Savings Bond Sales for the first three months of 1965 in Fisher County totaled \$19,358. Of this amount, \$4,365 were purchased during March according to a report released by R. L. Springer, chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1965 amounted to \$39,286,192, which represents 26% of the state goal of \$158 million.

**Christian Science Service Sunday**

The question of whether mankind can actually exist without God will be explored in depth at all Christian Science churches this Sunday. The subject is "Adam and Fallen Man."

**Stock Water Is Age-Old Rancher Problem**

In periods of drought, one of the most crucial problems facing livestock producers in our area, is having an adequate supply of livestock water. Livestock watering facilities should be adequate for the number of livestock which are to be served; they should be well placed, and properly maintained.

The most common method of supplying livestock water in our area is by the pond or what is commonly called the "tank". Our ponds should be deep and cover a small surface area so the high evaporation will reduce to a minimum during the hot dry periods.

Also, they should be large enough to furnish water storage to serve the number of animals planned, even during hot dry periods, and must be properly maintained to insure an adequate water supply for a long period of time.

Perhaps the most dependable source of water is from the well. If good well water is available, it should be utilized as first choice for developing livestock watering facilities. To insure a dependable supply of water from a well, a water storage facility, which holds a seven day supply of water for the number of animals to be served, can be constructed. If the well cannot be put in a desired location, the water can be piped to the needed location, from either the well or storage facility. Piping of water can also be done from ponds if they cannot be constructed in a desirable watering location. In an instance like this, the pond should be fenced out so the watering place can be controlled.

The spacing of livestock watering facilities is important in insuring that the livestock get adequate amounts of water as well as forage. On steep or rough land, they should not be spaced over one half mile apart; not over three-fourths mile apart on rolling or sandy land; and not over one and one half miles apart on smooth, firm land.

The correct placing of watering facilities in pastures plays a key role in getting more even distribution of grazing. Watering facilities can be placed in normally lightly grazed areas to get more uniform use over the pasture. They should never be placed in small necks in pastures or any other location that would cause cattle to congregate in small areas for a period of time. Watering facilities placed in these situations would result in severe over-use in parts of the pasture and under-size in other parts.

The personnel of the Rotan office of the Soil Conservation Service, which assists the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District, will be glad to assist you in planning your livestock watering facility program to best fit your needs and needs of the land.
