City Directory To Be Published Soon

After several unavoidable delays, final preparations are being made for publication of current issue of Rotan City Directory.

Boy Scouts have completed their survey of listings which will be screened at the last minute before publication for any changes in listings. They made an accurate canvass and called back when residents were not home, which should make the listings as near perfect as humanly possible.

The Directory which has been published every two years will be enlarged and improved with the current issue. New map of city will be enlarged to fold in 17x17 in size, which has been a handicap in the past. The larger size map will be much more legible and fills a definite need.

The 1965 issue will carry pictures and information of various facilities of Rotan, which is used by Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce in response to information about Rotan, which they receive regularly. Supply of Directories are also kept at City Hall where each new citizen is presented a copy, which proves desirable to advertisers. Free distribution will be made at every home in Rotan and copies will be mailed on all routes.

Joe Dominey Helping NBC Coverage Of Gemini Space Flight

Joe Dominey, News Director for KMD-TV, Big Spring, was featured in Sunday issue of Big Spring Herald as assisting in the Gemini-Titan IV flight scheduled for this morning.

He married the former Sandy Morrow and is son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Juston Morrow.

NBC News will employ an unprecedented technique for continuing an up-to-the-second television coverage of the four day Gemini-Titan TV flight, William R. McAndrew, executive vice president in charge of the NBC News Division, announced.

The new method will utilize these elements: Immediately preceding the beginning of every NBC-TV program from sign-on to sign-off during the four days of the flight, NBC News will provide live special reports with NBC News correspondents reporting the progress of the nation's longest two-man space mission to date.

KMD will assist in the operation by providing their field unit videotape recorder to the control station at NASA Headquarters in Houston. This VTR is one of the very few units in the state of Texas. The KMD equipment, complete with engineering crews left for Houston Monday.

NBC News will also broadcast 12 special programs ranging from 15 minutes to one hour in length.

May Rains 2nd Highest Since May 1926

Cotton planting was again stopped Monday when rainfall from half to inch covered the area. Fred Byerly gauged .45 inch, which up .60 was general, but to the north an inch was reported.

Most farmers had not been able to plant since the heavy rains, but several have cotton growing nicely. The majority were either planting or just ready to start when this rain came. This work was resumed Wednesday in some parts and with favorable weather much of the planting will be completed this week.

Byerly reports 12.53 inches this year, to date. May report this year was 9.41 inches, which is his second highest monthly total since he began reporting in 1926. His record month is May 1935, 9.57.

Temperature has been very comfortable because of the rains with a 91 high thus far. Some of our hottest weather usually comes about June 10, but chances for a pleasant June now exist as this immediate area as well as all the country to the south have received ample moisture.

M. W. Strickland Dies Of Extended Illness

M. W. Strickland, pioneer citizen of Rotan died at 5:15 p. m., Tuesday in Callan Hospital. He had been critically ill for several days and in failing health for several years.

Funeral will be held at 10 a. m., Thursday in First Methodist Church with Rev. R. N. Huckabee of Lubbock and Rev. Marvin Fisher, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Belview Cemetery, with Weathersbee Funeral Home in charge.

Sons of nephews will serve as pallbearers.

Mr. Strickland was born Oct. 10, 1889, in Lineville, Ala., and he came with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Strickland, to Fisher County about 1900. He had lived in the county since that time.

He married Ruth Jenkins in Rotan Sept. 10, 1924. Mr. Strickland had been a member of the First Methodist Church here since October, 1924. He was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the Masonic Lodge.

The lodge will be in charge of graveside rites. The family requests that any memorials be in the form of donations to West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.

Survivors are his wife; three daughters, Rebecca Strickland of Rotan, Mrs. Charles Race of El Paso, and Mrs. Wallace Strayhorn of Burk Burnett; one sister, Mrs. Ella Smith of Abilene; and eight grandchildren.

Draft Quota Heaviest Since January 1964

Austin, Texas, May 31 -- The state draft quota for June is 695, compared to 639 in May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

The June call of 695 men is the biggest since January 1964, when 812 Texans were directed to report for military service.

The June call is the Texas share of a national quota for 17,000 men, all for the Army.

The state Selective Service director also announced that state draft boards will forward 3,338 males for Army mental-physical examination in May, 535 of whom will be 18-year-olds.

These tests for 18-year olds are the result of President Johnson's action in 1964 which ordered the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine

Unemployed men who are out of school and available for service. Males married at age 18 and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined.

Colonel Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be considered for the armed forces at this time. Normally, draft for service is about age 22.

Hot Weather Hints

Summertime brings a return to the out-of-doors and its many games and sports.

Summertime also brings back the hot sunshine, high temperature and cases of sunburn.

Vigorous out-of-doors physical activity in the hot summer months is fun for almost all of us, but it can also bring health problems.

In a pamphlet, "Tips on Training," the American Medical Association and the National Federation of State Athletic Associations offer some hot weather tips for athletes that also can be applied to that big majority of Americans who are only occasional weekend athletes.

* Have a careful medical check-up prior to starting a program of vigorous activity, such as returning to the tennis court or the golf course for the first time after the winter hiatus.

* Plan your more vigorous sports and games in the cooler hours of the days, mornings and early evenings.

* Become acclimatized to the heat by graduated approach to exercise. Don't play to much or too long for the first few sessions in the heat.

* Take frequent rest periods. Don't be ashamed to sit down on a bench and rest while awaiting your turn at the tee. Take 15 minutes for a rest break between sets of tennis.

* Wear white clothing to reflect the heat, loose and comfortable to permit heat escape and permeable to moisture to allow heat loss via

sweating.

* Drink enough water to replace loss from sweating. Small, frequent drinks of water, perhaps half a glass, are better than gulping large quantities.

* Watch yourself and the others in your party for signs of trouble. Don't try to be a "he man." If the heat begins to get you down, stop, rest and cool off.

* Remember that the temperature and humidity are even more important than the sun. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke can occur in the shade on a hot, humid day.

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According to Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., cotton should be checked weekly by examining 100 squares at least one-third grown. Squares should be selected at random from several representative areas of the field. When 15 to 25 per cent or more have weevil punctures, begin treatment. Apply insecticides at five-day intervals.

After one-third grown squares are present and egg laying has started, infestations may still be confined to small areas of the field in some cases.

Check your field carefully, if punctured squares are found in only a portion of the field, spray only

that area. The spot treatment method where applicable is cheaper and beneficial insects are not affected in the unsprayed areas of the field.

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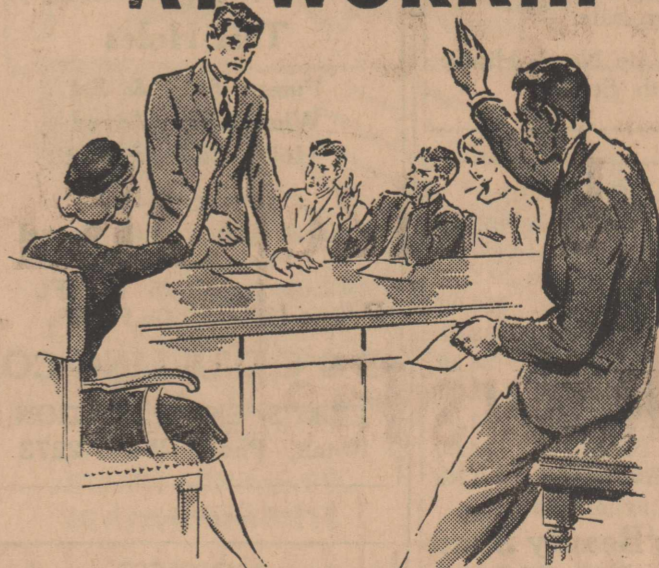

Phillips Back in States After Viet Nam Action

USS Hancock (CVA 19) (FHT-NC) May 30 - Fireman Apprentice Dalton R. Phillips, USN, son of Mrs. Joe S. Howard of Rotan, was scheduled to arrive in Alameda, Calif., May 29, aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Hancock, following a seven-month cruise with the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific that included three months of combat operations.

Since February 7, until she departed the Western Pacific for the United States, the Hancock participated in the majority of the air strikes conducted against North Viet Nam and communist Viet Cong guerillas in South Viet Nam.

In eight major strikes and numerous minor operations, Hancock aircraft struck communist billeting areas, harassed ground traffic, and knocked out anti-aircraft batteries, radar installations and may bridges vital to communist supply movements.

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'As It Looks From Here'

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Washington, D. C. -- Books -- Tom Lea's "Brave Bulls" -- Ernest Hemingway's "Death in the Afternoon" -- other books about bullfighting.

These two, although novels, describe the art -- and the bullfighting enthusiast makes the point that it is an art -- a drama -- not a sport. It portrays the skill and courage of the man over the stout-hearted and ferocious animal.

Those who may have seen bullfights in Mexico or Spain will recall the colorful pageantry of it all and the hearty "Ole's" of the native Latins. (Other countries permitting bullfighting in full or modified form are Ecuador, Peru, Venezuela and possibly one or two others.) If the Matador performs well -- if he accurately places his sword when the final "Moment of Truth" arrives, he may be awarded the bull's ears and receive the plaudits of the crowd with roars of "Ole." Should he require more than one thrust to find the vital and fatal spot, he may be awarded one ear, or nothing at all, and the Ole's may be faint. He may even have whistles, which is an uncomplimentary expression from the spectators.

Some months ago a new kind of Matador appeared on the gleaming sands of the ring in Cordova, Spain. His name -- Jose Delgado. A real fitting name for a real bullfighter. The facts, however, are somewhat different. Dr. Jose Delgado is a professor of Science at Yale University.

The story is that Dr. Delgado faced a charging bull armed only with a cape and a small transistor radio transmitter.

At a precise moment the scientist pressed a button and the mighty animal not only checked his rushing charge, but stopped in his tracks. Pressing another button, the bull docilely turned to the right and trotted to the side of the arena.

The amazing "Moment of Truth" in this contest between man and beast was produced, not by a long and narrow bit of shiny steel, but by precisely placed electrodes which Dr. Delgado had painlessly inserted in the bull's brain the day before.

It was all done to demonstrate the potential or actual value to science and therapy. Already claimed are great advances in the treatment of epilepsy. But now, to be a little facetious -- what a Pandora's box Dr. Delgado may have opened. For instance, if a senator or a

congressman is saying something in the Legislative Halls which is not liked at the White House, a button is pushed and the speaker yields. Another press on the sensitive instrument and he walks away in a strange and unseeing manner. He may charge in again, but his point of view has been reversed. (Come to think of it -- no, surely not -- but one could wonder if there have been a few installations of electrodes. If the operation is painless, as the scientists say, it would hurt less than a twisted arm. There's a lot to come yet in this Session of the Congress -- a far-reaching Public Housing Bill, Urban Renewal, creation of a Cabinet Post for Urban Affairs, Voting Rights bill, repeal of States' Right-to-work laws, revision in gun control, raising Federal debt limit again, liberalizing immigration laws, and many other measures.)

Now, if every constituent had one of these transmitting devices and his Congressman was wired to receive, imagine what a close relation-

ship would exist. Of course, the Congressman would be going in all directions (as he sometimes do any way) but likely without any great success at anything. It really would, though, be a representative Government, even if it led to anarchy.

Well, maybe not so good -- but there is another thought as an aid to higher education.

Suppose a certain group of university students, demonstrating their resentment against discipline, curtailment of their unrestrained liberties, or against IBM cards, are subject to the press of a button by school authorities. The press of one button would send them to the dormitories -- another button pressed might even cause them to wash and shave. Ole!
