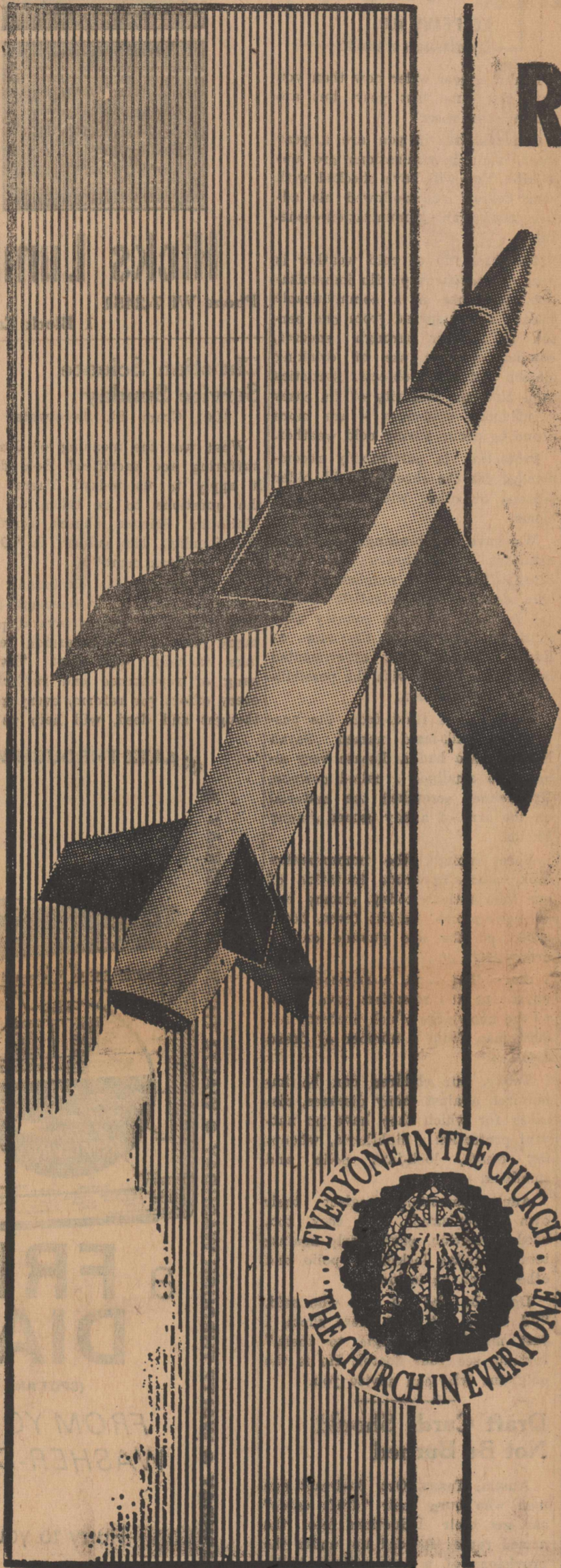

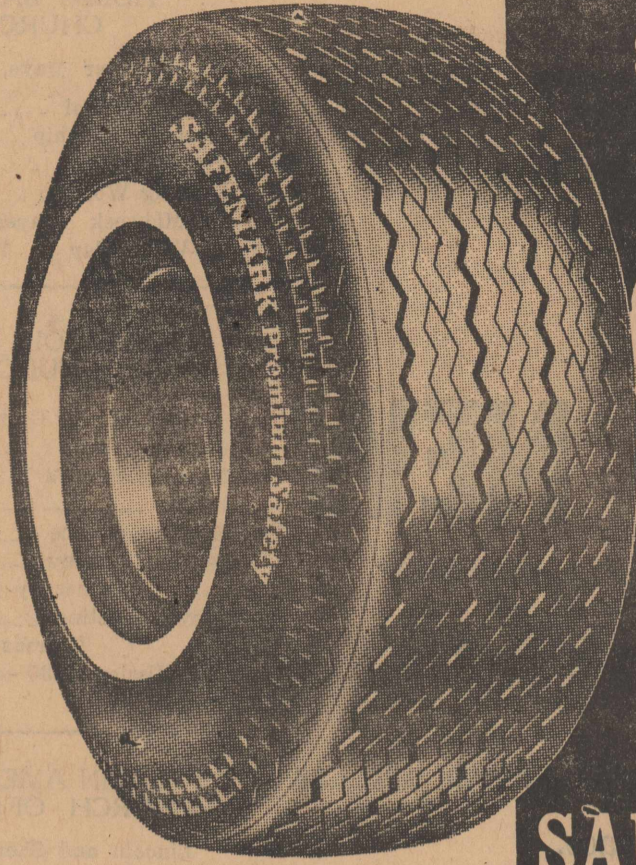

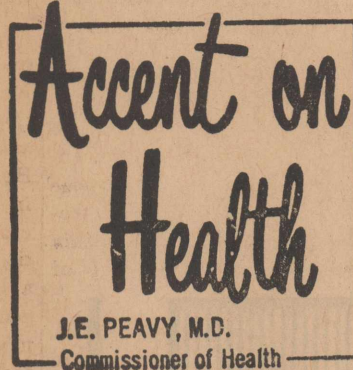

You're a year older now than you were this time last year, but are you a year wiser?

Chances are, if you are a year wiser, your immunizations are up-to-date. You will have checked with your doctor, and followed his advice about an immunization schedule.

The first nip of cold weather is your cue to check on flu immunization. Influenza is a communicable disease, easily spread from one person to another through sneezes, coughs, common use of drinking glasses and other objects. Statistics show that the majority of flu cases - influenza epidemics - are more prone to occur during cold weather.

Protection is particularly recommended for the chronically ill, older persons or other with health problems.

We have the blessings of immunizations today through the dedicated efforts of a number of curious doctors and scientists during the last 250 years. A country physician in England by the name of Edward Jenner first experimented in the late 1700's with the possibility of immunization.

Taking some fluid from the pustule of milk-maid named Sarah Nelmes, who had a disease very similar to smallpox - called cowpox, Dr. Jenner scratched the material on the arm of a boy named Jimmy Phelps.

Sure enough, the immunization took, much in crude imitation of our vaccinations today. Jimmy had mild symptoms - slight fever, headache and the one pustule on his arm.

Since that time, a succession of physicians and scientists have added to the knowledge which protects modern man from a number of dread diseases.

Today, our children can be immunized against many diseases, diseases for which they have no natural protection - diphtheria, whooping cough, lock-jaw, polio and smallpox.

Adults sometimes neglect their own immunization. But they, too, need protection, particularly against tetanus (alias lock-jaw), polio and others such as influenza.

Don't be like the lady who said, "I'd better not have these shots, I just might be allergic to them." Instead, see your doctor. He is the only one who can advise you.

Draft Cards Should Not Be Burned

Austin, Texas, Oct. 6.--Draft age men who burn their "draft cards" can get their inductions into the armed forces speeded up, under the provisions of a new official bulletin to Texas draft boards, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

The bulletin, issued as a result of Public Law 89-152, refers to legislation signed by President Johnson in August which makes it a criminal offense to "knowingly mutilate or destroy a registration certificate, or any other certificate" issued in official connection with the draft law or regulations.

The bulletin reads: "When such violations are brought to their attention, local boards are requested to consider whether or not such registrant-violators should be declared delinquent, reclassified if necessary, and their inductions accelerated."

Violators of the new law, which amends section 12 (b) (3) of the draft act, are also subject to punishment by imprisonment up to five years, or fine up to \$10,000, or both, upon prosecution and conviction.

Federal attorneys have been asked to advise appropriate draft boards when violations involving willful destruction and mutilation of registration certificates are referred to them by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

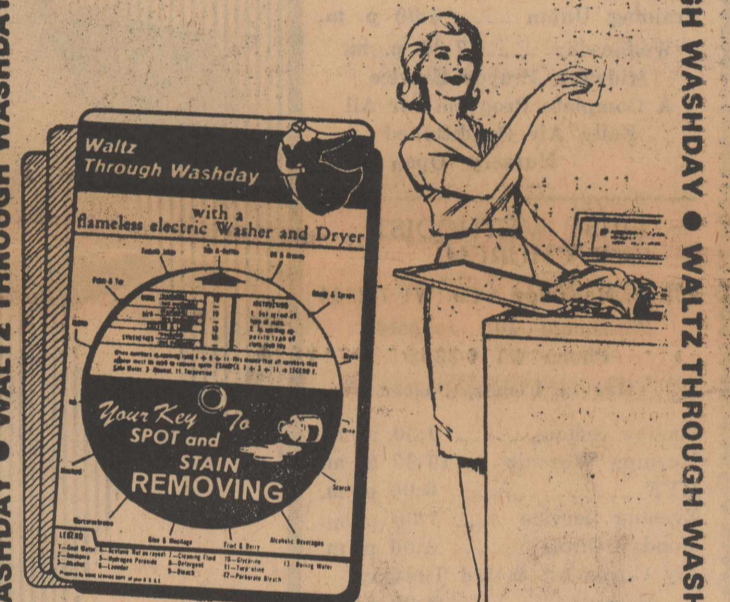
