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

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

Interest in growing and producing pecans has been on the increase the last few years here in the county. The pecan nut casebearer reduces pecan production more than any other insect.

Wet and cold weather in Texas has greatly influnced the development of the Pecan Nut casebearer this season. According to information from the U.S. Pecan Field Station at Brownwood, they plan to start their casebearer spray program in their orchard around May 25. Information from West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville, they plan to start their spray program around May 26 and continue until approximately June 1. Two of the main insecticides recommended for the control of the casebearer are Sevin (wettable powder) and Malathion.

A livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says grub control in beef cow herds can sometimes increase calf weaning weights as much as 40 pounds.

The Specialists, Dr. Dixon Hubbard, says grub control costs as little as 12 cents per cow and few

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
