## Hillcrest and First Baptist Churches Merge

The Hillcrest Baptist Church and the First Baptist Church of Rotan merger was made final last Sunday night. This merger was a historical step in Baptist work in this area. The main reason for the merger of the two churches was the unifying of the Baptist witness of the city in order that a greater and better witness for the cause of Christ could be had in the City of Rotan. This desire to have a program that would be better and that would have a greater impact upon our area for the cause of Christ was what led both congregations to this decision. The merger took effect immediately with the membership, assets, obligations, and commitments of both congregations becoming one. The spirit of harmony in which the merger was carried out by both groups was outstanding.

At the time of the merger both congregations were financially sound, alive, and doing a good work, with people working in harmony. Yet, there was still that desire to have the greatest witness possible, and the leaders of both congregations felt that a merger of both forces was the only way that this could ever be achieved.

Other reasons for the merger were to eliminate overlapping of expense and work. It was also felt that a merger would give a stronger faculty in the Sunday school and better leaders in the training union; thus, a much better educational system throughout the whole church. Much consideration was given to a well-planned and correlated youth program.

The big thrust for the merger came when the deacons of both bodies met to discuss what needed to be done in order to have a greater witness for the cause of Christ in the City of Rotan. It was the unanimous opinion of both deacon bodies that a merger would be a great step in this direction.

An invitation is extended to all to attend the first big service of the two merged congregations this coming Sunday at First Baptist Church.

## Scott Mitchell On World Wide Expansion Plan

Abilene, Tex.-Scott Mitchell, participated in the planning of worldwide expansion of Herald of Truth television and radio religious broadcasts at the second Herald of Truth workshop held Sept. 8-9, in Abilene. Mitchell was among 275 key workers from 30 states that attended the workshop. Key workers volunteered their efforts to secure local support among churches of Christ for the evangelistic broadcasts.

New expansion of the international broadcasts, outlined in a seven-phase five-year plan of increased program utilization and budgetary growth to \$2,239,250 per year by 1969, would "saturate the world with the gospel of Jesus Christ," according to the elders of Abilene's Highland Church of Christ, program producers.

Herald of Truth radio programs are now broadcast by a total of 515 stations, including 226 stations on two major networks (ABC and Mutual) and 289 independent stations. Herald of Truth television presentations are currently being telecast by 123 stations. The television and radio programs are broadcast in 14 countries.

The programs are supported by churches of Christ and interested individuals throughout the world.

## Good Rains Bring Much Cooler Weather

Sweaters and coats were in style Tuesday and Wednesday morning when temperatures dipped in the '50s. The cool weather was most welcome following two weeks of extreme hot, with temperatures going to 104 last Wednesday and reaching 100 for several days. The nights had been unusually warm for September, also. Much damage was suffered by crops during this period, but yield now looks somewhat better with the nice rains.

Fred Byerly gauged 1.51 for the week at his station in town, with the fall being much heavier at various points in the territory. Farmers tell us some crops will not be aided by the moisture, but most all agree overall the area is greatly benefited.

The rain fell slowly and no damage was reported in the county. The south portion of Nolan County had a big strip of country to suffer heavy crop and property damage from hail and wind. Other points of West Texas also had much damage.

Considerable mechanical gathering is planned but much of the crop will require hand gathering, due to rank stalk and foliage. Supply of labor is uncertain at this time. A number of crews have come in and more are arriving daily.

## Oil Test No. 21 Nearing Completion

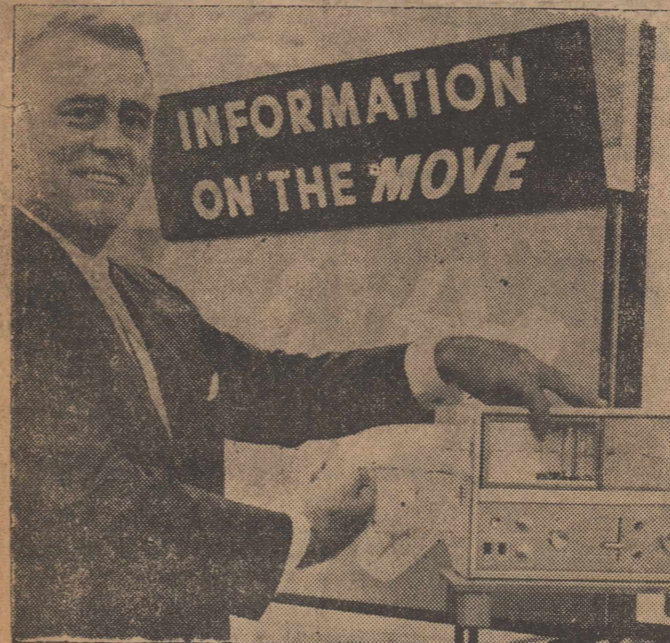
No. 1 Unit 21 City of Rotan oil test in the Upper Hope Lime field was at 3205 Wednesday morning. Officials expect to core this week-end if not earlier. No trouble in drilling has been encountered and the test is being completed in unusually short time. This is drilled by LeClair Operator Co., Inc., in this growing oil field.

Proposed depth is 4,100 feet. This is 1650 feet of nearest production in section 112, block 2, H&TC Survey.

Next test in townsite is drilling block number 15, and proposed location is 645 feet south of the center of Beauregard street and 676 feet west of the center of Lincoln avenue. This is just north of the new county warehouse, west of town. Notice of hearing on permit for this test appears in this issue of the Advance.

## Conservation Dist. Observing Anniversary

Soil and Water Conservation Districts of Texas will be celebrating their 25th Anniversary during their Annual Meeting in Corpus Christi, Texas, October 12, 13 and 14, 1965. The meeting will be in the Robert Driscoll Hotel.

According to Milburn Cook, Work Unit Conservator of the Rotan Soil Conservation Service Office, there are 183 Soil and Water Conservation Districts in Texas, covering better than 99% of the land area with over 160,000 land owner cooperators. There are five Supervisors on the governing body of each Soil and Water Conservation District totaling 915 Supervisors in Texas.

The Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District Board is composed of Glen Webb, Chairman; Elmer Jordan, Vice chairman; Alvin Smith, Secretary; Alfred Douglass and Jack Willingham, who are Board Members. These Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors are unpaid, elected, officials given many responsibilities include control and prevention of erosion, thereby preserving natural resources; control floods, prevent impairment of dams and reservoirs, assist in maintaining navigability of rivers and harbors, preserve wildlife, protect the tax base, protect public lands, and protect and promote the health, safety and general welfare of the people of this State.

Those eligible to attend this Annual Meeting are District Cooperators, bankers, legislators, equipment dealers and many others interested in the conservation of natural resources.

Area men feared that Rogers, who was new to the country, had fallen over a bluff in the canyon country, or possibly had been bitten by a rattlesnake.

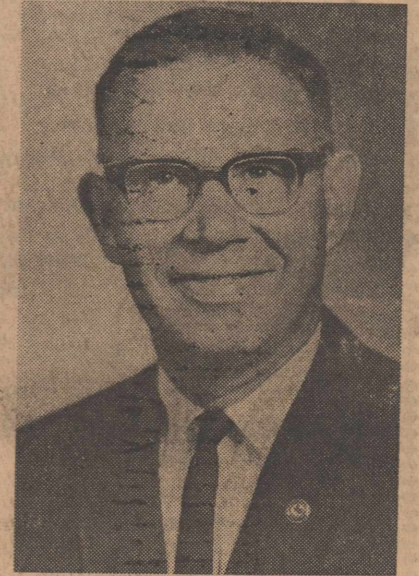
The man walked in about 10 o'clock Monday morning complaining of being "a little tired."

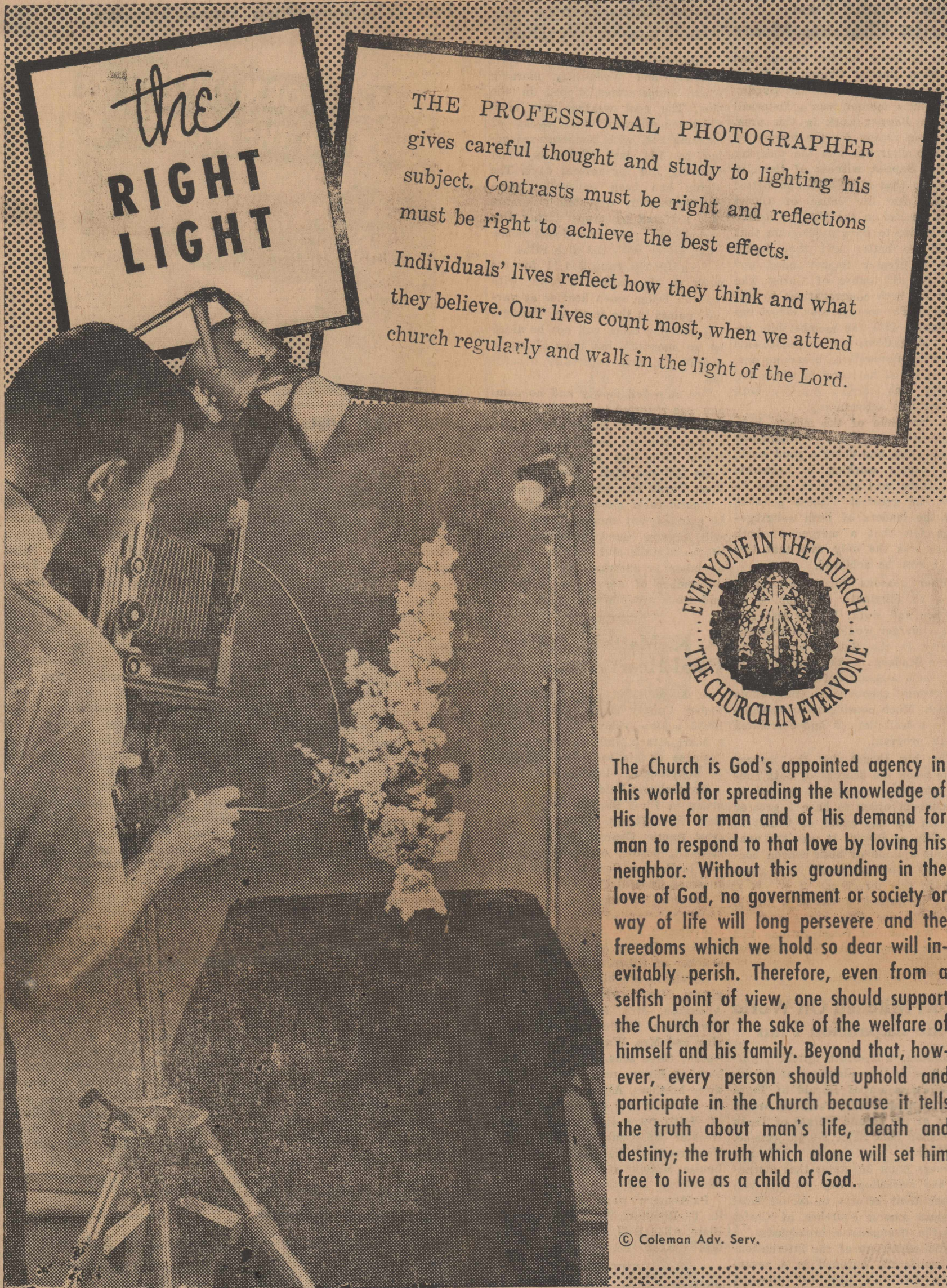

**Warning On 'Fly-By Night' Home Siding Salesman Given**

The following information supplied by Lubbock's Better Business Bureau is being published because of reports of several Fisher County homeowners being defrauded by this vicious racket. Local home builders supply firms can supply the re-siding material and work at prices competitive to any, and are here to back up their work and materials.

"The Lubbock Better Business Bureau warned today that the "model home" racket continues to be used to defraud the public in the sale of aluminum and steel siding.

Tom V. Watson, Manager of the Bureau, said fast-talking salesmen dangle the lure of "something for nothing" to induce homeowners to sign installment sales contracts covering exorbitantly priced aluminum or steel siding jobs.

According to the National Better Business Bureau, with which the local Bureau is affiliated through membership, the California Attorney General has reported that homeowners in that state alone are bilked of more than \$7 million annually by fraudulent aluminum and steel siding sales schemes.

Even a conservative projection of these findings, NBBB said, would mean a huge annual toll nationwide.

The California official said more than 4,700 contracts, ranging from \$2,500 to \$6,000, were sold during an eighteen-month period. Salesmen's commissions on a single contract often were as high as \$1,000.

The BBB said that while most siding applications are responsible businessmen, a minority in the industry perpetrates the re-siding racket despite repeated public warnings by Better Business Bureaus over the years. It works this way:

The scheme relies on the typical "model home" pitch. The salesman, posing as a representative of a nationally-known aluminum or steel company, tells the homeowner his company has selected her home for "before-and-after" advertising of siding.

area who subsequently buys aluminum or steel siding from his company. He may offer a cash advance on these prospective commissions as an inducement.

In reality the salesman, usually an itinerant, does not represent a well-known company and has no intention of using the home as a model. The homeowner, who had been induced to sign various papers, actually is charged many hundred dollars more than the competitive price for aluminum or steel siding.

The Lubbock Bureau offered this advice to homeowners:

- Don't rush into any important home improvement project.
- Don't enter into any home improvement deal with the expectation of having promised commissions pay for its costs.

- Deal only with firms whose dependability is known to you or has been established through inquiry.
- Read and understand any contract before you sign and keep a copy of it.

- Call the Bureau for a report on the firm and for a free copy of "27 Questions for Home Owners regarding Home Improvements."

**Hospitals and You**

General Motors makes automobiles. A hospital takes care of sick people. The "products" are vastly different, yet each institution maintains efficient administration to assure quality work.

Good patient care in a hospital doesn't "just happen." It is achieved by:

- A topflight medical staff.
- Well-trained, loyal employees.
- Distinguished citizens serving on the board of trustees.
- Volunteers assisting in many ways.
- Generous benefactors contributing funds to build new facilities.
- Modern equipment (both diagnostic and therapeutic) to keep pace with the advances in medicine.

The job of marshaling all this talent into a well-coordinated team requires good administration which is the framework on which a hospital is built.

The administrative staff keeps the hospital running in an orderly manner, makes sure that all functions are carried out and that the hospital is physically and financially sound.

Administrative functions include management of the hospital as a

whole and of its individual departments. Supervisors or department heads manage their own departments and report to the administrator, the associate administrator of assistant administrators, depending on the size of the hospital.

As the chief executive officer, the administrator shoulders the main responsibility of seeing to it that the hospital continues to operate successfully, that it meets the needs of the community, that it fulfills its responsibilities as an educational and research center, and that it expands when necessary to serve an ever-increasing number of patients.

No one person could do all this alone. The administrator works closely with many individuals and groups to receive counsel and assistance. The medical staff and the board of trustees are two groups which are extremely important members of the administrative team.

Administrators differ in the way they operate hospitals. Most of them believe in seeing for themselves what is going on in every area of the hospital. They make rounds at least twice a day -- in the morning and evening -- conferring with department heads and supervisors, visiting patients, talking with visitors and keeping posted on every phase of the hospital operation.

In addition, they hold meetings with the administrative council consisting of all department heads and supervisors. Agendas are prepared in advance to plan discussion on

specific subjects.  
The administrators also meets regularly with the medical staff and its committees, with the board of trustees, with the volunteers, and during construction projects he (or she) confers almost every day with the architect and contractors.

Although personal contact is the main means of communication used by administrators, they also employ bulletins to convey important instructions to department heads, supervisors and employees, and to report matters of interest and importance to such groups as the medical staff, patients, volunteers, and benefactors.

On call 24 hours a day, hospital administrators combine prayer, faith, professional training, hard work, leadership, a sense of humor and humility in carrying out their responsibilities.

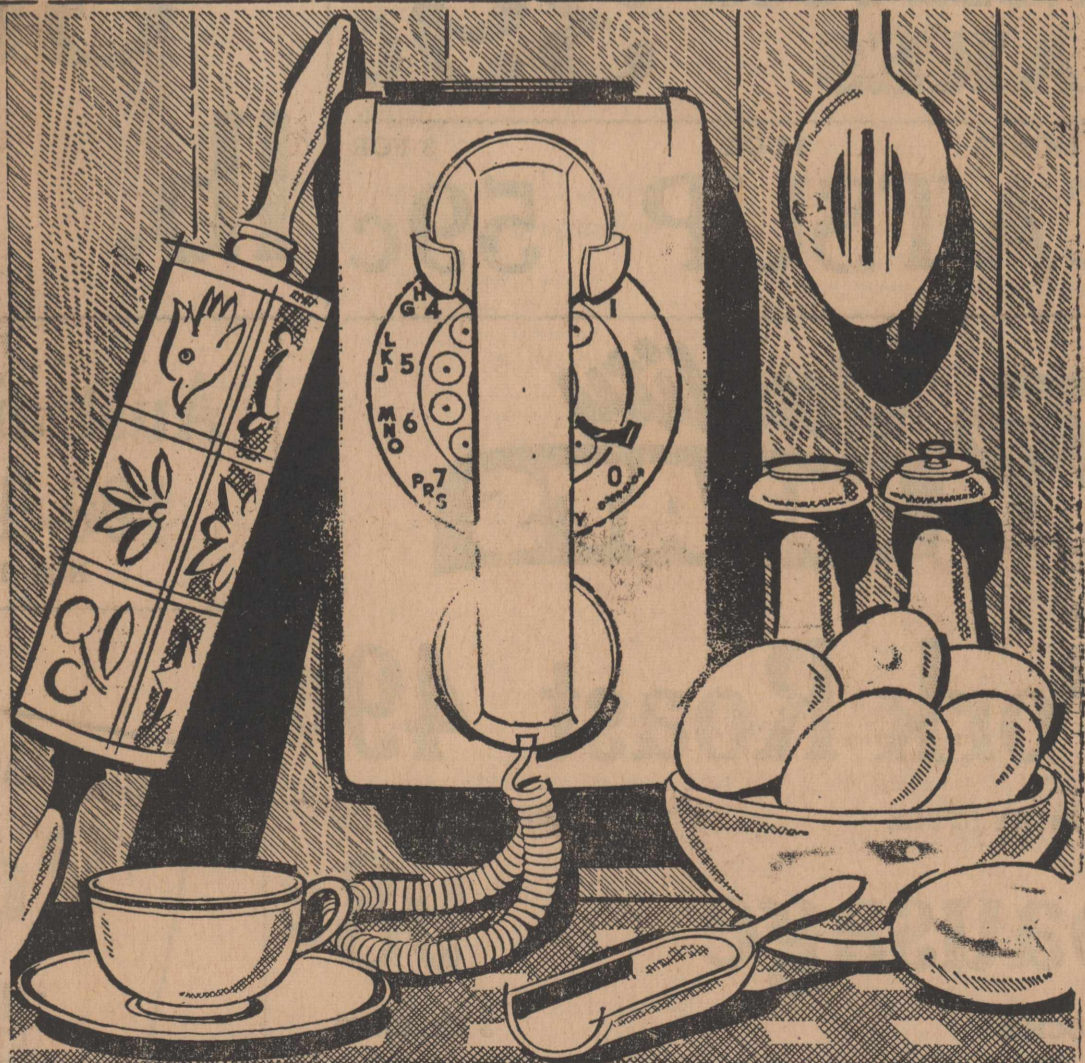

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health



Do you enjoy setting down to a tender, juicy T-bone steak?

Most of us do, and most of us eat our meat feeling secure that its quality is good, and that someone is looking out for our safety and good health.

This is true; two divisions of the Texas State Department of Health are directly concerned with the meat you eat -- the Food and Drugs Division and Veterinary Public Health Division.

For example, butcher shop and meat-cutting tables are checked by investigators for evidence of meat-borne diseases. This falls under the routine duties of a score of Texas' food and drug inspectors.

The Veterinary Public Health experts' work begins while the animal is on foot and leaves off where the food and drug personnel take over. Not only does the staff maintain a surveillance program of zoonoses -- diseases of animals transmissible to man -- but it goes a step further.

At present, 207 establishments participate in the State's inspection program. Of these, 164 use the square stamp, and 43 use the State of Texas outline stamp.

Not only has the meat that bears one of these legends been inspected

for wholesomeness, but the conditions under which the meat was processed were carefully observed for proper formulation and sanitation.

If the meat you eat has passed inspection, it will bear one of three stamps. The stamp will be square, indicating state approved municipal inspection; or an outline of Texas, showing State inspection; or round, indicating Federal inspection.

Of course, the two-by-two inch square stamp can't be shown on every piece of meat or on hamburger, but your meat-market man can tell you whether the meat was inspected or not.

But you, as an individual, have a responsibility, too. Yours is to look for the stamp on the meat certifying wholesomeness and ask your butcher about it, too.

Make it a point to check the quality of the meat you eat . . . help the many public health workers who are trying to protect and promote your health.

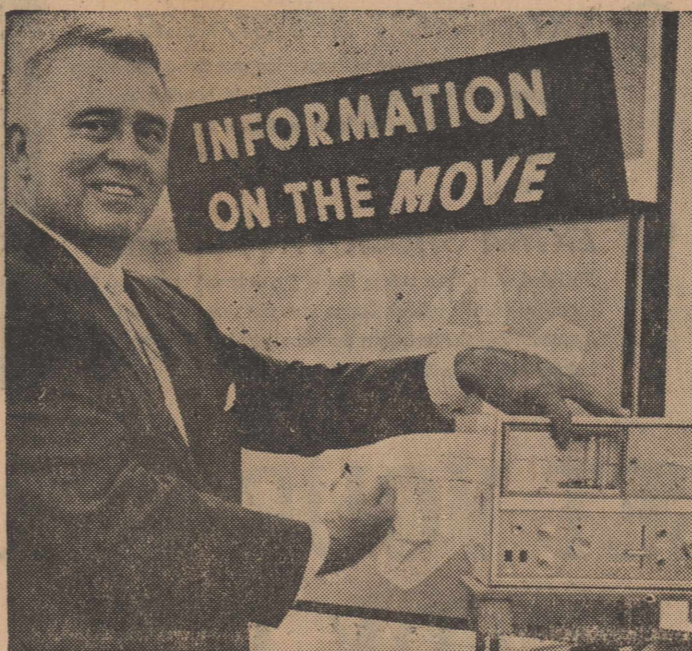
