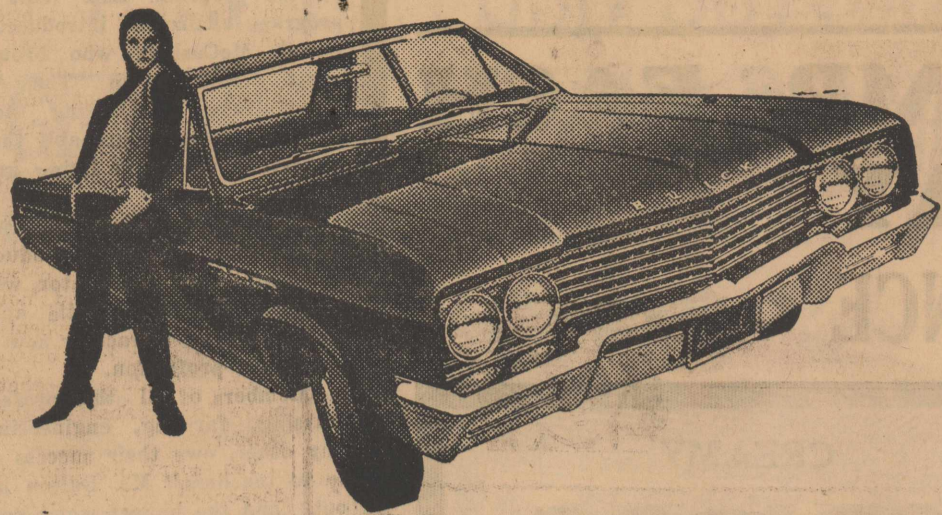

Resist the urge to prune trees and shrubs in the garden until you are relatively sure all danger of severe freeze is past.

Often the impulse is to start pruning rose bushes and other shrubs with the first shirt sleeve weather in January and February. In most areas of Texas there is still danger of freeze damage to tender growth as late as mid-March.

Warm weather in January frequently forces the terminal buds to begin growing. If this growth is removed by early pruning, the lateral buds begin to grow during the next warm spell and a late cold snap may cause serious damage to these buds.

The following are the only justifications for pruning plants: to remove dead or diseased wood; to repair storm damage or mechanical injury; to balance the top with the root system when transplanting; to develop and maintain a desired shape or size; to rejuvenate older plants; or to improve or increase flowers and fruit.

Flowering trees and shrubs which bloom early in the spring, such as flowering quince, spiraea, forsythia, lilac, and redbud, should not be pruned until after flowering.

Trees and shrubs which flower from early summer through the fall months, such as Crepemyrtle, hybrid tea roses, and shrub althea, usually produce their flower buds on new wood. They should be pruned in late winter or early spring after danger of frost is over and when new growth begins.

Complete information and illustrations on pruning trees and shrubs can be obtained from the local Extension Agents' offices by requesting B-977 "Modern Pruning Method." Either call by our office or drop us a card requesting the bulletin and we will mail it to you.

Don't take chances on losing a stand to soil and seed-borne disease organisms.

Chemical seed treatment is inexpensive and effective and the recommended chemicals are safe and easy to use.

The chemical forms a protective coating around the seed and protects it from micro-organism growth during the period of germination. However, seed treatment will not control damping-off after the seedlings grow out of the treated zone. Damping-off organisms develop most rapidly when weather conditions are unfavorable and causes growers to associate damping-off of seedlings with cold, wet weather.

Most commercially purchased planting seed will be treated and this will be noted on the container tag. Growers who save their own planting seed can purchase seed treatment chemicals at most agricultural supply houses.

If seed are treated on the farm, the important thing is to get a uniform covering of the protective fungicide over the seed coat. This can be done with a home-made device which will tumble the seed and mix the fungicide thoroughly with the seed being treated.

Be sure and use the proper dosage. Lower than recommended dosage may cause the treatment to be ineffective while excessive rates may damage the seed. Some diseases are borne inside the seed and these must be treated by different methods.

Cow Raised on Protein-Free diet Gives Birth to Normal Calf — A 930 lb. Angus cow that hasn't had a mouthful of natural feed since she was weaned gave birth to a normal calf at USDA's Beltsville research farm. She was fed a chemically pure diet containing urea as only source of dietary nitrogen. Scientists are studying blood plasma and milk samples to learn how micro-organisms in rumen convert urea and other purified food into vital amino acids. Other items in the cow's diet were cornstarch, corn sugar, wood pulp, corn oil, minerals and vitamins.

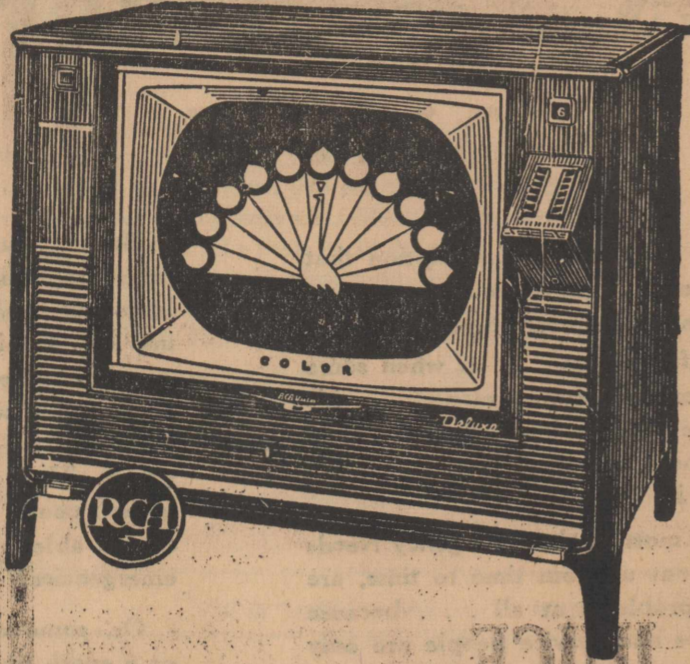
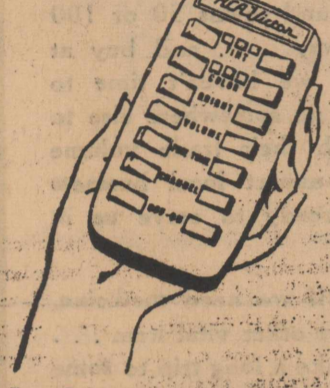

At various times during the week of February 1-5, three high school teachers were ill with the flu and unable to attend school.

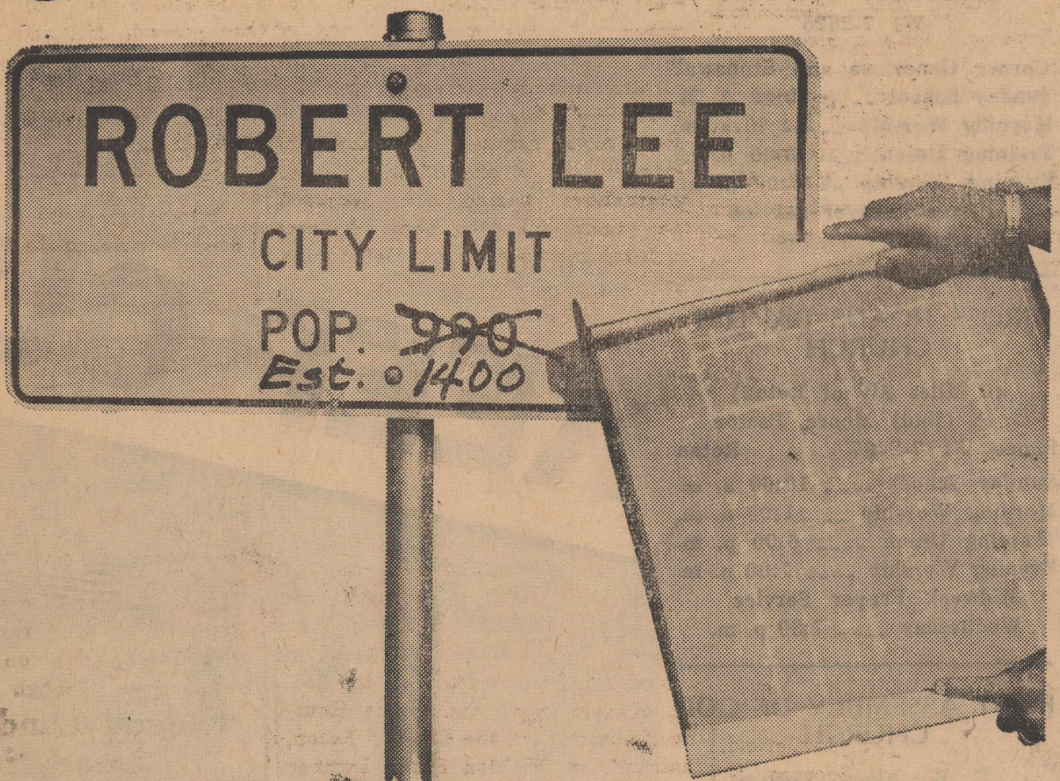
